2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK:

This section's drum and bugle corps has been aiding in the daily reception of the new arrivals and parading on the evenings of the mass meetings to get a good attendance there. There are approximately 20 members in the corps. The new residents have been able to get acquainted with the administration officials through the mass welcome meetings sponsored by this section. Over 1,200 people have attended these gatherings during the past week. Religious activities are getting started with the formation of a Inter-Faith Committee and the establishment of a Religious Center at Building 10 of Block 4. The Protestant, Catholic, Seventh Day Adventist and Buddhist groups are represented in the committee and the Rev. T. Goto is chairman. On Sunday Protestant services were held in the #3 and #5 Recreation Halls and the Buddhist services were conducted in Recreation Hall #6. 39 signs and 25 posters were made for the Public Safety, Community Services, Community Welfare, Housing, and Community Activities departments and for the canteen, block managers and induction by this section's art department. Handicraft and music classes are being organized by specialists for children in Building 9 of Block 4. Supervised playground activities will be inaugurated today; softball will be the main diversion. A dance has been planned for this Saturday night for couples only and roving entertainment programs are being mapped out for next week.

3. ADEQUACY OF SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS:

This section has just appointed a procurement chief who is compiling a list of supplies and materials necessary to carry on the work and program being planned. There is an immediate need of 2 typewriters and recreational equipment. The requisitions will be made immediately.

It is the goal of this section to set-up an over-all, center-wide recreation program; it will service all groups and interests in the recreational field; the center will be divided into 8 divisions on a geographical-building basis in order to inhibit cliques and other minorities; and the recreation program will be conducted so that it will meet with the highest professional standards of the field. This section is now working with the landscaping group in regard to the setting up of playground and athletic contest areas.

- (d) Personnel is inadequate now with the enlargement of our activities and the arrival of new contingents. Additional personnel is now being acquired.

2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK:

During the past week this section continued to aid the induction process by welcoming the new residents with its drum and bugle corps upon arrival and in the evenings by parading and advertising the mass meetings. Approximately 800 people took in these welcome gatherings and got acquainted with our city officials. The second public dance was sponsored on Saturday evening at Dining Hall #10; 32 couples enjoyed this record-dance. Protestant services were held in Recreation Halls #3 and #5 and Buddhist services in Recreation Hall #6 on Sunday morning. Both groups conducted religious meetings in English for the children and young people and in Japanese for the adults. Aid was given the public administration section in drumming up interest for block elections and the initial induction ceremony of councilmen. Final allocation of Community Activity Halls on a temporary basis was made taking into consideration the requests made by the Community Welfare, Placement and Housing, Public Relations and Community Enterprise sections and divisions. Time was taken to consult with the landscape architect and planning group in regard to lay-out plans for the immense recreational area. The art department of this section was kept very busy this week making 108 posters and signs for various sections and divisions. A tentative program for the hospital dedication on October 18th was drawn up and submitted for approval. This week was very eventful with the opening up of two recreation centers, one in block #20 and one in block #6, and the arrival of some recreational equipment and reading material donated by the Tanforan Recreation program. The donated material will be allocated to the recreation centers as they are opened. The handicraft and music program got under way this week and a complete report on this activity is attached herewith for your guidance. Also attached is a copy of the section's division of Community Activity Halls and proposed "ward" set-up.

3. ADEQUACY OF SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS:

Typewriters are needed immediately to carry on this section's work. At present two personal portable typewriters are being used. Office supplies are adequate at present, but there is a definite need of athletic equipment.

With the arrival of a majority of the residents, this section is busy getting organized. Plans for a work program to open Recreation Centers and to staff them has been worked out. A travelling crew to open the centers has been picked with a maintenance group to assist. Already two centers have been opened to the public. By October 8th, 8 centers will be ready for use and staffed.

1. NUMBER OF PERSONNEL EMPLOYED:

- (d) With the composition of this city almost completed and the opening of several recreation centers, personnel is being added on almost daily to fill the needs of the growing leisure-time program and activities.

2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK:

The past week has been mostly spent on opening up Community Activity Halls #20, 6, 23, and 37 as recreation centers on a routine schedule. The art crew has worked on office fixtures for the headquarters and art staff in their building in Block 10. A gala community-wide entertainment program was held last Friday night under the emceeship of Goro Suzuki and was well received by a crowd of some 500 people in Dining Hall #10. On Saturday evening, approximately forty couples enjoyed the third center-wide social in Dining Hall #10, dancing to record music. English and Japanese speaking services were conducted over the last week-end by the four different church groups and about 1100 persons attended them. This section assisted the Community Government group put over the public meeting with Mr. Dillon Meyer, head of the WRA, Sunday afternoon, and in the evening sponsored a mass welcome gathering for the latest newcomers to Topaz. Meetings were held with the different religious groups to decide locales for their church programs; temporary assignments were made. A special "Welcome Home" reception was planned for the 640 Santa Anita evacuees scheduled to arrive here Thursday afternoon; the drum and bugle corps and colorful banners will aid in the homecoming festivities upon their arrival and on this coming Sunday night a huge rally will be held in their honor in Dining Hall #34. This Saturday's dance will be featured for the young people from Santa Anita. Preparations for the hospital dedication are being carried on. During the week more recreational equipment arrived from Tanforan; also, books and magazines for the public library came in. Community Activity Hall #32 is now being set up as the main library with Ida Shimanouchi, temporarily in charge. The Art Staff produced over 180 posters and signs.

3. ADEQUACY OF SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS:

Athletic equipment and handicraft materials are surely needed to carry on our program. We have adequate office supplies, but need typewriters badly.

4. CURRENT PROBLEMS:

- (a) The allocation of the numerous Community Activity Halls is causing us a great deal of trouble. In many cases our program is stymied with the taking over of several of our key buildings by other sections and divisions without our consideration and approval.

They wish that more centrally-located halls are opened up for recreational purposes. They were satisfied with the variety show last week and hope more can be sponsored for their enjoyment.

(d) With the arrival of the final contingent from Tanforan, the composition of the city is now complete, and as a result we are now building up our personnel so that we would be able to handle a complete community recreational program. Owing to the fact that many of the capable and experienced leaders in this field have gone into other types of jobs, we are finding it tough to secure enough qualified leaders. We will have to train many new persons to help us in our work.

2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK:

The past week was very eventful with the arrival of our Section Consultant, Miss Emily Minton; she has been spending most of her time getting acquainted with the personnel, facilities and organization of our department. Over the week-end we were fortunate to have Dr. Gibson, assistant to the Chief of the WRA on education and recreation, here on a visit, and the staff members had the opportunity of discussing the many problems of our section with him. He promised to send us reference material and at the same time look around for sources of recreational equipment. Meetings have been held with the educational heads regarding correlation of our sections. Fifteen boys spent all day Friday moving a three-ton monumental stone from the mountain area west of this city for the hospital dedication ceremonies to be held here soon. On Saturday night a homecoming dance honoring the young people from Santa Anita was held in Dining Hall #26; over 40 couples were present at the social. The different religious groups conducted English and Japanese speaking services over the last week-end and about 1800 persons attended them. This Section aided in the first funeral service here by providing adequate seating. On Sunday night a gigantic and special welcome rally and entertainment show was presented for the Santa Anita group in Dining Hall #34; the hall was filled to capacity and from all indications it was a most successful reception. The Drum & Bugle Corps was on hand to welcome the final contingent from Tanforan Thursday; in the evening a mass meeting was held for this new group in Dining Hall #34. Plans for organizing a Red Cross Unit in Topaz were discussed with Mr. R. Alston, field executive of the Red Cross from Salt Lake City; a meeting of section and division representatives interested in this matter was scheduled for Friday morning. The library staff has been very busy cataloging and classifying the books brought in from Tanforan. More equipment and material for our work has also flowed in from Tanforan. With weather permitting, two exhibition touch tackle football games will be played Sunday afternoon for the benefit of

the residents. The Art Dept. is still working on office furniture and putting out signs and posters for the numerous events and departments.

3. ADEQUACY OF SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS:
We are still using personal typewriters; all the recreational equipment and material being used now were donated by the Tanforan Recreation program. Requisitions are being made for athletic goods and handicraft material.
4. CURRENT PROBLEMS:
(a) The weather is getting cold and our buildings must be winterized so that we can carry on our work without freezing. Some of the Scout drums and sticks were broken while being used for welcoming the incoming contingents; how can we raise funds to replace this broken equipment?

6. COMMENT ON CONDITIONS AMONG THE EVACUEES AS THEY AFFECT OUR DEPT:
They desire more closely located recreation centers; the older people want entertainment in Japanese. Now that the induction process has been completed, the Drum and Bugle Corps has been given a vote of thanks by the residents.

Many policies are being set up now that our consultant, Miss Minton is with us. In a week, our program will be organized so that it will be servicing all the people.

In compliance with the last minute request from the Administration, this Section made all the general arrangements for the Hospital Dedication Ceremonies; this event took place Sunday afternoon with a large crowd in attendance. Following the Dedication Program, three All-Star Touch Tackle Football Games were presented for the residents. The Eastern All-Stars walked off with all the honors, winning the three different age levels games. On Tuesday night a gala University of California Pep Rally was held in Dining Hall Number 5 with Dr. Allen Blaisdell as the main speaker. Over 250 students and alumni were present at this unique gathering. The library has been shifted from Community Hall Number 32 to Hall Number 16. The Library Staff is busy cataloguing the books now on hand, and is awaiting the winterizing of its building. Until such time it will not be opened to the public. The Art Department of this Section made approximately 124 signs and posters during the past week. English and Japanese speaking services were conducted over the last week-end by the four religious groups here and about 2,300 residents attended these church meetings. The different churches are also holding prayer meetings on Wednesday nights. During the past week, Fred Koba has taken over the Section leadership from Kim Obata. With Miss Minton's assistance, organizational set-up has been drafted and the two persons have already received specific duties. Kim Obata is to handle the arts, crafts, and skilled Division, and Tad Hirota is to be in charge of Athletics. The other positions will be filled at the Monday morning meeting. A report on the use of all the Community Activity Hall was gathered to find out whether maximum use of the halls was being made. A check-up on all the halls will be made weekly by this Section.

2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK:

1. In athletics the crucial contest between George Ushijima's Scorpions and Goro Suzuki's Midgets resulted in a tie, 6-6. It was a great afternoon for 400 odd football-loving fans.
2. The Art Department is open for business in a somewhat complete office at headquarters with Mr. Kim Obata and his able assistants promising to do a grant job to meet the needs and the request of the City of Topaz.
3. The eve of All Saints, otherwise known as Hallowe'en, will be observed this Saturday by the Topazans with a wide-scope program covering all age groups. The festivities will start Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The program is in charge of the newly appointed Social Activities Director, Mr. Kimbo Yoshitomi, and his able staff.
4. The Church group, both the English speaking and the Japanese speaking, conducted the usual services over the last weekend.

Judo class will be organized in the same recreation hall and over 200 students have signified their intentions of enrolling.

Karuta club and utai classes will have approximately 150 members. By Christmas time we hope to have 350, all totalled.

Other interesting groups being organized by the Adult issei section are the biwa, nagauta, naniwabush, and gidayu. There will be about 400 of this group. Recreation Halls #33, 39, and 4 are being looked into for these groups.

The recreational information survey has been 75 per cent completed. From the general response that we have received, we are quite confident that what we will plan in the immediate future will be the type of program that they have suggested to us.

The Fire Station Dedication program was attended by 300 citizens of Topaz. Mr. J. F. Hughes of the Administration was the main speaker. The slogans for the week as made by the Art Department was: "If Topaz burns, we freeze," "One careless cigarette, disaster!" The Art Department has a big job of renaming the streets that will grace our city in the near future.

The Protestant Church group had its dedication services at Dining Hall #32 at which time 400 members of this faith attended. Many fine talks were given by the ministers and lay people. The four

churches held their services over the weekend for 1900 people. Some of the meetings were held outdoors due to the lack of seating accommodation.

The Community Activities Section Headquarters moved to building #3, Saturday.

3. ADEQUACY OF MATERIALS AND SUPPLIES:

We are still allocating equipment and facilities and possible source of income.

4. CURRENT PROBLEMS:

The problem of housing, which has been troubling all departments under the Services Division, has been favorably met on temporary understanding. However, the exact hours for the uses have not been set up as yet. We hope this will be settled soon.

We are in need of stoves, coal, and scrap lumber in the recreational halls. We hope that some arrangements will be made so as to service these buildings with heat.

We are still in need of office equipment. Requisitions have been sent in.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS OR GENERAL SUGGESTIONS:

Meetings should be called at least on 24 hour notice, except in emergency.

Weekly reports from all departments, as we understand, are compiled. If these divisions have problems for general meetings it should have covered the points on the agenda.

With the coming weeks, we are hoping that all departments, at least in our own services division, will have a cooperative plan by which we can all succeed happily together.

2. PROGRESS OF CURRENT WORK

Athletic Division:

Two boys' softball games were conducted last Sunday with an attendance of 500 spectators. Several girls' events, scheduled for the same day, were postponed due to prohibiting weather conditions.

Social Activities Division:

The Big Game Rally held last Friday night was a huge success with an attendance of 400 rabid fans of the two colleges concerned. The program was rounded out with several guest speakers, community singing, and hells.

A concert by the Delta High School Band was presented in Dining Hall #1 on Tuesday, November 24, with an attendance of 900 people.

Final preparations have been completed for the variety show to be presented at the Delta High School auditorium in the afternoon and evening of Wednesday, November 25. Four rehearsals were conducted during the past week with the entire troupe of fifty-four people participating. All scenery for the entertainment is being prepared by the Art Department.

Arts and Crafts Division:

The Art Department has been swamped with work for the coming holiday program to be conducted this week end. They have conducted seventy man-hours of work for this department as well as other sections of the community.

Adult Activities Division:

Three adult entertainment shows have been presented during the past week with a total attendance of 1,400 people. Adult Activities Center #6 has been conducting a well-rounded out program with a total attendance in the past week of 675 people engaged in table games and athletics.

Group Activities Division:

A division of the Boy Scoutsof America has been established with a tentative plan completed for the coming three months.

Plans are being formulated for the establishment of a YWCA, and contacts are being made with the outside for aid on this project. Organization of high school girls in all recreation centers has been started with a very

favorable turnout at present.

Information, Statistics, and Research:

During the past week a complete personnel file has been completed to facilitate the work of this section. Plans are being made to foster an exchange of ideas and recommendation policy through the medium of inter-center correspondence to help solve the existing problems common to all relocation centers.

3. ADEQUACY OF SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS

Weekly requisitions for typewriters for use in this office have been sent in for the past two months, but we are still looking forward to their appearance in our department. Also, an acute need for allied office equipment, such as desks, supply cabinets, tables, etc. is felt.

4. CURRENT PROBLEMS

(a) We believe that winterization of all the Community Activities recreation halls should be made as soon as possible in order to present a more inviting atmosphere for those who wish to use our facilities.

(b) We are still handicapped by the lack of financial aid, but investigation is being made toward obtaining funds to facilitate the work of this department.

5. RECOMMENDATIONS OR GENERAL SUGGESTIONS

We are not here to dedicate a program that is to be used exclusively for any one group. We are against such false precepts and ideals. In other words, the policy of the department is opposed to any segregated set up. We want to give to all the warmth of surroundings to which we are so accustomed. It can, and will accomplish our purpose without leaving any detrimental after-effects on this community if we do but see it in the right light.

6. COMMENT ON CONDITIONS AMONG THE EVACUEES AS THEY AFFECT OUR DEPARTMENT

There is a new feeling among us. We have always been a friendly people, but the speed of life has been so swift of late that we have somehow drifted apart. We smile casually when we meet, then pass on with a hurried nod. But something new has stirred in our hearts lately. A new comprehension of the other fellow's place is felt and our concern for him.

7. A FORECAST OF PROJECTED ACTIVITIES

A tremendous Harvest Festival has been planned over the Thanksgiving holiday and week end. The program consists of four adult entertainment shows, two dances, a variety show, and a dedication of the bell tower. Plans are under way for a huge Christmas program to cover all age groups and foster the Yuletide spirit among all residents of our community.

One of the outstanding causes for this social clash is the lack of good employment for some groups due to their late arrival to this community. With this thought in mind, we have paid serious attention to job applicants who formerly came with the latter group.

However, with definite supervision, governed by C.A.S. rules and regulations, we believe that such trips are of a benefit to the community at large

- a. In order to partially remedy the serious need of adequate recreation leaders, a large number of voluntary part-time leaders have been aiding us in our activities. These young people, all of high school age, have been working after school hours and on week ends. Serious thought should be given to the possibility of an in-service or pre-entry training course as part of the high school curriculum in order that these volunteer leaders may be placed on a part-time paid basis
- b. We are still seeking financial aid to set up a petty cash fund

in order to care for all emergency expenditures which may arise. From reports from other relocation areas, the Community Activities Sections have all been receiving substantial amounts from the Community Enterprise for use in service work. Our pleas for aid from this source have so far been unheeded.

- c. With the serious need for a branch library, and with the increasing activities throughout our centers, there is a critical need for more buildings. Serious consideration should be given to the re-allocation of recreation halls in order to alleviate this situation. We believe that many of the offices in the various halls would be able to occupy some of the empty apartments in the now vacant Block #1. In that way, several halls may be opened for the use of the community in the various phases of our activities.
- d. Several resident blocks have already started a recreational program of their own, using the dining halls for recreational purposes. This is a step toward our ultimate goal of recreational facilities for every block. But we believe that there should be some correlation between our section and the present individual block activities, in order to facilitate and supervise the work.
- e. We are still awaiting a clarification of supervision of all Japanese-speaking entertainment. At the present time, several private entertainment programs have been presented by various blocks within the city. Inasmuch as the C.A.S. has not been given the authority to supervise such programs, we feel that such jurisdiction does not lie within one province. But in order to eliminate any possibility of programs of a questionable nature, cooperation on this matter should be enforced.

- e. With the acquisition of many Japanese books, a branch library for adults is needed.



5. RECOMMENDATIONS AND SUGGESTIONS

- With donations of Japanese books being received daily, there is an acute need for a branch Japanese library. At present a section of the Topaz Public Library is being used, but space is very

- limited at that location. With the increasing demands from the residents, establishment of a branch library is truly justified.
- b. Due to inadequate supervision of boxing classes in the high school physical education program, students are suffering injuries which may develop into a condition of serious magnitude. As a result complaints from the parents have been directed to the supervisor of boxing of our department. Inasmuch as the boxing activities in the Community Activities Section have been confined to the teaching of fundamentals and no body contact has been permitted, these complaints are unwarranted. Serious consideration should be given toward better supervision of the boxing activity in the high school in view of the physical limitations encountered. The Community Activities Section cannot be expected to be responsible for such incompetency as exemplified by the supervisors of this particular activity in the high school.
 - c. There is a serious need for an adequate public address system to carry on a large activity. Up to the present time, this section has been using the public address system of the Buddhist Church, but due to an increase in their religious program, further use of this facility has become prohibitive. Requisitions have gone in through the proper channels, and we are awaiting definite clarification as to its status.
 - d. The Community Activities Section is more than willing to cooperate in the programming of civic camp-wide functions, but we can hardly be expected to be responsible for any part of these activities not delegated to this department. There have been several occurrences in connection with civic programs, wherein we have received complaints and criticisms relative to portions of these programs over which we had no responsibility. The Community Activities Section would also appreciate early notification of our part in these various functions in order that we may have sufficient time to prepare a program worthy of each occasion.
 - e. Due to the remote location of the ice skating facilities with respect to the residents of the northern sections of our city, several rinks are being constructed by the people in their own blocks. The resulting unsupervised activity will be detrimental to all parties concerned. The possibility of constructing another rink in the area north of blocks one and two should be considered to care for the demands of the residents.
 - f. Clarification of janitorial service is desired immediately. If such service is unavailable, we believe that the request for brooms, mops, and other equipment which was sent through the proper channels should be fulfilled in order that our own staff may take care of these duties.

- c. Division of Winter Sports - Due to unsatisfactory weather conditions, the winter sports division was unable to carry on any activities during the past week. However, a great deal of work has been spent in the planning of the winter sports lodge at Recreation Hall 38 with the cooperation of the Public Works Department. Community Activities Section has been taking orders for skates and to date has received over 300 requests.

- d. Division of Social Activities - The entire past week was spent in preparation for the variety show to be presented at the Oak City Community Hall, February 2, 1943. A trip was made to Oak City by the entertainment committee to make final preparations for this event.

- e. Division of Public Relations

- 1) A second meeting for the establishment of a forum was held and many people have shown a willingness to help on this event.
- 2) Forums are being planned for January 29 and 30, one in English and one in Japanese. The subject of which shall be "The Cooperative Movement." The Education Department of the Community Enterprises will be present at both meetings to enlighten the residents of our community on this very vital question.

- f. Boy Scouts of America - All 4 Boy Scout Troops of the City of Topaz have been making preparations for Boy Scout Day to be held on February 27, 1943. Last Friday night the troops held their meeting with the total attendance of 78 Scouts. The principal topic for discussion being the aforementioned Scout Day.

A proposal has been made for a training course for Cub Master to be started in February under Reverend Tsukamoto, former Scout Executive of San Francisco.

The Boy Scout Lodge during the past week enjoyed an attendance of 133 boys all engrossed in the task of making animated toys and other handicraft projects.

g. Division of Arts and Crafts

- 1) Art Production - Poster work - 156 manhours - this division has also been working on the street signs for our city, and the stage effects to be used at the Oak City Entertainment.
- 2) Model Airplanes - This department has spent the past week in the establishment of a hobby shop, wherein a small supply of airplane kits and accessories are being carried for sale at cost to the interested people of our community. The initial shipment of orders was received in the earlier part of the week and to date the huge demand has not been fulfilled. A great deal of encouragement has resulted from the indication of the large number of adults interested in this particular activity. A special group for adult beginners is being established in District 2.
