Dear Mr. Best:

We were very glad to receive your report on the camera situation at Tule. It looks as if quantity hardly makes up for quality in this case.

Since the view camera would really be of no value to us, we suggest you hold it there. However, the Argus might be put in condition for possible use. We suggest that you send it to the Photographic Unit in Denver. Charlie with his 'fix-it' aptitude may be able to do something with it and if not will know whether it is worth repairing.

We feel we should 'protect' the Lab as much as possible from any heavy volume of developing and printing from the projects and have tended to discourage the projects sending their negatives there. Consequently, we hope you will be able to hold to your estimate of approximately one roll of film per week. Also, these negatives should not be incorporated in our Denver files unless you think the pictures would be of value to the program as a whole, in which case, submit proofs to us and we will select those we would like to have in the files.

We hope the Lab can supply you with batteries for the Vigilant flash equipment. Here's to some good 'shooting'.

Dear Mr. Best:

For some time, the Reports Division in the Washington office has been gathering and multilithing favorable newspaper clippings for distribution to the relocation centers. None have been sent to Tule Lake, since we have doubted that you would want to use them there.

We are breaking over, however, to send you 100 copies of the next set of clippings. This is the first set that we have had translated into Japanese. You, of course, will be the one to decide on the advisability of making these clippings and translations available to the residents of Tule Lake.

One clipping, in particular, seems to us to carry a message that might be of interest to them. This is the editorial from the Washington Post of July 10, entitled "Renouncing Citizenship."

In your Weekly Report, dated July 24, you comment on a recent increase in applications for leave clearance, and suggest that the reverses of Japan in the war may have been responsible, in some measure, for instigating them. This observation has caused some of us to wonder if more carefully chosen information should not be distributed to the Tule Lake population. We should like to have your views on this suggestion.

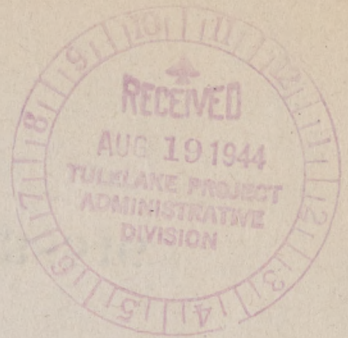

Dear Mr. Best:

I have been very gratified with the manner in which you have been collecting detailed and valuable statistics on the Nisei who have been inducted into the armed forces. This information has proved invaluable in creating more favorable public opinion and in planning future policy of the Authority.

As a means of furthering good public relations, we now need, in addition to the number of Nisei entering the service from centers, the total number of persons of Japanese descent, by center, who have entered the armed forces prior to evacuation and subsequent to relocation from a center, together with the number of families represented thereby. Will you, therefore, estimate the number of families ever under the jurisdiction of your center who have relatives in the service, in somewhat the form prescribed below:

From news stories appearing in center newspapers and from weekly and monthly center reports it is highly possible that such a study has already been accomplished at your center in connection with the organization of a Mothers' Club, Center Service Flag, or Servicemen's Memorial. In any event, the Reports Officer, with the aid of the Statistician, should be in a position to direct the compilation of such a report. The cooperation of the block managers may also prove helpful in obtaining this information.
