

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES

1. Classes have been held weekly for diabetic patients who have been referred by the doctors for instruction in urine testing. On the following week the patients have given return demonstrations. An evacuee who is a diabetic volunteered his services as an interpreter and has been helpful both as an interpreter and in getting patients interested in attending the class.
2. Twice during Dr. Neher's absence the prenatal clinic visits were taken over by the nurse. At other prenatal clinics patients were seen in the clinic and an effort made to discuss with them any problems they might have. Due to the lack of a quiet, private place for conferences these visits are not too successful.
3. On two days when the hospital nursing staff was at a minimum, the injection clinic was taken over and the rest of the day was spent on the floors.
4. Histories of all the babies attending the Well-Baby clinic were taken.
5. Several conferences were held with the school appointed personnel to discuss with them the means of preventing the spread of communicable diseases--especially influenza which has been prevalent this month.
6. The School Health Council held its second organization meeting and the Public Health Nurse was appointed secretary.
7. Fluoroscoping of mess hall worker continues.

## Additional Activities

- At the Hunt High School's request, two Nurses' Aides were assigned to the school Health Room. The Aides were trained by and were under the supervision of the Public Health Nurse and the Head of the Physical Education Department, Mr. Roth. The Aides are high school students who are attending school part time and had been working part time at the hospital under the Vocational Education Program. Their duties consist of giving first aid in cases of accident and illness and checking students returning from absences due to sickness. Records of all cases seen are made and filed in the School Office. The school feels that this is a worthwhile program and wishes it to be continued. From January 11 to January 28, 346 pupils were seen by the Nurses' Aides.
- Arrangements were made for the fluoroscoping of the entire teaching personnel. Fluoroscoping of Mess Hall workers continues.
- Twice during the Obstetrical Physician's absence, the prenatal patients were seen by the Public Health Nurse.
- "Sugar Classes" for diabetic patients and assisting the Doctor in the Well-Baby Clinic continue.

## Additional Activities

1. Demonstration baths for the instruction of Mothers of new babies being discharged from the hospital were started. It has been possible to keep the equipment necessary for the demonstrations in a room off of the Maternity Ward and the nurse is notified by the Ward Secretary when there are several patients able to attend a demonstration. In giving the sponge bath many phases of infant care are brought up for discussion. The importance of a good post-partum regime is also stressed. At times it is impossible to make home visits to all post-partum patients and in this way all patients being discharged from the Maternity Ward are given some help in the care of their infants. Home visits are still made to as many of the post-partum patients as time permits.
2. The activities of the previous months are still being carried on.
3. Two evacuee teachers from Stafford and Huntville Grade Schools were taught how to take temperatures and given first aid supplies to be used for minor injuries.

## Additional Activities

1. For six weeks during February and March during the Medical Social Worker's absence, that part of her work which had to be taken care of immediately was taken over by the Public Health Nurse.
2. Arrangements were made for taking fourteen (14) crippled children into the Twin Falls Crippled Children's Clinic. On March 30 and on March 31, three adults were taken into Twin Falls to see Dr. Burton as private patients.
3. At the suggestion of Mrs. Evans, a class was held to give instructions to diabetic patients in the taking of their own insulin. The purpose of this was to relieve the hospital nurses of having to give insulin to patients who are living on the project but eat at the hospital. General instructions were given but the plan did not work through as was anticipated as the hospital nurses did not have time to supervise the patients in taking their own insulin during the learning period at 7:30 A.M. The patients who also got insulin later in the day were not able to take their own because of individual problems.
4. Due to the discontinuance of the Vocation Education Program and the shortage of full time nurses aides, it has not been possible to keep nurses aides in the High School Health Room. Mr. Roth is continuing to see students in the Health Room before admitting them to class after absences due to illness.

Additional Activities

1. Routine blood testing for syphilis was started for all Food Handlers. About 75 Mess Hall Employees came to the O.P.D. once a week to have blood taken. The blood is sent to the Twin Falls Laboratory for testing. A Food Handlers' file was started which will be a record of the results of these blood tests and fluoroscopy examination and will be used in making annual appointments for future examinations.
2. Assisted the Medical Social Worker in making arrangements for psychometric testing of five children by Dr. Davis of Boise.
3. Assisted Dr. Neher in reviewing the cases of residents in the Semi-invalid Quarters. Several residents were found to be well enough to be moved into bachelor quarters if the present Semi-invalid Quarters becomes crowded. The care-taker was urged to report patients needing medical attention to the Public Health Nurse. It would seem that monthly visits by the Public Health Nurse to the Semi-invalid Quarters is indicated.

## Additional Activities

1. Assisted the Medical Social Worker in planning and setting up an Eye Screening Program as a means of determining appointments for refractions being done by an Optometrist. As it is not known how long the Optometrist's services will be available, it seemed advisable to have those persons seen first who needed refractions the most. About one half of the appointments are allocated to the schools. Arrangements were made for the schools to do screening tests and send the names to us of those having 20/40 vision or less. From this list those having the poorest vision are given appointments first. An evacuee was trained to determine the visual acuity with the Snellen Chart and to obtain as much history as possible. The records are then checked by the Nurse and Medical Social Worker and appointments sent.
2. Arrangements were made for the Dick testing and Scarlet Fever Immunization of the pupils in Grade I at Huntville School as a child from that grade was hospitalized with Scarlet Fever. Children in the block with whom he played were also brought in for testing and immunization.
3. This month there has been a slight increase in communicable diseases.
4. One Prenatal and one Well-Baby Clinic were taken over the the Nurse in the Doctor's absence.
