SERMONETTE

While walking home one morning toward my block, a strain, familiar to many of us kept repeating itself in sweet refrain:

"Where the desert bloometh like a rose
Walking in the King's Highway, etc..."

There are more words to that song, but the above two lines seemed to impress itself upon me more than the others. The King's Highway is simply a figure of speech referring to a Christian's walk in the Christian Way. If ever the reality and adequacy of a true Christian life is proved, it is during these days, when the novelty of the camp life has worn off--and so many of our friends have gone, leaving us with so little to look forward to in the way of fellowship and the social life which means so much to us.

And yet, strange, but more so, gloriously true, the understanding of God in our spiritual lives constitute so much. The sense of completeness, of wholeness, and indescribable joy--things that transcends earthly analysis truly makes the "desert bloom like a rose," and gives us gratifying grace and power to live triumphantly right here.

The key to the understanding of such things lies, I believe, in the following words of Jesus, so familiar, and yet so strange to so many of us:

"Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden; and I will give you rest."

How foolish on our part, if life is a dearth and a disappointment, to miss out on all its fullness so simply received right here--right now!

D.V.B.S. NEWS

Well under way is the Daily Vacation Bible School in both Parish I and Parish II, having started on June 19 and scheduled to close on July 14.

Approximately 130 pupils between the ages of four to sixteen attend these classes from 8:00 to 9:00 A.M., five mornings a week, before the regular summer school begins.

A short service opens the morning's activities after which the students disperse into separate

classes for fifteen minutes of Bible study; then assembly is called and the memory verses are recited. The remainder of the hour is devoted to handicraft. In Parish I, Rev. Imai is instructing the boys on how to make soap cases, book ends, toys, and letter openers; and Mr. Henry Mukai was teaching woodcraft in Parish II. The girls, under the supervision of Mrs. Grube, mother of Alice Grube, have learned to make beaded hat and butterfly pins, and also are weaving squares of yarn for many practical uses.

A total of thirteen teachers are volunteering their time and efforts to make this Daily Vacation Bible School as successful as it has been in the past two years, in spite of the many handicaps and shortages that exist. The two Parishes are supervised by Mr. John Miyabe with Misses S. Shizume and R. Konatsu assisting.

LOST OPPORTUNITIES

A very interesting bit of Church History appears in the Travels of Marco Polo, the account of the Polo brothers and the famous son, Marco Polo to the great China Empire of Kublai Kaha in the thirteenth century. The Polo brothers had made the long and hazardous journey across mountains and deserts to the little-known land China in the Far East. and had been treated with no lack of hospitality and friendliness.

After a time, the Polo Brothers began to prepare for their long journey back home. Kublai Kaha entreated the Polo brothers to accompany one of his officials to Rome on a Mission to the sea of Rome. His object he told them, "was to make a request to his holiness that he would send him a hundred men of learning, thoroughly acquainted with the principles of the Christian religion, as well as the seven arts, and qualified to prove to the learned of his dominions by just and fair argument that the faith possessed by Christians is superior to, and founded upon more evident truth than any other." An attempt to fulfill this request was made, but due to a number of circumstances, some of them unavoidable, the Christian missionaries never arrived in China to undertake the great task that was open to them. And thus has the coming of the brotherhood of men on earth been hindered and delayed. However, the lesson is obvious---surely this is one of the greatest "lost opportunities" in history.

Christian Youth today! Be on your guard that you do not allow opportunities to slip from your grasp because of indifferent attitudes, through failure to educate yourself to the best of your ability, through reluctance to dedicate yourselves to the service of mankind rather than to your own selfish interests and pursuits. The challenge of the crisis of the age is almost too great for our comprehension and for our strength but we must realize that the pattern of our Christian service is forming itself surely day by day in the quality of our consecration to Christ and is reflected in the degree to which we participate in the program of the Church of Christ in Poston. Is our service to the Church spasmodic and fitful-suiting to our own convenience or is it really a pouring out unstintingly of loving service?

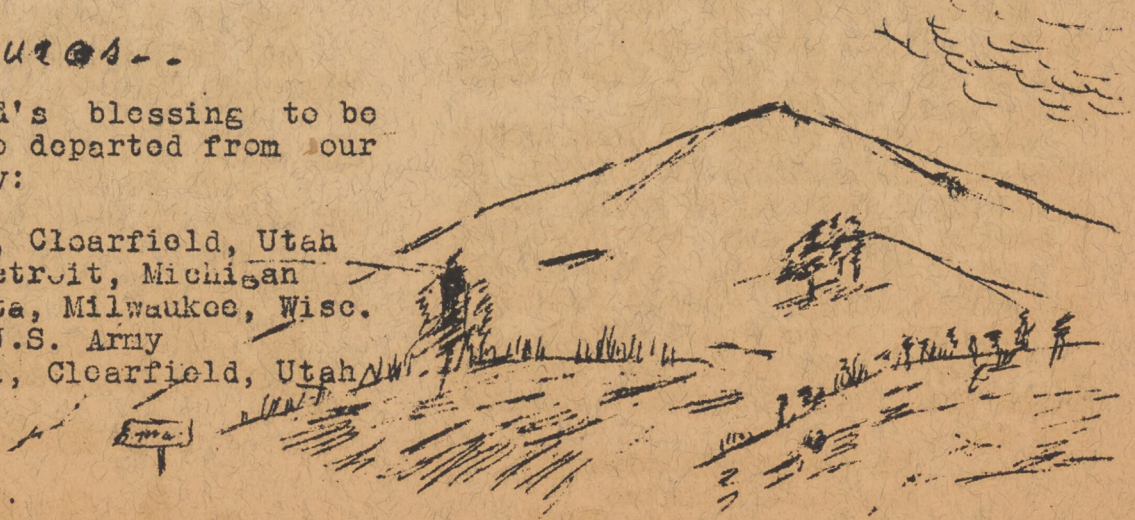

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ:

Here I am in Chicago, trying to get used to a new experience which started about a week ago. I am in good health and am among swell Christian friends.

By the way, how is every one getting along? Any more church members deciding to go out? How is your faith in the Lord? Well, anyway, keep it up and be not ashamed of His name.

I am now staying at the C.E.I. Working around school as a gardener, pulling weeds and grass out of the yard. I'm actually working harder than I wanted to. The school is located among the lower class of people, mostly Negroes. As was said to me by one of the students, "The school was placed here all around this community in order to be more effective". I think that is right. There are about 200 students during school term and that is plenty for such a small school building. Right now, there are about 30 people staying during the summer and they really are nice and friendly.

Chicago to me is too big and dirty. There are so many places I want to visit, but I can't make up my mind to go or not.

Whenever I think of those meetings and fellowship in Christ, it gives me a feeling of going back. I really miss each and everyone of you, your songs, your faces, and friendship. Please remember me in your prayers and write to me and I promise to answer. Thank you for all that you did for me.

"MANY ARE THE AFFLICTIONS OF THE RIGHTEOUS BUT THE LORD DELIVERETH HIM OUT OF THEM ALL." PSALMS 34:19

Often God seems to place His children in positions of profound difficulty--leading them into a wedge from which there is no escape. The issue will more than justify Him who has brought you hither. It is a platform for the display of His almighty grace and power. He will not only deliver you, but in doing so He will give you a lesson that you will never forget; and to which, in many a psalm and song in after days, you will revert. You will never be able to thank God enough for having done just as He has.

Oh do not pray for easy lives! Pray to be stronger men! Do not pray for tasks equal to your powers; pray for powers equal to your tasks! Then the doing of your work shall be no miracle. 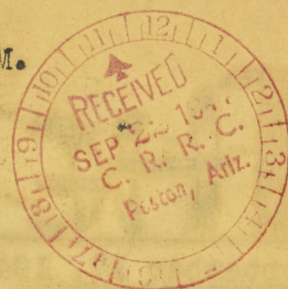

SERMONETTE

- "In the world, yet not of this world" -

"The world is like an ocean. We cannot live without water, it is true, but it is also true that we cannot live if we allow the water to engulf us, for there is life in water and also death. If we make use of water we find that there is life in it, but if we are drowned we find death."

"In this world we are like little boats. The place for a boat is on a river or on the sea. But this does not mean that the water must be in the boat. For if it is in the boat, the boat will become useless. It would fill with water, sink beneath the waves, and whoever was in it would be drowned. The boat must be in the water, but the water must not be in the boat."

In these parables, Sadhu Sundar Singh, a consecrated Hindu Christian, illustrates the truth about our Christian attitude toward the world. If we Christians become too much of the world we will soon become corrupt and be drowned. We Christians are neither ascetic nor worldly people but people who live the life of Christ in Him and live among fellowmen and women as Jesus did in this world.

A KING IS BORN

NOW WHEN JESUS WAS BORN IN BETHLEHEM OF JUDEA IN THE DAYS OF HEROD THE KING, BEHOLD, THERE CAME WISE MEN FROM THE EAST TO JERUSALEM, SAYING, WHERE IS HE THAT IS BORN KING OF THE JEWS? FOR WE HAVE SEEN HIS STAR IN THE EAST, AND ARE COME TO WORSHIP HIM. Matt. 2: 1-2.

The birth of Christ truthfully marked a beginning of peace on earth and good will toward all men. We find that as Christ was sent into the world, He was sent not to condemn the world, but that the world through Him might be saved. PALM SUNDAY

"And when he was come into Jerusalem, all the city was moved saying, Who is this? And the multitude said, 'This is Jesus the prophet of Nazareth of Galilee.'" Matthew 21:10,11

Often have I pondered a long time over the above verses. Jesus came to Jerusalem; his coming moved all the city; the people of the city asked who he was? The crowds replied that it was Jesus. These crowds recognized Jesus. If only they had gone farther, done more than just recognizing Him!

In Mark 11:1-10, we note in this story: Jerusalem, Bethphage, Bethany, and Mount of Olives; Jesus' request for the disciples to bring the colt; the spreading of garments in the way; cutting down of palm branches; the scattering of these branches along the road, and the singing, "Hosanna! Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord; Blessed be the kingdom of our father David that cometh in the name of the Lord; Hosanna in the highest!"

In Luke 19:34, there is still another verse connected with this same story. "The Lord hath need of him." Here we are told that Jesus had need of a beast of burden in his important business. Gilbert Chesterton has written a poem entitled, "The Donkey". The last stanza reads: Fools: For I also had my hour and far fiercer hour and sweeter; There was a shout about my ears and palms before my feet." Jesus needed this donkey for his entry into Jerusalem on that first Palm Sunday. Surely, then, Jesus has need of us.

In the early days, the church ordered that palm branches should be carried; palms blessed and distributed among the people. In some places today, pieces of the palm leaf are given to worshippers. Often a cross is made by joining two picots together to be worn on the hat or coat.

Whether we use the palm or not on this day, we know the story with which it is connected and in our hearts, we are among the multitude who sing His praises. The principal thought should be a prayer that all our lives, we keep a song in our hearts as well as our words on our lips. Jesus is with us, before our sight, and He leads us. The chief reasons to remember are these: He needs us. But more than that we need Him; we need Him now, this Palm Sunday, March 25, 1945.

Sermonette

In these days, we are constantly praying for our friends in the armed forces, for the peoples of all nations afflicted by the ravages of war, and for the leaders of the nations who have it in their power to lay the foundations of a just and durable world peace. Before each of us rests a weighty responsibility to pray unceasingly in behalf of the United Nations Conference now in session at San Francisco.

Not long ago, in one of Dr. Ralph Sockman's radio sermons, he asked us to think what it does to our prayers to conclude them with the words, "through Jesus Christ our Lord." He himself suggested a three-fold answer.

First, when we pray "through Jesus Christ our Lord." the words give us our invitation to pray. They help us to see a God who knows and understands, who cares and believes in us and in all for whom we pray. Second, we have a test for our praying when we pray "through Jesus Christ our Lord." Selfish motives are sifted from our petitions. Also, when we pray in his name, our horizons are enlarged and the sights of our prayers are lifted toward perfection, because He said, "Be ye perfect as your Father in Heaven is perfect." He taught us to pray, "Thy Kingdom come, They will be done on earth as it is in heaven."

Third, we get power in our praying when we pray, "through Jesus Christ our Lord." As Dr. Sockman puts it, "Christ gives us power not only through His own rightness, but also by imparting to us a faith that we, too, can reach toward His rightness." For when we pray, "through Jesus Christ our Lord," we sense the living presence of our Father who "so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish but shall have everlasting life." It was because Paul had this feeling that he could say, "I can do all things through Him who strengtheneth me." This same power in prayer is for each of us no matter how humble, if only we claim it, "through Jesus Christ our Lord."

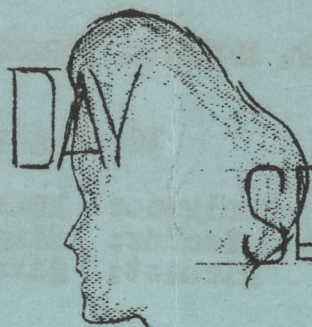

MOTHER'S DAY




SERMONETTE

He also said that many Niseis who have relocated have been doing a great deal to promote a better understanding by actually going out to speak before different groups to show them that the Niseis are just as American as they are.

This sort of work has done much to bring about a better understanding of our problem.

Rev. Morton gave an inspiring talk at the Prayer Meeting during the Conference week. He said that we should endeavor to make the best of ourselves physically, mentally, socially, and religiously. We are what we make ourselves.

Y. P. Morning Worship

On the Sunday following the conference, we had as our speaker Dr. Howes of the California Presbyterian Church. In his sermon "Victory over Evil," Dr. Howes pointed out that unless we all become again like a child--willing to share things--until that time comes, there can be no "Heaven on earth."

Last Sunday was Mothers' Day. A day on which we pay homage to our Mothers. Our Pastor, Rev. Kikuchi gave a message telling about the enduring love of a Mother. We must not remember our Mothers just on Mothers' Day which comes but once a year, instead we should try to show our devotion throughout the year.

SERMONETTE

The month of June is filled with interest. Besides bringing in the longest day of the year, it reminds us of many birthday anniversaries, among them are found these names: Jefferson Davis of the Confederacy; Jennie Casseday who inspired the Woman's Temperance Union to distribute flowers and religious tracts to the inmates of prisons; Henry M. Stanley, the African explorer; Helen Keller, the most notable blind deaf mute in the history of education; and, according to the oldest of records, John the Baptist.

In addition to June birthday remembrances, we pay tribute to our Flag, to those who fought at the Battle of Bunker Hill, to fathers, and to children.

Today, this second Sunday in June, we recognize Children's Day. During the middle of the last century, in Chelsea, Massachusetts, a minister conceived the idea of having this special Sunday. At the very beginning, it was called Flower Sunday; then, a little later, changed to Children's Day.

At the present time, in many churches, programs are given with children of all ages participating, and the offering taken at this time marked "College Fund." Personally, I am deeply interested, for my own college education was partly financed from this money. I recollect very vividly the generosity of the Board who stated that no interest on the money borrowed would be exacted until several years after graduation. Even then, it must be kept at a low rate.

Children's day has many Biblical reminders: That Jesus, a boy of twelve, visited the Temple and learned He must be about His Heavenly Father's business; that, later on in His ministry, He fed a multitude with the aid of a little boy's lunch; that He raised from the dead, a twelve years old girl, the daughter of the ruler in a synagogue, and sweetest of all, that Jesus took little children in His arms and blessed them saying, "Let the children come unto me and forbid them not, for such is the Kingdom of Heaven."

From the Old Testament rings out the message, "A little child shall lead them." And we think of Samuel, as well as many others. Surely, all who worship in churches on this holy day need to bow humbly before God and ask Him to grant us the simplicity, sincerity, definite trust, and deep faith of little children.

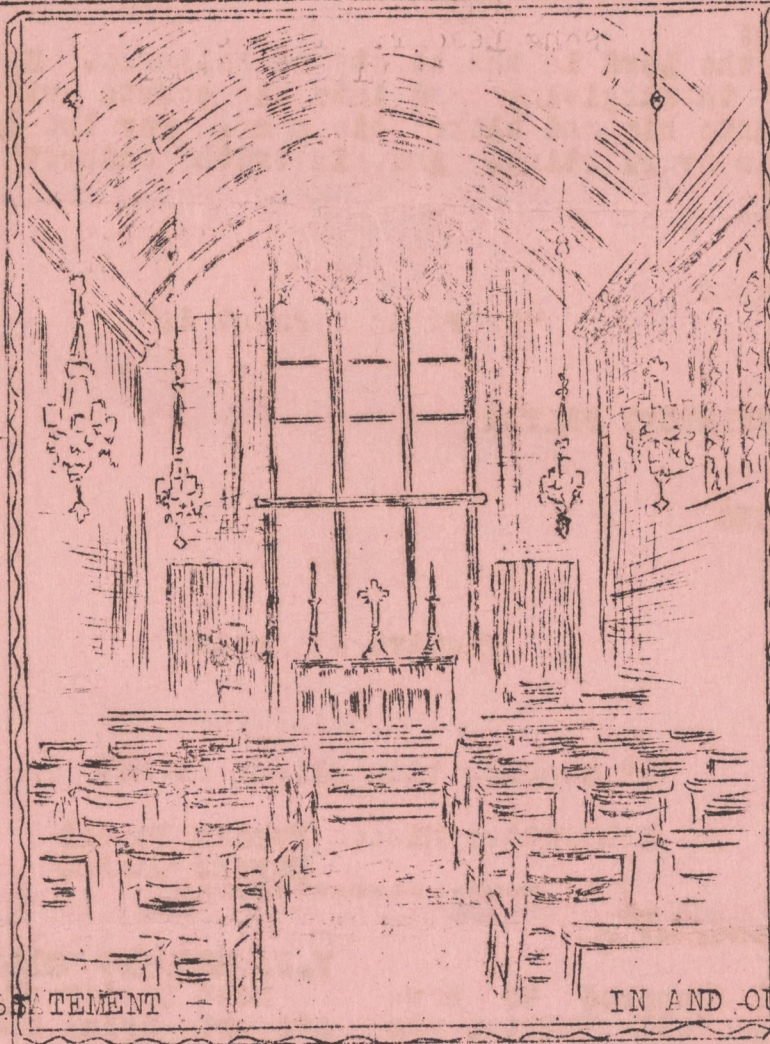
