Subject: Survey or Progress of "Service Stations for Voluntary Evacuation of Japanese"

Accompanied by Mr. Edward Bates of the Social Security office of San Francisco, I visited the Oakland office of the United States Employment Service today. The primary purpose of the visit was to determine the volume of Japanese who are availing themselves of the services provided by the Federal Government under the voluntary evacuation system. You will recall that the Wartime Civilian Control Authority branch of the Army created "three-man" teams to be established in the Employment Service offices throughout the Pacific Coast, to handle problems arising from the evacuation and to afford the Japanese a chance to settle their affairs in an orderly fashion prior to the deadline set for the voluntary migration.

Based on the visit to the Oakland office and telephone interviews conducted by the manager of the Oakland office with Employment Offices at Berkeley, Alameda and Hayward, my definite opinion is that the voluntary migration to date is negligible. This opinion was further supported by the statistics from the border checking stations, copies of which I have already filed with you by telegram.

In each instance the report was the same: the volume was ten to fifteen interview a day at the outside. The matter has been well publicized in the papers and on the radio, and since 48 hours had elapsed since the issuance of the press release announcing the service centers, it was reasonable to assume that a greater volume could have been expected had the Japanese been moving out in large numbers.

The problems presented by those who did appear at the Employment Service offices were mainly in the following categories: requests for transportation assistance; questions as to special cases (a) pregnancy, (b) defective children, (c) aged or invalid parents--including bedridden parents.

According to the Social Security Board interviewer (of the three-man team), the main request was for information as to available areas to which voluntary evacuation might be made. Second, were requests for more adequate information on disposition of property.

Comment: Summarizing, Mr. Bates, in a telephone interview with offices on the San Francisco side later in the day obtained the same impression from those in charge of the work on the San Francisco side of the Bay. There apparently will be no concerted move to use these services until the Army has declared a deadline. Judging from experiences of those in charge of the work at the service centers, a major stumbling block to the voluntary evacuation is the inability of the individual families to make a choice of relocation because of either insufficient information regarding new sites, failure to dispose of property satisfactorily, or general inclination to stay together as a group.

In this connection the Associated Press reported today from Seattle in a brief dispatch that Mr. James Sakamoto had stated that the Japanese colony in his city desired to migrate as a group to a point in Eastern Washington, a point undesignated in the press dispatch. The same report was conveyed to me in the statement of the manager of the U.S.E.S. at Hayward.

Subject: Interview with Mr. Saburo Kido and Mr. Larry Tajiri, Japanese-American Citizens League, 1623 Webster St., San Francisco, March 20

I interviewed Mr. Kido in an effort to obtain further particulars concerning the reports/~~h~~ that the Japanese were not availing themselves in any appreciable numbers of the offer to migrate voluntarily, but were awaiting a definite deadline from the Army. Mr. Kido, who, as you will remember, was appointed chairman of the emergency council of the Japanese-American Citizens League to work with the Army in the matter of evacuation and resettlement of the Japanese people, stated the League had been advising their people to await definite word from the Army regarding a deadline before they moved.

Mr. Kido, supported by Mr. Tajiri, stated the following reasons for this action:

(a) It is human nature to avoid a decision such as is involved in the present situation ~~f~~ for the Japanese. Therefore, there has been hesitancy on the part of the people to leave their communities.

(b) The principal reason for the failure of the Japanese to move is that there is no indication that any great number of employment opportunities await them wherever they may go. Widespread publication of the undesirable character of the Japanese has, of course, preceded them to the inland areas and the several "scouting parties" sent out by the JACL to survey agricultural land have not been to encouraging to date. Those of the Japanese who have agricultural experience and desire to relocate on farm land are unwilling to take the status of day laborers and prefer to make arrangements for ownership or leasing of land. Thus far, they have met with little or no success in these attempts.

(c) The Japanese remain willing to go, but look to the Government for an over-all resettlement and relocation policy. Very few have left of their own accord for the reasons indicated above and Mr. Kido and Mr. Tajiri were very apprehensive of the results of a sudden evacuation deadline. They stated that the efforts of the Evacuee Property Disposition at the Federal Reserve Bank had been aimed thus far largely at attempts to liquidate holdings without particular reference to equitable settlement.

Mr. Tajiri displayed a copy of the orders issued by the Western Defense Command for the Monday evacuation. These orders limited personal effects to a bare minimum, and Mr. Tajiri wanted to know if the same procedure would prevail in the event of a forced evacuation. I said I could not speak for the military, but that I presumed from the public statements of General DeWitt that such would be the case. In this event, said Mr. Tajiri, the matter of storage of such items as refrigerators, pianos, automobiles, and other items of real property which could not be moved, would become most important. He wanted to know whether the Japanese who would be sent to such stations as the Owens Valley center would be then permitted, upon relocation, to send for their personal effects.

Comment: Some of the matters noted above I hope to be able to take up with Mr. Towhy on my return from Los Angeles.

Further, the JACL has only recently begun an occupational survey of their people. Mr. Kido said he was informed in his first conference with Mr. Clark that this information would not be required of the JACL because it would be handled by the government agency in charge of resettlement. He said he was told a few days later in Los Angeles by Mr. Clark that the information was required and was asked to obtain it as soon as possible.

As far as I can determine the Maryknoll Fathers survey is about the only piece of statistical information along these lines available at the present time. The Maryknoll Fathers are playing a major part in this first evacuation.

SUBJECT: Service Control Center at 1701 Van Ness Ave.

The following information was obtained from talks with William Pierce, Assistant Director of the U. S. E. S. San Francisco office, who is now in charge of the ~~Service Control~~ Center and any others in the northern California area which may be opened; Mr. Bryant, regional U. S. E. S. head; and William Shaunessey, assistant to Bryant.

I stopped in at the Center today (April 2), the first day of its operation. Pierce was on hand to see that the office was properly set up and carrying out its function.

The Center has a staff of social workers, employed by the Federal Security Agency, who do the primary interviewing. The Center, at present, is dealing only with Japanese (citizen or alien) who live in the Fifth Evacuation Area and are to be moved this week. About 1,000 persons are affected.

The Japanese weretold to have the heads of their families or other representative of the family appear today. The Center expected about 300 to 350 persons to appear and that number seemed to be a good guess.

As the Japanese comes in, he is assigned to a social worker who first fills out the Routing and Control Slip (exhibit A, attached). If he desires help in any of the categories listed under Services Requested he is referred to a representative of the proper agency who is present in the Center office. With the help of the social

worker , the Japanese fills out the general form (exhibit B, attached) and, if he has an automobile, the Motor Vehicle Registration Form (exhibit C, attached) or, if he has personal property that he wants stored by the Federal Reserve, the Personal Property Form (exhibit D, attached).

He is then given a brief medical examination for the purpose of discovering cases of communicable or infectious disease and preventing their spread.

Beginning late this afternoon and continuing for several days, the families will come in for their examinations.

On a day not yet definitely decided, the Japanese will be notified to appear at a designated meeting place (also not yet decided upon) to entrain for a reception center (which one also not decided, but probably Manzanar). A special train will be provided for transportation, paid for by the government. Food for the journey, two sandwiches, an apple or orange and a half pint of milk, will also be provided.

Authorities at the Center believe that the move will be made Sunday, April 5.

Persons who are ill and cannot make the trip will be hospitalized at government expense, probably to rejoin their families when they are able to.

In addition to the officials, I talked to a few of the Japanese who were waiting to be interviewed. I wanted to listen to a few of the interviews, but the Army had ruled that no "caucasians" were to be allowed to sit in on the interviews.

Two young girls, fairly recent graduates of a local high school, now in domestic service, were principally worried about the possibility of the breaking up of families because of the piecemeal evacuation. They wanted to know if exceptions couldn't be made so that individuals who lived outside the zone to be evacuated immediately couldn't go along with their families who lived in the zone. They were also concerned about the kind of work that would be found for them to do, and anxious to get some suitable work as soon as possible.

Most of the Japanese at the Center to whom I talked seemed entirely resigned to the necessity of moving, and in general to the manner in which the actual moving was to be done. Their chief worries came from the scarcity of information about where and when they were going and what was to be done with them once they reached the Reception Center. They are not quite convinced that the Reception Center won't be some form of concentration camp, dressed up, but nonetheless a concentration camp. They are also worried about their belongings.

Visit to "Japanese-town" (Between Fillmore and Van Ness, California and Geary in S.F.)

The streets were bare of people. The only autos on the streets were with white operators. The first thing one notices was the vacant looking apartment houses--windows open and bare of curtains. The next thing, walking up Geary st.--one notices were cartons, boxes and furniture on the sidewalks in front of closed shops. The shops were all closed and empty. There was one exception, a small grocery store, with a "For Sale" sign on it, selling out all their stock, now almost bare. Turning the corner into a more residential section, one saw lines of moving vans, which in reality were operated by junk dealers. One junk dealer was cruising down the street at a slow pace yelling "Buy Junk". The only Jap. person on the streets with the dealers was one young boy with whom we stopped and spoke:

Q: Why are they selling this to junk dealers, and not giving it over to the FRB custodian?

A: Mainly because they don't secure the property. They might as well have the money as leave it someplace where it might not be safe.

Q: How much are they selling this stuff for?

There was a washing machine, small grand piano, three bed springs, three inner spring mattresses, a dresser, a cupboard, some wicker furniture, and other small odds and ends)

A: \$100 for all of it.

Q: Did they have it appraised or take the first junk-dealer's offer?

A: They take whatever they're offered.

All families along the street seemed to have been doing this as I counted five vans parked in two blocks. Others had their stuff carted up and waiting to be taken. One little old Jap. lady was signalling from the top of the steps for a junk dealer to come over to her place.

I stopped and talked with a Jap. University Student (ex) who with his wife was in the process of packing. I asked him if he intended to sell out like this. He answered that he might as well, since money was needed and there was no use hanging on to it---a lot of it being really "junk". I asked him why the people were not availing themselves of the FRB custodian. Like the other young man he answered that it was not insured and no telling what might happen to it so better to sell it while still possible. His wife called to him to come help her pack so he hurried off.

Next, we went into the Am. Jap. headquarters. Waiting a short while, one of the boys who works there came in and told us that the 6th Ev. Order had been issued. An old Jap. man, grinning, and a child rushed in from the street saying they had heard there was a new order--was it their's. When the answer was no, he indicated relief. I said "Feel better?" He laughed and answered "Much better, had me worried".

Lunch.

First thing we did was to see Dr. Mills, who told us several things:

1. The Wartime Farm Emergency has field reporters who were secured through the local Employment services. Of course, the FRB has their men in the field. The FSA men report the daily transactions of property to the main office. Their records are in numbers and do not have case studies. The only possible case records that exist are those which may be legal records. But if any transaction is made through Power-of-Attorney there will be no record.
2. Several vested interests in Calif. have formed organizations to take over evacuated land, whether by sale or lease is unknown. These organizations have men in the field doing the buying, leasing, etc. as fast as they can. This may have implications (such as massing of land into the hands of the Associated Farmers--admitted by Dr. Mills) which should be looked into by those working on the Property-Economic effects. This is only the rural side of the property picture. A record of types, at least, of transactions should be obtained before these records are lost.
 - a. I suggest contacting the buying organizations such as The California Poultry Association, The Frutigrowers of S.C. and perhaps even the Associated farmers.
 - b. The legal records, whatever they may be, such as sales of property may be gotten from the local govt. agencies, and this should be done before they are lost in the mass of data sent into state offices.
 - c. There is definite need for a member of our organ. to go into the field and contact these buying agencies and make some estimates on types of transactions.
3. In Los Angeles, Dr. Mills said, there have been reported cases of junk dealers going into vacated homes and taking what they wanted--this is the urban side of the property which must be gone into immediately. Naturally, this can only be done by observation. By contacting junk dealers some sort of estimates may be formed on the extent to which the aliens are disposing of their property by this method.

Notes for April 16, 1942 Trip to San Francisco

First went to see Norene Aubrey at the Social Security office/ She called Mr. Diehl for a list of the assembly centers for me. She had no copy of them in the SS office. Mr. Diehl works under Mr. Nicholson, who is in charge of the Reception centers. (He was formerly Regional Director of the WPA with headquarters in Salt Lake City) His office is in the Whitcomb Hotel. Miss Aubrey got the list over the phone and had copies typed for us and for the SS.

Next called on Dr. Schmid and H. Finn at the WCC office in the Whitcomb Hotel. Dr. Schmid gave me copies of the WCC press releases and advised me to see Captain Sinnott (floor 4) for back copies and to put our name on the mailing list. So far as the Reception Centers, he said that he had been working on the plotting of these. Two are certain (Manzanar and Parker Dam area) several others are being planned on, others are in the "dealing" stage, since they have to make arrangements for the proper land. He could not tell me the names of other than the two above (later at Mr. Kinai's office I found the paper had published (News) information on two rec. centers in Arizona---one being in the Parker Dam area; this information had been released thru the Press Relations Office of the WCC in its next day's release) Dr. Schmid said that at present the plans seem to be that these reception centers shall be permanent, rather than another move into a relocation area. I asked Mr. Finn if he knew of any of the material given to the WCC by Nobi Tackahashi. He said they had been working with some of it---agricultural material, although most of it is census material. He did not know about this material on Farm ownership and acreage that N. T. has. I went down to Captain Sinnott's office, to put our name on their mailing list.

After some controversy about whether I should be allowed to have the material, Captain Sinnott's secretary (Capt. Sinnott was out of town) gave me all the back releases of the WCC and all the Proclamations and instructions to date. She put our name on the mailing list, requesting that I have DST

different localities. In addition, there is a growing tendency on the part of members of families, which have lived for years on farms, to migrate to the cities in search of work. This is particularly true of the younger males, who see little opportunity for advancement on farms.

In order to obtain a proper perspective of the agricultural labor problem, consideration must be given to the development of mining and other industries and their demand for labor.

³⁷
Regulations Governing Employment of Natives.— Before proceeding to analyse the extent of employment of Natives in industry generally, consideration will be given to some of the more important laws and regulations governing native employment. Some of these apply only to Natives employed in cities; others apply to employment in agriculture as well.

In the Transvaal and Orange Free State all Natives, except those in scheduled native areas, are required by law to carry identification passes when moving about in these provinces, whether in search of employment or otherwise. Provision is made for exemption of certain classes of Natives from the necessity of carrying passes. The number of exemptions, however, is low. In Natal, Natives

send in an official written request for the material. She told me that the Bureau of Public Admin. at Cal was the only place at Cal. getting these releases.

I went next to the Japanese section of the city. There everything seemed very quiet. The only people on the street were a few junkmen and children. The houses had vacant signs in the windows and there was a noticeable lack of curtains at every house. All stores were closed (with the exception of one corner grocery, which was trying to sell out).

At the JACL all was quite--the only one around was the Secretary.

I then went to the YMCA on Buchanan st. to see Mr. Kinai. He strikes me as being very intelligent, idealistic, and perhaps a little "Christian".

Our conversation took the vein of "What a shame, such confusion, what are you doing" by which I gathered little. I mentioned that Pres. Sproul was requesting other Universities to take over some of the Japanese students. While I at first thought Mr. Kinai was in favor of this, I soon began to gather that he had other ideas. His main conversation concerned the useage of Japanese leadership groups in the reception centers. He thought it a terrible waste that no provision had not been made to use the educated Japanese student to his fullest capacities in the RC. He further said that the way things were shaping up it looked as though the very individuals who should be at the RC were going to be treated on an individual basis (and because of their individual aspirations) and would be sent away to other Univers. etc. This he felt would be too bad since it would drain the leadership from the Japanese group. (He has something there) He said the only way to see that such a local leadership is allowed to flourish is through some definite policy. He has been trying to get some statement of such a policy, but says it is impossible to deal with the Army group. He is waiting for the ^{Eisenhower} Isenbauer group to take over. He considers Ade a very capable man---but thinks Couverly is a little willy-nilly.

Along the line of "who has the authority" he told me this story. The Bainbridge Island group of Japanese at Manzanar have some very capable people among them. They wrote the Y asking for some recreational material, kinder-

Combined Unskilled Labor Needs of South Africa

Mention has been made of the fact that agriculture competes with other branches of economic activity in South Africa for what may be regarded as a common pool of unskilled non-European labor. Except perhaps among the Asiatic and Colored populations there exist no special groups of agricultural laborers, like milkers, cotton pickers, or fruit pickers, as is found in the United States. Although large numbers of Natives live permanently on farms and acquire considerable skill as agricultural laborers, they are not debarred thereby from seeking employment in cities whenever they may so desire. There are no labor unions among Natives in either the cities or in the country. Native labor is regarded as being unskilled whether it is in the city or in the country. Farmers obtain part of their permanent labor, and most of their seasonal labor from nearby native locations and reserves, which also supply the unskilled labor required by the mining and manufacturing industries, commerce and transportation, and by European households for domestic employment. It is not uncommon for a Native to work in successive years in two or more of these spheres of activity, often in

garten materials, and books etc. The Y asked its various members for donations. Through Colonel Benstedten they were given permission to take it to Man. They Asked if an army truck could, but there was no provision for that they were told. So the group got a truck owned by some Japanese-Americans and got it cleared with the Army that they could drive the truck down there. The truck started out, gathering material at Palo Alto, Fresno, and on down the line. Meanwhile, the Army called Kinia and said to call the truck back, they had just heard from Mr. Triggs (Head of the RC at Mana.) and Mr. Kidwell (Head of Services at Manzanar) who said they could not admit the truck. So through telephoning they were able to intercept the truck en route and bring it back to S.F. Once back, they had no place to store some 1 or 2 tons of stuff. Mr. Diehl of the WPa and now on the Reception Center Authority told them they could store it at the WPA warehouse in S.F. until they could arrange to have an army truck take it out, since only army trucks were allowed in Manzanar. Now Mr. Kinai was trying to clear with the army to get the use of a truck.

Mr. K. gave me a copy of a letter he has sent out many people concerning the evacuation; also a copy of the memo he has issued to college students.

On the basis of size of plants and number of employees the concentration of industry is much greater than is indicated by the figures on location of plants, because the larger factories are usually located in the more important cities. Although the Cape Western and Port Elizabeth areas have less than half of all factories in the Cape Province, these two centers have nearly 70 per cent of all employees. Similarly, the Southern Transvaal area has 76 per cent of all factories in the Transvaal but nearly 92 per cent of all employees. It is interesting to note that nearly 65 per cent of all natives engaged in manufacturing in the Union are employed in the Transvaal. On the other hand, about 91 per cent of the Asiatics are employed in Natal and about 88 per cent of the Colored in the Cape Province.

4/17/42

Went out to Japan^{tpw} tpwn today. Just as quiet as the day before. Nothing unusual, except for a terribly strong deodorant, disinfectant smell along Buchanan st. for about four blocks. The people who owned the buildings~~may~~ have been disinfecting the apartments left empty by the vacating Japanese. The ever-present junk men were prowling the streets.

Went to the JACL where the only one I could find to talk with was the secretary, a young Nesei girl. I read a letter sent by one of the S.F. Evacuees to-(Paul letter) back to a friend at the JACL. His description was of Santa Anita which he describes as being perhaps better than their "original" destination. I asked the girl what the original meant. She said that when this bunch of Jap. left SF. (they were the group north of Sacramento st.) they thought they were going to Manzanar, but one hour before they left it was decided that they should go to Santa Anita. The letter described conditions as not being too bad. I asked the girl if she had heard otherwise. She said she had a letter from her girl friend from there who said that they were the fortunate ones who got in the barracks (that's where this boy who was writer of the letter was). She (the girl friend of the Sec.) had been put with some other young girls in the stalls---the horses' stalls at Santa Anita, and wrote that the mice and rats were a terrible thing. Otherwise, everything agreed with Paul's description. In this letter he states that the evacuees can take more than they can carry (this part was underlined in red, the letter being posted on the JACL bulletin board so all could read it.) I asked the Sec. what their policy would be concerning this. She said they were advising people to take enough to be comfortable, like curtains, rugs, little heaters etc---but to keep it within limits, lest the Army tighten up on it and make it more stringent for the next group.

I asked her if she knew the list of the Civil Control stations, where the people first go to register for evacuation. She said one could not get that, as there were to be no permanent places, but rather a more central location in each eva. center area was to be designated at the same time the eva. notice for that area came out.

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physical fitness, or suffering from social diseases, are rejected. In 1938 some 571,000 Natives were shown as employed in labor districts. Of these 144,000 were from the Cape Province, 72,000 from Natal, 130,000 from the Transvaal, 26,000 from the Orange Free State, 85,000 from the Basutoland, Bechuanaland, and Swaziland Protectorates, and 117,000 from Mozambique (Portuguese East Africa) and other areas.

The conditions above described do not apply to Colored persons and Asiatics. There is no restriction on the movement of Colored persons and they are subject to the same conditions as apply to European employment. The movement of Asiatics into the Union and between provinces is governed by the general immigration laws and the laws of each Province.

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The Mining Industry. South Africa is a country rich in minerals, especially the precious minerals. There is evidence that gold was mined in South Africa long before the country was settled by Europeans, and that the Natives used coal and iron in the manufacture of their crude implements. The commercial uses of these minerals, however, did not begin until during the second half of the Nineteenth Century. The first mining of copper ore from the Namaqualand district of the

I then went down to Chinatown. The first thing one noticed were the no. of completely empty, closed stores, with For Lease signs on them. The next thing noticeable were the Chinese Store signs on all other stores. There were but 3 Jap. stores still open for business-with sale signs on them and little stock left in them. Upon going in I found all white, or Chinese help. One of the salesgirls explained to me that no more did the Jap. work there as they were preparing to be evacuated/ On the stores that were closed were typed signs to their customers, reading mostly like this: Thank you for your kind patronage. When times are better we shall be back and can meet you, our friends, again.

Addition to talk with Sec. at JACL: I asked her about the rumor of inoculations for small pox etc. being done at the JACL. She said they had inoculated about 2000 people this last week---at a nominal fee. The fee (which is \$1 per head) is to cover the expenses of the doctors and the medicines which the JACL has brought in. I mentioned that I had thought the army was going to do this at the assembly points or at the civil control stations. He said they had done it to the first evacuated group at the civil control stations but it created an additional hardship since many were very sick en route. The JACL had thought they might help by doing the inoculations while they could still stay in their homes and rest. The army had given its permission. Further inoculations are to be given next week starting Monday--they expect about 2000 more. (Read Najima's notes on the conflict of stories here)

Dear Mr. Fryer:

At the request of Anthony Tarlock, District Evacuation Officer for Imperial Valley, I reported to El Centro on Tuesday, May 18th, and learned from Tarlock that many evacuees believed to have been farm operators had classified themselves as farm laborers, and consequently had not registered with Farm Security Agents on the regular registration days.

On the day appointed for medical examination, a local Japanese leader pointed out all the operators and brought them to our representative for registration.

The reluctance of the Japanese operators to admit their status can best be understood by reference to a typical case, which for the sake of brevity, will be called the Homano case.

On July 23rd, 1941, one Boxley, landowner, of Holtville, executed a written one year lease to George Hoshizaki of approximately 75 acres of farm land. There is some doubt as to whether George Hoshizaki or his brother Frank Hoshizaki actually signed the name of George Hoshizaki to the lease.

A Japanese alien by the name of Homano actually took possession of, worked, and planted the land approximately as follows:

1. 30 to 35 acres of carrots which were plowed under in December, 1941, and planted to late cantaloupes (not yet harvested).
2. 30 acres of early lettuce (harvested).
3. 5 acres of tomatoes (harvested).
4. 10 acres of late lettuce (harvested).

On December 17th, 1941, Homano gave a crop mortgage to one Honda who is at present in the U. S. Army. The money was to secure the payment of \$2,250 borrowed either from Honda or one Takanaki. Takanaki, an alien Japanese, was given Honda's power of attorney to collect the money. The mortgage was recorded on February 17th, 1942.

On February 16th, 1942, the Board of Supervisors of Imperial County enacted County Ordinance no. 154, which I am enclosing for your inspection. The purported purpose of the Ordinance was to "Put Teeth in the Alien Land Law," and safeguard the military and civil property in the County. You will notice that section 14 of this Ordinance prohibits the transportation by enemy aliens of food or farm products or crops upon the public highways of the County. This indicated that the Ordinance was aimed at Japanese farmers.

Subsequent to the passage of the Ordinance, the District Attorney called all Japanese alien farmers into his office and took statements from the Japanese as to the positions they occupied on the farm lands. We are informed that farm operators in many cases signed statements that they were farm laborers. Leases were surrendered by Japanese farmers to the District Attorney. We were informed by one reliable Japanese leader that the District Attorney's office advised a Caucasian farmer that no Japanese alien or citizen could work on a farm.

In the Homano case, both Hoshizakis gave signed statements to the District Attorney that they had no interest in the crops and desired to be released from the lease.

Hoshizaki refused to admit his signature on the lease, perhaps for fear of violation of Alien Land Law, and that there was some talk of prosecuting Frank Hoshizaki for forgery of his brother's name.

Whitelaw, attorney for Boxley, stated that the District Attorney has obtained a signed statement from Homano that he had no interest in the crops and was working for only 40¢ per hour. The District Attorney told me that he had obtained such a statement, but that such was not signed.

The District Attorney then advised Boxley that Homano had no interest in the crop and that he, Boxley, should sell the crop. Homano had a prospective purchaser who tendered the not yet due rent to Boxley, who refused to accept it. The crop was sold by Boxley to one K. K. Sharpe, for \$1,700. Sharpe also purchased the land. Homano, Honda, or Takanaki has received nothing, as yet, from the crop. Sharpe harvested the lettuce, and he will harvest the cantaloups.

We talked to Boxley and learned from him that Homano had worked the land, planted the crops, was an excellent farmer and, without doubt, the tenant in possession.

Sharpe's attorney, Roberts, informed us that Sharpe purchased from Boxley with the understanding that the crops and land were free and clear of all encumbrances, but subsequently learned of the crop mortgage.

The Japanese interests are represented by an Attorney Horton, who feels that the Japanese were "pushed around" and intimidated by the District Attorney's office.

We called on the District Attorney who was away in San Francisco, but his Deputy advised us that the office had been "very fair" with the Japanese farmers. He refused, however, to get out his file and go into the Homano case and the County Clerk refused to show us the minutes of the Board of Supervisors (Public Records) for the meeting at which Ordinance no. 154 was enacted.

After much discussion both Sharpe's attorney and Boxley indicated a willingness to settle the matter and the attorney for the Japanese appreciated our efforts. The facilities of the local Field Agent will be used to close the case; however, it should be followed up.

The matter has been reported in detail so that you might see the reluctance of Japanese operators to admit their status to our agents.

Had it not been for the intervention of the W.C.C.A. Program in Imperial County, no doubt wholesale prosecutions for conspiracy to violate the Alien Law would have taken place, with resulting loss of many crops and much equipment. The innocent as well as guilty would have suffered great hardships.

The Japanese interests are represented by an Attorney Horton, who feels that the Japanese were "pushed around" and intimidated by the District Attorney's office.

We called on the District Attorney who was away in San Francisco, but his Deputy advised us that the office had been "very fair" with the Japanese farmers. He refused, however, to get out his file and go into the Homano case and the County Clerk refused to show us the minutes of the Board of Supervisors (Public Records) for the meeting at which Ordinance no. 154 was enacted.

After much discussion both Sharpe's attorney and Boxley indicated a willingness to settle the matter and the attorney for the Japanese appreciated our efforts. The facilities of the local Field Agent will be used to close the case; however, it should be followed up.

The matter has been reported in detail so that you might see the reluctance of Japanese operators to admit their status to our agents.

1. Reference is made to the agreement between the Wartime Civil Control Administration and the War Relocation Authority that the latter agency would assume financial and custodial responsibility for hospitalized and institutionalized persons of Japanese ancestry in Military Areas 1 and 2 in accordance with the following schedule:

a. Financial responsibility.

- (1) As of September 1, 1942, for all persons of Japanese ancestry hospitalized or institutionalized in the states of Washington, Oregon, Arizona and the entire state of California, with the exception of those counties listed in sub-paragraphs 2 and 3.
- (2) As of October 1, 1942, for San Mateo, San Francisco and Merced counties, California.
- (3) As of November 1, 1942, for San Joaquin, Madera, Fresno, San Bernardino, Los Angeles, Orange and Riverside counties, California.

b. Custodial responsibility.

- (1) Effective at such time as lists designating the name and location of each person effected have been furnished the War Relocation Authority.

2. Inclosed herewith are lists, in duplicate, furnished by the United States Public Health Service, designating the name and location of each person of Japanese ancestry now institutionalized in the areas specified in paragraphs 1 a. (1) above, for whom the War Relocation Authority assumed financial responsibility on September 1, 1942, except as noted thereon.

3. The inclosed lists are complete and final for all institutions within the areas effected, except for the Oregon State Hospital at Salem,

Oregon. A list of all Japanese patients in that institution is inclosed, but the Federal responsibility for the maintenance of these patients is still in the process of determination. This additional data will be submitted as soon as it is obtained.

4. Custodial responsibility for hospitalized and institutionalized persons of Japanese ancestry within the areas specified in paragraph 1 a. (1) above will pass to the War Relocation Authority at 12:01 A.M., October 4, 1942, in accordance with the agreement hereinabove mentioned.

5. Persons of Japanese ancestry, hospitalized and institutionalized within Military Area No. 1 and the California portion of Military Area No. 2, will continue to be subject to all regulations promulgated by the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, governing such persons. For your information and compliance the following regulations govern transfer and movement of persons of Japanese ancestry within the military areas mentioned:

- a. At the time of movement the person involved shall fill out and mail a Change of Residence Report Card - Form WDC PM-1. These forms will be furnished to WRA by this office.
- b. No transfer shall be accomplished involving any travel within, into or from Military Area No. 1 or the California portion of Military Area No. 2. except upon a travel permit issued by this office which shall contain the following information and conditions:
 - (1) Name, age, sex, present address and alien registration number, if any, of the transferee.
 - (2) The destination of the transferee.
 - (3) The date on or before which evacuee's travel will be completed.
 - (4) The means of travel.
 - (5) A condition that all travel shall be in the immediate company of a W.R.A. escort.
 - (6) A condition that upon arrival at any W.R.A. Project the permit shall be indorsed by the Project Director showing the date of arrival of the transferee and the permit shall immediately thereafter be returned to this office for cancellation.
 - (7) A condition that the permit shall not be copied, reproduced, or altered in any manner.


