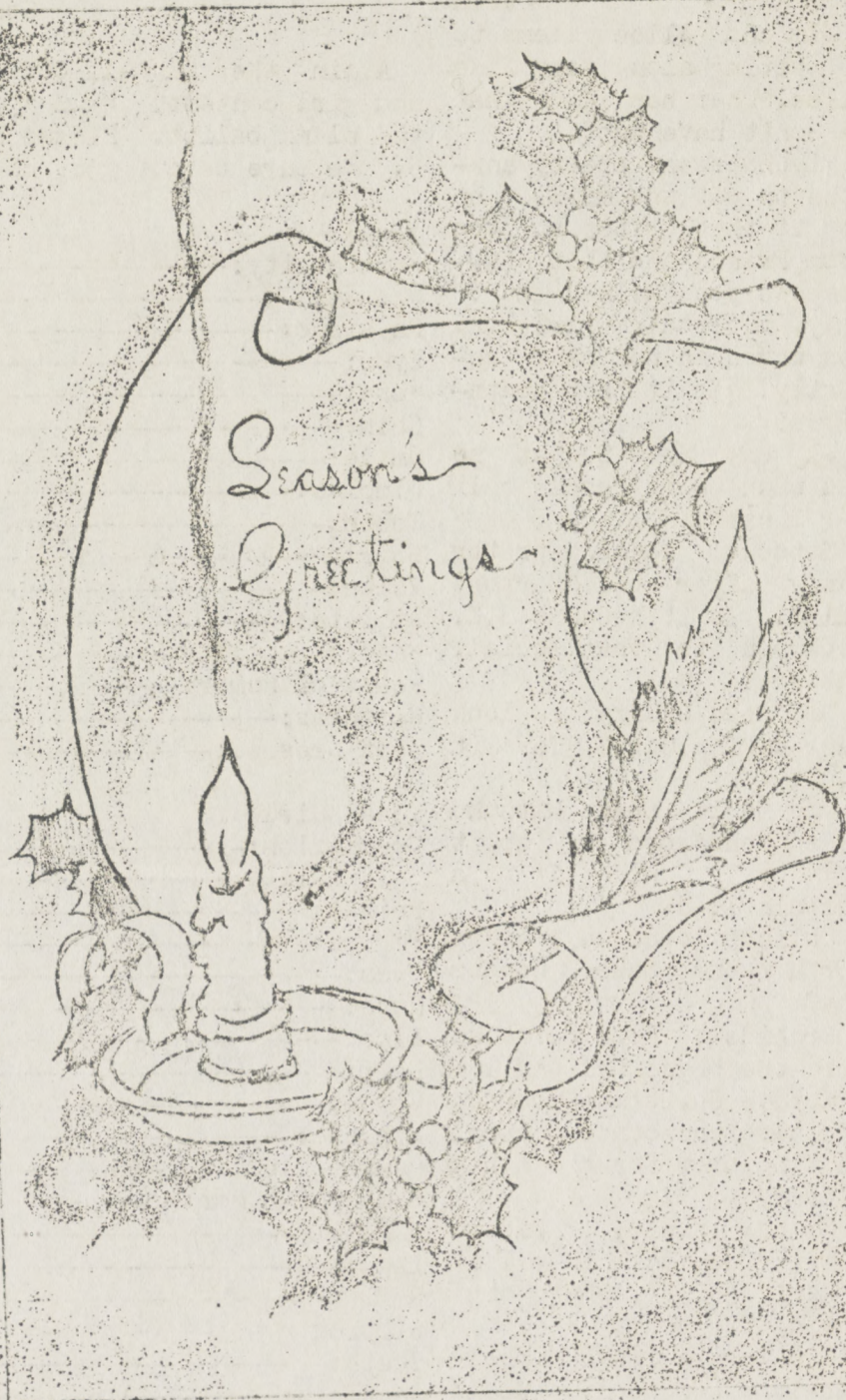
## BODINE SPEAKS HERE

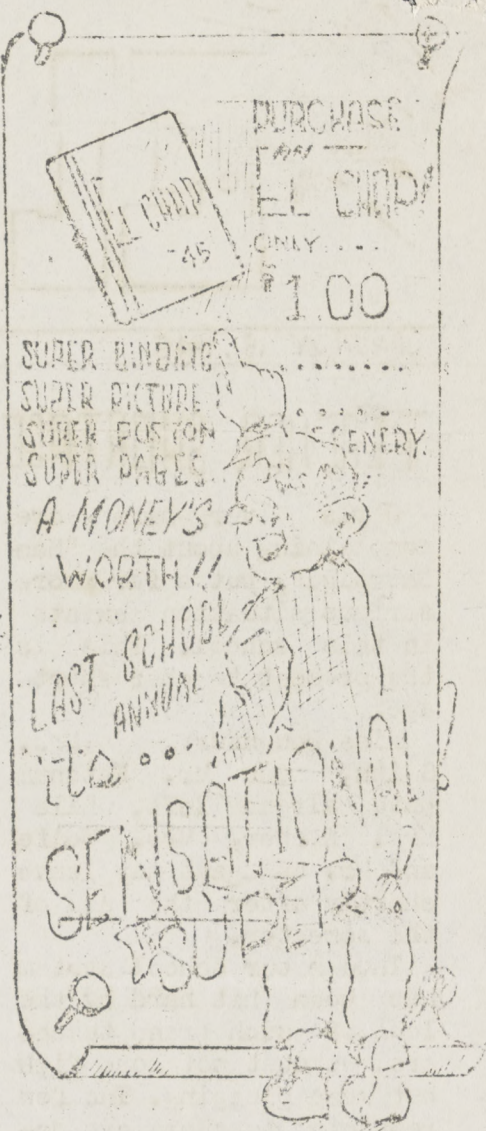
#### CHARGE ON COLORED BULBS

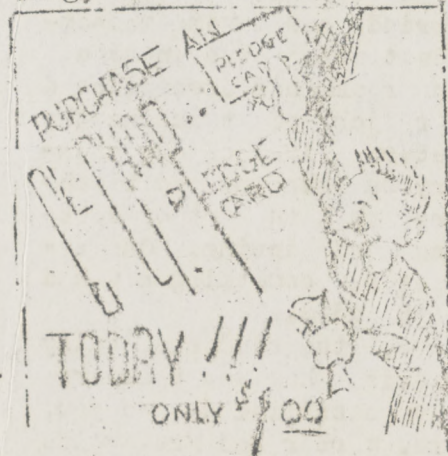

Due to the large number of seniors who have dropped core at the end of the first semester, the 1st and 2nd period class has combined with the 5th and 6th period core class.

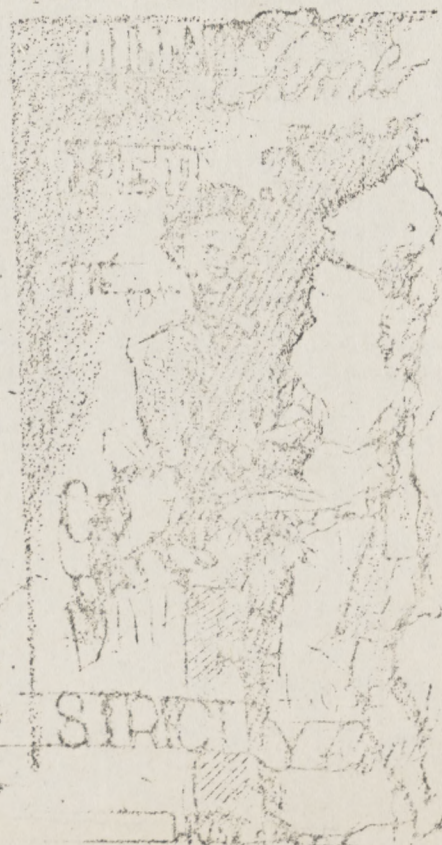

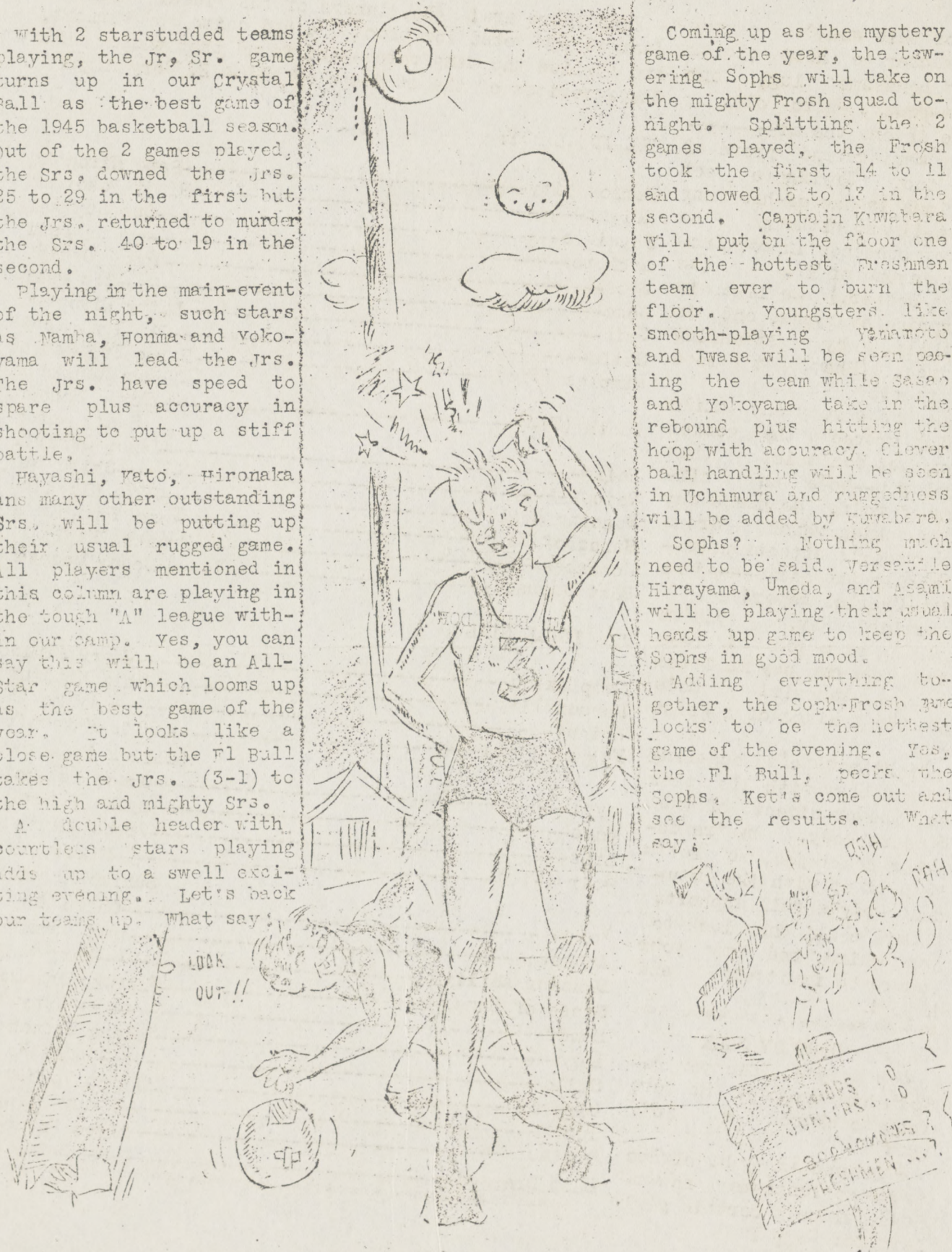

Since then many things have taken place. I left for overseas duty with the 442nd Inf. Com at Team. We fought up thru Italy with the 34th Div. (the red fighting bull head). Yes, I never knew there could be such a thing that's so terrible as war. I shall never forget my first day in action. I never felt so sick in all my life.

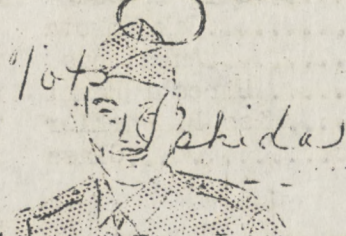

## Right Way
