INTRODUCTION

THE PUBLICATION OF THIS HANDBOOK OF GENERAL STATISTICS ON THE CHARACTERISTICS OF THE PROJECT POPULATION APPROXIMATES THE FIRST ANNIVERSARY OF OUR LIFE AS EXILES. IT WAS ABOUT AN YEAR AGO THAT NEARLY A HUNDRED THOUSAND JAPANESE WERE SUDDENLY DIVORCED FROM THE SCHEME OF THINGS IN AMERICAN SOCIETY AND CORRALED INTO FAR-FLUNG DESERT WASTE LANDS WHILE THE NATION GIRDLED ITSELF FOR THE SUPREME TASK OF WINNING THE WAR.

VIEWS ECONOMICALLY, THE BODY GROUP OF THE JAPANESE IN THIS COUNTRY ASSUMES SIGNIFICANCE AS THE SCOPE OF THEIR CONSIDERATION IS LOCALIZED. VIEWED NATIONALLY, THEY ARE NUMERICALLY TOO FEW TO ASSUME ANY SIGNIFICANCE WITHIN THE FRAMEWORK OF THE NATION'S ECONOMY. VIEWED FROM THE STANDPOINT OF A PORTION OF A STATE, NAMELY CALIFORNIA, THEY ASSUME DEFINITE SIGNIFICANCE AS A BODY OF EFFICIENT CULTIVATORS OF THE SOIL. VIEWED STILL MORE LOCALLY, AS A COMMUNITY OF JAPANESE WITHIN A METROPOLIS, A CITY, OR A TOWN, THEY ASSUME MOST SIGNIFICANCE. HERE WE SEE THEM NOT AS A BODY OF AGRARIANS AND MENIAL LABOURERS, BUT AS AN EMBODIMENT OF A COMPLETE HIERARCHY OF OCCUPATIONAL RANKINGS. HERE WE FIND DOCTORS, LAWYERS, TEACHERS, ECCLESIASTICS, MERCHANTS, AND EVEN LOCAL POLITICIANS. HERE WE FIND AT LAST THE DIVERSIFICATION OF HUMAN PURSUITS NORMAL OF ANY GROUP OF PEOPLE.

IT IS REGRETTABLE THAT ONE MUST SO CIRCUMSCRIBE HIS POINT OF VIEW IN GIVING RECOGNITION TO THE BACKGROUNDS, TALENTS, AND POTENTIALITIES OF THE JAPANESE PEOPLE IN THIS COUNTRY, BUT IT IS STILL MORE REGRETTABLE THAT THOSE POSSESSING THE INTELLIGENCE AND ABILITY TO DO WORK OF EXTENDED SCOPE HAVE HAD TO FIND THEIR EFFORTS CONFINED SIMPLY BECAUSE THE AVENUES TO INDIVIDUAL SELF-DETERMINATION WITHIN THE AMERICAN SOCIETY WERE SO INSURMOUNTABLY BARRED.

THE LATTER PORTION OF THIS HANDBOOK HAS BEEN DEVOTED TO THE RECOGNITION OF THE OCCUPATIONAL AND EDUCATIONAL ATTAINMENTS OF THE PROJECT EVACUEES, AND PARTICULAR NOTE SHOULD BE MADE OF THE DISTRIBUTION OF OCCUPATIONAL PREFERENCES EXPRESSED BY THE NISEI IN THE LIGHT OF THEIR EDUCATIONAL BACKGROUND. THE NISEI, IN ENJOYING THE FRUITS OF THEIR FATHERS' ARDUOUS LABOUR, HAVE, ON THE WHOLE, ATTAINED LEVELS OF EDUCATION OF WHICH THEY CAN BE JUSTLY PROUD. MANY OF THESE WELL EDUCATED NISEI HAVE ALREADY BEEN STRIPPED OF THEIR EARLIER ASPIRATIONS AND HAVE RESIGNED THEMSELVES TO INSIGNIFICANT WORK AND HAPPY DOMESTICITY. BUT THERE ARE THOSE STILL IMBUED WITH THE ASPIRATION AND WILL TO WIN RECOGNITION AND ESTABLISHMENT IN THE AMERICAN SOCIETY - BEYOND THE PROVINCIAL CONFINES OF THEIR FELLOW PEOPLE.

THE WAR HAS OBLITERATED EVERY VESTIGE OF INDIVIDUAL ACHIEVEMENT FOR THE WHOLE OF THE JAPANESE. ISSEI AND NISEI ALIKE NOW FIND THEMSELVES IN THE BOTTOM STRATUM.

THE OUTLOOK IS DISMAL WHEN ONE THINKS OF THE ROAD BACK, AND ESPECIALLY FOR THOSE WHO ARE AGED AND FEEBLE, AND FOR THOSE WHO ARE ANCHORED TO THE HEAVY BURDEN OF MARITAL RESPONSIBILITIES. WHETHER THE FUTURE WILL BE DISMAL OR NOT HINGES MUCH UPON THE INDIVIDUAL WILL AND ATTITUDE OF THE JAPANESE. IF POSITIVE, THEY WILL BE MEN AND WOMEN OF BETTER QUALITY. IF NEGATIVE, THEY WILL DEGENERATE AS THE FLOTSAM AND JETSAM RIFF-RAFF OF AMERICAN SOCIETY.

THIS IS THE CHALLENGE.










