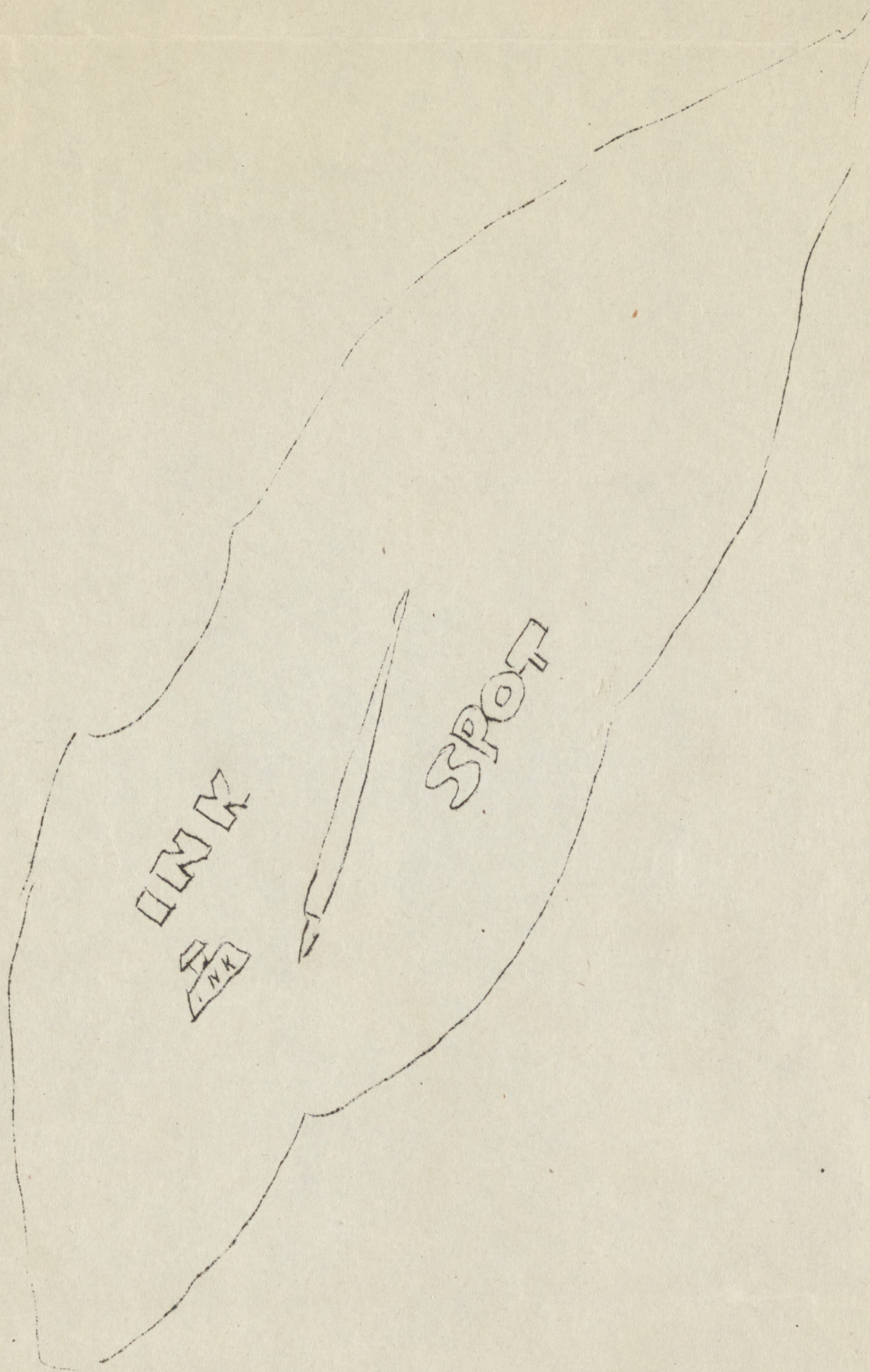


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MESSAGES FROM SCHOOL SUPERINTENDENT AND PRINCIPAL

AMACHE SR. HI-CO-OP PROBLEMS

AMACHE, COLORADO

1. Petty cash fund: At first we had the Treasurer make payments out of daily sales or cash for deposit. We found that this plan made it very difficult for her to prove cash each week. We established a Petty Cash fund of \$25 at first, and later reduced it to \$15, which was ample to take care of all cash payments. Whenever money was taken from the Petty Cash fund, it was okayed by one of the sponsors.
2. Check fund: At first we made all payments to the Consumers' Enterprise for goods by cash or to outside companies by money order. Later we found that it was much better to deposit our money in a near-by bank and make all payments to outside concerns, and to pay all large invoices by check. We found in doing this that we had a more adequate receipt, and that checking cash was simpler.
3. Protection of Money: The store was broken into and robbed of about \$30 in money and about \$50 in merchandise early in April. Previous to this, we had kept all cash for deposit locked in the store barrack room. Since that time, we have kept little or no money at night at the store. We have found a suitable place to keep this money locked for safe keeping.
4. Wages: At first the Board of Directors decided to pay four or five cents an hour for clerks and store managers. Later we found that since we were making sufficient profit and these wages were not enough inducement to draw many clerks, that it was advisable to double the wages. Along this same line, any work done without pay, such as, the work of the committee members, and the Board of Directors has an honor attached to make it attractive.
5. Responsibility for Management: During the time of the membership campaign, and during the first few weeks the store was open for business, most of the decisions were made by the sponsors. Gradually the sponsors shifted the responsibility to the students who were selected to be in charge. It was necessary for the sponsors to point out to the students that it was their store and their responsibility. Very soon they felt this responsibility and have been very capable in handling most decisions since that time.
6. Rebates or Share Profits: The auditing committee takes the responsibility of tabulating all purchases by members upon which their rebates will be based. We decided that it was simpler to issue rebates only at the end of each semester, since there was so much work connected with it.

7. Membership Number: In order to make our membership records easy, the membership committee sold a certain group of numbers to the faculty and another certain group to each class. This grouping of certain classes will enable us next year to sell the block of numbers which were withdrawn by the outgoing seniors, and let the other members retain their same numbers.
8. Bookkeeping System: We obtained a columnar journal, a ledger, and a book to record statements, which make up the major part of our bookkeeping set. We discovered that it was simpler to have the Treasurer be required to have advanced bookkeeping training, in order to be a candidate for office. The Treasurer takes full responsibility for keeping the books and making deposits and payments. With the help of the auditing committee, she had completed all bookkeeping processes.
9. Purchasing: When our store was first opened, we understood that we could purchase from some company outside the project. Later, we found that we must do all purchasing through the Community Enterprises, however, we could make recommendations as to the company from which certain goods could be purchased. The Community Enterprises allowed us a 30-day credit basis and we have very carefully adhered to this policy. We are now on a cash basis, and keep a stock of about \$250 at all times.



THE CORE CURRICULUM

March 6, 1945

I am inclined to think that one knows a core curriculum by certain practices which I should like to identify as follows:

1. The concern of the core curriculum is with problems rather than with subject-matter fields and these problems must be common (this is the meaning of core to me) to the majority of the class which studies them.
2. The problems should be broad enough to cut across subject-matter lines; that is they must call for knowledges, understandings, skills, appreciations, attitudes, interests, and habits which we have associated with English expression, social sciences, science, the arts, etc. This means that developing the skill of typing (taken by itself) is not an adequate area of learning for a core curriculum.
3. The problems chosen should be persistent and recurring in human experience; they may be problems of health, sanitation, housing, recreation, human relations, government, crime, family living, education, vocational adjustment or exploration, consumer problems, propaganda, labor movements and management, etc. They may be defined (and should be) in terms of the age level and interest of the class of pupils concerned.
4. The core curriculum should require and have larger blocks of time than the usual period in the school day. Two to three periods a day is the minimum. This allows for field trips, arts programs in which maps, charts, graphs, murals, and so forth can be enjoyed and created. This will allow time for the creation of plays, radio skits, newspapers, and other forms of activity in which the ideas of the curriculum are expressed.
5. The core curriculum should be cooperatively planned by pupils and teachers and cooperatively studied too. In this curriculum the teachers do not know all the answers before they even start out on the project!
6. The core curriculum should be planned by several teachers representing different subject fields; only in this way can the lacks in the experiences of individual teachers be compensated.
7. The curriculum should provide for experiences which give young people the opportunity to develop behavior characteristics significant for individuals living in a democratic society such as functional information, clear thinking, social sensitivity, appreciations, and creativeness, a disposition to participate with others in the solution of common problems, respect for personality and the like.
8. In selecting the activities to be undertaken there should be one central idea illuminating the program; this is illustrated in the list of problems in item 3, above.
9. The problems chosen for study should not make demands on pupils for highly technical skills which would necessitate an extensive period of study prior to the real work of the problem. Neither should the study require materials and equipment not readily available.
