I am unable to locate the list of 58 designates as to whom the Circuit Court's opinion affirms the judgment below. I would be grateful therefore if you would supply me a list of those 58 names so soon as possible.

In addition thereto, as I stated to you over the telephone a few days ago, my records do not show the precise dates upon which those applications were signed at Tule Lake. I would be grateful therefore if you would arrange to have your records checked and to supply me with a list so soon as possible of those who were under 21 years of age as at the time they signed their renunciation applications at Tule Lake. It is my belief that each application is dated. If not, the envelopes in which they were mailed probably would fix the dates of signing and enable the determination of those who were under 21 years of age at the time.

Dear Mr. Tramutolo:

This acknowledges the receipt of your letter of October 18, 1951, enclosing certified copies of the Mandates issued by the United States Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit relative to the above entitled cases. There are enclosed for your information and assistance in complying with the Mandates of the Court of Appeals the following documents:

- (1) Four copies of a list of the names of 880 parties in No. 25294-G, who were under the age of twenty-one years at the time of their signing of formal document of renunciation of citizenship;
- (2) Four copies of a list of the names of nineteen parties in No. 25295-G, who were under the age of twenty-one years at the time of their signing of formal document of renunciation of citizenship;
- (3) Four copies of a list of the names of sixteen parties in No. 25296-G, who were under the age of twenty-one years at the time of their signing of formal document of renunciation of citizenship; (in this connection, your attention is directed to the fact that the sixteen named persons in No. 25296-G are also named on the list of 880 since they were also parties to 25294-G);
- (4) Four copies of a list of the names of fifty-eight parties in No. 25294-G, who were designated in plaintiffs' offer of proof as to whom the offers of proof were solely that they went to Tule Lake to be with family members;

- (5) Four copies of a list of the names of eight parties in No. 25294-G, who lacked sufficient mental capacity to accomplish legally binding acts;
- (6) Four copies of a Notice of Withdrawal of Offers of Proof as to plaintiffs previously designated and as to whom the Department of Justice notified the Department of State that there was no objection on its part to the issuance to them of passports.

The above listed documents will suffice for compliance with that portion of the decision of the Court of Appeals which affirms the Judgments of the District Court. With respect to the disposition of the remaining cases of approximately 3300 adult plaintiffs as to whom the Court of Appeals has held that the issue of duress in each such case must be considered on the facts in connection with each individual, we offer the following suggestions and request that you present them for the careful consideration of the District Court and counsel for these plaintiffs.

On November 2, 1949, this Department forwarded to you a letter relative to the case of Acheson, et al, v. Murakami, et al, bearing file number 146-54-5501, in which we stated in pertinent part that the decision of the Court of Appeals in the Murakami case affirming the Judgment of the District Court by strongest implication approved stipulations for the use of affidavits in lieu of oral testimony in cases coming within the coverage of that decision. We further stated that in future cases where information in the government files, together with affidavits which the plaintiffs wished to submit as evidence in lieu of oral testimony, seemed to bring the cases of such plaintiffs fairly within the coverage of the Murakami decision, the Department would stipulate that the affidavits may be accepted in evidence and further would announce to the Court that in its view such cases are covered by the Murakami decision. However, where such affidavits were inconsistent with facts contained in the government files concerning the action of affiants, and in cases where there was substantial evidence of disloyalty or probable disloyalty to the United States, the government would insist upon the introduction of oral testimony at the trial. The Department's letter of November 2, 1949, stated that in the event of the reversal and remand of the Abo and Furuya cases, the same stipulation procedure would be available under the same conditions to any plaintiff required to give testimony. The letter set forth the information which should be contained in such affidavits.

As you know, the Court of Appeals' decision holds, with respect to such 3300 adult plaintiffs, that after the government introduces into evidence the documents which constituted their offer of proof, the burden of proof in individual hearings as to each designated plaintiff remains with them. The Court in its opinion also pointed out that the defendants' offered to accept the affidavit of many of the designants showing that his or her renunciation was in fact coerced, thus saving their appearance as witnesses or the taking of their depositions. The above suggested procedure was also mentioned on pages 10 and 11 of the government's brief filed in these actions and presumably, in view of the language of the decision by the Circuit Court, met with that Court's approval.

We therefore suggest that a stipulation be entered into stating that each of these plaintiffs may submit an affidavit covering the subject matter set forth in our letter of November 2, 1949, as evidence in lieu of oral testimony; that such affidavits be submitted only in single copy for examination of the same by this Department together with other pertinent government documents; that if upon examination of such documents it is concluded that their renunciations of citizenship were the products of duress, notices of withdrawal of offers of proof similar to that enclosed herewith will be filed by the defendants. The stipulation should further state that in the event that the defendants, after examination of such affidavit and other documents, conclude that the affidavit is not consistent with the facts contained in the government files, or that there is substantial evidence of disloyalty or probable disloyalty to the United States, thus requiring the introduction of oral testimony at the trial, they will return to counsel for such plaintiff the affidavit and agree that in the trial of the case such affidavit may not be introduced in evidence by defendants. (In practice, your office will be supplied with certified copies of the government's documentary evidence at or about the same time the affidavit is returned to you for return to plaintiff's attorney so that the government will be ready to proceed at any time.) It is our view that this procedure is within both the spirit and letter of the Court of Appeals' decision, and certainly it is an orderly method of disposing of this rather large number of cases.

In addition to the fact that the above procedure seems to come within the purview of the decision of the Court of Appeals, it is suggested that the following facts be brought to the attention of the District Court if it rejects the suggested procedure and requires the defendant to come forward almost immediately with certified documentary evidence in meeting their offers of proof. Because of the fact that the defendants were not in a position to know whether or not the District Court would accept the offers of proof with respect to designated plaintiffs, which it ultimately refused to do, the particular documentary evidence required in meeting the offers of proof were not extracted, photostated, or certified by the defendants. It is estimated that it will take approximately 1100 man hours to examine and remove materials from pertinent government files. The Government Printing Office has advised that the cost of photostating the documentary material covering the offers of proof if such work must be accomplished in a period of one month would be the sum of \$7,237, or \$5,790 if a longer period of time is allowed. Private duplicating firms have indicated that the cost of such photostating for similar periods of time would be \$19,305 for one month, or \$12,870 if a longer period of time is allowed. It is estimated that the time required for certifying such documents if accomplished by one certifying clerk would be approximately 83 working days. It has also been estimated that the filing space required for such documentary material covering 3300 cases, in order to prevent tearing of such material, would be approximately 42 legal size file drawers. These facts indicate that the job is of great magnitude and the expenditure of public funds involved can, in all probability, be greatly reduced if the affidavit procedure mentioned above is adopted.

With respect to the habeas corpus cases, we will forward under separate cover certified photostats of the law of Japan pertinent to acquisition and relinquishment of the Japanese citizenship which has been furnished to this Department by the Department of State.

For the reasons set forth above, it is the Department's view that every effort should be made to persuade the Court and counsel for plaintiffs to accept these suggestions and we request that you inform this office by airmail letter the results of your conference thereon.



ALL MESSAGES TAKEN BY THIS COMPANY ARE SUBJECT TO THE FOLLOWING TERMS:

To guard against mistakes or delays, the sender of a message should order it repeated, that is, telegraphed back to the originating office for comparison. For this, one-half the unrepeated message rate is charged in addition. Unless otherwise indicated on its face, this is an unrepeated message and paid for as such, in consideration whereof it is agreed between the sender of the message and this Company as follows:

1. The Company shall not be liable for mistakes or delays in the transmission or delivery, or for non-delivery, of any message received for transmission at the unrepeated-message rate beyond the sum of five hundred dollars; nor for mistakes or delays in the transmission or delivery, or for non-delivery, of any message received for transmission at the repeated-message rate beyond the sum of five thousand dollars, unless specially valued; nor in any case for delays arising from unavoidable interruption in the working of its lines.

2. In any event the Company shall not be liable for damages for mistakes or delays in the transmission or delivery, or for the non-delivery, of any message, whether caused by the negligence of its servants or otherwise, beyond the actual loss, not exceeding in any event the sum of five thousand dollars, at which amount the sender of each message represents that the message is valued, unless a greater value is stated in writing by the sender thereof at the time the message is tendered for transmission, and unless the repeated-message rate is paid or agreed to be paid, and an additional charge equal to one-tenth of one per cent of the amount by which such valuation shall exceed five thousand dollars.

3. The Company is hereby made the agent of the sender, without liability, to forward this message over the lines of any other company when necessary to reach its destination.

4. Except as otherwise indicated in connection with the listing of individual places in the filed tariffs of the Company, the amount paid for the transmission of a domestic telegram or an incoming cable or radio message covers its delivery within the following limits: In cities or towns of 5,000 or more inhabitants where the Company has an office which, as shown by the filed tariffs of the Company, is not operated through the agency of a railroad company, within two miles of any open main or branch office of the Company; in cities or towns of 5,000 or more inhabitants where, as shown by the filed tariffs of the Company, the telegraph service is performed through the agency of a railroad company, within one mile of the telegraph office; in cities or towns of less than 5,000 inhabitants in which an office of the Company is located, within one-half mile of the telegraph office. Beyond the limits above specified the Company does not undertake to make delivery, but will endeavor to arrange for delivery as the agent of the sender, with the understanding that the sender authorizes the collection of any additional charge from the addressee and agrees to pay such additional charge if it is not collected from the addressee. There will be no additional charge for deliveries made by telephone within the corporate limits of any city or town in which an office of the Company is located.

5. No responsibility attaches to this Company concerning messages until the same are accepted at one of its transmitting offices; and if a message is sent to such office by one of the Company's messengers, he acts for that purpose as the agent of the sender.

6. The Company will not be liable for damages or statutory penalties in the case of any message except an intrastate message in Texas where the claim is not presented in writing to the Company within sixty days after the message is filed with the Company for transmission, and in the case of an intrastate message in Texas the Company will not be liable for damages or statutory penalties where the claim is not presented in writing to the Company within ninety-five days after the cause of action, if any, shall have accrued; provided, however, that neither of these conditions shall apply to claims for damages or overcharges within the purview of Section 415 of the Communications Act of 1934.

I am enclosing herewith an original and copies of list of discrepancies occurring either in the names of the renunciants or in their birth dates contained in your list of names of 880 renunciants who were under the age of 21 years at the time of renunciation. With few exceptions the names of the persons contained on the list enclosed are the correct names in accordance with my records. They differ only slightly from the names contained in your records either because of spelling or of placement of middle names or because my list contains both the married and maiden names of some of the plaintiffs. The birth dates as shown on my lists differ in most instances only by one day from the birth dates as indicated by your list (the differences may be a result of the applicants' translating their birth dates from Japanese into English). I would be grateful, however, if you would review these names to clear up the said discrepancies so that in the records of the U.S. District Court the complete names, together with the correct birth dates, can be inserted. If the birth dates as shown by your lists after examination appear to differ from mine, both dates may be used in spreading the judgment on the records of the District Court.

I am enclosing also an original and copy of a like list of discrepancies occurring in the list of 58 names of designated renunciants as to whom offers of proof were solely that they went to Tule Lake to be with family members.

I am enclosing also an original and a copy of a like list of discrepancies contained in your list of the 19 renunciants who were under 21 years of age at the time of renunciation.

I am enclosing also an original and a copy of the one discrepancy contained in your list of 8 renunciants who were

mental incompetents.

I am enclosing also an original and duplicate copy of a like list of the discrepancies contained in your notice of withdrawal of offers of proof as to plaintiffs to whom passports have been issued.

I wish to draw your attention especially to the following discrepancies on your list of 880 renunciants at page 25 where there appears the name of Isamu Sam Uyeda. My records show Isamu Uyeda, born March 25, 1916, in Gardena, California, joined as plaintiff on March 4, 1946. I have no record of Isamu Sam Uyeda, born Sept. 29, 1925, as shown on your records. In consequence, I believe your record refers to an entirely different person from the person in the suit. I suggest that you instruct Mr. Bonsall to strike the name of Isamu Sam Uyeda from the list of 880.

In your list of 880 renunciants at pg. 27 and also in your list of 258 renunciants you show the name of Masami Yasuda. My records show Masami Yasuda, born March 25, 1913, in Mayhews, California, joined as plaintiff on Nov. 13, 1945. Your records show Masami Yasuda, born April 14, 1925. This may be a mix-up with Takashi Yasuda, born April 15, 1925.

In your list of 880 renunciants at page 26, you show the name of Hiroshi Yamamoto. I have no record of a Hiroshi Yamamoto, born April 14, 1924, as shown on your records. My records show two persons with this name: (1) Hiroshi Yamamoto, born May 1, 1921, Sacramento, California, joined as plaintiff May 18, 1948; and (2) Hiroshi Yamamoto, born October 3, 1918, Moneta, California, joined as plaintiff August 23, 1948. I assume that your records refer to the Hiroshi Yamamoto born in Sacramento, Calif., on May 1, 1921, but I am not certain. It may be that your records refer to another Hiroshi Yamamoto.

In your list of 880 renunciants at page 16, you show the name of Meriko Mary Nakatsui. I have no record of a Meriko Mary Nakatsui, born Sept. 22, 1925. I have a Meriko Nakatsui, born on October 25, 1925.

I would be grateful if you would have your list checked promptly and notify me so that the names of the renunciants whose renunciations are cancelled can be spread on the minutes of the District Court.
