FIRE DESTROYS TRI-STATE GYM NEW YEAR'S EVE

Fire which was discovered at 4:12 p.m. destroyed the Tri-State High School auditorium on New Year's Eve.

Corridors leading from the auditorium to other sections of the school plant were burned partly, but the adjacent wings were saved by intensive action of the Fire Department.

Office equipment and furniture were removed from the wing occupied by the Leave Office and Welfare Section during the height of the fire, and then returned after flames which had been driving through a connecting corridor were subdued. The Relocation Headquarters, nearby, was not involved. No school or other WRA records in the various wings were damaged.

Motion picture projection equipment owned by the Co-op, which was in the projection booth at the front of the auditorium, was lost. It was insured.

The burning of the building forced cancellation of a colony dance which had been planned for tonight. Decorations for the dance were being planned, but no one was known to be in the building when flames burst through the roof.

RENUNCIANT HEARINGS TO BEGIN NEXT WEEK

Hearings for more than 3000 residents of Tule Lake Center who renounced their United States citizenship but who have expressed desire to remain in the United States will be started here early next week, the Department of Justice announced today.

A list of the persons in each block who have applied for a hearing is being posted in the block manager's office of the block in which they reside, said Charles Rothstein, representative of the Department of Justice who has been making preliminary arrangements, and a complete list is being posted in Block Managers Headquarters at 1608.

Rothstein suggested that all persons desiring a hearing inspect these lists to assure themselves that their applications have been received and their names recorded properly. Any persons who find that their applications have not been recorded properly should contact him or Ivan Williams of the Immigration and Naturalization Service immediately at the Processing Station at Gate #1, he said.

Persons who have applied for hearing will be notified as far in advance as possible of the time they are to appear, Rothstein said, and once they have assured themselves that their applications have been received, all applicants should wait for further instructions.

Fifteen hearing officers have arrived in Tule Lake to conduct the hearings, which will be in a wing of the high school. A complete clerical staff also has arrived for the preparation of the necessary records.

Each person who has applied will be granted an individual hearing, after which the recommendation of the hearing officers will be reviewed by a separate board. Each person granted a hearing will have signed the application form containing the following statement:

"I do not wish to return to Japan. I request that I be given a hearing and the opportunity to show cause why I should not be removed to Japan."

Renunciants not signing this statement will be considered to desire voluntary repatriation to Japan, the Department of Justice said.

TO HELP EVACUEES RECLAIM PROPERTY

Following the recent Presidential Proclamation No. 2674, which provided among other things that Japanese aliens now are entitled to seek return of personal property surrendered to the government as wartime contraband, the War Relocation Authority has set up mechanics for return of such property still in its custody.

WRA has announced that it no longer can assist evacuees in reclaiming property (cont'd on page 2)

CENTER STARTS NEW YEAR WITH POPULATION OF 7268

Tule Lake Center started the new year with a population of only 7268 as compared to the one-time peak of more than 18,000, and this figure is being reduced rapidly by departure of resettlers.

During December 1807 people left Tule Lake to relocate, bringing the total of resettlers from this center to 6358 since relocation again became possible in December of 1944.

One thousand five hundred seventeen persons have left or are scheduled to leave during the approxi-

mate first half of January, and daily departures now are being scheduled for the latter part of the month.

"Transportation is being arranged in an orderly manner and resettlers are leaving under the best possible conditions," said W. K. Holland, relocation program officer. He said the remaining residents of the center who are eligible to relocate are co-operating fully in completion of their planning and arrangement of their departure dates.

USE OF HOSTELS INSTEAD OF FPMA PROJECTS URGED

A communication was received this week by Project Director Best from Earl L. Kelley, district relocation officer of WRA at Los Angeles, suggesting that several hostels in the Los Angeles area be used for temporary housing facilities by relocating family groups in preference to FPMA projects.

"The hostels have central kitchen facilities where a family may do its own cooking," Kelley wrote. "In most cases the rental rates are no higher in the hostels than they are in the FPMA projects. Hostels have the advantage of being located much closer to job opportunities, and their general location enables a family better to look for permanent housing. Other advantages of the hostels

are that they are in good buildings with adequate heating.

"In view of these conditions we believe it is to the best interests of returning evacuees to take up residence in the hostels rather than in the FPMA projects."

He is awarded this honor as a fitting award for a faithful service, and his ability to do the job. Mr. Furuta, due to ill health, wishes to resign as Senior Steward and will assist Mr. Kurahara in every way possible."

CLOSING OF MESS HALLS PROCEEDING SMOOTHLY-HAYWARD

"The orderly closing of mess halls is proceeding satisfactorily with the idea in mind that no person will have more than one block to walk in order to obtain his meals," stated Raymond Hayward, chief project steward, this week.

"It is the desire of Mess Operations," said Hayward, "to continue with the service it has rendered to the colony in the past."

"No particular group or block is being favored in any way, with the exception of Mess Hall #9, which will remain open until the center closes at the request of Dr. K. Hashiba, for the purpose of feeding hospital patients, ambulatory cases, etc..

"Mess halls closed to date are as follows: 4, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38, 39, 41, 46, 47, 48, 52, 53, 54, 57, 58, 66, 72, 73, 74, 76, 79, 81, 82, 83, 84.

 erty which was surrendered to the Department of Justice or local law enforcement agencies acting for that department. This includes property surrendered prior to occupation of the assembly centers. Requests for these items should be submitted directly to the United States Marshal for the judiciary district in which the property was surrendered.

WRA will, however, assist evacuees in reclaiming property surrendered at the assembly centers and at the relocation centers. All requests by people still residents of Tule Lake Center should be addressed to the Evacuee Property Officer in writing. Requests of persons on the outside should be addressed to the nearest WRA area supervisor. Each request should include the name of the assembly center and the relocation center in which the evacuee lived.

PATTERN SET FOR MESS HALL, BLOCK OFFICE CLOSING

As Tule Lake's population dwindles rapidly nearing the end of WRA's center services to evacuees, mess halls and block managers' offices are being closed on a pattern to provide the most convenient services for as long as possible, the Administration disclosed this week.

The mess hall closing program is leaving, in almost every instance, a mess hall available in an adjoining block, the open mess hall being in strips through the center of each ward.

Mess halls expected to remain open until the end to serve residents of two or more blocks are:

Ward I---Blocks 13, 14 and 15. Ward II---Blocks 28, 29 and 30. Ward III---Blocks 31, 32 and 33. Ward IV---Blocks 9, 10, 11 and 12. Ward V---Blocks 43, 44 and 45. Ward VI---Blocks 49, 50, 51 and 56. Ward VII---Blocks 69, 70 and 71. Ward VIII---Blocks 77 and 78, with Block 56 in ward VI also being available to some residents of this ward.

Block managers' offices also will serve more than one block as the closing progresses. Block managers' offices are being closed when both the block manager and the block manager's office are being closed.

HEARING REGISTRATION STILL OPEN-ROTHSTEIN

Anyone in Tule Lake Center who has renounced United States citizenship but who desires permission to remain in the United States, and who has not as yet applied for a hearing before the Department of Justice board now here should do so at once, Charles Rothstein, chairman of the Tule Lake Renunciant Hearings, said today.

WRA BUS SERVICE FOR SHOPPERS ENDS TOMORROW

The WRA special bus which has been taking resettlement planning shoppers to Klamath Falls in the mornings will not be operated for this service after tomorrow, Jan. 12, it is announced by R. R. Best, project director.

"This service has served its purposes," said Best, "in providing a transportation facility for resettlers who desired to shop in Klamath Falls in connection with their plans for departure. Now the greater portion of Tule Lake's population eligible for relocation has departed, and the remainder is prepared to go."

Shopping credentials will continue to be issued to persons eligible to relocate who can arrange their own transportation, said W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, upon application at Relocation Headquarters.

Persons who for any reason did not make application through the block managers during the original registration of those seeking opportunity to show cause why they should not be removed to Japan, may do so now by applying in person to Rothstein in Wing #2---the Primary Building---high school grounds, where the hearings are being held. Rothstein will provide the form on which signature of the applicant is required.

The renunciant hearings, which began last Monday, will continue until each of more than 3100 applicants have been given opportunity to appear, Rothstein said.

"Each person to be heard is receiving personal notification of the date of his hearing," Rothstein said. "It will require considerable time to conduct all of the hearings. Therefore no one should be troubled because he does not receive his notification at once. Everybody will be heard."

Rothstein said it is impossible to give out information regarding scheduled hearings in advance of the sending of the notifications and asked that all persons refrain from inquiring regarding hearing dates.

Under the procedure set up by Rothstein as chairman of the Tule Lake Renunciant Hearings, each person to be heard may have with him at his hearing one relative, or one either Japanese or Caucasian friend. He also may ask that witnesses be called to give oral testimony in his behalf before the hearing officer.

"CONTINUED CO-OPERATION MEANS NO 'TRAFFIC JAM'"

Scheduling of transportation of Tuleans who are eligible to relocate is proceeding in an orderly manner and if resettlers continue for the remainder of the month the co-operation shown so far, there will be no "traffic jam" of people who must be out of the center by Jan. 31., W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, said today.

During the first 10 days of January 839 individuals left for resettlement,

with 158 departing Thursday, the biggest day, bringing to 7197 the number who have relocated since December of 1944, exclusive of some who are converting short-term leave to terminal departure without returning to the center.

Transportation is being arranged for everyone, Holland said, and on the present basis no one need fear that transport will be lacking. But it is necessary, he said, if this

MORE RESETTLERS SOUGHT BY ARKANSAS PLANTATION

Wilson Plantation at Wilson, Ark., with 57,000 acres of land in cultivation, is anxious for more Japanese American tenants, according to word received here this week. Many Japanese American families already have settled there under three share plans offered by the Plantation.

Wilson Plantation is not only a farming enterprise, but a blending of agriculture and industry on a large scale. Among 77 industries operated in connection with the agricultural enterprise are lumber mills, box and crate factory, ice plant, meat packing plant, dehydration plants, cotton gins, granaries, the largest cottonseed oil mill in the south, a flour mill, a bank, medical clinic, retail enterprises, and a deep-freeze plant soon is to be constructed.

Cotton, wheat, corn, alfalfa, and truck crops are raised in good soil which is not irrigated.

In normal times, 10,000 people have occupied the 2200 homes which are located in five complete towns with full facilities, including schools with vocational training.

Wilson Plantation furnishes a quick cash market for all crops, and because of the vastness of the enterprise, there are many seasonal agricultural jobs at hourly rates, and much opportunity for employment in the various industries which are operated.

Under one plan, Wilson Plantation offers home and livelihood to persons or families with little or no money, they to furnish only the labor, but to divide with the company the proceeds of the crops. The other two plans are for

individuals or families who wish or are able to finance themselves in whole or in part, with resultant greater return.

Wilson Plantation has sent word that it still is in a position to contract with as many as 1000 families, with housing provided. Tenants must provide their own furniture, cooking and eating utensils.

situation is to be maintained, that people whose departure dates now have been set and transportation scheduled stick to those departure dates and use the transportation on the day that it is provided.

The latter part of the month is being reserved as far as possible for welfare cases, people who are ill and require special attention, and other instances of hardship, and Holland has asked the continued co-operation of all who have been or may be scheduled to depart before Jan. 19 in maintaining the schedules as set.

Extra busses are being operated daily to take Tuleans from the center toward their new homes, and if these schedules are maintained every person eligible to leave can be cleared by the Jan. 31 deadline without undue inconvenience to anyone, Holland said. Requests for changes in departure dates should not be made except in demonstrable cases of hardship, because otherwise they cannot be granted.

PHILADELPHIA NISEI COUNCIL To Aid TULEANS

The Philadelphia Nisei Council, which serves more than 2800 resettlers in the Philadelphia area, again has sent word to Tule Lake of its sincere desire to aid Tuleans in establishing themselves in Philadelphia and vicinity. At the same time it invited more Tuleans to become members of the Council.

Founded in June, 1944, the Philadelphia Nisei Council has the reputation of being one of the most active and helpful groups of its kind in the country. It serves as a clearing house for the voicing of resettlers' needs and has an excellent working relationship with all people interested in the welfare of Japanese Americans.

The council rounds up housing vacancies and special jobs, sponsors get-acquainted socials, and helps newcomers become adjusted to the community. It sponsors programs for various age groups, from Issei to Teen-agers. Two current projects are bringing of a Japanese minister to Philadelphia to serve as an interdenominational counselor, and establishment of a Buddhist Church.

24-DAY SENTENCE GIVEN MURAKAMI

George Murakami Tuesday was sentenced to 24 days in jail after he had been found guilty in a project hearing of assault and battery on Dr. Paul Yamauchi of the project hospital.

The sentence, which expires Jan. 31, was imposed by Martin P. Gunderson, assistant project director sitting as project hearing officer. The assault occurred the day before the trial.

FORMER DIRECTOR HEADS SACRAMENTO DISTRICT OFFICE

Guy Robertson, former project director of Heart Mountain Relocation Center in Wyoming which closed Nov. 10, has been appointed relocation officer in charge of the WRA office in the Sacramento district, to which many Tuleans are resettling, it was announced this week by Charles F. Miller, WRA area supervisor in San Francisco.

Miller announced also appointment of Claud C. Gilmore as relocation officer in charge of the Stockton district office, these moves being in line with WRA policy of continuing essential services for relocating Tuleans on the outside as the closing date of the center draws near.

HOSPITAL PASSES ISSUED AT 1808

ALIEN ID CARD RULES REVOKED

Regulations requiring issuance of certificates of identification to alien enemies have been revoked by Presidential Proclamation.

The Federal Register of the National Archives of the United States in its issue of Jan. 4 has published, as signed by President Truman on Dec. 29, Presidential proclamation No. 2678 "Revoking Proclamation No. 2537 of Jan. 14, 1942, prescribing regulations relating to the control of alien enemies."

The new proclamation states that "the interests of national defense and public safety no longer require that these regulations thus prescribed remain in force and effect," and that the previous proclamation of 1942 "prescribing and proclaiming regulations governing the issuance of certificates of identification to alien enemies is hereby revoked."

MESS 99 IS SHUT DOWN; MAY USE MESS 9 INSTEAD

Mess Hall 99, which was set up for the convenience of colonists working in or near the Administrative area, ceased operation Monday, it was disclosed this week by Raymond Hayward, chief project steward.

High school and elementary school classes are available nearby for the other children, who will live with Mr. and Mrs. Yamaguchi in a large apartment furnished in the Batt home. 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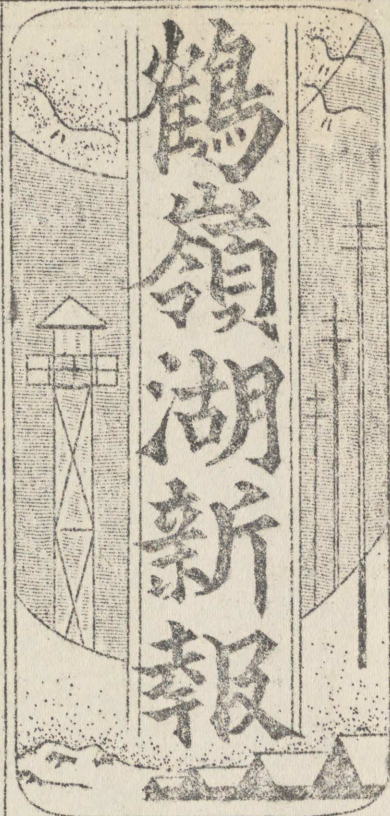

'REPATS' STILL ABLE TO APPLY

While yesterday was the nominal deadline set by the Department of Justice for registration of persons desiring voluntary repatriation to Japan on the next sailing, Ivan Williams, officer in charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service detail here, announced today he has been authorized to accept any further applications for voluntary repatriation up to two weeks before the date of sailing.

The date of departure of the next contingent has not as yet been announced.

Williams said arrangements will be made shortly for representatives of the Bank of America to be at the Processing Station for service to repatriates who wish to purchase travelers checks, and that meantime

NEXT TUESDAY SET AS DISPOSAL DATE

Next Tuesday, Jan. 22, has been set by Sheldon Lowery, evacuee property officer, as the day for Tule Lake residents who have applied to the Department of Justice for voluntary repatriation on the next sailing to Japan to arrange for disposal of property they may have stored in WRA warehouses.

A special notice from Dillon Myer, national director of WRA, regarding WRA assistance offered in disposal of such stored property now is available to all repatriates in the block managers offices. It sets forth that such property must be sold and the proceeds turned over to the United States Treasury if arrangements for removal from warehouses have not been made within 30 days after departure of repatriates.

Lowery said a special crew will be on duty at the Evacuee Property Office

RELOCATION PLANS FOR ALL FREE PEOPLE MADE

Special transportation arrangements have been made to enable every person now free to leave Tule Lake Center to depart on or before Jan. 31, W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, announced today.

These completed relocation arrangements include members of many families in which one or more members still are under detention of the Department of Justice.

The transportation schedules have been set up

for the latter days of the month to care particularly for people who are infirm or handicapped or otherwise require special attention, Holland said, and pointed out that persons who are not in need of special consideration in transportation arrangements should be particularly careful to adhere to the departure plans laid out for them, to avoid upsetting arrangements for those who do.

Five special Pullman cars, in addition to the usual special daily coaches, are scheduled to leave Klamath Falls on the nights of Jan. 22, 24, 26, 28 and 31 to carry Tule Lake resettlers to the Pacific Coast, the last one, on Jan. 31, being routed through the San Joaquin Valley all the way to Los Angeles. These Pullmans are reserved for persons whose physical condition or age requires this special consideration.

"Everyone who must leave the center on or before Jan. 31 will be taken care of adequately," said Holland. "It must be borne in mind that it is impossible for everyone now remaining to leave on the last day, or even the last few days. It is necessary to divide the departures among all the days that are left, which has been done to meet the requirements and desires of everyone as far as possible. The schedules must be adhered to."

CLARIFY RULES REGARDING ALIEN REGISTRATION

A clarification of changes in requirements for registration of aliens was received this week by the Administration from the office of Tom C. Clark, United States attorney general.

Revocation by President Truman of Presidential Proclamation No. 2537 of Jan. 14, 1942, it is explained, makes it no longer necessary for aliens of enemy nationality within the United States to carry with them the special identification (the pink book) required by it, and they no longer are required to make separate reports regarding changes of address and employment. The pink book registration certificates are not required to be turned over to any governmental agency.

The duty of aliens to register under the Alien Registration Act of 1940--which is an act of congress and is not affected by the Presidential Proclamation--and to report changes of address to the Immigration and Naturalization Service remains unchanged.

The revocation of Presidential Proclamation No.

2537, says the attorney general, "is the last step in the termination of wartime restrictions on the travel and other conduct of the alien enemy population--individual alien enemies remain subject to internment and removal from the United States."

TO PROPERTY OWNERS

NEW ORDER IS ISSUED BY ALIEN PROPERTY CUSTODIAN

The Administration this week was informed of issuance of General Order No. 34 by James E. Markham, alien property custodian, which requires filing of reports with the alien property custodian by persons connected with property in the United States in which interest also is held by Germany or Japan or nationals thereof.

"Every person in the United States who, on or after Dec. 31, 1945, has any interest or legal title to or custody or control or possession of any property or interest of any nature whatsoever within the United States, and believes or has cause to believe that such property or interest is or may be directly or indirectly owned or controlled by, payable or deliverable to, held on behalf of or account of, or is evidence of ownership or control of property or interest by Germany or Japan or any national thereof, shall file with the alien property custodian on or before Feb. 26, 1946, a report on Alien Property Custodian Form APC-56, containing the information called for and in conformity with the instructions, whether or not a report with respect to any such property or interest shall have been filed previously with any government agency," says General Order No. 34.

Residents of Tule Lake Center who are affected by this order are advised to call at the office of the project attorney for more detailed information regarding the scope of the order and exceptions to it. The office of the project attorney has information

regarding where Form APC-56 may be obtained with instructions, and where such reports may be filed.

FORMER PHYSICS TEACHER NOW AT U. OF MINNESOTA

Tom Kishaba, former popular physics teacher in the project high school, has written from St. Paul, Minn., where he is attending the University of Minnesota, that he is enjoying his life on the outside a great deal, and especially the football and basketball games.

Kishaba remarks that he now is on the receiving instead of the giving end of "marks" and says "for the first time in my life I had 100 on my monthly exam, so you see the tests are not so hard."

"There seem to be quite a number of Nisei attending here," he says. "Here in this dormitory there are six of us. My roommate is one of the instructors in Japanese at the University."

repatriates should obtain from the WRA finance department the certificate necessary to establish their gross earnings in the center. Under the regulations repatriates may take with them \$60 plus their gross earnings in the center, in cash, travelers checks or other securities in their name.

Baggage instructions also will be given later, and repatriates should be prepared to produce their cargo-hold baggage on short notice, Williams said.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAILROAD LOOKING FOR MORE WORKERS

Southern Pacific railroad recruiters still are visiting Tule Lake Center and they report that their needs for workers are far from being filled. The Southern Pacific is signing workmen of ages 17 to 55 for six-day, 48-hour week with time and a half for overtime. Base pay in most cases is 62 cents an hour. The men now are working a nine-hour day, and thus are paid 93 cents an hour for the last hour of each day, and for all work on Sunday's and holidays.

The Southern Pacific is furnishing housing with all jobs, both for single men and for families, and it provides facilities for purchase of food and other supplies.

Aproximately 1000 Tule Lake residents have been provided with jobs and housing by the Southern Pacific so far, and many of the people from Tule Lake are being placed in a selected section made up of workers of Japanese descent.

In connection with disposal of such property by persons who are going to Japan, WRA has been informed by the Treasury Department that regulations now provide that anyone who is being deported or repatriated to Japan is authorized to "dispose of, by sale or otherwise, any tangible property in his possession or held for his account in a government warehouse, provided that such transaction is completely effected within the United States."

REWARD OFFER OF \$300 WITHDRAWN BY TULE CO-OP

Tule Lake Co-operative Enterprises, Inc., now in process of liquidation, today announced withdrawal of a \$300 reward offered in connection with loss last June of \$3359.25 from a safe in the business office at 717. The withdrawal is effective today. The following official notice was issued by the Co-op:

"The offer of \$300 reward heretofore made by the undersigned for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons guilty of stealing certain money from a safe in Building 717 on or about June 25, 1945, is hereby revoked effective Jan. 18, 1946.

JOBS FOR NISEI IN MERCHANT MARINE

The Marine Cooks and Stewards Union at 88 Commercial Street, San Francisco, has been identified by the San Francisco office of WRA as offering some of the most likely opportunities for Japanese Americans seeking to join the Merchant Marine.

This union clears applicants for work and refers them to the U. S. Shipping Commission, 630 Sansome Street, San Francisco, which provides the U.S. Coast Guard permit, passport and other documents necessary. Applicants must present birth certificate and draft classification card.

The Marine Cooks and Stewards Union at present is in need of cooks, butchers and bakers. Applicants must have at least one year of experience and letter of reference testifying to the same.

DEADLINE SET FOR REMOVING GOODS IN WRA WAREHOUSES

The War Relocation Authority announced this week that it is urgent that resettlers whose property is stored in WRA warehouses request its removal not later than Feb. 1, except in cases of present residents of Tule Lake Center and people who have relocated directly from Tule Lake, who will be allowed until Mar. 1 if that is necessary, and people in temporary housing projects who are approved individually as hardship cases.

"The agency's liquidation schedule makes it necessary to set this deadline," said the announcement from Washington. "Evacuees with property still in WRA warehouses may secure it through Mar. 15, but not at government expense after Feb. 1. After Mar. 15 property which still is unclaimed will be sold according to law and

SEABROOK FARMS NEEDS WORKERS

An urgent telephone request from Seabrook Farms in New Jersey was received by the Tule Lake Relocation Headquarters for 150 families immediately. Seabrook, said the telephone message, now has housing for 1000 persons available, with family units equipped with stoves and refrigerators.

Nathaniel Snyder, relocation officer at Philadelphia, and Captain Lett, vice-president of Seabrook Farms, are on the way to Tule Lake and will arrive here next Monday to confer with people interested in the Seabrook offer.

Men are needed at once at Seabrook for construction and maintenance work at 73 cents an hour. Beginning Apr. 1 women will be employed in processing of fruits and vegetables at 57½ cents an hour and men at 64 cents an hour.

The Seabrook offer includes an arrangement for loans, to be repaid out of overtime wages only, if financing for immediate subsistence is necessary.

the proceeds turned over to the Treasury Department.

"Registered letters advising of the Feb. 1 deadline have been sent to the last address given WRA by evacuees whose property still is in government storage. However, some persons to whom the letters were sent have made no response. Ownership of some such property is uncertain. Persons who have property in WRA warehouses but have received no notice regarding its removal are advised to write the WRA office in the city nearest their pre-evacuation homes, identifying their stored goods and giving shipping instructions.

"Property stored privately by evacuees also will not be shipped to owners at government expense after Feb. 1.

"It also is announced that on Feb. 1 WRA will discontinue all property management services, including rental collection and sale or lease of evacuee property. Individuals whose property is currently under WRA management will have until Feb. 1 to assume personal responsibility.

"All deadline dates are in line with WRA's announcement, made at the time the exclusion ban was lifted, that it would be necessary for evacuees to remove their property within 60 days after relocation. The Authority has made adjustments to this ruling when it appeared that strict compliance with the regulation would work hardship on individual evacuees.

"The only future exceptions to this regulation will be cases of:

"1. Present residents of Tule Lake and people who relocated directly from that center. All these evacuees will have until Mar. 1 to request property shipment.

"2. Evacuees in temporary housing projects who are classified and individually approved by a War Relocation Authority supervisor as hardship cases."

21 SINGLE MEN OFFERED WORK By LOMPOC CO.

Year-round work is being offered at Lompoc, Calif., to 21 single men and four families by the Buckman, Denholm and Holden Seed Company, with housing furnished in a new unit which will be completed and ready for occupancy Jan. 15.

This company, in addition to furnishing housing, also provides cooking utensils for use on a community basis, and beds and mattresses. Workers furnish their own blankets and linens.

Housing for single men is in dormitories, where the community cooking arrangement is provided.

For families, the company will pay rent in the homes of Japanese Americans already settled in the town of Lompoc, five miles from the single men's camp. There is no room for children.

Pay is 70 cents an hour for tractor drivers, 65 cents for irrigation of flowers, and 60 cents for weeding, pollenizing, and picking of flowers and seeds. Issei particularly are considered well-qualified for the latter classification, with Nisei or younger Issei preferred for the tractor-driving jobs.

Buckman, Denholm and Holden are operating a 600-acre flower farm. Particulars may be had by inquiring about Job Offer No. 99-1 at Relocation Headquarters, high school grounds.

STUDENT RELOCATION COUNCIL SERVICES OFFERED STUDENTS

Ann M. Graybill, director of the National Japanese American Student Relocation Council at 1201 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia 7, has written to R. R. Best, project director, concerning the plans of the Council now that WRA is about to close its facilities, with particular reference to services offered Tule Lake students.

"There has been much discussion about the closing of the Student Relocation Council," Miss Graybill writes. "We would, therefore, like to assure you that the Council office will be open and its services continued at least through Mar. 31, 1946. There is a possibility that we may continue through June.

"The Council is in a position to offer financial assistance to Japanese American students who otherwise would be unable to pursue a college education. In making application for such scholarship aid, the student should submit a Council questionnaire, three copies of his high school transcripts and three letters of reference. We understand that after Jan. 15 the high school transcripts from Tule Lake will be processed in Washington. We will, therefore, be glad to send for the transcripts and letters of reference for Tule Lake students upon receipt of their questionnaires.

"After Tule Lake closes, students may write directly to the Student Relocation Council for placement service or financial assistance. Letters of application for financial assistance should be addressed to Miss Ann Graybill, Director, Student Relocation Council, 1201 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia 7, Pa.

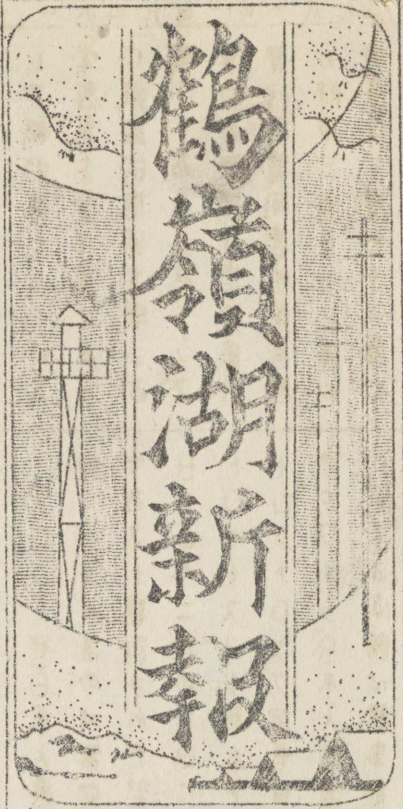

JOBS AVAILABLE FOR THOSE WHO MAY BE RELEASED

Numerous employment opportunities are available at Relocation Headquarters, high school grounds, for consideration of persons detained at present but who may be eligible to relocate later as the result of Department of Justice hearings now underway here, the Relocation Division announced today.

Services of advisors and other facilities of this division are available now to all Tule Lake residents who wish to prepare for immediate action if their detention status is changed, said W. K. Holland, relocation program officer.

These services are offered and should be accepted, he said, not as any indication of what the Department of Justice decision will be in any individual case, but as purely preparatory for the time when, and if, certain individuals now detained are adjudged eligible for relocation. Numerous employers have been found, he said, who are willing to make tentative plans for the future.

One of the most attractive opportunities of this type, details of which are available at Relocation Headquarters, is an offer of the R. D. Pringle Company of Ogden, Utah, to house the families of presently detained workers, (cont'd on page 2)

said Best, "that the War Relocation Authority now of necessity is nearing the end of its life, and that Tule Lake Center as a place of residence for Japanese Americans now eligible to re-enter normal life shortly will be a thing of the past.

"I have been particularly impressed and pleased with the attitude of Tule Lake's entire population during these closing days, which have been trying upon the nerves of everyone. We have proved, each one of us, that the problems we have to meet can be met ---and we can look ahead with assurance that future problems will be met.

"The credit for the orderly liquidation of Tule Lake Center as it has progressed to date belongs to the residents who have co-operated in the finest possible way."

Holland and Lowery expressed special appreciation of the co-operative services of the Block Managers Organization and of the work of the more than 40 Japanese Americans who have been involved directly in the planning and operation of the Relocation Division.

"These workers," they said, "have been loyal and dependable under every circumstance, and their contribution of human service to their fellow Tuleans is beyond estimate."

Holland said departures scheduled through Jan. 31 have been set up to meet the wishes and convenience of everyone as far as it has been possible, including special Pullman cars for persons whose health or age makes such service necessary or desirable.

A special Pullman on Jan. 28 will proceed via Sacramento to Oakland pier, and another on Jan. 31 will be routed through the San Joaquin Valley to Los Angeles.

N. J. FARM REITERATES NEED FOR MORE WORKERS

Seabrook Farms in New Jersey reiterated in a special communication to the Administration this week that it is in urgent need of many additional workers in food processing. The present union pay scale is 64 cents an hour for men and 57½ cents for women, with 40 hours weekly, the year around, guaranteed. Seabrook Farms has advised, however, that a new union contract will result in higher pay after Feb. 1.

Seabrook now can accommodate 350 families---a total of about 1000 people---on a beautiful housing site near the state park, 3½ miles from the main Seabrook housing units, in furnished apartments for which no rent at any time will be charged.

The food processing work will begin about Apr. 1, but families may move into the quarters at any time, and until Apr. 1 150 able-bodied men can be employed in construction work at 73 cents an hour.

Families may move in at once regardless of whether they have workers available for the construction jobs, Seabrook advises, as the housing is free and Seabrook will extend loans for subsistence to be repaid out of future overtime earnings only.

Capt. Herbert Lett, assistant to the president of the Deerfield Packing Company at Seabrook Farms, is in Tule Lake Center now as representative of the

Shelly succeeds Paul G. Robertson, also formerly an assistant director of Tule Lake Center, who is returning to private business after heading the Southern California area since it was opened by revocation of the exclusion order more than a year ago. Steiding, who formerly was in charge of the New York district office and has served as special assistant to Robertson for several months, succeeds Earl L. Kelley, who also is leaving WRA.

The changes were announced in Los Angeles by H. Rex Lee, chief of the Relocation Division of WRA in Washington, in connection with the program looking toward complete liquidation of WRA within the next few months.

Lee announced that the Los Angeles district office and other district offices in the Southern California area, at Santa Barbara, Santa Ana, San Diego and El Centro, will close May 1, and the Southern California area office will close May 15.

Emphasis during the remaining months, he said, will be placed on more satisfactory permanent relocation of persons now in temporary quarters, and movement of such people into permanent homes now is a prime assignment of the Los Angeles area and district staffs.

TULE LAKE CENTER OPERATION TO CONTINUE FOR SHORT TIME

The period of residence for evacuees remaining at Tule Lake Center will be extended for a short time beyond February 1 in order to permit the Department of Justice to complete its review of the program still under consideration in Washington, Harry L. Black, Acting Project Director, announced today.

Ivan Williams, representative of the Department of Justice at this center, stated that arrangements are being made for a ship to transport several hundred voluntary repatriates to Japan during the month of February. A total of 7100 repatriates were removed during November and December.

After the status of all Tule Lake residents has been determined, Williams added, it is probable that a group will be removed to Department of Justice internment camps to await final disposition of their cases.

Black stated that WRA will continue during the month of February to assist in the relocation of those persons at the center who are not under Department of Justice detention orders.

Official announcement of continuance for the time being of WRA services to evacuees at Tule Lake Center in co-operation with the Department of Justice and to allow the Justice Department to complete its determination of status of all residents, was made by Black in the absence of R. R. Best, Project Director, who is inspecting WRA relocation facilities on the West Coast.

CLOSING DATES FOR BLOCKS 35, 36 ARE GIVEN

All utilities will be discontinued in one Tule Lake Center block tomorrow and in another next week, Joe Thomas, administrative officer in charge of housing, announced today. These blocks no longer will be available for residential purposes.

All residents either have moved or now are moving out of Block 35, mainly to vacant apartments in Block 32, Thomas said. The water service in that block already has been discontinued, and electricity will be turned off tomorrow.

Water also has been turned off in Block 36, and residents are moving from there to adjacent blocks. Electricity in Block 36 will be discontinued next week.

This procedure will be followed, with several days of notice given the remaining residents, whenever the population of blocks in which mess halls are not operating falls to a point to make continued operation of utilities unjustifiable. Residents will move into blocks in which mess halls continue to operate.

The War Relocation Authority has completed liquidation of the Granada Relocation Center, Dillon Myer, national director, announced from Washington this week.

"The Granada Relocation Center was turned over to the Farm Credit Administration for disposal, effective Jan. 27, 1946," said the Director. "The work of the War Relocation Authority at this center is complete and finished."

All inquiries pertaining to Granada Relocation Center now will be handled by the Washington office of WRA.

FOR THOSE WHO MAY BE RELEASED

TENTATIVE PLANNING IN FULL SWING THIS WEEK

Tentative planning for relocation by persons who soon may become eligible, by Department of Justice action, to resettle in the United States was in full swing in Tule Lake Center this week.

Yesterday's official announcement by Harry L. Black, acting project director, and Ivan Williams, representative of the Department of Justice, of a co-operative agreement between WRA and the Department of Justice by which WRA Tule Lake Center services to evacuees are extended into February has given these tentative planners assurance that WRA facilities will be available for their departures if they become eligible for relocation.

In this connection W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, said every facility previously accorded residents who were required to leave the center on or before Jan. 31 is being made available to residents now planning relocation on an if and when basis, and the Reports Office announced resumption of issuance of the Tule Resettlement News, a publication containing specific information for the assistance of relocation planners.

Thus, said Holland, all persons who now may become eligible to relocate will be able to leave the center under exactly the same conditions as those who departed before the end of January, and transportation schedules will be arranged and maintained to serve them.

In many instances, interested residents are being notified by Relocation Headquarters of appointments for interviews, it being impossible for all who seek to make tentative plans to be interviewed at once. These interview appointments should not be misunderstood, Holland pointed out. They do not constitute notification that the person

involved has become eligible to relocate. WRA has no knowledge of what Department of Justice decisions will be.

Williams said that notifications to residents of Department of Justice decisions regarding their status as the result of the now virtually completed hearing program carried out here during most of January will be delivered to the individuals concerned through his office.

FIRST PHASE OF TULE RELOCATION PROGRAM ENDS

Tule Lake Center completed the first phase of its relocation program with a population of 5045 at the close of Jan. 31, when all persons required to leave by that time had departed, and the Administration turned its attention to aiding residents who may become eligible to relocate this month.

During January 2244 individuals left Tule Lake on terminal departure for resettlement in various parts of the United States, bringing to more than 8600 the number of resettlers leaving during the 13 months it has been possible for Tule residents to relocate.

The last contingent of 90 resettlers departed yesterday, with transportation including a special Pullman car routed through the San Joaquin Valley to Los Angeles.

RECRUITERS STILL HERE

SOUTHERN PACIFIC OFFERS WORK ON IF AND WHEN BASIS

In connection with WRA's arrangement to continue tentative relocation planning for the benefit of people who may become eligible to relocate this month, L. J. Van Wormer, in charge of recruiting here for the Southern Pacific Railroad, said today that Southern Pacific recruiting representatives will continue to be available in Relocation Headquarters each forenoon to interview prospective workers.

Gene Okubo, central block manager, also is representing the Southern Pacific in its Tule Lake recruiting, and has all information concerning the railroad's job offers at Block Managers Headquarters, 1608.

The Southern Pacific already has furnished free housing to more than 1000 Tule Lake residents, with full-time, year-around jobs for the male working members of the families involved. It hires men 17 to 55 years of age, and pays 62 cents an hour for a six-day, 48-hour week, with time and a half, or

93 cents an hour, for all overtime. The men have been working a nine-hour day, which has given them six hours of overtime a week.

Okubo, who has remained in close touch with most of those who have departed for relocation on the Southern Pacific plan, reports receipt of numerous letters expressing satisfaction of workers and their families with the working and living conditions afforded.

The Southern Pacific, said Van Wormer, now is prepared to sign workers on an if and when basis, the jobs to be waiting for them if and whenever they may become eligible for resettlement, with free housing guaranteed for families the same as with workers who are free to leave at once. Already some 150 workers have signed with the Southern Pacific with the understanding the jobs are to be taken only if and when they are able to relocate.

This service will be continued, Van Wormer said, as long as there are workers in Tule Lake who desire and who may be able to take these jobs.

150 JOBS OPEN WITHIN CENTER

The Placement Office announced today that it has approximately 150 job vacancies at this time, including such interesting and educational positions as assistants to the Community Analyst, alarm operators and Motor Pool dispatchers.

There also are vacancies for freight handlers, construction and maintenance workers, janitors, utility men, etc.

The Placement Office appealed to all persons, male or female, not employed at the present time, to avail themselves of the excellent opportunities now available on the WRA payroll.

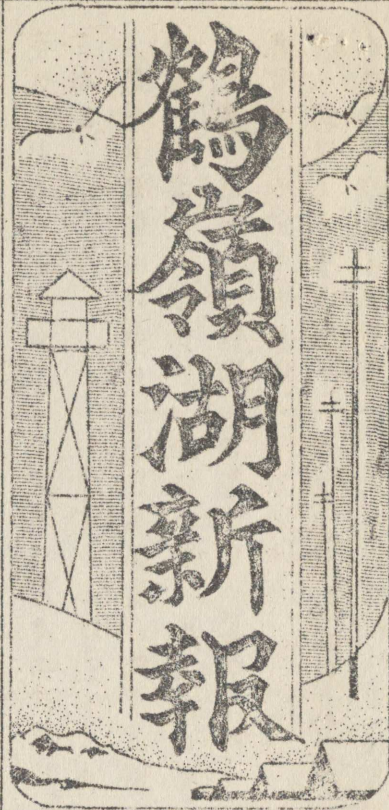

RELEASES NOW BEING RECEIVED AT THIS CENTER

Notices of release from detention now are being received in Tule Lake Center as the result of the Tule Lake Renunciant Hearings which closed last Tuesday.

First notices of approval by the attorney general of requests for permission to relocate in the United States were sent to colony residents last Saturday by Ivan Williams, officer in charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service detail here, who is the attorney general's representative in this procedure.

Nearly 3200 Tule residents availed themselves of the privilege of appearing before the special Department of Justice hearing board which began hearings here Jan. 7.

Joseph Shevlin, who became chairman of the board after departure of Charles Rothstein, under whose direction the hearings were started, said before he left the center Tuesday night that every person who applied had been given an opportunity to appear. Hearing officers called upon people who were physically unable to visit the hearing rooms, including patients in the hospital.

PROSPECTIVE RESETTLERS TO HAWAII MAY REGISTER NOW

Tule Lake residents who plan resettlement in Hawaii must make proper application at Relocation Headquarters not later than Feb. 21, the Relocation Division announced this week. This is the deadline for arrangement of transportation at government expense.

Approximately 200 persons who were evacuated from Hawaii and wish to return are believed to be residents of the center at present. They should visit

SAYS HOLLAND:

SHOULD COMPLETE PLANS AT ONCE WHEN RELEASED

Tule Lake residents who are released from detention by action of the attorney general as the result of the Tule Lake Renunciant Hearings should move at once to complete their resettlement plans and schedule their departure dates if they are to assure themselves of the full benefits of the relocation aids WRA is continuing temporarily in co-operation with the Department of Justice, W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, said today.

"Some people whose applications for permission to remain in the United States have been approved by the Attorney General already have left the center," said Holland, "and others have set their departure dates, having contacted Relocation Headquarters at once upon receipt from the Department of Justice of notice of lifting of detention orders. The arranging of a departure date should be the first order of business for everyone who receives a release notice.

"It must be assumed that everyone who requested permission to remain in

the United States sincerely desires to leave the center as soon as possible, and it is the responsibility of people who receive release notices resulting from such requests to carry through without delay if they are to receive the benefits of WRA's temporarily extended planning and transportation (cont'd on page 2)

13 MORE BLOCKS TO BE CLOSED, STATES THOMAS

Thirteen more blocks will be closed during the next two week-ends, with the residents moving to adjacent blocks because population no longer is sufficient to warrant continuance of utilities, Joe Thomas, administrative officer in charge of housing, announced this week.

No mess halls have been operating for some time in any of the blocks scheduled for closing except in Block 9, which has been used as a dietary kitchen by the hospital but which no longer is needed as such, he said.

In all the blocks residents will be given a week-end opportunity to move before water service is discontinued. Lights will be left on three more days to facilitate clean-up.

Water will be turned off next Monday, Feb. 11, and lights turned off Thursday, Feb. 14, in Blocks 9, 46, 47 and 48.

Water will be turned off Feb. 18 and lights turned off Feb. 21 in Blocks 8, 19, 24, 27, 34, 37, 38, 39 and 76. Thomas said there likely will be additions to this list before the closing week-end arrives.

3 BIG EMPLOYERS ANXIOUS TO OBTAIN MORE WORKERS

Three big employers of Japanese American workers whose experiences with resettlers have been so favorable as to make them anxious to obtain the services of more, are continuing intensive recruiting in Tule Lake Center. All three guarantee housing with jobs for both single workers and families.

The Southern Pacific Railroad's program of hiring Japanese American workers to replace Mexican nationals still is far from complete, and company representatives are here in the forenoons for interviews. Gene Okubo at 1608 also is a Southern Pacific employment representative. Housing automatically accompanies all of the Southern Pacific jobs offered, and the railroad makes special provisions for school attendance of children and family shopping.

Seabrook Farms at Bridgeton, N. J., is seeking a minimum of 150 families and can accommodate many more, with housing, rent free, which can be occupied in advance of actual employment of family members if necessary or desirable, with a credit arrangement available if it is needed to tide families over the beginning period of resettlement. Capt. Herbert Lett, representative of C. F. Seabrook, has been here for a personal survey, and will remain in close contact with Relocation Headquarters. Seabrook's versatile combination of agriculture and industry offers clerical and other jobs as well as farming.

Wilson Plantation at Wilson, Ark., where many resettlers have reported

themselves as finding prosperity and excellent housing facilities, is anxious to obtain as many more families as possible, and its capacity at this time, with 57,000 acres under cultivation, is almost unlimited. Wilson Plantation operates complete towns for its workers, who are employed in 77 industries in addition to farming. The towns include educational, recreational and medical facilities. It is looked upon by WRA investigators as the outstanding resettlement opportunity in the southern area.

"This applies to all residents, whether they relocate, repatriate, or go to a Department of Justice internment camp," said the notice.

MAY NOW SIGNIFY DESIRE TO BUY TRAVELERS CHECKS

The Relocation Division has been informed by the Bank of America branch at Tulelake that whenever sufficient persons signify their desire to purchase travelers checks to make such action worthwhile a representative will be sent to the center to serve them.

Persons making relocation plans who desire to carry their funds in travelers checks instead of cash are advised to register at the front office in Relocation Headquarters. They will be advised when the check-selling bank representative will be available.

VETERINARIAN MAY COME TO CENTER

If 20 more people signify their desire for the service, the Colonial Peace Department announced this week, it has been informed a veterinarian will come from Klamath Falls to immunize dogs. Registrations are being taken at Colonial Peace Headquarters, where information regarding the cost of the service is obtainable. Immunization is necessary in most instances before canine pets may be shipped from the center.

48 MESS HALLS CEASE OPERATION

Mess halls 9 and 59 are scheduled to serve their final meals today making a grand total of 48 center mess halls to cease operation, as of this date, according to Raymond Hayward, chief project steward.

WRA OFFICES IN NORTHERN CALIF. TO CLOSE SOON

All War Relocation Authority offices in the Northern California area, it has been announced by Charles F. Miller, area supervisor, will be closed by May 15, the first to close Apr. 19.

To be closed Apr. 19 are the offices at Santa Rosa, Watsonville, Stockton and Oakland.

To be closed May 3 are the offices at Fresno, San Jose and Sacramento.

The area office at San Francisco will be discontinued May 15.

"All major problems incidental to resettling evacuated persons of Japanese ancestry in this area have been solved or are at a stage where they can be turned over to the individual communities," said Miller. "Responsibility for the welfare of its citizens and law-abiding aliens rests with each community. Those returning persons moved from their homes by military order in 1942 and who began their return when the military ban was lifted Jan. 2, 1945, have the same rights and legal status as persons of any other ancestry in this country."

FROM HERE AND THERE

GIVE LATEST INFORMATION ON RELOCATION POSSIBILITIES

Up-to-date information regarding relocation possibilities, for the benefit of people who since Jan. 31 have been made eligible for resettlement or who may become so, is being received at Relocation Headquarters from many parts of the country.

"Employment possibilities in Los Angeles county for Japanese Americans are considered equal to those existing in any area west of the Rockies," wires James L. Shelly, former Tule Lake assistant project director and now Southern California area supervisor. "The majority of jobs available are in unskilled farm and domestic employment. However, opportunities do exist for qualified people in some professional and skilled trades. The domestic job offers provide good salaries and housing conditions for singles and couples. Farm opportunities exist for families with and without children. Professional and skilled jobs are located through a review of the individual's qualifications by WRA or co-operating agencies and individual contacts with employers. However, many evacuees returning to Los Angeles have been able to negotiate favorable jobs for themselves."

"Experience indicates," Shelly continues, "that opportunities for employment by Japanese Americans in the reconversion pro-

cluded Eastern Nebraska and South Dakota.

The Milwaukee Office, which includes all of Wisconsin, and the St. Louis Office, which includes the Eastern Missouri District, will be closed Feb. 28. The Chicago District Office for the Chicago metropolitan area, and the Minneapolis Office for Minnesota and Eastern North Dakota, will be closed Apr. 1.

The North Central Area Office, in Chicago will continue until May 15.

gram is comparable to those of any other group. At present Americans of Japanese ancestry are working in diversified types of industry, business and the professions. We expect this condition to continue."

Housing of permanence has been difficult in Los Angeles, and Shelly reports most arrivals from Tule housed temporarily, adding that "the WRA district office, however, has developed an intensified campaign to create as much permanent and semi-permanent housing as possible and hopes to be of greater assistance in this respect."

The Chicago WRA area office says:

"We see no reason why hundreds of Tuleans should not find Chicago, with the largest Japanese American population in the United States, a good place to resettle."

"Professional openings in Chicago are fair to good," says this communication, "depending on individual skills and adaptability. Most skilled trades also have fairly good demand. There is a great variety of openings. (cont'd on page 4)"

Southern Pacific Railroad in Midway hired two new men, TANIN OGATA and TOMOKI HINAGATO. The returnees have proved themselves to be very good workmen and the company continues to employ more and more of them.

The Southern Pacific Railroad at Gilroy, California, has employed KYUTARO OKAYAMA, MATOJIRO OKAYAMA, TAKATO OSAKI, KATSUJI MEGASHIMA, MEGUMI MORI. The company has provided housing for these men and their families.

The newly-organized Connecticut Council for Japanese Americans held its first public state-wide meeting in co-operation with the Connecticut Interracial Commission the evening of Feb. 1 in the Old Senate Chamber of the State Capitol at Hartford, with Paul Butterworth, Hartford civic leader and Council chairman, presiding, and Philip Glick, assistant director of the War Relocation Authority, as the featured speaker.

Glick's topic was "Next Steps in the Japanese American Relocation Program."

"The Connecticut Council for Japanese Americans is providing an important public service in undertaking a program which will assist the state's 300 evacuees of Japanese ancestry in successfully adjusting themselves to their new communities," said Glick. "The friendly welcome already given these newcomers by neighbors, employers and fellow workers is evidence of Connecticut's spirit of fair play and tolerance. In helping these displaced people to start their lives anew, the Council and the public and private agencies co-operating with it will be acting in the best traditions of American democracy!"

The Connecticut Council for Japanese Americans is an example of organizations which are being formed in all parts of the country to continue advisory and other services to Japanese

Americans after WRA has liquidated.

"The new Council will carry on an educational program designed to inform residents of the state about the Japanese Americans and the contributions those who have resettled here can make to our communities," said Butterworth. "Through its local committees, the Council also will work with existing agencies in aiding resettlers to meet problems of employment, housing, education and general adjustment."

for unskilled workers and domestics.

"Reconversion is progressing rapidly in Chicago and employment of Japanese Americans largely has not been affected. Long-time employment prospects are believed good."

Says the San Francisco area office:

"All points in this area are prepared to meet any problems, and returnees should proceed immediately to the communities of their choice, contacting the nearest district office for whatever service is desired."

Want ads specifying Japanese American help, particularly in domestic positions, are appearing daily in San Francisco newspapers.

"Reassure those yet to come to San Joaquin, Stanislaus and Merced counties that agricultural employment is plentiful and there are some openings for clerical workers," wires Claud Gilmore, relocation officer at Stockton. "Every newcomer calling in our office will receive personal attention on any problem, including housing, employment, welfare and property."

Additional farm, domestic, clerical and other offers are being received at Relocation Headquarters from many points, some providing opportunities for some family members to precede others.

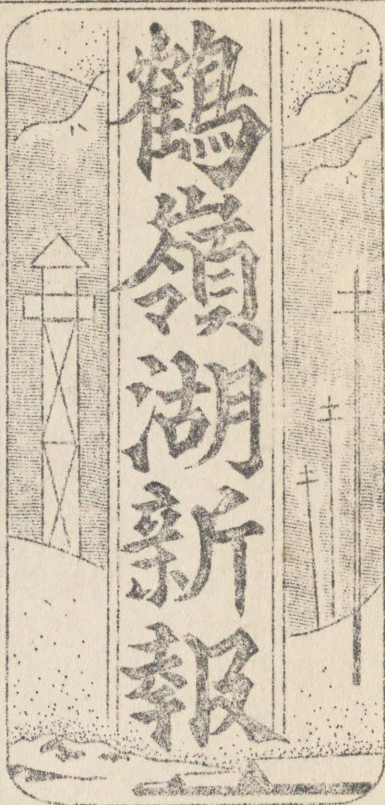

REPATRIATES TO SAIL FOR JAPAN ON FEB. 21

The Department of Justice announced completion this week of plans for departure of voluntary repatriates from Tule Lake Center Feb. 19, to sail for Japan from San Pedro, the port of Los Angeles, on Feb. 21.

The repatriation train is scheduled to leave the center at 4 p.m. and repatriates have been instructed to report at the Department of Justice Processing Station near Gate #1 at 1 p.m. Persons physically unable to report at the Processing Station will be informed in advance of facilities which will be made available to them for processing and in reaching the train.

The voluntary repatriation list was closed at 10 a.m. yesterday and no further applications will be accepted for this trip, the Department of Justice said.

It is contemplated, the Department of Justice said, that persons notified of recommendations for removal to Japan as the result of the recent hearings, and who have not requested voluntary repatriation, will be removed in the near future to the Department of Justice internment camps at Santa Fe and Crystal City.

ESTABLISH 5-DAY RULE FOR COMPLETING PLANS

A five-day rule for completion of relocation planning by Tule Lake residents who receive releases from the Department of Justice, and for residents who are free to relocate if and after withdrawing requests for voluntary repatriation, was established this week by R. R. Best, project director.

Releases are being received continuously from the attorney general in Washington and the limitation on planning time is necessary in order to assure transportation and other facilities for released persons during the brief time Tule Lake Center will continue to be operated by WRA in order to allow the Department of Justice to complete its procedures.

All persons who are notified by Ivan Williams, department of Justice representative, that they are free to relocate should contact their relocation advisors at once, regardless of whether plans already have been started. Their plans must be completed within five days.

All persons not under detention orders and who withdraw requests for voluntary repatriation must act at once in their relocation planning. Their plans for leaving the center must be completed also within five days after their names are removed from the Department of Justice voluntary repatriation list.

It was pointed out that WRA services to Tule Lake residents are being curtailed rapidly, as demonstrated by closing not only of mess halls but of entire blocks.

W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, reiterated that every WRA resettlement facility is being made available to persons becoming eligible to relocate, and that transportation is being scheduled promptly—but this can be done only if the affected persons act promptly.

HAWAII-BOUND PERSONS MUST BE INOCULATED

Tule residents who desire to go to Hawaii, regardless of whether they yet have received releases, were warned today by Dr. Donnell W. Boardman, acting chief medical officer, that they must appear at Wing 8 of the high school at 8:30 o'clock next Thursday morning, Feb. 21, for immunization.

Everyone going to Hawaii must be immunized. Those who had their first immunization shots on Feb. 14 should appear Feb. 21 for the second shot. Those who have not as yet appeared at all should be present for their first shot. No immunizations will be given at the hospital, and persons for whom immunization is necessary must report at the stated time at Wing 8 of the high school.

At the same time the Relocation Division reiterated that Feb. 21 is the absolute deadline for making of applications for transportation to Hawaii at government expense. The last such movement to Hawaii now is being arranged.

11 MORE BLOCKS TO BE VACATED

Blocks 5, 8, 19, 20, 34, 37, 38, 53, 54, 59 and 72 are to be vacated and closed after this week end, and blocks 24, 27, 39, 52, 73, 74, 76 and 79 will be closed as soon as moving arrangements can be made, Joe Thomas, administrative officer in charge of housing, said today.

In all instances, residents are moving into blocks in which mess halls still are operating.

TULEANS' RELOCATION CO-OPERATION LAUDED

Co-operation in connection with the five-day relocation planning completion rule by persons who are receiving Department of Justice notices of release for resettlement in the United States has been excellent during the past week, W. K. Holland, relocation program officer, said today.

The rule is that persons receiving release notices are expected to complete their planning for relocation within five days after the notices have been delivered by the Department of Justice.

"If this whole-hearted co-operation is maintained, and there is no reason to believe that it will not be, there is no need for persons still awaiting receipt of notices to fear there will be any transportation or other lack in relocation facilities," said Holland. "Released people are being scheduled for departure daily in a most orderly manner, and as quickly as it is possible to complete the necessary procedures."

By the end of this week more than 1,000 persons, including released individuals and members of families, already will have departed for resettlement.

Holland and R. R. Best, project director, took occasion to brand not only as unfounded but as fabricated reports that delivery of release notices to individuals has been delayed after receipt of release lists here from Washington, because of transportation or other difficulties.

"There are no transportation or any other difficulties in connection with departures of released people," they said. "The whole interest of WRA in this proceeding is to relocate eligible people from Tule Lake Center as quickly as possible. The reason for the five-day rule is to avoid necessity for delay on the part of anyone."

They pointed out further that notification of released persons is not a function of WRA, and that

MAILS MUST BE SENT DIRECT TO WASHINGTON

Communications regarding the Tule Lake Renunciant Hearings, which are intended for the Attorney General, should be mailed direct to the Attorney General at Washington and not addressed for delivery to Ivan Williams either as Officer in Charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service detail or as representative of the Attorney General, Williams said Tuesday before leaving for San Pedro aboard the repatriation train.

Williams said he has received numerous communications at his Tule Lake office which are in fact addressed to and intended for the Attorney General, and that his office cannot forward them. All communications to the Attorney General must be mailed by the sender direct to Washington if the Attorney General is to receive them, he said.

438 CENTER REPATRIATES EMBARK FOR JAPAN TODAY

A special train from Tule Lake Center Tuesday afternoon, operated under the jurisdiction of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, carried 438 Tule residents, and two other persons who came here for the purpose, to San Pedro, the port of Los Angeles, to embark today for Japan.

The voluntary repatriation list for this, the third departure from this center for Japan, was made up of single persons of both sexes and family groups including United States citizen children accompanying their parents.

Ivan Williams, officer in charge of the Immigration and Naturalization Service here, under whose direction the movement to San Pedro was made, said all of the citizen children had been fingerprinted to

provide means of establishing identification should they desire to return to the United States as citizens when they reach legal age.

The train, made up of 13 cars, carried hospital cases in a special Pullman. It left Tule Lake at 6 p.m. Tuesday and was due to arrive alongside the ship at the San Pedro dock some time during last night.

FURTHER 'SHOTS' TO BE GIVEN HAWAII-BOUND

Residents who are expecting to go to Hawaii must report to Wing 8 of the high school at 8:30 a.m. next Thursday, Feb. 28, for their third (or, their second) immunization shots, stated Dr. Donnell Boardman, acting chief medical officer.

SEABROOK FARMS OFFER FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

Capt. Herbert Letts, recruiter for Seabrook Farms of Bridgeton, N. J., and personal representative of C. F. Seabrook, returned to Tule Lake Center today for further interviews with people released or who may be released for resettlement. Captain Letts is at Relocation Headquarters.

Seabrooks' proposition of steady employment with rent-free housing for families in pleasant surroundings has proved itself both workable and profitable for Japanese-American resettlers over a long period of time, and is one of those recommended highly by WRA officials who have investigated it carefully.

The free housing at Seabrook may be occupied by families in advance of the start of worker employment, if that is necessary or desirable, and personal credit is available to individual or families in need of financial aid in establishment of homes and

for living expenses in advance of beginning work. These loans are arranged on a basis for repayment out of overtime earnings only, so that the basic income of workers will not be reduced by them.

The Seabrook offer is presented as of particular interest to persons or families faced by an immediate financial problem, or housing problem, or both.

MESS HALLS MUST FOLLOW SCHEDULED MENUS - HAYWARD

In view of the fact that increasing number of mess halls is no longer following the mess menu, Raymond Hayward, chief steward, stated today that block residents should insist to the mess workers that menu be strictly observed, and report to the block manager in case it is not followed.

this procedure is not being handled by WRA or through WRA facilities. Notice is being delivered to each individual directly by the Department of Justice, wholly independent of WRA.

The multiple lists which are being distributed by WRA to the Relocation Division and other departments are for information only. They do not constitute official releases. Although these WRA information lists are prepared and distributed as soon as possible after the information is received, in most instances notifications have been delivered by the Department of Justice to the individuals concerned before the WRA lists are available.

Railroads and bus lines are co-operating fully in the final movement of Tule resettlers, Holland reported, and special facilities are being made available whenever they are needed.

A special railroad car is leaving Klamath Falls southbound nightly as an exclusive service for resettlers. It provides through service to Los Angeles and all way points without change. Pullman car service is available to persons whose physical condition makes this mode of travel necessary.

DECREASE

POPULATION TO DROP BELOW 2500 BY MONDAY

Tule Lake Center's population by next Monday will have dropped below 2500, leaving this once most populous of all the WRA centers, comparable in number of residents to the city of Klamath Falls, with all the aspects of a ghost town.

Since the beginning of February, in connection with receipt of Department of Justice releases from Washington, more than 2100 persons by Monday will have departed for resettlement,

in addition to which 433 elected to return to Japan.

The biggest relocation week in Tule Lake's history was the week of Feb. 17 to Feb. 23, inclusive, when 900 individuals left the center for resettlement in various sections of the United States. Nearly as many have departed or are scheduled to depart the week of Feb. 24 to Mar. 2, and more than 200 are due to leave over the week-end.

By the beginning of next week nearly 11,000 people will have relocated from Tule Lake Center since the lifting of the Army's West Coast blanket exclusion order and Tule Lake began again to function as a relocation center in January of 1945.

With continuous receipt of releases from Washington, the Administration foresaw today that the remaining population which will be eligible for relocation will be cleared within a very short time, to bring about the closing of the center, which WRA has continued to operate since Jan. 31 in order to co-operate with the Department of Justice.

SWISS TO DISCONTINUE REPRESENTING JAPAN SHOULD CONTACT PROPER AUTHORITIES

The Legation of Switzerland in Washington has announced the intention of the Government of Switzerland to discontinue representation of Japanese interests in the United States, and has suggested that all persons who in the past would have consulted the Swiss Legation now take their problems to appropriate American authorities.

The following letter was received this week from the Swiss Legation addressed to the "Spokesman for the Japanese Evacuees" at Tule Lake Center:

"The Swiss Government has informed this Legation that the representation of Japanese interests is to

be discontinued.

"Conforming with this order we wish to advise you not to write to this Legation any longer. We suggest that you submit your problems to the appropriate American authorities in the future. Please inform your compatriots accordingly."

PAYMENT OF FEB. WAGES DELAYED

The Finance Office announced that wages and clothing allowances for the month of February will not be paid in cash at the time of departure.

Payrolls and clothing vouchers are being prepared for payment by checks, which will be mailed as soon as they are received from the Treasury, probably around March 20. Residents are requested to leave their forwarding address at the agent cashier's office when receiving their relocation grants. Forms will be provided by the Agent Cashier for this purpose.

Wages earned during the month of March will be paid in cash by the Agent Cashier at the same time as relocation grants are paid.

Other staff members who have put the NEWELL STAR "to bed" for the last time today are Hiroshi Nishikawa, Fred Harada, Kisao Kamada, Mary Oshiro, Takao Matsuda, Minoru Nehira and Kiyoshi Yamamoto.

These men and women have earned the respect and the affection of Tule Lake Center as they have earned mine. Godspeed and success to them in their future endeavors.

The Newell Community Hospital today issued a stern warning to those who are expecting to go to Hawaii to appear at Wing 8 of the high school at 8:30 a.m. next Thursday, March 7, for their immunization shots, positively the last chance afforded them.

DISPOSAL DATE OF HEART MT. BARED

The WRA announced this week that the Heart Mountain Relocation Center has been turned over to the Bureau of Reclamation for disposal effective last Monday, Feb. 25.

It was announced that any correspondence pertaining to Heart Mountain now should be addressed to the Washington office of the WRA.

Without being immunized, no one will be permitted on the ship, the hospital disclosed.

Those who have already received their first shots should appear for their second (or their third) shots next Thursday. People being immunized were instructed by the hospital to bring their immunization cards when they come to the high school for their shots.

NEWSPAPER LIFE IN RETROSPECT: EDITOR

After serving Tule Lake Center for more than two years as the official news agency, THE NEWELL STAR will go out of existence after today because this center---the largest and last of the WRA centers and which during the past two years has made headlines in the nation's leading newspapers---will be closed in the immediate future.

In January of 1944, under the Reports Division then headed by Allan Markley who was on detail from Washington, organization was begun of THE NEWELL STAR to become Tule Lake's official news agency after the two-month general strike following the incident of November, 1943, had stopped publication of THE TULEAN DISPATCH, former center newspaper.

When THE NEWELL STAR published its first edition on February 26, 1944, Tule Lake Center just was returning to normal and general misunderstanding existed throughout the colony. THE NEWELL STAR set forth to correct this situation. It did so by becoming an accurate medium of information to the residents, which it has remained to this day.

In addition to Mr. Markley, the Reports Officers who have been instrumental in maintaining the high standard set by THE NEWELL STAR have been John Bigelow and Ralph O. Brown. Mr. Bigelow succeeded Mr. Markley when the latter was recalled to Washington, and Mr. Brown succeeded in January of 1945 when Mr. Bigelow entered the United States Navy. A short time before this Robert H. Ross had entered the Reports Office as Assistant Reports Officer. Without the aid of these men, publication of THE NEWELL STAR on the basis it has been published would not have been possible.

So in the issuance of this last edition, THE NEWELL STAR wishes to express its gratitude to these men of the Reports Division, and at the same time to wish all other WRA personnel as well as the remaining residents of Tule Lake Center the best of luck.
