Construction of simple ice-skating rink has been started as well as the construction of areas for slides for sledding.

A number of hikes have been conducted and these hikes have various interests, such as geology, flowers, etc., which are to be emphasized.

Plans are underway for outstanding Christmas and New Year's program.

Requests have been made for CCC buildings to be used for the showing of movies and housing bowling alleys. These activities will be carried on cooperative basis with the Community Enterprise. CCC buildings have been requested also for space for such activities as Social Dancing, Judo and Sumo.

Our greatest handicap at present is the inability to secure materials, such as lumber and transportation. Transportation is needed very much at the present time because it is necessary to move benches into mess halls for showing of movies and holding parties of different types.

Another major problem is the scheduling of community activities in a limited space available. This includes meetings of churches, various organizations, block activities as well as organized recreational activities.

✓ The personnel of the department has suffered greatly due to resettlement of trained and experienced leaders. The solution to this problem may be the drafting of older people and the reorganization of the department.

The outstanding event of the month is the formation of a Community Activities Evacuee Board of Directors on April 5, to act as trustee for the funds made available to the department through the sale of salvage, donations and admission charges to motion pictures, etc. The Board is composed of seven members: Ricardo Ritchie, Chairman; Ben Murayama, Vice-chairman; Howard Nomura, Secretary-Treasurer; Shinji Fujimoto, Kaoru Inouye, Raymond Katagi, and David Yamakawa.

The Adult Department sewing activity has been dropped, terminating eighteen employees. The woodcarving exhibition proved a gratifying success and they received an invitation to exhibit in Cody.

The Athletic Department enjoyed many outstanding events: 3,000 spectators attended the opening of the sumo (wrestling) season; two weightlifting contests were held; the grade school kite-flying contest with prizes was enjoyed by the children; boxing continues under new leadership; the center-wide ping-pong tournament was a huge success; tractors are awaited for the leveling of grounds for sport events.

The Boys and Girls Department cooperated in the United States Army "Volunteers' Dinner"; some of the clubs have found it necessary to disband due to lack of leaders. The supervisor for the boys and girls clubs is to contact the superintendent of schools for better coordination of youth activities.

The Entertainment and Social Department enjoys continued success with the Hawaiian "Surf Riders" weekly broadcast from KPOW, and together with the dance band and the mandolin band, they have performed for several outside organizations. The music was provided for the Junior-Senior Prom in Thermopolis and for the Junior Chamber of Commerce in Lovell. The Sunday "Music Hour" is enjoyed by many center residents.

The Technical Department has increased its field of service to include religious organizations, additional "free" motion picture performances for the hospital patients and staff, the Sunday Music Hour and for the Education Department.
