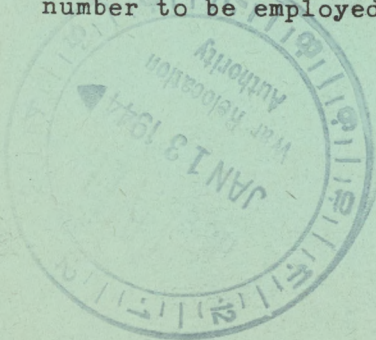

The responsibility for industry on this project was given to Agriculture during December because here industry is food preservation or processing. In fact the question has been raised as to whether activities are industrial or a further step in the agricultural production program. It is intended that facilities be developed here for canning, pickling, Tofu making and bean sprouting. Surplus seasonal crops will be utilized and some increase in acreage of tomatoes, beans and peas is planned for canning. Some soy beans will be raised for tofu and trial plantings of Mung beans for sprouts will be made this year. Canning and pickling facilities need to be built and equipped. Tofu equipment is on hand, but additional space is needed. Some pickling is being done in barrels. Results of canning last fall were very unsatisfactory.
