





Gentlemen:

Following our letter of February 25th, we have been thinking about your ideas of price and have tried to figure what would be the maximum basis we might possibly be able to afford in order to induce you to produce a greater volume of charcoal than you originally contemplated.

We would say that if you can actually get out 30 tons in March, 60 tons in April, 90 in May and 120 tons monthly beginning with June, and if we could depend on this production being regular we will pay \$30.00 a ton basis bulk F.O.B. cars Los Angeles.

If it would be more convenient for you to ship in sacks we suggest that you could buy burlap bags of some sort and throw them in the car without the necessity for sewing or closing the bags and after the car had been emptied we would ship the empty bags back to you at your expense. The freight from Parker to Los Angeles is at the present 24¢ per 100# and we believe the empty bags could be returned to you at one-half that rate or at 12¢ per 100#.

This does not mean that your charcoal is any more valuable to us than that which we are buying for less money from Mexico, but since you are not so far from Los Angeles and your operating conditions would possibly be more favorable than those in Mexico, we would expect deliveries at regular intervals, and this might be of some benefit to us.

If and when a lower rate can be obtained to Los Angeles you would receive the benefit.

If you are interested in trading at this basis we must have an immediate reply. We do not understand why it takes so long to get a reply to our letters but our season of

maximum use is rapidly approaching and unless you act immediately we will not be able to wait long for your decision.







SUBJECT: Handling and Accounting for Industry Subsistence Products

The following procedure is to be followed in delivering and accounting for all Industry subsistence products, produced or processed and used locally.

All subsistence products produced or processed in Poston for local consumption will be handled through the project warehouse or when considered advisable, delivery will be made at the place of production or processing to a representative of the warehouse. A receiving report must be issued by the Chief Warehouseman on all subsistence products produced or processed on the project in the same manner as other merchandise obtained from the outside is receipted for. Details for physical handling of all subsistence produced or processed locally can be arranged suitable to the nature of the products involved, particularly keeping in mind that it must all clear through the warehouse so that the Industry Division receives full credit for all such production on whatever basis is applicable.

The Subsistence Section places orders far in advance covering their subsistence needs for the project. For that reason it is most essential that the Industry Division field offices keep the Subsistence Section advised constantly of all the local production. The Industry Division field offices will therefore supply the Subsistence Section with the following reports.

1. A progress report or subsistence schedule shall be maintained constantly, closely estimating quantity, type, etc. of produce available for local consumption. On the basis of this report the Subsistence Section will regulate their open market subsistence purchases and shipments from other centers with a view to giving first consideration to the consumption of local produce.

2. A 10-day production schedule must be provided, for not less than 10 days in advance at all times. This should show the type of produce, specific time of delivery, a close estimate of quantity and grade and estimated cost prices in detail. On the basis of this schedule the Subsistence Section will plan the use of local produce in their menus.

For accounting purposes the following provisions will be observed:

1. Transactions will be initiated by the issuance of a request from the Subsistence Section to the Industry Division field office for the delivery of certain products on a specified day according to the planned menu.

2. The products ordered will be delivered by the Industry Division to the Warehousing Section either at the warehouse or at the place of production or processing, according to arrangement. A receiving report will be issued by the Chief Warehouseman the same as for receipt of any other merchandise. For disposition of the receiving report see attached flow chart (Exhibit 1).

3. Under this procedure it will be necessary for the Industry Division to furnish the Stores Accounting Unit and the Warehouse Section with a complete list of all contemplated production showing in detail unit prices on a per lb. basis whenever possible. This must be done before any produce is delivered. Uniform prices should be established by Industry Section Heads on all produce in the three camps on an estimated cost basis. When the priced receiving report is received by the Store's Accounting Unit, the original and five copies shall be distributed as shown on the flow chart (Exhibit 1).


4. At the end of each month for verification purposes the Industry Division field offices shall make a statement of all products delivered to the warehouse during the month. This shall be made in triplicate, the original to be forwarded to the Cost Accounting Unit, the duplicate to H. A. Mathiesen's office, and the triplicate retained in the Industry Division field office. The septuple copies of receiving reports for the month are to accompany the original of the summary report to the Cost Accounting Unit at the close of the month. The Industry Division field office should upon receipt of the duplicate copy of receiving document insert thereon in red pencil, the price the article could have been sold for on the open market at the producing center at the time of delivery to the Project Subsistence Section. For comparative purposes a monthly and annual tabulation record should be prepared and maintained by the Industry Division field offices covering all produce delivered to the Project showing both the estimated cost price used and the market price at the Project at the time of delivery.

5. Cost accounting entries. Only one entry will be necessary in the cost accounting records. This entry will be made from the original receiving report and will be as follows:



When the monthly summary statement is received from the Industry Division field offices it shall be compared with the Industry Division sales account and any discrepancies shall be followed up and corrected.

MEMORANDUM

To: Mr. Wade Head
From: Mr. H. A. Mathiesen
Re: Commercial Photography in Poston

For quite some time, the evacuees have been making inquiries regarding the possibilities of having a Photographic Studio here where they can have their portraits taken, pictures of their babies made, and photos taken of special occasions — weddings, funerals, graduations, engagements, anniversaries, etc.

Recently, photos taken in the Heart Mountain Relocation Center have been coming into this camp, giving added impetus to the demand for commercial photography here.

And now, Manzanar has a Studio in their Community Enterprise Building and is already being swamped with people who have not had their pictures taken for over a year.

Poston is now in the free zone and the evacuees here feel that if the matter were presented to the proper authorities, permission would be granted for a photographic studio under proper supervision.

Like all immigrant peoples, the Japanese in this country have made it a practice to patronize commercial photographers frequently and in their communities professional photographers prospered in altogether disproportionate numbers. Here in Poston they have missed the photographer; his absence at weddings and funerals is keenly felt. Babies are reaching their 30th day, their 100th day, and their first birthday without benefit of the inevitable photographer.

And now the first graduating class of the Poston High School is looking forward to their "cap and gown" pictures. The nurse's aides are graduating next month and are asking about photos. Family pictures are wanted to be sent to fathers and husbands in internment camps. And the soldier boys would like pictures of their family, wives, and sweethearts.

About half a year ago, this matter was brought before you by a few of the professional photographers here in Poston but was tabled until explicit instructions should come from Washington.

In view of the fact that Manzanar has opened a camp studio, it is felt that if this matter could be presented to the proper authorities now, a workable arrangement could be made for Poston which is in the same Western Defense Zone.

The Plan

The evacuees suggest that orders for photos be handled by the Community Enterprise and that the processing be done under the management of Industries. The two professional photographers in Unit I. have equipment which can be brought here readily and there are photographers in the other units who can, no doubt, do the same.

These men have had many years of business contacts with Eastman and other supply houses and claim they are able to obtain film and darkroom supplies without great difficulty.

Commercial Photography requires very little space for studio work and darkroom work can be done in living quarters at night.

If necessary, the prints and negatives can be sent through the Military authorities for censorship and the supplies and equipment be under constant supervision of their department.

The Objectives

Commercial Photography in Poston would be entirely self-supporting. Would perhaps be a profitable addition to the Community Enterprise business.

The evacuees would welcome the establishment of a Photo Studio here. Would help to foster self respect and would add a decided lift to morale.

Apprentices and under-studies in photographic work would get good training for job opportunities. Perhaps the school system could give credit for part-time work.

Photographs of memorable occasions and happy events would become valuable to the individuals. Disagreeable experiences would be forgotten and only the photos of pleasant happenings of their stay in Poston would remain.

As far as the evacuees are concerned, they see no real reason for the ban on commercial photography here in Poston. They cannot understand any Army or FBI objections to a well-supervised studio here. Until the evacuation, although the Japanese (Issei and Nisei) had to turn in their cameras to the local police, commercial photographers were permitted to remain in business until the last day. They had travel permits enabling them to go out on calls with their photographic equipment without restraint.


This matter is brought to your attention again because the demand for photographs is insistent, and it is hoped that you will bring it before the proper authorities as soon as possible.
