
SURVEY OF STUDENTS

Over 1000 Enrolled

Now we know what causes all the hub-bub and racket at Denson High - it's 197 Seniors, 179 Juniors, 193 Sophomores, 162 Freshmen, 142 eighth and 146 seventh graders. A survey of the monthly report at Mr. Martin's office showed a total enrollment of 1,109 students; a loss of 231 from last year's 1,250.

Probing further into the files, we discovered a slight "girl-shortage" in existence, for they number but 509, while there 510 boys!

To date, there are 83 former Tuleans enrolled at Denson High, a total of 45 girls and 38 boys.

The third touchdown was made by Yosh "Muscles" Ushiro on a quarterback sneak from the four. The conversion by Arihara was good and the score read 21-0.

Roy "Chauncey" Yamana and Sam Shimasaki alternated in taking the ball to the four-yard line, from where Yamana scored the next counter. The conversion try was not good.

The Denson gridders scored again when Shintaku took a lateral and ran twenty-five yards to promised land. Arihara sent the pigskin squarely between the up-rights to give the Denson lads a substantial lead of 34-0 as the half ended.

Denson took the second half kick-off on the fifty yard line and two plays later Arihara scored from the fifteen. His place kick was good. He scored again from the seventeen after a forty eight yard drive. Arihara's educated toe again sent the "pelota" over the goal and the Tigers had amassed a total of 48 points.

At this point L.T.I. made their lone touchdown. With the ball resting on their own five yard stripe fullback David Anderson faded back to his goal line and threw a twenty yard pass to hide-out Hoyt Cribbs. This play caught the whole Denson team flat-footed and Cribbs scampered 75 yards for the score. The conversion run failed to produce the extra point and the quarter ended with the score 48-6.

In the fourth quarter George Ichiba scored from the two-yard line on a quarterback sneak. Arihara's conversion point made the final reading 55-6.

MASAI STARS IN JUNIOR COMEDY



With Relocation as their theme, the hall will be decorated in blue and white, the class colors, and posters of the various states in which residents have relocated. It will be a stag-stagette affair.







Simple and different this party was believed to be one of the best by all the members present. It was held in place of the original social planned for Christmas.





JUNIOR G.A.A. INITIATED


Rosaline Yoshida Funniest





Hiroshi Maeda was emcee for the evening which was spent in dancing. During intermission refreshments were served by the refreshment committee, headed by Ben Tagami.



As we look back we know this graduation is the ending of a chapter both sad and glad, and this "Commencement" will also be the beginning of a new and, we hope, glorious adventure.







CO-ED FINALISTS



The sponsor of this group is Mr. Chono.



Included among the ten players who will make the trip are George Fujita, Robert Sugita, Sus Enkoji, Joe Hamade, and Jim Furukawa.


Twenty girl cagers representing the all-star contingent of Denson High are also scheduled to clash with the Rohwer High All-Stars Saturday.





Remember the time I used to wear evis and shirt-tails hanging out? Well, no more of that. Some boys wear sport coats and suits, no fooling.

I have the toughest time holding my books together every morning when I catch the streetcar and then transfer to a bus. There are supposed to be three Japanese girls here according to the vice-principal, but I've only seen one.

I miss my friends alright, but outside life is pretty swell."

THOMPSON TO ATTEND WASHINGTON CONFAB



and Recreation.


Notable WRA officials to speak at the conference include Dillon S. Myer, Philip M. Glick, Leland Barrows, and John H. Province.

Eligible For Quill and Scroll




SOFTBALL OPENER SLATED




SWIMMING SEASON IS OPEN; BUT SO IS DETENTION HALL


