There are still employment opportunities available in Cleveland and although converting to peacetime industry has disrupted the employment market, it is authoratively reported that there will be continued an increasing employment opportunities.

Tokuo Yamamoto acted as chairman while Masashi Tazumi gave a brief message asking for further cooperation of the members.

RECONVERSION NEWS

Since the end of the war with Japan, employment offers in industrial plants have been somewhat reduced. However, indications are that this type of employment is beginning to pick up.

A local plant manufacturing rayon used in the production of tires advise W.R.A. that they are speeding up production and now can use more men. This concern is one of many in Cleveland that have hired Japanese-Americans and have been very satisfied with their work. The starting wage is 75 cents an hour, 48 hours, time and a half over 40 hours.

SCHOOL BROADCAST

"New Faces in the Classroom", the first of a series of broadcasts, "Behind the Headlines", was given in the upper elementary schools of Cleveland this week. The broadcast told of the evacuation and of the hardships of center life. It finally made a strong bid for tolerance and understanding toward the Nisei attending schools in Cleveland. The broadcast ended with this challenge--"We have a chance to prove our belief in democracy by treating fairly and respecting all the boys and girls who go to school with us, regardless of where their ancestors came from or what their racial background may have been. There is probably no greater challenge to all of us who call Cleveland our home."

J.A.C.D. ORGANIZING

A chapter of the Japanese-American Committee for Democracy is being formed in this city. An interested group of twenty met on Friday, September 15th, to plan the organization. Among the coming events of the J.A.C.D. is the appearance in Cleveland in the very near future of the well-known ballerina, Sono Osato, who is dancing in that New York Broadway hit, "On the Town". Miss Osato is a very active member of the J.A.C.D. in New York City and her visit here will be in the interest of this new chapter.
