Do you want to be a person that counts?

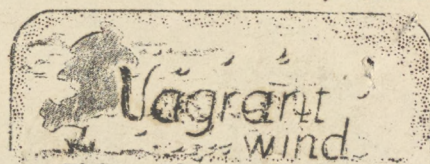

Shago Muraoka stated that two teams, block 8 & a team which calls itself the Pick-Ups wished to play football.

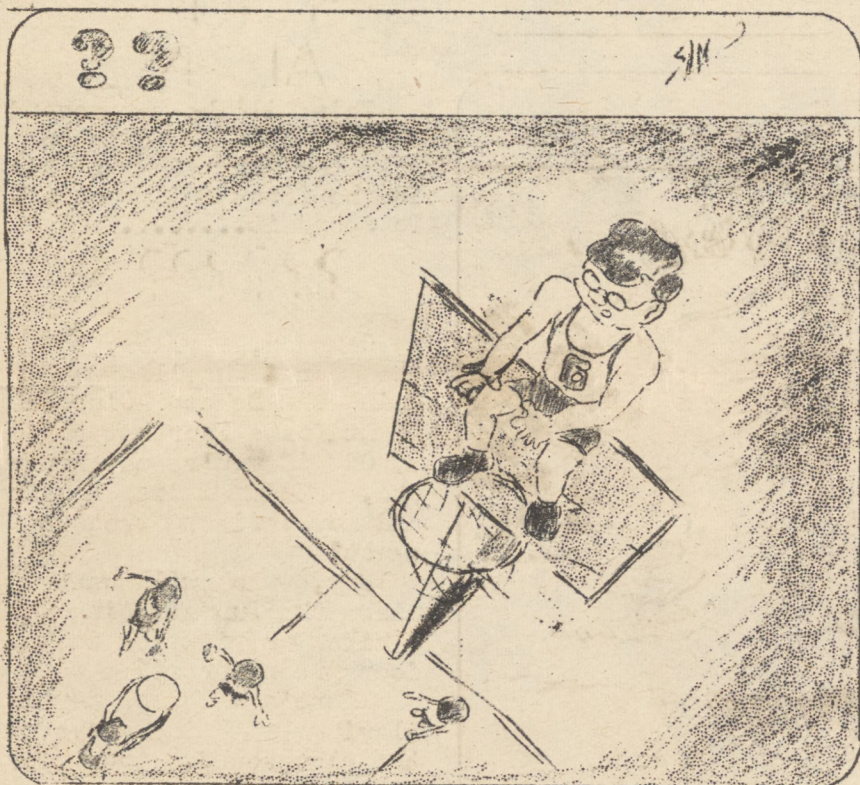

ADULT EDUCATION LARGEST PROGRAM HERE

The Adult Education Classes which were organized at the beginning of this term are continuing as usual. Since many men and women in the center are eager to learn to speak English, a number of English classes have recently been organized throughout the center. Others will start very soon. The emphasis in these classes is on speech and conversation. Some instructions will be given in reading and handwriting.

BIBLE SCHOOL

A Vocation Bible School for children between the ages of 4 and 12 years are in progress and will continue through June 17 under the sponsorship of R.F.C.C.

Classes are held each morning from 8:30 to 11 o'clock in P.S. Halls 2, 6, and 20. All children are invited to attend the class nearest them.

The program consists of singing, story hour, and handicrafts.

Teachers other than those in the center are Miss Janet Smith of Aichi College, a former missionary to Japan, and Miss Mary Ann Troy of Pine Bluff.

The Home Economics cottage at the high school is open to adult classes this summer. Two classes in foods are meeting there each morning. Many women who have not been inside a kitchen since evacuation are enjoying the opportunity to cook.

Beginning Monday, June 12, a room will be established in block 31, where instructions in handwriting will be given. Adults who want to write letters in English, may come to this room and learn to write. For further information inquire at 31-1-D.

The Adult Education program is probably the largest in the center. Much interest is manifested by the older folks. It is a great satisfaction to the youngsters to see their elders so interested.

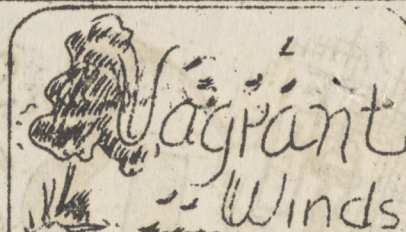
Editor

Do you know what a Teen-age Canteen is? What its purpose is? How it is to be run? What it would mean to this center? Do you think it is a good thing?

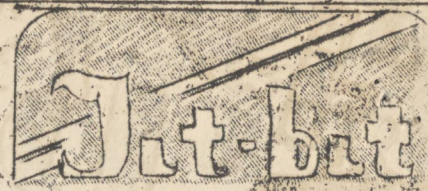
All who have given the matter any thought know that to put over anything concerned with the life of the children of this center the parents must first understand, then approve before any progress is made toward the desired goal.

WHAT'S SCOUTING?

So many wonder about this thing called Scouting. What does it do for you? How may one become a Scout?

Ever since 1910 when Scouting began, more than 75,000,000 boys and men have become Scouts. Why? Because the boys wanted it!

Suppose you stop a Scout and ask, "Tell me, what is Scouting?" His answer, with a smile is, "Scouting is fun!" As we bend over a boy busily preparing an outdoor meal and ask the same question, the boy's answer is, "Scouting is comradeship!"

Thus, the boys have explained their own activity, their game. To a boy, that is what Scouting is --- A game. A game full of laughter and play and something to keep him busy. A boy becomes a Scout for the fun there is in it.

But Scouting is also a purposeful game, a game with a purpose behind it; a game that develops character, that trains for citizenship through experience in the out-of-doors.

Character and citizenship - these are the aims of Scouting. They are also the aims toward which the churches and schools are working. How does Scouting bring about its goal?

In the first place, the program of Scouting does not consist merely in getting together in a meeting, but is one of the things to do and to be. In the second place, the Scout's Law is the rock upon which the whole movement rests. When a boy takes the Scout's Oath, he promised to live up to this with its ideals of self-development and of services to others. Scouting sets forth ideals that gives a chance to practice all these things in every day life.

All in all, every task in something is a man's size job cut down to fit a boy. Some of you might be glad someday that had the chance to learn things which will be more useful to you when you grow up. The things that you learn are not only for boys but are things which really grown men have found useful. So you see Scouting is really to train you to be a man.
