--- EDITORIAL ---

Up till now, the disabled people have been outcasts of society. Some disabled people are put into institutions where they spend their lifetimes in rot and excrement. Nearly all of them are victims of an inferior educational system that segregates the disabled and the non-disabled. Many of the disabled who do not survive the educational system are given, if they are lucky, meaningless jobs and poverty level wages. Rehabilitation programs that could ease the adjustments between the disabled and society are criminally neglected.

We must demand our equal rights in society. We must fight for integration in education. We must insist on better jobs and wages. We must also demand better rehabilitation programs and treatment for those disabled who are confined to institutions. Higher priorities must be given to research programs designed to find cures for disabilities caused by muscular dystrophy, cerebral palsy, post-polio, etc.

We must lend all our support to organizations such as the D.I.A. in the fight for our acceptance by society.

D.I.A. ACTIVE IN NEW YORK CITY

Disabled In Action (D.I.A.) has been proving itself to be an effective organization and has won recognition from the New York City Board of Education and the New York City Human Rights Commission. Both city agencies are presently establishing committees to discuss improvement of the education for the physically disabled, and establishing a committee to make the HRC's policy preventing discrimination against the disabled a reality.

D.I.A. has just opened a bank account and we presently report two hundred and forty dollars. We are also working with a lawyer to establish ourselves as a non-profit corporation. We are also happy to report that as a result of stories and articles given on mass media other disabled people throughout the country have expressed desires to set up similar organizations; also happy to report that a young lady in Salt Lake City is soon to be filing suit against her Board of Education because she has been denied a teaching license because she is physically disabled.

I would like to say that I feel some people do not understand the problems of the disabled and do not understand that we are human beings. We in D.I.A. have a large job to do. It is our responsibility to educate the public and the parents of disabled people.

D.I.A. is not a group for only a few people. Anyone who wants to help us get our human rights is welcome to join. You do not have to travel and you do not have to do a lot of work. A little bit of work by a lot of people will mean that we the disabled will gain our human rights a lot sooner than if people do nothing and then complain that the reason why they are doing nothing is because D.I.A. has not proven itself.

D.I.A. has to prove itself to society and can only do this by having people pitch in and help.

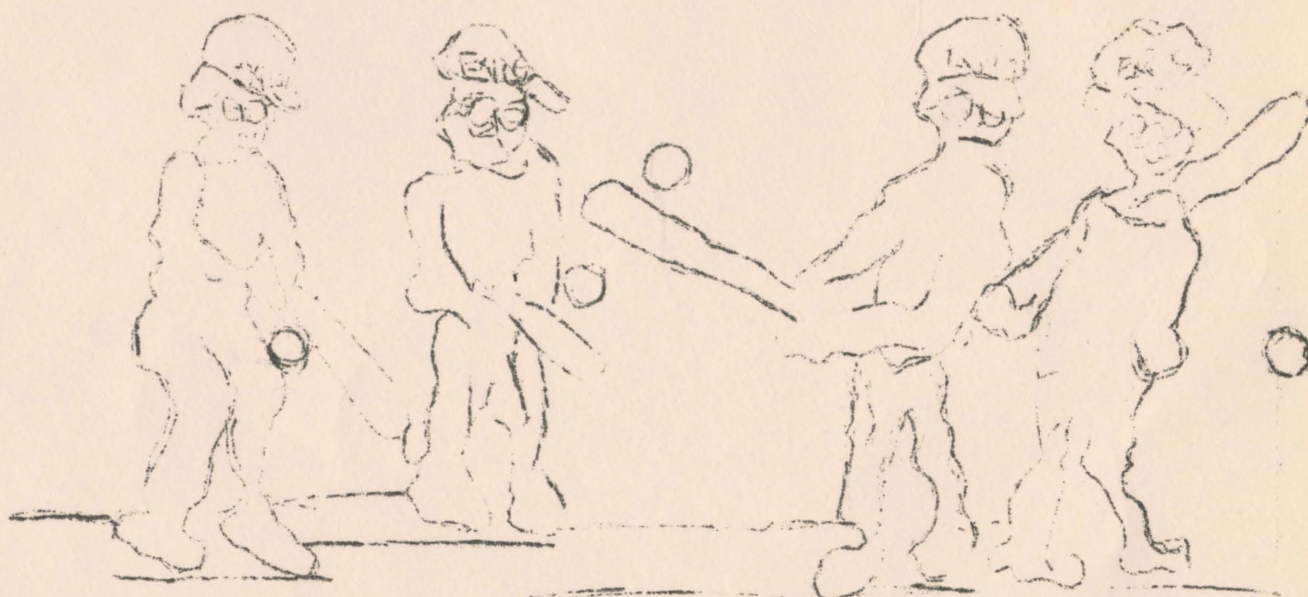
