I'm sending WISE OLD WOMAN back to you and appreciate your offer to walk it over to Kathy Dawson. I'm enclosing another bio in case you think she'd be interested in seeing it.

About UNCLE KANDA... I see it as a story of the relationship between a child and an old man. She grows in her understanding of him as a human being (not the stereotype she's heard about) and he learns to trust her. Giving her his cat is symbolic of his highest trust as well as his love.

Since there are almost no picture books dealing with the Japanese American experience, I'm especially happy about THE BRACELET, and would be so pleased if you could help me develop UNCLE KANDA into a good picture book as well.
