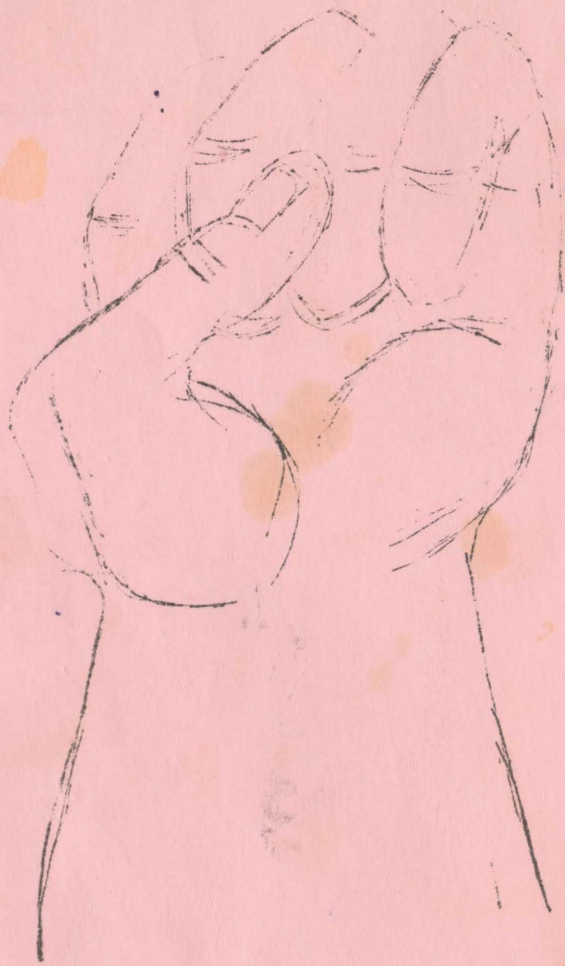

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4th of July Moratorium by Ann Cupolo

Independence Day is classically celebrated with
firecrackers and beautiful displays of fireworks and
patriotism.

This past 4th of July was celebrated by Camp
Jened quite refreshingly and differently. We made note of July
4th principally with a peace march. We marched from adult camp
into the rec hall carrying signs both anti-war, anti-American and
those representing the right-wing point of view. Also
represented were people dressed as right-wing "hippie hating"

being done.. Something was burning and for once, it wasn't fireworks.

Political Analysis by Danny Winchester
Cambodia- What happened there and what will be the consequences.

At the end of May, beginning of June, President Richard M. Nixon "unconstitutionally" declared an invasion of Cambodia through the fishhook area. He said that this war would be "a short one and we would be out June 30." The President's decision to invade Cambodia was made a few days before this latter decision had been made.

My opinion of the situation is that since the President has not consulted Congress before declaring war on Cambodia; it is unethical, immoral and very unwise of Nixon to expand the ~~xxx~~ Southeast Asia war to Laos and Cambodia. He had declared war of his own initiative because he felt that he could fight Communist workers with the democratic forces. I think this stems from the fact, of the situation in the 1950's. The United States was a bit scared of communism because Joseph McCarthy played on the fears of the people. As a matter of fact, Richard Nixon was a Congressman from California at that time collecting all the evidence for McCarthy. What this evidence would later do would be to convince a man who belonged to the state department and charged him with treason.

As a result of Nixon's decision there has been debate on whether or not this act was Constitutional. Also whether Congress could pass an amendment concerning such an action. It appears as the Coopa-Church amendment which states that funds would be cut off from Cambodia as of July 1. By cutting off funds from Cambodia, it might lead to cutting off funds from Vietnam.

Now what has happened in Cambodia is that after June 30- the date of withdrawal- the country was devastated; by American

and Viet Cong forces. What was once a peaceful country, was now a total wreck. The people had been friendly and considerate of foreigners. They now are alienated. Because of what I mentioned about the war not ending, the Americans are under the assumption that it has ended. This reminds me of a similar case in history where Hitler had decided to invade Poland in November, 1939. He invaded Poland and took the country by surprise. Everyone thought that this was going to be the only invasion. But little did they know far worse was to come. I am beginning to think we are another Germany 30 years apart.

D.I.A. - MARILY DICKERSON AND NANCY ROSENBLOOM

What is D.I.A.?

D.I.A. means Disabled In action Association. It is a group of disabled people who are trying to be recognized in society today,

How did it begin?

On May 16, 1970, many disabled people were invited to a rally at Long Island University to consider what extent of freedom a handicapped person could fight for. Eighty disabled people came to the rally by various means of transportation. In the morning a discussion was held which directed mainly to why disabled people were kept in the background. Most contributors to the discussion mentioned in some way or another that associations assisting the disabled or handicapped did not direct their policies or spending ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ to the entire benefit of those people they served. Instead of encouraging infiltration into society, their policies were such that the handicapped were "taken care of" kept occupied and superficially happy, but in a "closed doors" type of environment.

The D.I.A. was established to rectify this situation..

The purpose and Aim

the purpose of the D.I.A. is to fight for more freedom for the disabled people. The most important factors to be considered are education, transportation, employment, housing, civil rights, and ~~XXXXXX~~ architectural barriers. Before all of these factors can be achieved, the primary problems must be overcome, being education and ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Transportation. Once disabled people are educated to the same level as ordinary people and are able to have around independently, the other aims Civil Rights, Housing, and Employment should gradually be achieved.

Therefore at the present time the D.I.A. is concerned not only with learning to be independent as much as possible in a physical

No ~~XXXX~~matter ~~XX~~ where you are or what your handicap or non-handicap is, there is no reason why you cannot be an active member of D.I.A. throughout the year. All participation and interest will in some way assist the organization.
