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## SENIOR HIGH STUDENT COUNCIL

School was officially opened on October 12, 1942 at Amache, but it was not until the following February that we felt that there was enough interest on the part of the students to start some form of student government. A committee of student leaders was chosen and these leaders discussed with the sponsor and one or two other teachers, various forms of student government. Of course, each person wanted to follow the form of student government which he was used to and it was with some difficulty that we finally decided on one form and drew up the constitution. Elections were held in the same manner each year. Students were nominated by petition. It was necessary to have twenty-five signers in order to get a name on the ballot. Students went to regular polling places where they were received by clerks who checked their names from lists and gave them ballots. It was necessary to have a majority vote before being elected to an office. Therefore, we had what amounted to primary elections. The entire procedure was handled by the Student Council.

The Student Council was composed of one representative from each second period class. The second period classes were in a sense the homerooms. These teachers were responsible for the guidance of pupils in their classes. Also on the Student Council were representatives of clubs and the class presidents. This made, with the student officers, a council of around fifty people. Experience taught us that this was too large to be effective. Much of the work, therefore, was handled by the Executive Committee which was composed of the five student body officers. These were the president, the girls' vice-president, the boys' vice-president, the secretary and the treasurer.

The activities during the remainder of the year were limited in nature as most of the time was spent in the organization of the Student Council and in the writing of the constitution. We sponsored the opening dance at the new high school building which took place in the early part of July. The Student Council also helped, where possible, with the commencement and other end-of-school activities and with the dedication program for the new school building.

During the year 1943-44, the organization was slightly different. Each student was required to take English-Social Studies class. This class was a homeroom and the teachers were responsible for the pupil's guidance and records. Representatives were chosen from these classes for the Student Council. It was their duty to bring to the Student Council questions and suggestions from their classes and to report to the class the work of the Council. The members were elected for only one semester. At the beginning of the second semester an effective installation ceremony was conducted at which time the members took an oath to uphold the school spirit and to take the responsibility necessary to make for real school government.

During the year, one discipline case was referred to the Student Council. They refused to take any definite, positive action upon it and this was not tried again.



The Student Council sponsored the Kampus Kanteen which met for several weeks, twice a week. The purpose of this Kanteen was to give more opportunity for social relaxation. The Kampus Kanteen is discussed in detail elsewhere.

The Student Council managed the selling of tickets, taking care of publicity, and put on an act for the Rhythm Show.

A committee from the Student Council worked on the annual and the entire council made suggestions for it.

Although the point system was discussed, no definite action was taken on it during this year.

All clubs were asked to submit constitutions which were accepted or rejected by the Council. Only those clubs whose constitutions were accepted were allowed to operate.

During the summer of 1944, the Student Council sponsored a concert by Miss Ruby Yoshino, an outstanding Nisei singer.

The Student Council formed a plan whereby students could buy activity tickets and thus be admitted to athletic events, school plays, the Rhythm Show, and paid assemblies at a very much reduced rate. Approximately half of the student body bought activity tickets.

In December of 1943, the Student Council sponsored the Madrigal Singers, a choral group from the University of Colorado. This was a paid assembly.

In the Fall of 1944, we started in a little different manner. We had been somewhat discouraged by the lack of participation of all students in student government. There were many problems that we felt they could help with if they would and we earnestly sought ways and means to first, get more student participation and secondly, to teach students to take more responsibility toward their student government. Because the English-Social Studies teachers were the ones involved, much time was spent with them first in discussing the aims and program for the Student Council. We decided that we should cut the size of the Council, thinking that perhaps a smaller group would work more effectively. We then held student elections and the student Council was composed of the student body officers and one representative from each English-Social Studies class. That made nineteen members on the Student Council.

We felt that the entire constitution had to be revised and so a Constitutional Committee went to work on this. We used the old constitution as a basis but we made a good many changes and worked on it until we felt that we had quite a acceptable constitution.

Some of our early problems were these;

1. Students were wearing metal taps on their heels and marring our soft-wood floors. We tried to build up a spirit of cooperation through the Student Council in getting them removed. We were not entirely successful and finally had to take stricter means.

2. Pupil violation of center traffic rules. The Student Council worked on the problem of walking in the streets and crossing them when asked not to by school patrols. We were not successful here, either.

3. The problem of activity tickets was discussed and the homeroom representatives reported that the student body as a whole did not wish activity tickets. Therefore, it was dropped.



We tried to cooperate in some of our activities with the junior high Student Council since we were all housed in the same building and some of our problems were identical. Occasional meetings on these problems were held with both Councils. On the whole, the Councils did not function in solving their own problems.

Every person on the Student Council was a member of a committee. Some of these committees were very active. Besides the Constitution Committee which has already been mentioned, there was the Boys Athletic Commission. This was an effective committee whose aim was to coordinate the work of all boys' athletic organizations and to sponsor activities such as the intra-mural games and other activities decided upon by the Student Council as worthwhile athletic events. On this committee, as on all, several teachers participated with the students. It was the duty of the Awards Committee to revise the Script Letter "A" Award System, publicize this plan, record students' points, and make the awards. The Student Social Activities Committee, under the leadership of the girls' vice-president collected the dates for all clubs and organizations for school calendar of social activities, avoiding conflicts and keeping in mind the fact that not too many paid activities should occur consecutively. The Social Activities Committee also suggested procedures including conduct and dress for parties and dances. The work of this committee was large and they were very effective. The Property Protection and Management Committee made suggestions for the proper care of library books, classrooms, lavatories, lawn, and equipment. They carried on an effective campaign against walking on the grass and made suggestions for the building of new walks. The Hospitality Committee was so organized that upon a moments' notice they could show visitors around the building and explain the function of the various departments. They welcomed guest speakers and were especially helpful at the time of the evaluation. The Ushers Committee, which was composed of the entire Las Alegrias group with the chairman from the Student Council, was effective in helping seat visitors and stragglers, and ushering at other programs. The Charter Committee had made an attractive charter suitable for framing which was presented to each club upon its approval. Only those clubs which were chartered had the privilege of calling meetings and using the school building for social activities. This committee also set the standards by which a charter could be granted. The entire Council voted on this plan and it was the entire council which accepted an application. The Inside and Outside Traffic Committee made plans for students to enter and leave the auditorium without crowding, campaigned against careless walking in the streets, campaigned for cooperation with the elementary school safety patrol, and made suggestions about hall traffic. The chairman of the Finance and Budget Committee was the secretary of the Student Council. All clubs and organizations had to submit to the Student Council their budget for approval. It was the duty of this committee to study the needs of the group and approve their budgets. Each month the Student Council went over the report of the School Treasurer. This report gave the receipts, expenditures, and balance or deficit for each club or organization. Suggestions were made by the Student Council as to the removal of the deficits. The Assembly Committee studied to improve assembly behavior, made definite plans for assemblies at fixed times, tried to raise the standard of assemblies and to get more pupil participation in them. In their aims the Assembly Committee succeeded to some extent. The work of this committee was large.



The Student Council joined the National Association of Student Councils in December of 1944. The work of the Student Council during this year was far more effective than it had been at any time previously. The students and sponsor have learned a great deal through experimenting. We worked much closer with the teachers and had their full cooperation. Each teacher was careful to find out what had taken place at Student Council meeting which needed discussing and in those places where the representatives were not doing an effective job, they were removed from office. The entire structure depends upon the effectiveness of the reporting to the class and bring back from the class the reactions of the group. With teacher cooperation, this can be successfully handled.



## JUNIOR HIGH STUDENT COUNCIL

Junior High Student Council was organized during the second quarter of the school year of 1943. At that time it met with the Principal to discuss general social problems, such as better pupil elections, beautifying the school grounds, decreasing the use of undesirable language, pupil organizations, and activities etc. It was difficult to get decisions from the group.

During the second quarter of 1943, the council sponsored a series of military programs including many military speakers. At the close of the school year a merit assembly was held by the student council at which over 500 merit awards were presented.

Throughout the school year ending in June 1944, the student council continued to function.

In October 1944 Junior and Senior High Student Councils joined in sponsoring an all-school party. Committees with members from both councils cooperated and made very definite plans. The party was very successful.

In November 1944, the council sponsored a party for just Junior High. It was not very successful because group games had been planned and boys and girls would not play together. A very few danced. In February, another party was held just for Junior High. It was quite successful. Much had been learned from the former party.

Through April 1945, the council helped with the clothes drive for war-torn countries. The effort was worth-while, and the outcome was good.

Junior High Student Council joined with the Senior High Student Council in carrying on a basketball tournament. Plans for organization of the league were carried to the classes by the representatives.

On June 5, 1945, the Ninth Grade Continuation Exercises and the Merit Assembly were sponsored by the council.



The student council provided excellent experiences in self-direction. Growth in accepting responsibility, making decisions, and standing by them was noted.

## AMACHE SENIOR HIGH CONSTITUTION

We, the students of Amache Senior High School, in order to obtain maximum cooperation, to foster school spirit, to encourage and support all worthy activities and organizations, do ordain and establish this constitution for the Student Body of Amache Senior High School.

### Article I Name.

The name of this organization shall be the Student Body Organization of Amache Senior High School.

### Article II. Officers.

Section I. The officers of this organization shall be: a President, a girls' Vice-President, a boys' Vice-President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer.

Section II. All officers shall have the approval of all their teachers and of the senior high school office.

Section III. Requirements and Qualifications

1. The President shall be a senior.
2. The Vice-Presidents shall be members of the senior or junior class.
3. The Secretary shall be any person who is a member of the senior or junior class.
4. The Treasurer shall be a commercial student, and shall be a member of the senior or junior class.

Section IV. Duties of the Officers.

1. The President shall:
  - a. preside over all meetings of the Student Body.
  - b. be chairman of the school Student Council but shall have no vote unless they are equally divided.
2. The Vice-Presidents:
  - a. The Student Council shall decide which of the two Vice-Presidents shall discharge the duties of the President in event of the inability of the President to discharge his duties.
  - b. The Vice-Presidents shall appoint all committees deemed necessary by the Student Council or not otherwise provided for.
  - c. The boys' Vice-President shall:
    - a. preside at all meetings of the boys of the school.
  - d. The girls' Vice-President shall:
    - a. preside at all meetings of the girls of the school.
3. The Secretary shall:
  - a. take and keep minutes of all meetings of the Student Council.
  - b. take attendance of the Student Council at all meetings.
  - c. take care of all official correspondence of the Student Body and the Student Council.
4. The Treasurer shall:
  - a. take accurate account of all money taken in and spent by the Student Body and Student Council.
  - b. make financial reports as deemed necessary by the Student Council.



Section V. Term of Office.

The term of office shall be one semester unless recalled by a three-fourths vote of the Student Body for inefficiency or incompetency.

Section VI. Nominations and Elections.

- a. All nominations for Student Body officers shall be submitted to the office during a period designated by the Student Council.
- b. All officers shall be elected by popular vote of members of the Student Body at a time designated by the Student Council.
- c. All officers shall be chosen by a majority of votes.
- d. All officers shall enter office on the first day of school, or whenever requested by the Student Council.

Section VII. Removal from Office.

- a. Any officer who receives a failing grade at the end of the first quarter shall automatically resign from office and shall not be reinstated.
- b. Any vacancy shall be filled by a student appointed by the Student Council.

Article III. Student Council.

Section I. Membership.

- a. All persons selected by their second period classmates to act on the council shall be members of said council.
- b. All officers of the Student Body shall be members of said council.
- c. A member of the Student Council may be removed from the council with a three-fourths majority vote.
- d. Any officer shall present his resignation upon the request of the principal.

Section II. Quorum.

- a. A two-thirds majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

Section III. Duties of the Student Council.

- a. The Student Council shall constitute a clearing house for the consideration of questions of interest to the students of the school.
- b. The Student Council shall make recommendations to the principal in regards to any problem that concerns the students or the school.
- c. The Student Council shall consider improvements, amendments, or alterations of the existing constitution and to pass upon the acceptable form.
- d. The Student Council shall maintain a code of rules governing the awarding of emblems and the conferring of honors and recommend the kind of emblems to be awarded.

Article IV. Amendments.

This constitution may be amended by a three-fourth vote at any regular meeting of the Student Council, provided, however, that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been recorded by the secretary and read to the Student Council at the preceding meeting.



CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENT BODY  
AMACHE SENIOR HIGH SCHOOL  
✓ AMACHE, COLORADO  
1944-5

We, the students of Amache Senior High School, in order to promote the general welfare of the school and to allow student participation in school government, do ordain and establish this constitution for the associated student body of Amache Senior High School.

Article I. Name

The name of this organization shall be the Associated Student Body of the Amache Senior High School.

Article II. Purposes

The purposes of this organization shall be: (1) to promote high standards of scholarship, (2) to obtain maximum cooperation within the school, (3) to encourage and support all worthwhile activities and organizations, (4) to provide opportunities for social growth.

Article III. Officers

Section I. The officers of this organization shall be a president, a girls' vice-president, a boys' vice-president, a secretary, and a treasurer.

Section II. Requirements and qualifications

1. The president shall be a senior.
2. The vice-presidents shall be seniors or juniors.
3. The secretary shall be a member of either the senior, junior, or sophomore class.
4. The treasurer shall have had previous experience while in high school as treasurer of some organization, or shall have had or now be enrolled in a bookkeeping course, and shall be a member of the senior or junior class.
5. Candidates for any office shall have a C average or better.

Section III. Duties and powers of the officers

1. The president shall
  - (a) preside over all meetings of the student body and over all assemblies unless other provisions have been made.
  - (b) be chairman of the student council.
  - (c) appoint chairmen of temporary committees.
  - (d) have the power to veto the vote of the student council. However, this veto can be over-ruled by two-thirds majority vote of the student body. Such action must be taken within three days of the time that the veto by the president is announced.



- (e) call meetings of the student body or student council upon need.
  - (f) act as chairman of the executive council and call meetings of this group.
  - (g) be an ex-officio member of all committees.
2. The vice-presidents shall
- (a) discharge the duties of the president in event of his inability to act, the sponsor deciding which of the two vice-presidents shall perform these duties.
  - (b) The boys' vice-president shall preside at all meetings of the boys of the school.
  - (c) The girls' vice-president shall preside at all meetings of the girls of the school.
  - (d) The boys' vice-president shall serve as chairman of the boys' athletic council.
  - (e) The vice-presidents, when asked, shall preside over assemblies.
3. The secretary shall
- (a) keep complete minutes of all meetings of the student council.
  - (b) take care of all official correspondence of the student body and the student council.
4. The treasurer shall
- (a) keep accurate records of the receipts and disbursements of the student council.
  - (b) make financial reports as deemed necessary by the student council.
  - (c) act as chairman of the budget committee.

Section IV. Term of office

The term of office shall be one year unless recalled by a three-fourths vote of the student body for inefficiency or incompetency.

Section V. Nominations and elections

- A. All nominations for student body officers shall be made at a designated time not later than the end of the fourth week of school. Nominations shall be made in the homerooms. All nominations with the number of votes for each person will be tabulated and those four persons having the highest number of votes for each office shall be considered candidates.
- B. Petitions may also be submitted for candidates. These petitions must contain 35 names. No person may sign two petitions for the same office.
- C. All officers shall be elected by popular vote of the members of the student body at a time designated by the student council.
- D. All officers shall be chosen by a majority of votes.
- E. All officers shall enter office immediately following election.
- F. Any vacancy caused by recall or by withdrawal from school shall be filled by the student council, using whatever plan seems desirable for that particular office and time.



## Article IV. Student Council

### Section I. Membership

- A. One person elected from each English-Social Studies class will act as representative of his class.
- B. All officers of the student body shall be members of said council.
- C. The homeroom representatives will serve for one year unless recalled by a three-fourths vote of the class which they are representing.

### Section II. Quorum

- A. A two-thirds majority of the members of council shall constitute a quorum.

### Section III. Executive council

- A. The executive council shall be composed of the student body officers.
- B. They shall meet upon the call of the student body president.
- C. They shall handle emergencies where immediate action is deemed necessary by the president.
- D. They shall make recommendations to the council.
- E. They shall elect the chairmen of the standing committees.

### Section IV. Meetings

- A. The student council shall meet regularly once a week.
- B. It shall also meet upon the request of the president.

### Section V. Duties

- A. The student council shall constitute a clearing house for the consideration of questions of interest to the students of the school.
- B. The student council shall make definite recommendations and suggestions to the administration regarding any problem that concerns the students.
- C. The student council shall consider improvements, amendments, or alterations of the existing constitution and pass upon an acceptable form.
- D. The student council shall maintain a code of laws governing the awarding of the school emblem and the conferring of honors and recommend the kind of emblems to be awarded.
- E. The student council shall grant charters to those school clubs who have submitted constitutions in harmony with the school's purposes and philosophy.
- F. The student council shall act as a coordinating agency for social activities.
- G. The student council shall study the financial needs of clubs and organizations and approve the budgets of the same.
- H. The student council shall help protect school property and bring about proper attitudes toward the care of this property.
- I. The student council shall participate in planning and improving assemblies.
- J. The student council shall make provision for the welcoming and entertaining of visitors to the school.
- K. The student council shall do whatever it can to help in such situations as inside and outside traffic management, etc.

### Section VI. Standing Committees



**Note:** These committees work in conjunction with teacher committees, in many cases. This is especially true of A, B, C, I, and J.

**A. Boys' Athletic Council**

**Duties:**

1. to coordinate the work of all boys' athletic organizations.
2. to sponsor such activities as the intramural games and all other activities decided upon by the student council as worthwhile athletic events.

**B. Awards Committee**

**Duties:**

1. to furnish information to the students concerning the letter award system.
2. to keep an accurate record of points earned by individuals
3. to make the awards.

**C. Student Social Activities Committee**

**Duties:**

1. to plan the social calendar for all clubs and organizations for the year.
2. to suggest procedure including conduct for parties and dances.
3. to plan social events sponsored by the student council.

**D. Property Protection and Management Committee**

**Duties:**

1. to make suggestions for proper care of library books, classrooms, lavatories, lawn, and equipment of all kinds.
2. to carry on campaigns wherever necessary to instill the proper attitude toward the care of school property.

**E. Hospitality Committee**

**Duties:**

1. to welcome visitors and guest speakers.
2. to show visitors around the building and explain the use of the building and the work of the departments.
3. to make assembly guests and speakers welcome.

**F. Ushers**

**Duties:**

1. to help seat visitors and stragglers at assemblies.
2. to usher at programs other than assemblies.

**G. Charter Committees**

**Duties:**

1. to familiarize the clubs with the rules and procedures for obtaining a charter.
2. to submit recommendations to the student council as to whether or not a club should receive a charter with reasons for their approval or disapproval.



H. Inside and Outside Traffic Committee.

Duties:

1. to do whatever is necessary to help the congested hall situation.
2. to campaign against careless walking in the streets, etc.
3. to find ways and means of cooperating with the elementary school safety Patrol.

I. Finance and Budget Committee

Duties:

1. to plan the budget for the student council.
2. to study the needs of all clubs and organizations and approve their budgets.

J. Assembly Committee

Duties:

1. to study assembly behavior and give suggestions for its improvement, if necessary.
2. to plan definite assemblies for definite times.
3. to raise the standards of participation in assemblies.
4. to get more pupil participation in assemblies.

Article V

Parliamentary Authority

This organization shall be governed by rule of parliamentary law as found in Roberts' rules of Order

Article VI. Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a three-fourths vote at any regular meeting of the student council and by a two-thirds vote of the entire student body. Notice of such proposed amendment must be recorded by the secretary and read to the student council at the preceding meeting and to the student body at a homeroom meeting at least one week previous to the time of voting.

Note: The words "home-room" and English-Social Study class as used in this constitution are synonymous, as all "home-room" business is transacted in the English-Social Studies classes.



BY-LAWS

Article I. School "A" Letter Award

For achievement in a combination of school activities, the school "A" (script) shall be awarded to any student under the following conditions:

Section 1. Within a period of one school year, the student must earn a total of twenty-five (25) points in at least two of the following major groups of activities:

1. Athletics
2. Dramatics
3. Journalism
4. Music
5. Officers
6. Scholarship

Section 2. Not more than fifteen (15) points may be counted in any one of these major groups during one school year.

Section 3. Any senior who has not previously earned the school "A" may receive the award if he has earned a total of fifty (50) points during his entire three years in high school.

Section 4. Points for the school "A" must be earned in the various departments must be earned as follows:

1. Athletics

If a student earns an athletic block "A" in one sport he may not use the points earned in the sport for the school "A". If the said student does not earn enough points for an athletic block "A" in the particular sport, he may score points for the school "A" as follows:

A. Boys' Interscholastic Football and Basketball

- a. By playing five quarters 5 points
- b. For each quarter played in excess of five quarters, maximum fifteen quarters in all  $\frac{1}{2}$  point
- c. For playing four quarters or less and remaining on the squad 2 points

B. Track

- a. In track he will receive as many points as he won in competition, up to and including nine points

C. Boys' Intramural Competition

- a. For each member of an intramural championship team. 3 points

D. Girls' Athletic Association

- a. Meeting G.A.A. Requirements as set as the following. 10 points



1. Member of the G. A. A.
2. Four major sports a year (Averaging 18 hours per each sport which results to approximately 36 hours a year minimum)
3. Four hours of activity a week

2. Dramatics

A. Full length plays

- a. Major role 7 points
- b. Minor role 5 points
- c. Noteworthy crew work 4 points

B. Short Plays

- a. Major role 5 points
- b. Minor role 4 points
- c. Noteworthy crew work 3 points

C. The director's classification of roles and crew work in the above shall be final

3. Journalism (School paper)

- A. Two head editors 15 points
- B. Other editors 10 points
- C. Assistant editors 5 points
- D. Staff members 3 points
- E. Those (not on the staff) contributing material toward the publication of the school paper shall be awarded points; the amount of points shall be decided upon by the Journalism class and advisor

4. Music

A. Glee club

- a. Ten performances 5 points
- b. Five to nine performances 3 points
- c. Two to four performances 1 point
- d. Ensembles
  1. Six performances 5 points
  2. Two to three performances 3 points
  3. One performance 1 point

B. Band and Orchestra (200 point basis)

Two hundred (200) points in this division shall be equal to fifteen (15) points for the school "A". Points received for the school "A" shall be proportional to the Band and Orchestra points earned. If after proportioning, a fraction remains for the school "A" points, that fraction shall be adjusted as follows: If under  $\frac{1}{4}$ , no fraction added to the whole number; if over  $\frac{1}{4}$  but under  $\frac{3}{4}$ , to be adjusted to  $\frac{1}{2}$ , if over  $\frac{3}{4}$ , to be considered as one and added to the whole number.



- a. Performance with band or orchestra 4 points
- b. Performance for school 6 points
- c. Solo 8 points
- d. Correct dress 1 point
- e. Improvement-per week 1 point
- f. Good care of equipment-per week 1 point
- g. Private lessons, per week 2 points
- h. Outstanding work 25 points

5. Officers

- A. Student body officers 5 points
- B. Class officers 4 points
- C. Club officers (of clubs represented on the Student Council) 3 points
- D. Council members representing second period classes 2 points
- E. Standing committees 2 points
- F. A student may earn points in any combination of these divisions as well as in just one division.

6. Scholarship

- A. School grades  
For each subject:
  - a. Yearly average grade of A 3 points
  - b. Yearly average grade of B 1 point
  - c. Semester courses count  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the points earned for a unit credit course
- B. Scholarship Contests
  - a. Winning first in state contest 5 points
  - b. Winning second in state contest 4 points
  - c. Winning third in state contest 3 points
  - d. Member of the team, but not placing 2 points
  - e. District contests count  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the above

Section 5. Demerit system

Students shall be demerited from the School "A" for the following:

- 1. Each F for a semester average 1 points
- 2. Any student suspended from school or dropping out of school shall forfeit his right to the school "A" for that year.

Section 6. Awards committee

- 1. The student council shall maintain an awards committee of ten (10) to determine each student's eligibility for the school "A". Three of the committee shall be members of the student council and the chairman shall be one of the three said council members.

Section 7. The school "A" shall be presented to the eligible students before an assembly of the Student Body.



Article . . Boys' Athletic Block "A"

Section 1. The boys' athletic block "A" shall be of three types

Section 2. Each letter may be accompanied by a smaller emblem, denoting the sport in which the award was won.

Section 3. Any student may earn a block "A" in football or basketball by remaining on the squad, playing in at least sixteen (16) quarters in interscholastic competition, and in track by winning at least ten (10) points under the following point system:

Section 6. Whenever a certificate of award accompanies the block "A", the said certificate shall be signed by the athletic advisor and the principal.

Section 7. A student may receive as many block "A"'s in one year as he earns.

Section 8. Awards shall be presented to the eligible students before an assembly of the Student Body by the athletic advisor upon the end of each season, or whenever otherwise feasible.

MEETINGS:

Meetings were held every Tuesday immediately after school, and special meetings were held when it was deemed necessary by the president and adviser. The meetings were presided over by the president or by one of the vice-presidents in the absence of the president.

MEMBERSHIP:

The Student Council was composed of the school officers, the class officers, one representative from each English-Social Studies class, one representative from each of the organized clubs. During most of last year there were about fifty (50) members in the Student Council.

ACTIVITIES:

The Student Council sponsored the Madrigal Singers from the University of Colorado on December 7, 1943.

The Council sponsored the New Year's Eve dance.

During the spring months, on Monday and Wednesday evenings, the Kampus Kanteen was held in the high school building. This was also sponsored by the Student Council. There was no admission charge. Dancing and games were the attractions.

The Student Council took charge of the business end of the Rhythm Show, did the advertising, sold the tickets, and took care of the ushering, ticket takers, etc.

MORALE:

This brief report scarcely shows the difficulty encountered with the Student Council. Although these people had been selected because of their leadership qualities, in many instances it was almost impossible to get them to take responsibility or to make decisions. It was tried only once to have the Student




Council take part in a decision concerning a school policy which would affect a student who had been truant. They refused to do anything on this case. Gradually the morale became better, but it was as difficult during the second semester as it had been during the first to get people to run for school office. Many of them showed much reluctance to take any prominent part in the Student Council. I do not even pretend to know all of the psychology back of these difficulties.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ANOTHER YEAR:

I am not at all willing to give up a student government, and I think that we should have one and try again to build up a school spirit and a school morale which will make the student government function. A good student government will also increase the morale of the entire school. I don't know how the elections should be held, but I do think that the method of holding elections was quite unsatisfactory last year. I would suggest that in the fall, we do nothing at all about a Student Council or school officers for about a month, hoping that during that time the demands for such an organization will be rather insistant. Then a group of hand-picked students, probably not more than 15 or 20 in number, should spend considerable time with four or five teachers, discussing the entire proposition, making suggestions for revamping the entire constitution, planning how to hold elections, etc.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

The balance in the Student Council Fund at the present time is \$59.63.

5. Purpose of the club must be in harmony with the policies of the school.
6. The purpose must be in harmony with the policies of the school.
7. Two copies of the Constitution must be handed in with application.

Mits Sumada, chairman of the Constitution Committee gave a short report.

A report of the money taken in by the Inter-class Basketball Tournament was given by Frank Goi.

A motion was made and seconded that the Amache Senior High Student Council join the National Association of Student Councils. The motion was carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

1. That Article II, Section 2, which reads "All officers shall have the approval of all their teachers and of the senior high office" be struck from the constitution. Yes \_\_\_\_\_ No \_\_\_\_\_

Please vote today in your homerooms on the proposed amendment to Article III, Section 1A, which now reads "All persons selected by their second period classmates to act on the council shall be members of the said council", to "All persons elected by their English-Social Studies classes to act on the council shall be members of the said council."

Section B reads, "All officers of the student body shall be members of said council." Therefore, if the amendment suggested is passed, the student council will be composed of representatives from English-Social Studies classes and student body officers. Those will be the only ones who have a right to vote on the council, although others may attend council meetings.

I know you will soon think that I have a phobia about this: but elementary and junior high school pupils are still using the halls up here, in drone, that create very much disturbance at times. Will you please tell them that we shall discontinue all music and other activities up here for them unless they use the walks and go around to the south door of the building, which is closest to the music room. On cold days they are, of course, welcome to come into the building to get warm; please ask them not to use the building on other days. Thank you.

The student council decided upon the following regulations for Saturday night's dance, at their meeting last evening. These regulations are made in order to assure everyone the best possible time. We want all of you to come and we want you all to enjoy the dance. If we all follow these regulations, it will be a successful dance.

1. Stags and stagettes may attend the dance but there is to be no tagging during the dancing, with the exception of those one or two dances which are labeled "Tag" dances.
2. Everyone not dancing must stay off of the dance floor. Part of the gym will be reserved for those who wish to stand and talk. Everyone on the dance floor must be dancing.
3. Outsiders are not invited to this dance, with the exception of soldiers in uniform.
4. Soldiers in uniform and their dates are welcome to come free.
5. Tickets are 25¢ per couple; 20¢ for stags; and 15¢ for stagettes. Tickets may be obtained from your homeroom representatives or from Miss Lewis's office after 1:00 today.

The student council has asked Mr. Walther to close the dance if the above rules and regulations are not followed. This means that if there is crowding on the dance floor, tagging, and other unpleasant occurrences, that the dance will be declared over.

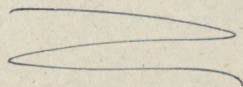

## FINAL REPORT

### KAMPUS KANTEEN

For some time, the need was evident for a place where young people of high school age could enjoy their leisure hours in well planned and directed recreational activities. For this reason, the student council operated what was known as the Kampus Kanteen. For some months during the winter and spring of 1943-44, the school building was open on Wednesday and Friday nights for all those people enrolled in Senior High School who wished to come to dance or play games. Students presented identification cards before being admitted. The Kampus Kanteen was open from 6:30 until 9:00 O' clock so that study time was not seriously interfered with. Refreshments were sold at cost. Some of the games which were enjoyed by the participants were, checkers, chess, cards, bingo, and chinese checkers. The chief difficulty with this program was that the girls were not able to, or did not care to attend. On some evenings, a hundred boys would be present and 10 to 15 girls. Some of the girls who came were more interested in games than in dancing and it became increasingly difficult to carry out the dancing program. Toward the end of school, so many parties were being held that we felt the Kampus Kanteen was no longer revived because the need did not arise. For some who were not active in block and large school parties, it was necessary and beneficial.

### STUDENT DAY (MISCELLANEOUS DIVISION)

The suggestion for student day was made early in the year by members of the Student Council who had seen such a day work effectively elsewhere.

A committee was appointed to make plans. This committee met with Mr. Walther and decided to make it a day in which students would have responsibility for the teaching of the classes, the office work, and the work of the principal, the vice-principal, and the guidance director. It was stressed from the beginning that this was to be a day of worthwhile activities and not a day for relaxation. Earnest school work was to continue.

The student teachers spent much time with the regular teachers in preparation. Lesson plans with the aims and objectives of that particular lesson, and the procedures to be used were carefully made. The students were responsible for the entire procedure from the duplicating of materials to the grading of that day's papers.

This was a Junior and Senior High School project. The Student Councils discussed it together several times. The president of the Senior High student body acted as the Principal; the president of the Junior High acted as the Vice-Principal, and was therefore in charge of attendance problems; the secretary of the Senior High acted as the Guidance Director.

Work proceeded on a high level on this day in most of the classrooms. The student teachers did a careful job and the student council in evaluating it felt that it had been a worthwhile project.

Subject: Quiz Kid Assembly
