

NOTICE OF APPROVAL OF RENUNCIATION OF UNITED STATES NATIONALITY

You are hereby notified that, pursuant to Section 401(i) of the Nationality Act of 1940, as Amended, and the regulations issued pursuant thereto, your renunciation of United States nationality has been approved by the Attorney General as not contrary to the interests of national defense. Accordingly you are no longer a citizen of the United States of America nor are you entitled to any of the rights and privileges of such citizenship.

I would like to cancel my application for renunciation of my U.S. citizenship. In time when I applied for renunciation, there was such a strong pressure group in here that I was gradually misled to apply. I tried my best to hold my citizenship but the surrounding people began to give rumors to my parent. Finally, I was forced to renounce. To prove that, I tried my best to keep my citizenship I am sending you my register mail receipt which, I sent to Dept. of Justice. Which have the date of sending.

In war time one makes hasty decisions without placing much thought of future. I realize now my big mistake. I have a brother in Salt Lake City. And my parent have relocated recently to my brother's place I now regret what I did very much.

So give me one more and the last chance to cancel my application, if this is impossible, please inform me whether it would be possible for me to be paroled out of this dreadful camp to be with my parent.


I have your letter of recent date requesting that you be permitted to withdraw your application for permission to renounce your United States nationality and enclosing, as proof of your statement that you have made a previous attempt to retain your nationality, registered mail receipt number 6742, addressed to this Department and dated February 9, 1945.

The records of this Department indicate that the piece of mail received from you under date of February 9, 1945, and bearing registry number 6742, was your original application for permission to renounce your United States nationality and not, as you claim, a communication from you pertaining to an attempt on your part to keep your citizenship.

With reference to your request that you now be permitted to withdraw your application, you are advised that no such procedure is possible. Under the law, once renunciation is approved by the Attorney General, neither he, nor any other official of this Government, has the power to restore citizenship. The Attorney General approved your renunciation on April 26, 1945.

I regret the hardship to which you may now find yourself exposed as a legal consequence of your renunciation. It was to prevent such hardship, wherever possible, that a hearing was required prior to the approval of any renunciation application.

Sir;

On about March, 1945, I signed an application for renunciation of United States nationality form at the W. R. A. Segregation Center situated at Tule Lake, Lodi County, California, at a perfunctory appearance before a government official, and I have received a letter dated April 26, 1945, from Mr. Herbert Wechsler, Assistant Attorney General, approving the same.

I hereby repudiate, withdraw, retract, and revoke the said renunciation upon the following grounds and for the following reasons:

(1) The circumstances under which said renunciation form was signed by me did not constitute a fair and impartial hearing and was a denial of my constitutional guaranty of due process of law and of the equal protection of the laws;

(2) I was not a free agent at the time when and the place where said renunciation form was signed but was then and there held in duress and was the victim of fraud, menace and undue influence and mistake of law;

(3) I then and there was and continuously from Jan 23, 1942, had been detained in the said W. R. A. Segregation Center by official authority and was deprived of substantially all my constitutional rights, liberties, privileges and immunities as an American citizen by birth and by choice and was thusly discriminated against solely by reason of the Japanese nationality of my ancestors;

(4) I was intimidated, coerced, and compelled to sign the said renunciation form by threats of physical violence to myself (and members of my family) made by a pressure group in said camp, and by members thereof, and I was in constant fear, (as was my family) that said threats would be carried into execution if I refused to sign it. I was acting under the menace and fraud of said group and its members and the undue influence exerted by them upon me and I signed said renunciation form under duress.

Because of the foregoing reasons the said renunciation and approval thereof were, and each of them is, invalid, null and void.

I am not a citizen or subject of Japan and I do not and never have owed or given that country or nation any allegiance. I am not an alien enemy. I am a native American by birth and also by choice. I recognize as my sovereign the United States of America and I give and ever have given the United States my undivided loyalty and allegiance. ~~I have no dual citizenship.~~ (If you have dual citizenship - then say: I have no dual citizenship through any act or acceptance upon my individual part.) ~~(I have served in the U. S. military services and have an honorable discharge.)~~

Therefore I demand that you withdraw, recall, cancel, and revoke your approval of said renunciation form.

I am ready and willing to have this matter re-opened and a hearing be granted to me in order to prove that said renunciation form was signed when I was not a free agent in any sense of the words but was acting under duress and under menace, fraud and undue influence and mistake of law.

I respectfully request your immediate consideration of this urgent matter.
