I have your letter inquiring what services Farm Security Administration can make available to returning Japanese farmers.

The following FSA services are available:

Rural Rehabilitation or Operating Loans

Rural rehabilitation or operating loans may be made to citizens, and aliens not of enemy nationality who have indicated their intention of becoming citizens.

Low-income farm families, including owner-operators, tenants, sharecroppers and farm laborers with sufficient family manpower for farm and home operations, except possibly at peak seasons, will be eligible for standard loans, provided:

1. They can conduct (a) approximately full-time operations on farms which effectively utilize available family manpower, or (b) part-time farming operations which may be supplemented by off-farm employment that will not interfere with successful operations of the farm in order to maintain full employment and a satisfactory level of living.
2. There is need of supervised and financed farm and home management services of the FSA, together with willingness to assume the necessary responsibilities in order to make an effective contribution to the Nation's war effort.
3. The family is unable to obtain adequate farm and home financing at reasonable rates and terms from sources other than the FSA.
4. There is reasonable possibility of repaying the loan.
5. The family's health and level of living can be maintained or improved.
6. The family has some background of rural experience and shows evidence of having or being able to develop acceptable industry, skills, and managerial ability deemed necessary to conduct a farming enterprise.

Loans may be made to heads of families eligible as standard borrowers to provide for family and farm expenditures (except for the purchase of land) when the approved Farm and Home Plan indicates that such expenditures are necessary for successfully conducting the family's war production program and the rehabilitation of the farm family. The family and farm expenditures may include, but will not be limited to, the following items: live-stock, farm equipment, and furnishing minor repairs and improvements for the farm and/or home; participation in group health, hospital and/or dental services; for emergency health services and for correction of physical conditions.

Loans will not be made for refinancing, either secured or unsecured debts, except in extreme cases where the refinancing of non-real estate debts is determined to be absolutely necessary to (1) save valuable equities in live-stock or equipment essential to the war effort and/or (2) where the refinancing of non-real estate debts results in an adjustment without which the family could not utilize its resources in the war effort.

Farm Ownership Loans

Farm purchase loans, which run for 40 years at three percent interest, are available to veterans of the present war, farm tenants, renters and laborers, who are American citizens. At present FSA offices in California have on hand 413 applications for these loans. In view of the limited loan funds available and the inability of farm families to buy farms at earning capacity prices, it is unlikely that more than 12 farm ownership loans can be made in California this year. Although qualified Japanese-Americans are eligible for these loans, it seems questionable that they will be able to secure them in the near future, because of the long waiting list.

Health Services

Farm families, whose income for taxable purposes has averaged \$2,000 or less per year during the last five years, are eligible for prepaid medical and hospital care through membership in county health associations established by FSA in cooperation with California Physicians Service, county medical societies and local farmers.

Water Facilities Loans

Water Facilities loans, which run up to 20 years at three percent interest, are available to farm families for repairing, rebuilding or constructing farm and irrigation water systems, provided the family cannot secure adequate financing from other sources.

Group Services Loans

Group Services loans are available to groups of farmers who wish to pool their resources for the purchase and use of services and equipment -- such as pure-bred sires and machinery -- which they cannot afford to own individually. These loans, which carry three percent interest, run for a period not to exceed the lifetime of the facility purchased.

Before a loan can be made to any applicant, the County FSA Committee composed of three prominent local farmers must pass on his eligibility, character and integrity.

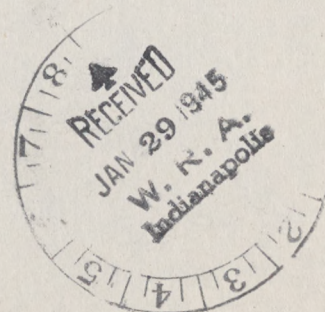

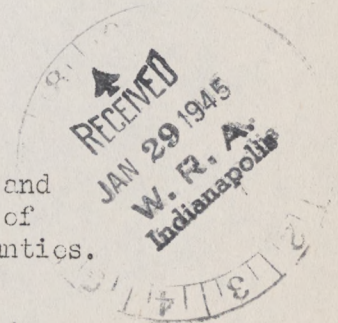

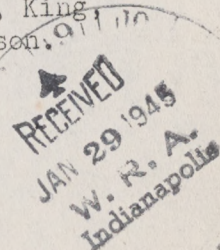

Dear Mr. Huso:

We have your letter of January 23, concerning the restrictions governing travel by Japanese aliens.

There appears to be considerable misunderstanding as to the regulations controlling the travel of aliens and even some misconception as to the rights of American citizens in that connection.

It should be pointed out that so far as American citizens of Japanese descent are concerned, in the absence of the service of a specific exclusion order on them, they are free to travel anywhere any other American citizen may travel.

As to aliens, the rumor that has been brought to our attention from at least two sources, that they may not travel more than five miles from their homes has no basis in fact. Under the regulations of the U. S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides, in such a way as to permit his engaging in normal activities. In each case his community includes all the area generally thought of as constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community, and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or a county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business, and may travel between his home and his church, school, etc. as is normally required. If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another he

should send a statement to the U. S. Attorney of the district of his residence at least seven days before his intended departure, stating in a form furnished by the U. S. Attorney his name, his home address and telephone number, his business address and telephone number, his Alien Identification number, the purpose of his trip and the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the route to be followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the U. S. Attorney or the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the U. S. Attorney will stamp an endorsement upon a copy of the statement and will deliver it to the alien, who shall have it with him at all times while he is traveling.

There is also provision for frequent or regular business travel to cover the cases of traveling salesmen, drivers of trucks, etc. so that they will not have to make a separate application for every trip.

Travel by airplane is not permitted.

Change of residence or of employment shall be made only after at least seven days' notice to the U. S. Attorney, of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

We believe it will be found that the only differences in interpretation of the regulation by U. S. Attorneys in various sections of the country are those which properly follow from the geographic limitations of the community involved. For example, in the case of San Francisco, the bay area would undoubtedly be considered a part of the community; whereas in the case of another city the community might properly be considered to be a much smaller area. But if there are actual differences in the regulation of the conduct of aliens as a result of differences in interpretation, they should be called to our attention, so that they may be uniformly interpreted and enforced.

SUBJECT: Travel of Aliens

We have been asked on several occasions to furnish information regarding the rumor to the effect that aliens of Japanese descent, who might be returning to the West Coast, would be restricted in their travel to an area not more than five (5) miles from their homes.

This matter was referred to the Assistant Solicitor and for your information, I am quoting below his report on this subject:

"There appears to be considerable misunderstanding as to the regulations controlling the travel of aliens."

"The rumor that has been brought to our attention from at least two sources, that they may not travel more than five miles from their homes has no basis in fact. Under the regulations of the U. S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides, in such a way as to permit his engaging in normal activities. In each case his community includes all the area generally thought of as constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community, and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or a county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business, and may travel between his home and his church, school, etc., as is normally required. If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another, he should send a statement to the U. S. Attorney of the district of his residence at least seven days before his intended departure, stating in a form furnished by the U. S. Attorney, his name, his home address and telephone number, his business address and telephone number, his alien identification number, the purpose of his trip and the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the route to be followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the U. S. Attorney or the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the U. S. Attorney will stamp an endorsement upon a copy of the statement and will deliver it to the alien, who shall have it with him at all times while he is traveling."

There is also provision for frequent or regular business travel to cover the cases of traveling salesmen, drivers of trucks, etc. so that they will not have to make a separate application for every trip."

"Travel by airplane is not permitted."

"Change of residence or of employment shall be made only after at least seven days' notice to the U.S. Attorney, of the proposed change; and the holder of Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address,

or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

"The travel restrictions apply to all aliens fourteen years of age or older, who were or are citizens or subjects of Germany, Italy or Japan, or who are at present stateless but who were citizens or subjects of any one of those countries."

"The curfew regulations of the Western Defense Command no longer apply, since they were rescinded under Public Proclamation No. 21."

"If any instance arises indicating that U. S. Attorneys are not uniformly interpreting the Department of Justice regulations controlling the conduct of enemy aliens, we shall of course be glad to investigate such cases, and if verified, contact the Attorney General's Office through the Solicitor's office in Washington. We believe it will be found however, that the only difference in interpretation are those which properly follow from the geographic limitations of the community involved. For example, in the case of San Francisco, the bay Area would undoubtedly be considered a part of the community; whereas in the case of another city the community might properly be considered to be a much small area. But if there are actual differences in the regulation of the conduct of aliens as a result of differences in interpretation, they should be called to our attention, so that they may be uniformly interpreted and enforced."

WRA purchased these folders because it was felt that they would be valuable to relocation personnel making initial contacts with potential employers or with organizations and individuals whose support or assistance is being sought. I feel that the same use is applicable on the West Coast, not as a quick introduction to persons of Japanese ancestry, as they will be viewed in other parts of the country, but rather as an effective method of demonstrating the honest and solid acceptance which has been offered by editors and communities throughout the country.

We feel that there will be many instances where you will think it is worthwhile to leave the folder with the person or persons with whom you talk. No indiscriminate distribution should be made, however, because we are limited by the price of the publication and because ill-advised use of printed matter can easily become a public relations hazard.

Where you find groups or individuals desiring additional copies it will be necessary that you explain our inability to supply them at government expense. You can answer such requests, however, with the information that additional copies may be purchased by anyone from the publishers, as indicated on the back page of the folder.

As you use these folders I will appreciate your opinion as to their value. I also would like to know if they are used. I have retained a limited supply in this office for further distribution among West Coast relocation personnel where the value and need can be established.

I would like you to make an immediate effort to utilize this publication, and advise me as to its general acceptance by individuals, organizations and the public.

Subject: Travel of Aliens

Some of the Projects have inquired about the regulations governing travel of aliens, particularly whether relocates are prohibited from traveling more than five miles from their homes. For your information we are quoting a memorandum prepared by the Assistant Solicitor after communicating with the U. S. Attorney in San Francisco.

"There appears to be considerable misunderstanding as to the regulations controlling the travel of aliens and even some misconception as to the rights of American citizens in that connection.

"It should be pointed out that so far as American citizens of Japanese descent are concerned, in the absence of the service of a specific exclusion order on them, they are free to travel any place any other American citizen may travel.

"As to aliens, the rumor that has been brought to our attention from at least two sources, that they may not travel more than five miles from their homes has no basis in fact. Under the regulations of the U. S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides, in such a way as to permit his engaging in normal activities. In each case his community includes all the area generally thought of as constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community, and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or a county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business, and may travel between his home and his church, school, etc. as is normally required. If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another, he should send a statement to



Attorney his name, his home address and telephone number, his business address and telephone number, his Alien Identification number, the purpose of his trip and the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the route to be followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the U. S. Attorney or the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the U. S. Attorney will stamp an endorsement upon a copy of the statement and will deliver it to the alien, who shall have it with him at all times while he is traveling.

"There is also provision for frequent or regular business travel to cover the cases of traveling salesmen, drivers of trucks, etc. so that they will not have to make a separate application for every trip.

"Travel by airplane is not permitted.

"Change of residence or of employment shall be made only after at least seven days' notice to the U. S. Attorney, of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification."

We believe that this information should be made available to your Relocation Planning Officer and other members of your staff who have occasion to confer with evacuees preparing to relocate.

SUBJECT: HAWAIIAN RETURNEES

It will be necessary for individuals, or heads of families, desiring to return to the Hawaiian Islands at government expense to initiate the following in advance of their arrival at the port of debarkation:

- 1.) Each individual or head of a family will write to the 12th Naval District out-Bound Passenger Section, San Francisco, California, indicating their desire and eligibility to return to the Hawaiian Islands at government expense and should request application for priority and clearance. Such clearance is in addition to that required by the Provost Marshal General.
- 2.) Application will be filled out and mailed by the individual, or individuals, in question to the Office of Internal Security, U. S. Navy, Ielina Palace Grounds, Honolulu, T.H.
- 3.) On receipt of the application at the Office of Internal Security, it will be acted upon and priority will be set up for their return. Notification will be sent to the applicant, as well as the Office of the 12th Naval District, San Francisco, or other district ports of debarkation who have jurisdiction over that area.
- 4.) It is this office's suggestion that this request be made out by the applicant in sufficient time in advance before they leave the Centers or the localities in which they are residing at that time.

There is enclosed for your information a copy of the statistical summary of dependency cases for the three West Coast Areas for the week ending March 30, 1945.

From January 2nd to and including March 30, 1945, 345 dependency referrals have been received on the West coast. Of this number, 100 have been returned to the Projects by the Area Relocation Adjustment Advisors, with a request for additional information. 26 referrals have been processed through the appropriate State agency and have been returned to the Projects through the Area Adjustment Advisor. 221 of the referrals were pending as of March 30.

Of the 221 pending cases, 170 are pending in the State or County Agency and 51 in the WRA Area offices. All of the latter group consist of cases received during the past few days of the reporting period.

Of the 26 summaries that have been completed, 22 have been accepted, 3 have been rejected by the State Agency and 1 was withdrawn because of the death of the client. Of the 22 accepted cases, 10 have or will receive public assistance and 12 cases have had services rendered without financial assistance - most of these being child placement problems.

Of the 345 referrals received, 329 have come from the Projects. The remaining 16 are either referrals from Relocation Offices outside of the excluded area or from the Health Section. The breakdown of the 329 referrals from the Projects is as follows:

It is not true that every registrant must have in his possession a Notice of Classification (DSS Form 57) which is less than six months old. It is true that certain classifications (II-A, II-B, II-C) can not be granted for more than six months at a time. If a registrant is carrying a Notice of Classification in Class II-A, II-B or II-C which is more than six months old there would be some question as to whether he had kept in touch with his local board. Likewise some question would ordinarily arise where he had a I-A classification card which was more than six months old, since registrants ordinarily do not remain in Class I-A for as long as six months before being either inducted or rejected.

However, where a registrant is classified in Class IV-D, IV-C, IV-B, IV-A, III-D, I-C, or IV-F, his local board would ordinarily have no occasion to reclassify him or issue him a new Notice of Classification unless there was a change in Regulations or a change in the circumstances of his case which would require such action. There are many thousands of registrants in the State of California who are in perfectly good standing with their local boards and who are carrying Notices of Classification which are much more than six months old. Some of these notices are several years old and it is entirely possible that a man might have a classification card issued as early as November, 1940, which would still be perfectly valid.

It would seem that such difficulty as has arisen in the case discussed in your letter of April 4 and the attachment thereto have been due to the fact that some police officers may not have fully understood Selective Service procedures relative to the issuance of Notices of Classification. Prior to receipt of your letter this office had received a few complaints of similar difficulties, but the very small number of such complaints indicates that cases such as mentioned in your letter have been of infrequent occurrence and that generally speaking police officers and others assisting in the

apprehension of Selective Service delinquents are quite well informed on the subject. While it would probably be impossible to take any measures which would wholly eliminate the possibility of such difficulties, it would be our suggestion that if any additional cases of this nature come to your attention you might take the matter up with the authorities concerned.

We might add that it is true that all Selective Service registrants are obliged to keep their local boards advised of all changes of address and all changes in status, such as changes in employment, changes in dependency situations, changes in citizenship, etc. We believe that it would be helpful to the administration of Selective Service and of assistance to the individual registrants involved if the War Relocation Authorities could undertake to advise Selective Service registrants who are leaving relocation centers of their obligations in this regard.

Draft and Registration Cards.

Enclosed find four copies of a letter recently received from Col. Kenneth H. Leitch, Director of California State Selective Service, explaining the procedures and policy in relation to draft and registration cards.

This letter was requested following some confusion over recognition of draft cards which designated classification. It had been reported that no classifications should be more than six months old. This blanket report is not true.

Col. Leitch points out the necessity of keeping in touch with one's draft board, and necessarily a change of address from a Relocation Center to a point of Relocation is information that must be sent to each registrant's local draft board.

Also the draft board should be notified of change in occupation.

This letter should be made available to all Relocation Officers for posting in a prominent place in his office, and as a matter of record if on some future occasion an over-zealous official should detain a returnee who has a classification, (other than I-A, II-A, II-B or II-C,) which is more than six months old.

Those holding classifications of I-A, II-A, II-B or II-C should make a semi-annual check with their draft boards.

It is the duty of WRA officials and evacuees to cooperate with Selective Service.

SUBJECT: Opening of New Grocery Stores

We recently discussed the procedure to be followed with the OPA for evacuees who may wish to enter into the grocery business in California.

OPA advised that all applicants should apply to the local ration board, fill out Form No. R315 and specify in detail the number of ration points that will be required for the initial inventory stock. This estimate of stock should be based on the first 30 days of business. After 30 days in business the applicant must submit a complete inventory of the stock on hand showing sales for that period and additional points required for the next 60 days. After the initial 90 days in business the OPA will allocate a regular allotment of points for inventory stock.

All the men were bitter in their denunciation of citizens who sat by while the desecration continued, as well as of those who committed the acts.

"I thought we were fighting against this sort of thing, not for it," said ex-Marine Bob McDannold, Pacific Grove. "It makes me made to come home to something like this."

Jack Yadgar, Yonkers, N.Y., who served with the Army in Europe, commented:

"If anyone should forget past animosities, I think that we must. And to think 40 per cent of those graves were those of infants!"

"The travel restrictions apply to all aliens fourteen years of age or older, who were or are citizens or subjects of Germany, Italy or Japan, or who are at present stateless but who were citizens or subjects of any one of those countries."

"The curfew regulations of the Western Defense Command no longer apply, since they were rescinded under Public Proclamation No. 21."

"If any instance arises indicating that U. S. Attorneys are not uniformly interpreting the Department of Justice regulations controlling the conduct of enemy aliens, we shall of course be glad to investigate such cases, and if verified, contact the Attorney General's Office through the Solicitor's Office in Washington. We believe it will be found however, that the only difference in interpretation are those which properly follow from the geographic limitations of the community involved. For example, in the area of San Francisco, the bay area would undoubtedly be considered a part of the community; whereas in the case of another city the community might properly be considered to be a much smaller area. But if there are actual differences in the regulation of the conduct of aliens as a result of differences in interpretation, they should be called to our attention, so that they may be uniformly interpreted and enforced."

MEMORANDUM TO: Newspaper Editors

I am herewith submitting to you the proof that State Senator Jack Tenney of Los Angeles misinformed West Coast newspapers and in turn newspaper readers in a statement accredited to him on June 5, 1945, during the recent sessions of the Legislature in Sacramento.

The proof is in an amended anti-Japanese-American resolution presented to the Legislature by Senator Tenney and Senator Hugh Burns of Fresno. This resolution passed the Senate in its amended form but did not get out of committee in the Assembly so was finally repudiated.

After giving voice and publication to fearless fictions and falsehoods the Senators amended their resolution and struck out the "charges" which made newspaper copy. They did this amending behind closed doors and made no public announcement that they had been in error. Their original statements have appeared as authoritative in a number of editorial columns on the West Coast and have been accepted as the truth by both editors and readers.

By their amendments, the Senators in essence actually have done this:

Rescinded their statement that the F.B.I., Navy and Army Intelligence has not been consulted on the character and integrity of persons of Japanese ancestry returning to the West Coast.

Rescinded their statement that there is a lack of care exercised by the War Relocation Authority in its relocation work.


Rescinded their statement on "the fact", as they called it, that of the first five Japanese returned to one California county all have a history of espionage.

Rescinded their statement that Japanese-Americans and Japanese aliens "with an open and notorious and well known disloyal attitude" are being released.

The original resolution was a shabby contribution to further discrimination against a minority group. The proof that the authors couldn't swallow their own fictions on Japanese Americans is a documentary record which I believe should be called to your and your readers' attention.
