My dear Mrs. Kingman:

I have your telegram dated January 1st, but you have not indicated in it the date for your conference. Mr. Hermann Hagedorn, a friend of mine, who was in the office yesterday told me that he had been invited and gave me the date. It so happens that I shall be in New York City at that time. I regret very much that I cannot join you and Mr. Galen Fisher in a review of our West Coast strategy.

Both of you know what a profound interest I have in the coordination of our several programs, so that there will be the minimum of lost effort and the maximum of community service with reference to the disturbing intercultural conflicts in our midst. I have been in several sections of the Pacific Coast area recently, including Seattle. Everywhere I have gone I have found leaders in city councils, police, labor, church, school and the like anxious to do something that will really count, but at a loss to know what the wisest procedures are in community group planning. I therefore recommended to Chancellor Deutsch at the University of Berkeley that President Sproul call a West Coast conference of key leaders to compare notes with reference to their community problems and ways and means for dealing more intelligently with them. A letter from Dr. Deutsch suggests that I see J. Harold Williams at U.C.L.A., who is in charge of University Institutes. Dr. Deutsch gave the suggestion his hearty endorsement and hopes the University will set up such a program. I shall see Dr. Williams on the earliest occasion possible.

It strikes me that your group might consider the advisability of ^{supporting} such conferences, and if you are disposed to believe that it would serve an important purpose, you might join me in making such a recommendation to Dr. Williams.

I have one other suggestion to relay to your meeting. That is with reference to the functions of our respective agencies that are working in the field of inter-racial and intercultural tensions. As I see it, virtually all of the agencies on the West Coast, with the exception of our Bureau, are chiefly concerned with what may be regarded as the "social action" approach to these issues. I believe there is a measure of distinction in our Bureau's function in that we specialize in the field of formal education. Besides our educational approach is directed chiefly

to the younger generation through the public schools. In so far as your ~~Committee~~ and other agencies do have an interest in education, ~~they will~~ contribute chiefly to informal types of adult education, ~~We~~ all believe that we need both generations *emphases,* and that the technique of social action to meet emergencies and the method of education are complementary and associated in good planning. If this analysis is fair than your conference might like to review the general problem of methods and strategy and report back to the various agencies what, if any, changes or new coordinations are advisable, if we are to do our common job more effectively.

I repeat that I regret deeply that I cannot join your group when they address themselves to these related problems. I am sure you will do me the favor of providing me a record of the proceedings.

If you plan to be in Los Angeles in February, let me know so that we discuss our interests.

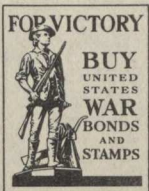
This is in reply to your letter of recent date, addressed to the Secretary of War, regarding the recent action of Major General Henry C. Pratt, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command rescinding the mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast.

The position of the War Department with respect to the mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast has been that it was undertaken for military reasons and that it would not be continued any longer than required by military necessity. The recent action of General Pratt was taken because of the favorable progress of the war in the Pacific and because, during the period of the mass exclusion, it has been possible to separate those persons of Japanese descent who are apt to be dangerous from those who are loyal to this country.

Dear Mrs. Kingman,

Thank you for your last special letter. Some quite adverse publicity has appeared in last night's paper - threats of violence by a group of men bringing a petition to our largest paper. But Dr. Ashley, Methodist minister, is heading a group to present a better solution. I will give all assistance possible.

One nice farmer has already sold out and returned to Boston this week. But Mr. S. Nitta, who was the leading man of this community, has been here this week and is returning home with his family next week. Dr. Ashley gave them a public welcome this morning in church. The elder son was well received - I heard no adverse comment.

I have been able to interest very few personally, but have kept on trying. A Mrs. Roy Corry told me this morning she had sent the Committee the ^{2.00} fee - long ago and has never heard from you. She is a very active outspoken lady - and of utmost value to us because her son was a pilot who was lost at Midway. She says these boys were her boy's friends and she will help

all she can. Her address is First & Sullivan
St. Santa Ana.

I also wrote 2234 Telegraph Ave about
a month ago and enclosed \$8.00 from some of my
misc friends. They had sent the money for flowers
for their mother's grave - but I had plenty of
Chrysanthemums and suggested the committee
get the money. No answer has come. I was ill
in bed then and couldn't get a post office order.
Hope it arrived. Mrs. Cory also wrote that address.

Dr. Sproul has been so helpful to me. The
Draft Board here still has not inducted my
young friend. Dr. Sproul contacted the War
Dept. last September. They notified National
Selective Service Oct 11 - On Oct. 26 National
notified State Selective - no other results -
Don't they have to call all men under 26? They
still have him listed as a 4-C - Perhaps the
larger calls - and the return to California may
cause the Board to change its mind. They claim
their rating is as of December 1942 - it was
up to them to bring it up to date.

Shall report on this next week's development -
I have kept quite still for months simply because
I did hope the Draft Board would change. But
one member is both a legimaine and a farm bureau
official - Hence the delay.

Please let Mrs. Cory & myself hear if you
received the money. Good luck - and many
thanks for your splendid work.





Recent material over radio and in editorials seems to be doing a good job of publicizing the facts about the loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry. I have another idea for doing it that I think might help form a civilized public opinion. My contacts with small farmers and country store business men shows me that much still needs to be done before we can hope those unfortunate citizens can return safely to their communities.

I would like to see a series of large advertisements in magazines and newspapers entitled "Have You Earned YOUR Citizenship". Then you could give examples of the heroism and sacrifice of some of the loyal Nisei & or other minority group members or naturalized citizens. You ~~xxxxx~~ might have something about what citizenship ~~xxxx~~ in this country means in tangible benefits. And then you could list ways for us to earn it -- bonds, blood donations, no black marketing.

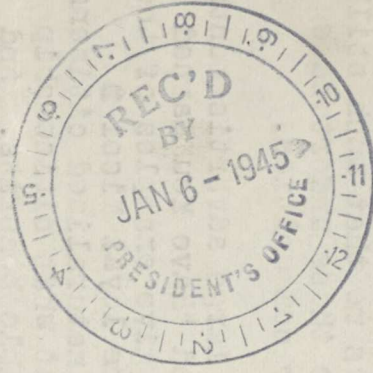

Thank you for the invitation to attend the very important conference in San Francisco. I talked the matter over rather fully with Dr. Farnham. He and I agreed that as several persons will attend from Southern California I should not go. I have heavy responsibilities here.

I am writing, therefore, to assure you that for many months I have been planning to be aggressive in aid to the Japanese, as soon as the War Department should act. I am, therefore, at your service to offer greater assistance than ever before. My Committee has already broadcasted both among our members and throughout the community the enclosed statement.

Next Monday we are considering some aspects of the return of the Japanese. We shall bring before the Committee the County Council to advise us regarding all local matters.

You may, therefore, count upon our Committee to use its influence to help returning Japanese in every possible way.

I have heard with much satisfaction that the Friends' Service Committee hopes to open a hostel where Japanese families can be temporarily entertained while they are making permanent arrangements.

Our Committee will do everything possible to mediate between Japanese and Negroes where their interests conflict regarding the occupancy of property.

This letter will not reach you before the Conference tomorrow, but I am writing to ask that you keep me on your mailing list of those who are informed of the conclusions your committee reaches from time to time about the resettlement of evacuees.

I received the invitation too late to free myself from tomorrow's engagements, but I believe so much in the approach of the committee to the problems, that I wish to thank you for the invitation and to express my regret that I shall not be able to attend the conference.

|| In my basement are the personal effects of two Japanese friends, from whom I received a note in November saying that the Government had just notified them that their only son, an American citizen, had been killed in Italy. The husband's part-time service as our gardener is now being done by an Italian, who told Mrs. White last week that his daughter had just had her tonsils removed, and he would have to work seventy-five hours at a dollar an hour to pay the surgeon! Will your committee please be a conscience for me and tell me infallibly what American principles and fair play require that I shall do under the circumstances?


