Citizenship and Legislation

Greetings from your Department of Citizenship and Legislation. We hope for an inspiring and informative meeting at this time.

We have worked very hard this club year to keep the Association members informed throughout the State as to new legislation passed and how to implement same. The slow road to freedom and equal opportunity is frustrating. Throughout the country much talk, little action. After the Hunter's Point incident in San Francisco, it was said around five hundred jobs would be immediately opened to the people of that area. After extensive examinations and processing a very few was hired. The majority classified unqualified were turned back into the streets to roam still looking for work. However a community center has opened in that area and great strides are being made for the advancement of their cause.

To quote Dr. Martin Luther King, "That time will eventually end discrimination; that legislation is useless; that the Negro should pull himself up by his bootstraps, is a myth. Black rioting can be black suicide. But I condemn the conditions that cause people to feel they have no other way of getting attention. Rioting is the language of the unheard." All this is so very true.

The tremendous job ahead beckons us to action. We're moving at snail pace. The racial unbalance in our schools, the unfair housing practices throughout the country, the lack of equal job opportunity call for action now. If you can't work, pray, that somehow God will intervene at this time of crisis.

When I visited the slum area of Chicago last summer, I was appalled at what I saw. That beautiful city with such poverty and destitution at its door step. Do we need legislation to combat such conditions or do we need love? A little bit of humanitarianism would suffice.

IN MEMORY OF MRS. BERTHA WYSINGER ALLEN



BERTHA W. ALLEN

Who passed this life May 8, 1967. Funeral services have been held for Mrs. Bertha Wysinger Allen Friday May 12, 1967.

Her parents came to California by covered wagon in 1849 both of them freed men. Later to become important in both political and early civil rights matters in the State.

Mrs. Allen herself was an active member of numerous organizations and was a member, an officer of the former County Welfare League. The Young Women's Christians Associations and the Alameda County League of Colored Women's Voters Club, formed in the 1930s to inspire more active participation in politics by Negro Women and also credited with being instrumental in opening Hyland Hospital to qualified Negro girls as nursing students.

Mrs. Allen was born in Visalia, California, the youngest daughter of Ben and Mrs. Edmond Wysinger. Her father, a Baptist Clergyman, instituted and won, in 1875, a suit for equal education for Negro, Mexican and Chinese children in California.

She was also a member of the Northern Federation Clubs which operated Fanny Wall home and Nursery, also the founder of the California Native Daughters and affiliated with the California Women's Clubs, a charter member of the Imperial Art and Literary Club which she was past president.

Mrs. Allen lived in her own home, 1087 66th Street.

Dead physically but the posture of her life has written an epitaph that lives beyond the boundaries of death.

The new members added to the club are Mrs. Floresia Green, Julia Blake and Virgie Lee. Please pray for our continued success.

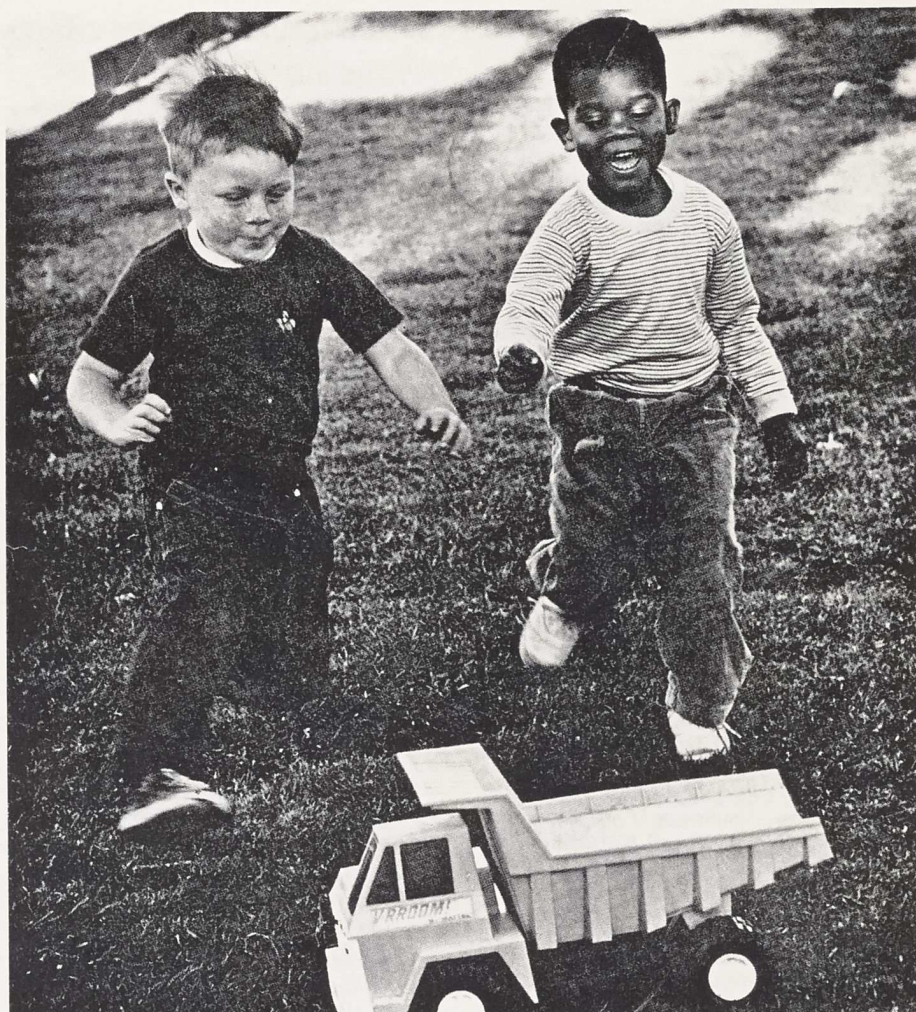
