To The California State Association of Colored Womens Clubs, Inc.

Greetings, as we gather here to give account of another year's working together for "Deeds not Words." We feel that our efforts in promoting peace and understanding among women all over the world, has become important to our Association.

The problems relating to social and legal status of women are of considerable importance. This is easily appreciated when one considers that women today a part in every sector of Social life. Side by side with men, women earn their living at the most diverse kind of jobs and this host of working women has become a very important factor in the life of Nations. A considerable part of the wealth of Nations is produced by them. In the world of literature and the arts, in the liberal professions and in employment generally, they sometimes outnumber the men.

The time has come when educated women should seek wider horizons. In this age of overwhelming change of urban sprawl, automation, government growth, many frightened by the bigness of the job, tend to identify with isolated groups in fragmented efforts of solutions.

Women Astronauts are needed says Pat Jones, tele teletype if we are going to colonize the moon we will need both sexes up there.

Two of the highest ranking military nurses in the world attended the National League for Nursing Convention held in Civic Auditorium in which 4,500 nurses attended, Col. Mildred I. Clark, U.S. Army Chief Nurse and Brig. E. M. Turner Britain's top army Nurse.

President Johnson still expresses his belief that women's place is no longer just in the home but in the House, the Senate, and throughout the Government Service. Four women have been named to top U. S. positions paying up to \$2,500 and announced he expects to name many more. For the first time, a woman was placed on the Atomic Energy Commission and on Export Import Banks. Mary Ingraham, Bunting, President of Radcliffe College and trained in microbiology got the \$22,500 post on the Atomic Energy Commission. Mrs. Marguerite Jay Tibbets, a State Department Foreign Service Office will be ambassador to a country not yet disclosed. She has been with the State Department since 1946 and is the second to be given an ambassadorial post. Lee has been named Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Evaluations. A former president of Womens Press Club is the third woman Deputy Assistant Secretary now employed by the State Dept.

The president also put a woman on new commission to study Puerto Rican Statehood, Commonwealth Statehood Independence. She is Patricia Harris, 45, Assistant Professor of Law at Howard University, Washington, D. C. She will receive \$100 a day when on the job. Patricia Harris, a negro, is also a member of the president's commission on the Status of Women.

Mrs. Mamie Bynes Reese of Albany, Georgia, in July became the 17th President. A native of Macon, Georgia, she completed her elementary and high school education in this city. The Bachelor of Science degree was earned at Spelman College in Atlanta, Georgia and the Master of Science degree was conferred by Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa. Advanced study has been done at Ohio State University, University of Southern California, Simmons College and Boston.

She is a member of Hines Memorial Christian Methodist Episcopal Church. Mrs. Reese has been affiliated with the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs Inc., for the past eighteen years, and has served in the following capacities in addition to local club duties: President of Georgia Federation of Colored Women's Clubs, President of the Southeastern Federation of Women's Clubs, and the First Vice-President of the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs, Inc. In addition she works diligently with the Georgia Teachers and Education Association, National Education Association, Sigma Rho Sigma Honor Society, National Mental Health Association and the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority.

In August, 1963, she was appointed by Governor Carl Sanders of Georgia to serve on the Governor's Commission on the Status of Women. This is a highly select group of only one hundred women from over the entire state, of whom four are Negroes. Her skill and ease in working with groups has won for her much acclaim as a public speaker for rededucational, religious and Civic groups.

She is married to Dr. William J. Reese, Practicing Physician in Albany, Georgia.

President Reese will be the guest speaker for the Fifty Ninth Annual Convention of the California State Association of Colored Women's Clubs, Inc., Banquet Friday June 18, 1965, at 7:00 p.m. at the Sainte Claire Hotel, San Jose, California.

Twenty-nine years of service in the interest of all our citizens leaves us with an awareness of how much remains yet unfinished.

We purpose to continue our efforts toward community improvement through constructive, organized efforts best determined by the needs of the vicinity of which we are an integral part.

The rebuilding of our plant has not progressed as rapidly as hoped, but we are nearing "ground breaking day" for a community center for all the people.

Our activities have included participation with the YEO (Youth Employment Organization), as a sponsoring member. Two of our members, Pearl L. Bennett and Henrietta O. Farrell serve on the YEO Board of Directors. Brooks) has chaired many committees. 1965-19655 will see one of WCIC Past Presidents (Indianola Mulholland) serve Woman's Council as 2nd Vice President. This is a first.

Joining the ranks of those who have served faithfully, and gone for the final reward, was our Past President, Jessie B. Robinson. Truly a loyal citizen and club woman closed her career March 10, 1965.

We salute those women of the past who have given and endured much that we may face the dawn of a new day with courage for a "better tomorrow".

WELCOME TO THE FIFTY-NINTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE ASSOCIATION OF COLORED WOMEN'S CLUBS, INCORPORATED

It is the pleasant task of the Garden City Women's Club, Inc. to serve you as hostess at the Annual State Convention, June 15-18, 1965, in San Jose, California. We greet you with the deep hope that our days here together will be replete with good fellowship, productive consultation, meaningful accomplishments, and warm memories.

The present club year has been one of unparalleled activity in the history of GCWC, Inc. With a membership of thirty-six women active in professional, social, civic, educational and cultural areas, we have found that our many and varied activities often dovetail. Therefore, as the club year draws to its close, we can honestly say that we have explored all avenues of concern in advancing the cause of mankind in general, and the Negro, in particular.

As it would be impossible to enumerate all of our activities in the space allowed, we invite you to share the highlights of a wonderful year for GCWC.

Past President, Mrs. William A. Reeves was voted "State Woman of the Year" at the 1964 convention. She has been named General Chairman of the 1965 United Nations Festival in San Jose; an annual activity which GCWC always supports with financial contribution, and a booth at the Fair proclaiming, in some way, the universality of man.

Mrs. Reeves' daughter, Deborah Ann Reeves, wrote an essay on the "Aims and Effects of the Reconstruction" which won first place and a \$100 U. S. Savings Bond in a contest sponsored by NAACP and CORE. This essay was printed in the 1964 Annual Journal of CSACW. This year she wrote an essay titled "Tow the Handicapped are Overcoming the Employment Barrier" which she submitted to the San Jose Committee for the Employment of the Handicapped. This committee is a chapter of the President's Council on Employment of the Handicapped. Debbie's essay won second prize of \$100 in a field of approximately 75 entries.

Negro History Week was commemorated with a fine display at a local high school whose principal asked that they be allowed to borrow the display for exhibition at times other than Negro History Week. A partial tuition scholarship to attend a course in Negro History at San Jose State College was awarded to a young civil rights worker from Mississippi now residing in San Jose and working with SNNC. His enrollment in this course brought the enrollment figure to sufficient numbers to kepe the course from being dropped from the curriculum this year.

One of the members of GCWC spent six weeks in Mississippi assisting COFO in the civil rights struggle in late 1964. During her tour there she came to know a Negro widow from Phildelphia, Miss. with a large family who, because of her civil rights activities, had lost her job, welfare pension (now reinstated) and all means of livelihood for her family. GCWC "adopted" this family by sending regular voluntary financial and clothing contributions to them.

Mrs. Moslette Kiles, chairman of our committee on education and family life, serves on the Family Life Coordinating Council of Santa Clara County, the Advisory Board of the East Valley Opportunity Council and the Committee on the Culturally Deprived.

Among our fund-raising projects for the year were the very successful Arts and Crafts Festival and our fourth annual fashion show "A Spring Fling into fashions". The proceeds of the latter event will be presented in the form of at least three \$100 scholarships to deserving Negro students graduating from high school in June 1965. Presentation of the awards will be made at our Annual Scholarship Tea in June.

The Club was honored to welcome the Jollyette Civic and Social Club into the CSACWC fold and to have in attendance State President Viola M. Brooks.

Mrs. Inez Jackson, financial secretary, is serving her second three-year term as a member of the City of San Jose Human Relations Committee.

Our President, Mrs. Rush Davidson, bringing further pride in kind to GCWC, was the first Negro ever to be nominated for "Woman Volunteer of the Year" in the city of Santa Clara, California. Mrs. Davidson has been active in volunteer work at Agnew State Hospital where the Club also sponsors a booth at the annual carnival for the patients complete with gifts, games and refreshments.

The Club is purchasing a life membership in NAACP and is a member of the Pacific Neighbors Club, the San Jose People to People Program.

Garden City Women's Club realizes that as our activities broaden and our concerns deepen, so our responsibilities grow. In this unceasing, educational process, we strive, through unified, integrated effort and devotion, to render "service" through "deeds, not words" to "lift as we climb."

The second Reciprocity was held January 9, 1965 at Jerusalem Baptist Church, Palo Alto, California. Tulip L. Jones was hostess club. Mrs. Fuller was general chairman.

The third and last Reciprocity was held April 10, 1965 at Parks Chapel A. M. E. Church, Oakland, California. The hostess clubs were: Mother's Charity, Mattie J. Stubblefield, Elizabeth Brown Six and over, Pioneer Ada H. Jackson and Seventeen Arts. Mrs. Oda Ward Sexton was general chairman. It was recommended by the Executive Board, which was held the second Saturday in May, 1965 that the fourth Reciprocity not be held, because the Annual Convention would convene June 15, 1965.

According to the record, over seventy-five per cent of the clubs are financial.
