


FOREWORD


When I look back upon the past, a thousand emotions crowd my mind comparing the past with the present.


During the summer session, the resignation of our former Student Body Prexy Mitsuo Ikeda brought Isao Kiyohara the task of finishing the school year as Student Body President.


The possibilities of assemblies evolved upon the newly constituted Assembly Committee headed by the Student Body Vice-Prexy Shiro Sato.

The high morale of the students were exemplified by the Calendar Committee and the Social Committee under which the events of the year were drafted.


Educational films were provided for the students' special vocational interests by the Student Film Committee supervised by Isao Kiyohara and his committee members.







During this year, too, the council and the Student Body officially named our school the Miles E. Cary School.




CASABA SEASON
