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



5. RECOMMENDATIONS OR GENERAL SUGGESTIONS:



During the quarter the happening of greatest importance to the Internal Security Section was the shooting by a military police sentry of a resident, James Hatsuaki Wakasa, on April 11. This unfortunate incident which caused more concern within the center than any other one thing which has happened has been separately documented and supplied to the Washington office.

Re-organization of the police department with the appointment of a new resident chief and his captains and lieutenants provided a smoothly-working organization.

The Associate Internal Security Officer was detailed to Heart Mountain Project as chief of the section, and was replaced here by an assistant detailed from the Gila River Project.

Late in the quarter, the first group of 11 young men from this center were sent to Leupp, Arizona. These men had said they would commit sabotage against the United States if given the chance, when questioned by the FBI. Near the end of June, two more young men were also ordered to Leupp.

In the second quarter of 1943, the first happening of any importance was the death of James Hatsuki Wakasa on April 11, 1943, which was caused by a gunshot wound fired by a sentry in Military Post #8. Mr. Wakasa was 62 years old and had no family and had no known relatives.

On May 23, Yoshiaki Fukuda, who was visiting his family at this Center, was returned to Lordsburg, New Mexico because of violations of his agreement regarding his conduct while at this Center.

During the early part of May, we received from the Director of Internal Security in Washington, a manual of rules and regulations in conducting our police work at this Center. Report forms and Follow-up forms, which were to arrive by May 15, however, did not arrive until the latter part of June. The delay in the arrival of the Report and Follow-up forms caused us to be over a month late in setting up this new system, however it was very similar with the exception of the copies to be sent to Washington. We are now in the process of catching up with this work, which was to have begun on May 15.

Marc Campbell, who was the Associate Internal Security Officer, was detailed to the Heart Mountain Project as Chief of Internal Security there. He was replaced at this Center by Mr. D. Johnston, detailed here from the Gila River Project.

In conforming with the new rules and regulations, Mr. George K. Adachi was appointed Chief of the Internal Police on July 1, 1943. Mr. Adachi has been in the Internal Police force here since its inception and is very much respected not only by the Internal Police but in general throughout the Center.

July 7, 1943

The Relocation Program has very seriously affected this Department as some of the best trained and most efficient workers have either volunteered for the Combat Team or have relocated. These losses seriously affect the efficiency of the Internal Security as it forces us to continually train new people.

2. CURRENT WORK:

Conditions at the auditorium seem to be improving. Two janitors there were given Special Police Badges and instructed as to safety regulations concerning no smoking in or near the building, keeping aisles cleared and the exit doors unlocked. They are cooperating with the resident policeman who has been assigned there daily from 4:00 p.m. until 12:00 p.m. The Fire Department is giving us excellent cooperation in our efforts to improve conditions at the auditorium.

The #1 substation has been moved from Block #2 to the Lumber Yard and Warehouse area. This area is now patrolled on foot twenty-four hours each day. It is planned to gradually decrease the number of police stationed at substations in the residential area and patrol this area by car at two hour intervals during the night only. The need for twenty-four hour foot patrol in the residential area seems to have passed since segregation was completed.

May 27, 1944

Traffic conditions have improved. Very few violations were reported this past month. We are now receiving fine cooperation from the Motor Pool who are suspending driver's licenses in more serious violations and warning drivers in minor infractions of regulations. "No Parking" signs have been requisitioned and will be installed one-hundred feet apart in front of Canteen #19; also "No Vehicles, Playground" signs will be placed at the playground in the Staff Housing area.

We are working on and having many meetings with the Gate Clerks concerning the new pass procedure that is to be put into effect June 1. This new plan will simplify and improve our present pass procedure.

3. SUPPLIES AND MATERIALS:

On June 1, at the time the new pass procedure is in effect, we will definitely need more space in our Gatehouse building. The Engineering Section informs us that they are unable to erect our new building there at the present time.

We have been successful in securing another car for Internal Security which will be used for traffic work and patrolling of the Center. The three sub-stations in the residential area have been closed and the patrolling of this area is now done by an appointed Internal Security Officer and two evacuee policemen in an Internal Security car.

We have paid special attention to cars operating without night permits, and the month of July shows a considerable decrease in the number of these violations as only two citations were issued for this violation.

At Gate #1 a new procedure has been put into effect, that is, the MP's stop all cars entering the Project for identification, and an Internal Security Officer stops all cars leaving the Center and the Gate Clerks check these cars for identification.

2. Main Activities During Month:

September has been a comparatively quiet month insofar as violations of Center ordinances and regulations were concerned. Only one case of petty theft was reported, a paint spray gun was stolen from Warehouse 103; it was recovered the following day.

With the opening of school two Resident Police were stationed in Block 32, the High School area, to patrol this district. This detail will be continued from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00m. every day, not with the objective of enforcing discipline but to prevent a repetition of

the vandalism that occurred there during the past school year.

Fifteen traffic citations were issued, all were parking violations. The overall traffic situation seems to be quite satisfactory.

3. Supplies and Materials Needed: None

4. Problems Considered:

We are making definite plans for the policing and traffic control during the Fair and Rodeo, September 30th and October 1st, this will necessitate shifting some police from the early morning watch to watch two and three for those two days.

We now maintain twenty-four hour guard duty at the Delta warehouse, also the new time clock patrol system has been installed. This consists of a time clock, carried by the guard, and of six boxes, each box installed at a different location. Inside of each box is a key and this key must be used to register the time and location on a chart which is a part of the time clock. This chart is to be mailed to the Chief of Internal Security each day.

5. Plans For Next Month:

We are cooperating with the Engineering Section on plans for the new Internal Security Building which is to be completed during the month of October. Internal Security Headquarters will be moved to this building, the new location at Gate #1 will simplify pass procedure and will be advantageous in many ways. Definite plans for next month are in abeyance because of lack of both appointed and Resident Personnel. Appointed Personnel is three fifths of maximum strength and Resident Personnel, four fifths of maximum.

6. Recommendations and Suggestions to the Project Director on needed changes in Policy or procedures:

Would suggest that hearings of Appointed Personnel, for violations of traffic ordinances, be held once each month instead of weekly. The small number of violators does not justify that time be reserved each Tuesday at 4:00 p.m. for this purpose. I would recommend that the first Tuesday of each month at 4:00 p.m. be reserved for this purpose.

We have made a survey of the Center listing all covered porches now built. This check will be made once each week and if any new additions are noted, citations will be issued.

A petty thief seems to be active in the Staff housing area. Reported stolen during the month are: a quantity of ammunition from the storeroom, two bottles of milk from the refrigerator in an apartment, a dog collar with rope attached from in front of an apartment and a two quart stainless steel sauce pan from the laundry room.

Thirty citations were issued; fifteen for not having night permits, one for speeding, two for unauthorized use of motor equipment, one parked too close to building and eleven for leaving Project without proper pass.

One serious accident occurred. Truck #59 overturned and injured seven persons--two seriously. This was a case of reckless driving.

3. Supplies and Materials Needed: None

4. Problems Considered:

We are having considerable difficulty having repairs made on our police cars at the Motor Pool. Police car 60 was out of service for two weeks for a minor fan pulley repair and it has now been in the Motor Pool for four days to have the play taken out of the steering gear. The resident personnel of the Motor Pool are aware that traffic cannot be checked while our equipment is out of service.

5. Plans For Next Month:

Enforcement of the regulations on unauthorized construction of porches etc. and a more thorough check on traffic.

There are two vacancies on the appointed personnel staff: one CAF-9, Assistant Chief and one CAF-7, Internal Security Officer. The Resident Police Force now has sufficient personnel to satisfactorily police the Center. However, we are definitely in need of two evacuee clerk typists, one for the main office and one for the gatehouse.

2. Main Activities During Month:

The investigation of the reported theft of 800 feet of rope revealed that the Engineering Section had issued one bale of rope to the contractor on the water tower job. The Engineering Section reported to this office at the time the rope was missed that this

bale contained 2,000 feet. A check at the issuing warehouse shows that one bale of 1,200 feet of rope was issued to the contractor. On checking the rope being used at the water tower we found 400 feet in each set of blocks, 300 feet, and 400 feet in the pickup truck of the contractor which had not been used. As all of the rope was accounted for there was no course for action.

Three cases of theft were reported, one at the Elementary Schools; all articles stolen were recovered and the seven boys responsible, ages seven to twelve, were apprehended. A dog was stolen from a member of the appointed staff by a 14 year old boy from Hinckley, the dog was recovered by the Sheriff's department and returned to the owner. A typewriter was stolen from the unlocked Engineering Office, this case is still pending.

One case of Assault with Knife was reported and investigated. The guilty person received a sentence of 30 days in the Millard County Jail.

Four citations were issued one for reckless driving in which one gravel truck sideswiped another causing both to overturn, however, no one was injured. Two citations for no night permit and one parked too close to building. We are continually patrolling and checking traffic both night and day and as a result the present traffic situation, within the Center, is quite satisfactory.

One case of crashing a party at the High School is under investigation. Five young men were responsible and it was determined that three out of the five were evacuee employees of the High School. Two were Physical Education teachers and the other employed in the Principal's Office. This case is pending awaiting a recommendation from the High School Principal.

3. Supplies and Materials Needed: None

4. Problems Considered:

We are confronted with no serious problems at the present time with the exception of lack of appointed personnel which necessitates one shift, from 12:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m., functioning without an appointed Internal Security Officer on duty.

5. Plans For Next Month:

The traffic patrol will be continued and we expect to move Headquarters to the new building at Gate #1.

Over two hundred summons were served and approximately fifty, who did not answer summons, were located and escorted to the Army hearing board. This required the full time services of one car and

one Resident Police and part-time services of one appointed Internal Security Officer.

Two cases of petty theft were reported, one case of destruction of Government property, namely, six blue gate badges; one small fire in the kitchen of Block three and one automobile accident of a minor nature. The overall traffic situation is satisfactory. No cases involving juveniles were reported. One raid was made on a gambling establishment at 40-11-B and twenty-four patrons were apprehended. They were tried before the Judicial Commission and nine plead guilty and were fined.

3. Supplies and Materials Needed: None

4. Problems Considered:

Problems at present are mostly the Army Clearance lists. The three categories white, gray and black are not complete as yet and deletions and additions are made daily, this complicates and confuses the work pass procedure. In addition the Immigration authorities have issued a stop list which is continually being changed.





4. Problems Considered:


No major problems at present, the traffic situation is satisfactory and petty thefts are practically nil as compared with the month of April.




