The month of July was hot and there was not much trouble; one burglary was reported and investigation will show that this was one of the cover up jobs by some of the employees.

We removed one man to Leupp, Arizona; the first and only Japanese that this project has deemed necessary to move from the project. This was more to keep the moral of the Center high. This young man was an original "No" answer to #28 question, and he was also instrumental in organizing a strike among the carpenters; on permission of W.D. C., he was sent to Leupp, Arizona. No bad criticism, except they thought the entire family should have been moved.

The segregation procedures were outlined by Director Myer in his visit here.

We expect very little trouble or disturbance, if any, here on segregation.

We let the people know that they are making their own choice.

We checked several radios for short waves and removed the bands and cut them out and returned them to the owners.

Dog license fees were returned to the owners by the fiscal department.

Mr. Glick was also a visitor and was well satisfied with our hearings on leave clearance and the loyalty question.

The new report forms, I believe, will give a better breakdown of the cases than that of the Weekly Report, which did not mean anything.

We had three terminations, our chief of Police Tak Koga left and re-located with his family on the outside August 4th, another patrolman left for outside employment. My secretary left on indefinite leave for outside employment.

We had one attempted burglary of the refrigerator warehouse, which area is guarded by the military police. The guard shot at the parties but did not hit them. Recovered 1 sack of coffee and 1 sack of rice. No description of the parties involved and they were thought to be outsiders.

We picked up 19 juveniles for destruction of property and petty theft. Money was recovered and the damage to property repaired. Two cases were involved. We recovered the money and arranged for the other boys to repair damage to buildings and then turned the boys over to the Welfare department.

The accidents were two industrial, and one involved in a <sup>dent</sup> auto accident where an unauthorized driver took a dump truck and let an old man ride in the dump body and then accidentally raised the dump body while in motion, throwing the old man out, injuring his vertebrae or spine. We will file charges against the driver for unauthorized driving of a Govt. truck as he had no driver's license.

We sent our quota of people to Japan on Aug 30th, without any disturbance on part of center people. We had 3 F.B.I. agents and 3 Naval Intel. Agents here to be onlookers, also 1 customs man and 1 Dept. of State man.

Col. Fitzpatrick of <sup>the</sup> Army Intel. <sup>signer</sup> was here a short time and decided we were doing a good job and went back to Denver.

We are holding out department as is in regard to reclassifications of the salary ratings until after the segregation has been completed.

School will start this next week and we will try ~~and~~ get the school authorities to install a junior traffic patrol. I can organize it. We are making private cars either park in the Motor Pool or park at the police Station until their visit is over and they are ready to leave the Center.

Things are running fairly smooth here.

C. We made a cut in our employment from 53 to a total of 34. 2 evacuees left the Police Department during the month of September. This bringing our exact police officers to the total strength of 32. We have two secretaries (female) at the present time.

We brought in around 1,000 people from Tule Lake, California. Chief Tomlinson made the first trip and Assistant Internal Security ~~Security~~ Officer Adams made the second trip. Mr. Adams has been ill the past week.

We cleared one burglary case which was an old case; reported to the police department on April 23rd. Five boys were apprehended, all under 17 years of age. Reports were written and turned to the Welfare Department. Case cleared and closed.

I cleared one outside grand larceny <sup>was cleared</sup> concerning 2 of our center evacuees, one is <sup>15</sup> years old boy and the other is <sup>18</sup> years old, both boys having record with this department. Warrants will probably be obtained for their prosecution by outside officials. ~~Our~~ <sup>case</sup>, referred to the outside officials, was caused by segregation; and we wanted this man in the county jail until after segregation was over. We get very good cooperation from the county officials. We find that our local Judicial Commission ~~are~~ <sup>is</sup> very much inclined to sentence a very light sentence and then parole the boys involved.

We had one burglary case at the warehouse, guarded by the Military Police. No suspect so far in this case.

We are in dire need of winter uniforms for the police department; and we are writing to the ~~director~~ <sup>suggest</sup> requesting permission for WRA to purchase a suitable winter uniform. The police department at Tule Lake has uniforms bought by the WRA and I can see no ~~cause~~ <sup>reason</sup> why we should not be entitled to the same consideration, as it gets very cold from November until the first of April in this part of Colorado.

I have ~~made~~ <sup>have been made</sup> stop signs to be used by the junior traffic or the safety patrol at the elementary school by the school boy patrol and it will be used at the street crossings, Tuesday, October 5th. This should be very helpful.

The Police Department now consists of 31 patrolmen and officers (Evacuee) 2 secretaries, 2 appointed personnel; A reduction of 3 policemen and ~~and~~ 2 new men appointed. We intend to build back to 35 Evacuees - male police officers. Due to the proposed removal of military forces. We are still short the 2 trucks that have been in the garage over two months for repairs. We have one convoy truck and Police Chief and Assistant a Chev. sedan. Need at least another car or our pickup repaired.

We had an aggravated assault, but come of a drunken fight in which <sup>suffered</sup> four men were involved. One man was hit in head with a wooden sword and 6-inch cut on scalp; was in hospital 11 days. Three men were charged with the assault and at trial it was determined that only one man was actually guilty so I recommended dismissal of the charges against other two.

We had two insanity cases and both sent to State Hospital.

Had hearing for 5 boys that burglarized the High school Coop store last April in front of the Project Director. All entered plea of guilt and were sentenced to work out the value of money and goods stolen. This was with the consent of District Attorney of County.

We are trying to obtain winter uniforms for the Police Officers have not heard from request as yet.

The Police Dept. has to take over more duties such as looking after the patrol of the Center fence to keep parties from going through the fence, no trouble as yet. We have no guard in the towers and the guards were out of the towers almost 2 weeks before it was noticed by the Evacuees.

We plan to concentrate on traffic as we have in the past, only more so. We have not had any severe accidents but are trying to hold the line and educate the drivers better. I have my assistant patrol the roads and highway adjacent to center to stop speeding and traffic hazards.

Halloween has passed and no noticeable damage to Govt. property <sup>was done</sup> due to fact that we had parties for most of the children and that kept them in their own blocks.

I have requested about 4 months ago to have a Safety Committee appointed from the Appointed personnel and also from the Council and block managers and think that it is going to materialize <sup>which will</sup> help in traffic problems and safety measures.

I organized a School safety patrol <sup>was organized</sup> and put it into effect and it is doing good. well.

On Nov. 4th, Assistant Internal Security Officer Stanley E. Adams was sent to Tule Lake to help there. He has returned to duty here.

We have a man to fill the place of Internal Security officer and are waiting for an O.K. from the Civil Service board in Denver.

We have not heard from the request for uniforms.

We had an appointed personnel man that was involved in an accident in which a government car was damaged and the other party was the cause of the accident. Report and pictures were made and sent in.

Transportation for the Police Department is not very good and the gasoline situation is bad.

The Police Department has taught the people in the center to try and take care of their own dances and to keep order. Last year they usually asked for 4 or 5 policemen to watch the dance, but we have been able to get them to look after their own at this time.

When month of December rounded out the year, it left the office with a total of 113 cases reported where there was a police action of some kind taken. A good share of these 113 cases were settled by the police department and not found necessary to bring to the attention of the Judicial Commission or outside authorities. On December 2, with the aid of the Federal Communication Commission, we picked up one small broadcasting set. The records and broadcasting machine <sup>was</sup> seized and the owner of the material was told that if the Federal Communication Commission wanted to place charges against him we would use the equipment as evidence. <sup>the</sup> copy of the report was sent to Willard E. Schmidt of Tule Lake. Another copy was sent to the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Denver.

We had a little crime wave during the month of December. A total of 10 cases were reported. One ~~reported~~ was a theft concerning lost High School equipment. This case could just as well be a lost property as a theft. At this time we have not been able to uncover anything about the property. We had one mental case handled during the month, three cases of drunkenness and one gambling case. Seven convictions, <sup>on the gambling case, and 2 that</sup> the police department asked dismissed. <sup>we were obtained</sup>

We had an addition on the 23rd of December of 1 Caucasian Internal Security officer who was transferred over from Education. We added 2 Evacuees to the police department and 1 resigned.

We have not been able to obtain winter uniforms for my evacuee policemen.

We had one trial in the center in front of the Judicial Commission, <sup>He was</sup> and they sentenced ~~him~~ to work 1 month as a janitor. This is the first time that we have been able to get the Judicial Commission to actually impose a sentence against the offender. ~~I did a little missionary work with the Judicial Commission and the visit of Mr. Kimball probably helped in this respect.~~

~~We have~~ <sup>is</sup> An Internal Security Officer on duty from 8:00 a.m. until midnight, <sup>and the chief is</sup> ~~is~~ always on call. We had ~~the~~ total of 936 visitors in the Center, ~~which is summed up as~~ 48 soldiers, 252 Caucasian and 636 Japanese. 776 were visitors and 160 <sup>on</sup> business. <sup>There were</sup> We had 1 accident involving a Project automobile and a Personnel driver. This case was handled by the Highway Patrol. The other driver was charged with causing the accident. We ~~had~~ 2 industrial accidents causing the loss of a little finger to an Appointed personnel <sup>member</sup>.

He also invited me to come to Denver in the near future and give a talk to the American Legion in Denver.

Our personnel problem with the evacuee police department will undoubtedly be less than the number we have working at the present time. But ~~we~~ have convinced the officers that with their training and efficiency, they should be able to handle this Center with a reduced number *of men*.

~~Our yearly report for 1943 has already been submitted and we are hoping that we can hold the crime of 1944 as low as the preceding year.~~

The month of February brought on some difficult cases and some Center trouble. The announcement of the ruling of the War Department which made the Japanese subject to Selective Service, as of January 20, really got under way in February. At the first of the month, we had a lot of draft age boys come in to the Administration and state that they wanted to be expatriated to Japan. To all appearances, evidently, this was made with no other reason but to escape draft. This feeling evidently resulted in the draft age boys having several meetings in the center. These meetings were apparently spontaneous meetings, and at this time we have no one that knows who started or suggested having the meetings.

On about the 12th or the 13th of February, the Council received a letter from, apparently, Poston Arizona, stating the Voice of Nisei ask that they get their rights before being subject to draft.

Of the 52 evacuees that were supposed to go to Denver for pre-induction, 47 went to Denver and 9 were rejected. Five of this group failed to show up for their pre-induction notice. U. S. District Attorney in Denver issued warrants for the arrest of the five boys and they were removed from the Center on February 23, 1944. Additional information of this case will be under Case #134. Additional information will be stated further in Case #131 of the investigation of meetings held by the draft-age niseis and some Isseis.

We had one burglary on January 28 which was reported in the month of February and cleared in the month of February. We have one outside burglary which shows on the face of this report as burglary and which was thought that a Japanese from this center committed this burglary. But I am doubtful that a Japanese from this center committed this burglary, and till such time as it is proven to me that they committed the burglary, we will call the case closed.

Due to other affairs in the center and the investigation of some of the case not having been closed, we had no Judicial Commission hearings in the month of February, and will try to get a good share of our pending cases the first part of March.

The police department has been working with the Draft Board and getting these boys up to meet their calls. Also we helped to get a family

The Internal Security problem this month was devoted almost entirely to helping with the Selective Service. We had 11 men called for the Selective Service that failed to report. Each and every one of these men were called in the day before they were to leave the Center for Lamar, and great pains were taken to explain to the men what his failing to report would mean to the Japanese people in the Center and what it would mean to him. Each person was interviewed and the violation was explained to them. Statements were taken from the ones that were willing to give statements. The Internal Security transmitted this information to the Project Director, and effort to convince these boys that they were making a mistake by refusing to go for preinduction.

We handled approximately 171 Selective Service men. We had to transport these men from the Center at 5:30 in the morning in order to get them to the Local Draft Board in Lamar in time to entrain for Denver.

We had 2 minor automobile accidents, total damage of around \$9.00, which on the outside would not have been enough to make a report.

Plans were sent to the WRA office in Washington as to how we could handle this Center without the aid of Military Personnel. It is my firm belief that we can get along without any Military Police at this center. Before our plan had been received by the Washington office, a order was transmitted to the local Army Post to reduce the guards to approximately 16 men and 2 officers.

The gambling case reported, in which 3 men were arrested and fined \$50.00 each in the court at Lamar, Colorado. These same men had been warned several times previously about gambling in the center.

I served notice on one of our tenants farmer to vacate <sup>LAND</sup> occupied by him and information prepared and sent in to Washington, D. C. <sup>THE</sup> The U. S. Deputy Marshall served an injunction on this man to vacate property by April 6. In case he is not moved by April 6, the U. S. Attorney in denver will be notified of his continued violation.

I have hopes of being able to get definite information as to who is leading the resisting of the Selective Service in this Center. I am sure that one of the leaders is already in custody of the Federal Authorities in Denver, as he himself failed to report for induction.

We have had no misdemeanor and no Juvenile Delinquency reported this month to the Internal Security. I have made 2 talks to the school children. Judge Gilliam from Denver was in and gave a talk on Juvenile Delinquency on March 26, 1944. I am planning to get an advisory board of school children, especially boys, to meet with me and talk some of the Juvenile problems when called to my attention. In this way, I believe we can do a lot of good to prevent Juvenile Delinquency by giving the children first hand knowledge of the actual happenings.

In the month of March we had a total of 921 people coming in from the outside. Of these 798 were visitors and 123 on business. There were 64 soldiers, 227 Caucasians and 630 Japanese.

We had few cases this month. What they were, were just little nasty cases.

The Petit Larceny case involved workers at the Slaughter house and it was settled by the Project Director and have had some influence with one or two men working in the Slaughterhouse and were able to persuade them to go back to work.

We had an Aggravated Assault case. A man is doing 120 days in the County Jail. This could have been a very serious case, if this man's rock had held together.

We had two automobile accidents. Both drivers at fault were suspended from driving. One permanently. Then we had one Parking case. One Evacuee insisted on disregarding the Evacuee Police Department and I banned him from driving any automobile into our Center since he apparently does not intend to obey the rules.

We had a burglary of the Project Garage. We are still working on this case and will continue to work on it until it is cleared up. At this time the leads are very few and far between

We had a little difficulty at the hospital resulting from jealousy among doctors. So far no case has been made on this and we are going to meet with the doctors today and see if we can settle things to the best advantage of the project, as that is the best way out of this situation.

Our Police officers are taking their compensatory time in good spirits. About from 5 to 8 men at a time are using up their compensatory time, since the Washington Office ruled that they will not be paid for compensatory time. Most of this Compensatory time was acquired by these men when the camp first started and they put in a lot of long hours. We were up to our strength of 30 Evacuee Police Officer, but I added one who had recovered from sickness. This man has 4 sons in the U. S. Army and he is very proud of that fact. I am going to keep him working if I have to lay off someone else as he I believe we owe that much to his sons. This old man is a good steady worker.

We have been trying to arrange transfer of Mr. C. Felker of Jerome but have not received any information from the Project Personnel. Only a statement that they were planning to take care of it.

We are planning to transfer Mr. Griffith back to the schools as their Vocational Ag. teacher has transferred to the Farm Division and they are unable to secure replacement and this is the kind of work Mr. Griffith has been in all his life. We are relinquishing him back to the school.

We would like to get our full quota of Internal Security Officers so that we can start our gate procedure as required in the Manual.

We are busy also in helping with the Draft. Interviewing prospective delinquents and trying to change thexx attitude of some of the Evacuee boys of Draft-age.

For the month of April we had 829 Visitors and and 129 business people come to the Center. Of these 14 were soldiers, 250 Caucasians and 694 Japanese.

The month of May has been a very busy month. We have had several cases, including one where three women were arrested for treason, and our arrests for Selective Service brings our cases and reports up pretty heavy for the month of May. Our arrests shows for 20, while only two of these were arrested for offense against the Project rules and regulations.

We have relocated three policemen this month. We have also been able to fill up our Caucasian staff with addition of Mr. Felker from Ferome, Arkansas and hiring of Mr. H. H. Hunter through the Civil Service Department. We expect to have one more addition to our staff sometime in the near future. Due to the fact that we have no Gate Clerk, the Internal Security is running the gate, checking the visitors' incoming and outgoing, and making collections at that place. Mr. Gerald V. Griffith was transferred back to the Education Department this month.

We have a good number of cases pending, but as soon as some of the Selective Service Cases are tried, we will be able to get them off the Pending Files.

We helped in the Segregation Movement to Tule Lake and have been called on by Housing to help them in moving some of the families to smaller apartments in the Center.

The Internal Security is operating with a caucasian on duty 24 hours per day. I do not have a relief man at this time, and will have to do the relief work myself so that my men will not have to work but 6 days per week.

We put in application for uniforms for my caucasian staff and also asked for money to buy some additional equipment so that we can function as a police department should.

The month of June the Internal Security Office started the Gate Procedure. We have been supplemented with one Gate Clerk, supplied by the Statistic Department. We are checking all visitors and have collected for the month of June \$ 1080.50 for meals.

Mr. Carl Adams from Wichita was supposed to report for duty on the 20th of June, but due to expected call from the Army he was unable to take the call at that time. He called me on June 25th and stated that he would be here to report for duty on or about the end of this month.

*FOR THE MONTH OF JUNE*  
We had a very good month of relocation among the Police officers, which was encouraged for a long time. The total number of evacuees relocating as of June 30 stands at 12. The evacuee Chief of Police, C. Y. Nakamura had been accepted by the U. S. Strategic Service and was supposed to leave on the 28th of June for Washington but due to unexpected call from Denver by Mr. Lindley to act as interpreter for the draft delinquents, his leaving for Washington was delayed for a few days. This job had been about eight months in materializing. He has one stepson in the U. S. Army, who is now serving in Italy.

I was subpoenaed to attend trial on the Draft Delinquents in Denver for June 27. I will give more details regarding this trial in the next monthly report. The trial was in session until about 3:40 p.m., June 30, 1944.

On June 21, 1944, 530 transferencees arrived from Jerome, Arkansas. The Police Department helped with the registration and checking of these people and also helped keep general order during registration.

The month of June, we had six cases. Of these, one was a suicide case, where a man, mentally deranged, hanged himself. We had one Selective Service Violation. Four boys failed to show up for their Army Physical examination. There was a Petit Larceny case where a man took home groceries from the WPA truck which he was driving and delivering from Warehouse to the Block News Halls.

The month of July was a good month for relocation from the Police department. Our Police department came down to 13 mens evacuee including two secretaries. All my policemen that can, have relocated on either trial indefinite or indefinite leave. Reports from them are favorable for their experience and the indefinite leave. We are still running the Evacuee Police station 24 hours a day and seems to be getting along just as good or better.

When I came here, there were approximately 89 evacuee officers in this department. I have been trying to reduce the number as much as possible but I have found that in order for us to function properly, I should have at least 15 evacuee police officers to run 24 hours shift. I am slated up to have a total of 30 evacuee police officer and two secr secretaries, but I am going to try and get along with half that number.

Our Internal Security Officers, we are still four in number. August 1, 1944, we are sending our associate Internal Security Officer, Stanley E. Adams to Heart Mountain on detail as Acting Chief. We have been notified from the Civil Service that they have hired or referred to us of another Internal Security Officer CAF7, who will probably report for duty this week.

We had two more selective service cases. Just two in each call. Each call was for around forty men. Two men failed to respond from each call. They were arrested within 3 or 4 days by the United States Marshall and taken to the Denver jail where they are now awaiting trial.

We had a theft report by the Property Officer; Case No. 164. This case was referred to the Judicial Commission and their Project Attorney, Mr. Horn, delivered a message about the seriousness of these offenses. He stated that we are only trying the boys on the theft of one camera to keep the theft a petty larceny, and asked them to be a little severe in dealing with the offenders in this case. The Judicial Committee found three defendants not guilty and found five others that pleaded guilty and found them guilty. They asserted the penalty of 90 days without passes and that they should report to the Internal Security with their parents once each week. This might be a typical Japanese



trial or sentences, but for the reaction of the other young people in this Center, they just figured that nothing was accomplished. We suggested that these offenders be assigned to some work in this project without pay, but the Judicial Commission saw fit to do it this way. It was, I would say, almost a white wash which leaves me to believe that these people are not interested whether they steal from the evacuee or from the government. They do not seem to be greatly concerned over the outcome of these cases.

The court in Denver disposed of four selective service cases, and the defendants with the exception of one, who was acquitted and one whose case is awaiting additional information from the Selective service Board. They were all sentenced to a term at the Tucson, Arizona Labor Camp. Some received a sentence of 10 month, other 18 month, which in all is a fair sentences and satisfactory to the W. R. A. of this Center. Our ex-Japanese, Chief of Police is working for the strategic service in Washington D. C. and should be of immense service to that organization and is a man that is capable.

We feel that we had been fairly successful with our efforts in supervising and running the gate collection. We turned this over to the statistics section but we still have to pinch hit for them at the gate. Collection have fallen off a little last week.

The Internal Security were operating with a decrease in Man power. We sent Associate, Assistant Chief Adams, to Heart Mountain, Wyoming, where he was approved and transferred there as Chief of Internal Security. We are planning on having a man transferred from Tulelake to this Center to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Stanley E. Adams. When he gets here, we will be operating with the desired men which will be a total of four beside me.

We are still having to maintain the Gate one period, sometimes two periods. Our crime is running about the same average. We had five cases reported this month but one of these cases was carried over from last month which was not reported as a case until this month giving us a total of 170 cases, for the project up to date. We still have 24 cases pending and 146 closed. We had one violation of the Selective Service law this month. We had one petty larceny by four outside Caucasian boys from the nearby town of Granada. They were apprehended and turned over to their parents and they were dealt by their parents. Violation was not severe but will stop depredation and trespass of other Caucasian boys on Government Property. We had one case on Joy-Riding from the Service Station. He was picked up and action was taken by the Motor Pool and the Internal Security. Case closed. The notorious treason trial taken out of the pending file as the sentences was pronounced by Judge Simms; Toots Wallace was sentenced to two years in the penitentiary and \$1,000 fine; Billie Tanigoshi and Florence Otani received a sentence of 20 month in the penitentiary and \$1,000 fine for conspiracy to commit treason. The trial was publicized all over the United States, but the local Denver paper <sup>did not</sup> write articles derogatory to the W. R. A. in this trial.

At this time, we are getting along with 11 Police Officers and two girls making the total of 13 Evacuee workers. Due to the shortage of laborers available on the farm we had been letting the Evacuee Police Officers remain as it is for the time being. With our Officers on duty 24 hours a day, we are able to handle almost anything that appears necessary.

Our crime for the month of October was small. We had only three cases being reported. One was attempted rape case. After the man had been arrested and placed in the County Jail for about two weeks, the father of the girl molested made an application to the District Attorney to have the charges against the defendant dismissed. So the case was closed.

We have had several report of small groups of boys beating up one boy and in all several young boys were beaten up or threaten by a group of boys. I learned the names of the boys involved in these offense but the victims did not want to enter into the case, so I proceeded in this manner. I took our Community Analyst and I had the boys and their parents into the Police station and reported the case in detail to the parents in the presence of the supposed gang members. I explained how dangerous practice of this kind was to the well being of Center life. I asked their cooperation of the parents and the boys in preventing this kind of activity in the Center. I explained to the parents that assaults of this kind will have to be tried in the outside court and that if convicted, they will probably receive a jail sentence or a trip to the State Reformatory for boys. When the boys and their parents realize the seriousness of their action, they stated that they would cooperate and maintain control over the boys. I asked the parents to have their boys at home at 8:00 in the evening for a couple of month. I told the parents that if the boys received an invitation to go to a party or a school dance that we would give them a permit to attend such social function. I can say that we have had success with the boys and their parents in this case the last two weeks of October.

I was subpoena to Denver on October 24, for draft evasion trials. We had 18 boys awaiting charges of this nature and 17 out of the 18 were either convicted and had been sentenced by the court. The other boy entered the plea of guilty but his sentence was held for pending his mental statis. We are still short on Police Officers in the Internal Security Section and try to effect the transfer but at this time, it has apparently followed through with. I have 14 Evacuee on the Police Department at this time. We have very little crime arising in our Center.

The Evacuee Police Force were strengthened with the addition of 10 Police Officers. These men came back from Seasonal Leave and wanted to go back to work on the Police Department. Due to the Holiday period with the amount of extra patrolling, I put these man back on my Police Department.

We had one case of theft, one outside case of gambling, one case of Vandalism at the High School Building in which panels were kicked out and at this time, we had not been able to get any information on this case. We had one assault and battery case where two men beat up another old man both of whom are now in jail doing a forty-day sentence. We had one Juvenile run-off to Colorado Springs where he was apprehended by the Police Department and was held in the Detention Ward of the Juvenile Department in the Sheriff's Office, which I believe cured this boy from running away. I went to Colorado Springs and return this boy to the Center.

We were asked on November 29, to furnish the night watchman for the Motor Pool Garage. For this, we hired two men on December 1, 1944. We have had no case of Juvenile Delinquency report ng this month. I am ready to release the boys from probation that I put on about one month ago since they have done a fine job of cooperation with the Police and their behavior has been very good. In regard to Juvenile Delinquency, I got the various organization to assist in curbing this case. I got the Community Analyst interested by showing him the methods of how to combat these cases and suggested the the various organization in this Center to help in curbing Juvenile Delinquency, also succeeded in having the Welfare Department, the Community Council and the Womens Federation and almost every other organization in the Center have become Juvenile Delinquency conscious. We have not had any Juvenile case the month of October. I have arranged a little party for the 16 boys that I had on Probation, the month of October and are giving them their release at the party. I believe that these 16 boys will be a lot of help to me and the other organization of the Center in ehlping to hold down Juvenile Delinquency. I believe that we had been very fortunatē in getting the people interested in the Welfare of this Center and in comparison with any outside town of the same size. I am very happy to make this encouraging report in regard to Juvenile Delinquency.

On December 2, 1944, someone appropriated the WRA Convoy Truck at 9:00 p.m. and returned the truck along side of the Water tank outside the Center, four hours later we have been unable to solve.

We had a report of burglary of Warehouse at the Koen Ranch, some time in the later part of the month of December. About \$70.00 worth of small tools were taken. As a lot of people has access to the building, it is not known as to who committed this theft. We had one other case of joy-riding on December 28, in which two or three young boys apparently Juveniles drove a farm truck through the northwest gate, was located at Granada by Officer Felker. These boys almost wrecked the Police car. They abandoned the truck in the Alfalfa field near the irrigation ditch by the X-Y Ranch. One young boy was apprehended, who gave a fictitious name and as the Internal Security Officer stopped his car in the Center, this boy jumped out of the right side of the car and out-ran the Police Officer. We have not been able to locate any of the boys involved in this offense at this time. I wish to report that this is the first Juvenile Offense in the last three months of 1944.

Our Internal Security has been strengthen with the addition of Mr. Foster formerly with the Colorado Highway Patrol. During the last 10 days we have been out of our office and loaned them to the Army Majors to conduct the investigation regarding the return of the Japanese people to California. My Police Officers have notified some 100 or 130 to be interviewed by the Army Majors. We have been commended very much by the Army Majors in the efficient work of our Internal Security Officer and the splendid cooperation that we gave them in this matter.

The Internal Security Officers are ready at a moments notice to take over the facilities now exercised by the members of the Military Police. With three or four men will be able to handle the situation very well.

We had a case of Assault which happened on the farm. As neither of these man would file complaints against the other and are room mates, no action was taken in this case.

We cleared the Joy-riding case which was case No. 187, commended on the monthly report of January. These four Juveniles were apprehended and had a hearing in front of Mr. Lindley, Project Director and they are now working on Saturdays washing automobiles for the Project. We had one gambling raid. No state action was taken in this case but the ring leaders were brought before Mr. Lindley and made contribution of \$150 which will be turned over to the Blue Star on the promise that they would do no more gambling. We had burglary of residents. The burglary was committed by the lady's son and one of his buddy. We recovered \$201 and the money was returned to the parents. These boys were counseled by myself and are now on probation and doing fine at this time. We were advised of two Short-Wave receiver being sent to this Project by Mr. Lessing, Relocation Officer in Chicago, who was advised of the shipment by the Secret Service Department. Both radios were picked up after they were in the owner's house and set up. One radio wouldn't operate but the other did work only the old man didn't know how to operate the same. It is doubtful whether there would be any prosecution in this case as the District Attorney in Denver advised me that the Attorney General in Washington D. C. did not wish to prosecute any more of these aliens unless they are dangerous to the war effort. The owner of these two radio will probably be allowed to relocate and then distribution would be made at later date. The owner of one radio was already to relocate.

The Internal Security Officer of this Center is in good shape and we have a good Evacuee Police Department. We believe that we have the smallest crime record of any town or city this size in this United States. As a general rule, the people in this Center are law-abiding and do not want to commit any crimes that will get them into trouble or embarrassment with the Law Enforcement Agency of the state or nation. I will submit the summary of the yearly report in the near future.

One of my Japanese police officers caught seven school age boys and girls when one of the boys threw a rock at the High school window at 10:20 P.M. and identified them and testified in court.

We have already started in checking the brakes and equipment of the motor vehicles in use in this Center. In Cooperation with the National drive of the I.C.A. But we have a program to check the equipment and see that it is in good safety condition before using the same. A steady program is better than a periodical one. We have been very fortunate in having a very few accidents so far.

Things are going along very well in this Center and we have a very little trouble and hope it does not increase.

We had a hearing Feb 28th on the 7 people in the window breaking event. The guilty boy was expelled from school, and the rest were severely lectured and passed refused for 30 days. With a warning that future incidents of this kind would be met with a stiff sentence.

The parents of these children were at the hearing and advised that the best thing to do was relocate with their children.



I will try to remedy this condition within the next few days.

We had a lot of work with Relocation in the month of March. We only had three cases in the Center during the month. One of these cases was a juvenile, apparently a sex offense, which was investigated both by the Police Department and the Welfare Department, resulting in the parties involved being placed on probation by myself and in the custody of their parents, with instructions that they should relocate as soon as possible. We had one evacuee return to the Center from his internment in the Federal Prison at Tucson, Arizona. As he had not received an approved visit to the Center he was ~~admitted~~ rejected from the Center. He very definitely stated that he wanted to be placed in an Internment Camp. I gave him the necessary instructions and information so that he could get there. We had one case of an old Japanese Dentist conducting private business at his residence which was settled and I still have his tools in my possession waiting for him to relocate.

I lost 6 policemen during the month of March--3 by relocation, 2 by transfers, and one that I let go for the good of the department. I made one addition to the force which gave me a total reduction of 5. I now have 15 evacuees in the police department. The only reason I keep this number is that we help with relocation 24 hours a day and our trains are late at night and early in the morning, and they are a great aid in relocation. We will probably lose Mr. Hunter sometime in the first part of April as he is to be Postmaster at Lamar whenever they decide to make the change.

In the month of March the Center was a very well behaved place--very little crime. We checked the rolling equipment and we only found one set of brakes that was bad and they were immediately repaired by the Motor Pool garage. We have carried out a brake inspection of project equipment for the past two years which is born out in the finding of only one faulty vehicle. Sometime during the first part of April we will check all the personnel vehicles as they come in or leave the project.

It looks as though we were going to be able to close this Center by January 1, 1946.

Two cases, a mess hall burglary, and a car prowler, were filed with Internal Security Department during the month. Both were solved by the arrest of four 'teen age boys. Final disposition of these delinquents will be made upon the return of Chief Tomlinson who has been called away by a death in the family.

The Army has refused to process those delinquents who have completed their Federal Prison Terms and were again called by the local draft board. Chief Tomlinson has taken this matter up with the proper authorities.

In compliance with the National Brake Check Campaign, we are completing the check of the Government vehicles assigned to this project.

Relocation is progressing. Tho our police department now has only eleven men, we are continuing to provide transportation 24 hours a day for outgoing relocatee's to the railroad station, and to the relocation office.

Officer Hunter will be terminated in a few days to accept his appointment as Postmaster of Lamar, Colorado. Qualified replacement has been secured.

With the exception of the juvenile cases enumerated above, order has been maintained in the center, and minor infractions held to a minimum.

We were without a fire Dept for a few days.

My police officer with aid of block managers prevailed upon the fireman to resume work through the efforts of Foster internal security officer . ho arranged a meeting with Project Director Lindley and the heads of fire Dept. Everything going along O.K.

We had two draft evaders come back to the Center from Tuscon Ariz. and they have left already no admittance for them but the gate clerk slipped and they got in but the Police located them and sent on their way.

I took care of 11 men for pre physical exam, and they were taken to Lamar to draft board.

We are sending 5 men to active duty June 3rd.

The Police Dept. is still functioning as usual and will do so untill the Center closes, which we hope will be some time this fall.
