
We would also be pleased to have you as our guest at the Young Reader Medal Luncheon and the Young Reader Medal Reception held on Saturday, November 5.

ALL THE COLORS OF THE RACE A Festival of Ethnic Children's Writers October 6-8, 1983

ARNOLD ADOFF, the author of *All the Colors of the Race*, is a poet, lecturer, and creator of anthologies. For twelve years he was a teacher and counselor in the New York City public schools, then a lecturer at New York University and Connecticut College. Later Adoff and his wife, author Virginia Hamilton, moved to Yellow Springs, Ohio to raise their children on land that has been in the family since the days of the Underground Railroad. Adoff's books reflect his wide-ranging interests: *Black is Brown is Tan* and *Today We Are Brother and Sister* (poetry rooted in his own family), *The Biography of Malcolm X*, *Friend Dog, Eats*, and the classic *Poetry of Black America*.

JEANNETTE FRANKLIN CAINES has published four picture books for young children with a fifth in press for 1984. She is a native New Yorker, born in Harlem and now living in Long Island. A member of the Coalition of 100 Black Women and the Negro Business and Professional Women of Nassau County, she is active in church and civic affairs. For the last 17 years she has been a member of the staff of a major children's publisher. Caines' books — *Abby*, *Daddy*, *Window Wishing*, and *Just Us Women* — touch on universal human experiences. Her latest book, *Just Us Women*, received the Coretta Scott King award.

DENISE CHÁVEZ is a Chicana poet, playwright, and storyteller who explores Hispanic traditions in dramas for both children and adults. She was born and raised in New Mexico where she received her MFA from the University of New Mexico and where she has served as an artist in the schools. At present she is living in her family home in Los Cruces, where she is at work on a book of short stories based on her own childhood and making plans for the founding of a new theater company. She is the author of *The Flying Tortilla Man*, *The Adobe Rabbit*, and *Hecho en Mexico*, an adult drama which was presented at the University of Nevada last May.

LINDA HOWARD, Chairman of the Yerington Paiute Tribe, is an Indian leader who has worked along with others to develop a new series of books for young people. She grew up in Nevada, learning to value the traditions embodied in the lives and teachings of the Tribal Elders. A graduate of the University of Nevada, she has used her background in psychology to organize workshops and coordinate educational programs. The Yerington Tribe's publications include *Let Me Tell You A Story: Adapted Paiute Tales*, a book on arts and crafts; and Linda Howard's special favorite, *Nevada Tribal History and Government*. Since 1982 Howard has served as Chairman of the Executive Board of the Inter-Tribal Council of Nevada.

Books by the authors featured in the Festival will be on sale at Old College Bookstore and immediately before the scheduled programs.

YOSHIKO UCHIDA has drawn on the traditions and experience of her Japanese-American heritage to create more than twenty books, including anthologies of Japanese folk tales and stories for children and young adults. Her *Journey to Topaz* and *Journey Home* are informed by her family's experience in World War II, when they were uprooted from their home in Berkeley and sent to a concentration camp in the Utah desert. Like the child Rinko in *A Jar of Dreams* and *The Best Bad Thing*, Uchida herself knew the feelings of alienation in an often hostile society. Twice winner of the California Commonwealth Club Medal, she has been honored by the University of Oregon for her "significant contribution to the cultural development of society."

HARRIET ROHMER, The publisher of Children's Book Press (Imprenta de Libros Infantiles) of San Francisco, is the creator of an innovative series of bilingual children's books which are receiving increasing national attention. Rohmer's publications are characterized by their vivid illustrations, their historical authenticity, and their respect for the richness and diversity of the cultures they depict. Most books are designed for readers of all ages, and titles include *Fifth World Tales* in Spanish; Asian stories in Chinese, Filipino, and Korean; an Afro-American story, and *The People Shall Continue*, a history of Native American tribes. Rohmer was recently the recipient of the Americans Before Columbus award.

Dear Maureen Hayes:

We are very much looking forward to Yoshiko Uchida's participation in All the Colors of the Race: A Festival of Ethnic Children's Writers which we hope to hold in Reno in October, 1983. All plans are conditional on receiving a Nevada Humanities grant, the decision on which should be made by the third week in July.

We want Yoshiko Uchida to participate in a reception for school children at four Friday afternoon October 7, then to take part in an evening program in which she would give a short talk (15 minutes or so) on the creation of a favorite book (ideally Journey to Topaz or Journey Home.) The program will be followed by a time of autographing books. (Some authors will visit children in classrooms during the day and if that is convenient, we would of course appreciate that, too.)

On Saturday morning each of the visiting authors will be asked to speak on the theme "Deep Are the Roots," calling on childhood memories and the place of books and oral tradition in the author's life. This will be followed by a panel discussion with academic humanists from the University of Nevada. From three to four in the afternoon there will be an informal roundtable with a chance to share with a local librarian and interested attenders in discussion of children's books by Asian-American writers. In the evening we will close with a multi-ethnic festival in celebration of "All the Colors of the Race."

We understand that Yoshiko Uchida's honorarium would be \$500 for the two days, October 7 and 8, and that we would pay travel expenses, take care of her in-town transportation and motel and per diem costs.



I'm looking forward to meeting you in October and am sure we'll be in touch again before then.





Directions to conference hotels and meeting rooms will also be available in the conference CRA Office or at the Information/Hospitality Booth in the Theater Lobby.

Please don't be a No-Show! If you don't pick up your Speaker's Packet, we will assume you are a No-Show and send someone down to your room to announce the session has been cancelled. This can cause real problems in a conference using as many speaking areas as we are using.

Plan to arrive in your scheduled meeting room 10-15 minutes early to meet the session chairperson/host and to be sure everything is set to your satisfaction.

Session Room Arrangements: Your room will be set in Theater style (rows of chairs), except if you are doing a preconference workshop. These workshops will generally be set up classroom style (tables and chairs), since they are limited to 40 to 50 people.

A microphone and screen will be provided in your room by CRA if they are needed.

Your session chair will ask smokers to sit on the right side of the room (facing the speakers), and will ask participants to note fire exits. The chair will make a brief conference-related announcement, and then introduce you, using the Speaker Vita form you returned to us. He/she will also greet people at the door (encouraging them to sit in the front of the room) and will distribute and collect evaluations.

Parking: Parking is available at the Community Center Garage at

13th and J Streets (enter off of 13th Street). Parking tickets will be validated at the Information/Hospitality Booth in the Theater Lobby. Parking at both the Capitol Plaza Holiday Inn and the Mansion Inn is free of charge. There is an overflow parking garage next to the Holiday Inn.

Taping of Sessions: Sessions will be taped professionally of those speakers who have given prior permission. These will be made available for sale at the conference and later. For those speakers giving permission a complimentary tape will be provided. ONLY THOSE SESSIONS WHERE PRIOR APPROVAL WAS GRANTED WILL BE TAPED.

Dear Yoshiko,

I was so glad to speak with you the other day and to learn of your growing strength. We hope the Reno Festival will be a joy and we will do whatever we can not to make things too strenuous for you.

Jone Sun, ^{President} the wife of the Japanese-American Citizens League and herself an elementary school teacher, will consider it her privilege to be your special hostess, meeting you at the plane at 12:35, and taking you wherever you need to go, both on Friday and Saturday. Should you need to contact her directly her phone is 702-331-2097 and her address 199 Emerson Way, Sparks, NV 89431.

If you are feeling up to it, she will bring you to the reception at the Washoe County Library for the school children who have been reading your books and those of the other visiting authors. Then she can take you to the College Inn, across from the University at 1101 N. Virginia Street (Tel: 702-323-0321), where you will be staying. At five-thirty we'll be having dinner together at the College Inn with the other writers who will be taking part in the program at 7:30. 



At lunch the visiting authors and publishers will sit at tables in the Humanities Library. Jean O'Meara will arrange for decorations and hospitality over lunch. Tables will be designated for each visiting author and publisher: Jeanette Caines, Denise Chavez, Yerington Tribe, Yoshiko Uchida, Harriet Rohmer, Arnold Adoff.

Roundtables will be coordinated by Leona Wright. They are scheduled to begin at three o'clock and we have encouraged parents unable to spend a whole day to come by to see the books and to talk about books for their children.

✓ The four roundtables will be Native American, coordinated by Virginia Olds; Hispanic, coordinated by Shirley Altick; Black, coordinated by Leona Wright; Asian American, coordinated by Marj Maples.

At four o'clock we will pack up, say goodbye, and move on to the final happening of the Festival.

There will be transportation from Old College (where the Day of Sharing is taking place) to College Inn, then to the Goulds'. Because peoples' schedules and needs are different supper will be a buffet from 5 to 7. Come as early as you like---stay as long as you can. For those participating in the Festival there will be transportation to the Center leaving at 6:30 (earlier if you need it).

Festival

This is the time the community joins in the program. We are arranging the program so that part most suitable for small children will be earlier in the evening and we are suggesting that people come early. The program will start promptly at 7, running till about 9. Then there will be a break for music and refreshments. Community groups expected to be selling refreshments are: University of Nevada Black Students Group - cookies and punch; Black Business and Professional Women's group - sweet potato pie and coffee or tea; Lulac (Hispanic) - hand made corn chips and sauce; Asian - some sort of small egg-roll; Yerington Tribe, if possible pine nuts (their basic food staple which has not yet come to ripeness this fall), possibly tastes of a berry soup. The simplest thing here is probably to buy what you want and simply make a note for Ann as to total expenses.


