**A review of the Legislative Year

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THE 1986 SESSION of the California legislature was a continuance of the recent years in which the tide of gubernatorial influence has run against labor.

Governor Deukmejian vetoed 30 labor-sponsored bills and signed only 18 into law.

The veto that cut deepest was that of the unemployment insurance benefit increase bill. Although 33 states and the District of Columbia provide higher benefits than California, the Governor vetoed the bill on the theory that the money for the increase should have been found by removing several thousand workers off the eligibility lists.

He also killed three labor-sponsored pay equity bills aimed at putting the state on the path to comparable worth for the protection of women workers.

He vetoed a bill that would have prevented nursing home operators from taking slices of the annual MediCal cost of living increases intended for workers.

The Governor also vetoed bills which would have achieved the following:

- Required employment of certain quotas of California residents on public works construction projects;
- Codified into state statutes existing regulations requiring prevailing wages on public works projects;
- Required the Cal-OSHA Standards Board to establish policy concerning safety of workers exposed to cancer-causing chemicals;
- Simplified the procedures under which local prosecutors can obtain injunctions to halt operation of unsafe equipment;
- Aimed at improving the quality of public education by reducing the size of classes;
- Increased the bonding requirements for farm labor contractors; and
- Established criteria for posting of warning signs on crops where dangerous pesticides have been sprayed.

OF THE EIGHTEEN BILLS the Governor signed into law were those which:

- Require the Housing and Community Development Agency to hold hearings on the need for farm laborer housing;
- Enable state officials to enforce housing laws in rural areas;
- Authorize up to \$200 million in revenue bonds for construction of some 5,000 units of housing for senior citizens;
- Identify and evaluate pollutants associated with indoor air pollution;
- Strengthen hazardous waste laws; and
- Obligate the state's institutions of higher learning to consider ergonomic factors in purchasing office furniture and equipment including VDTs.

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Bills Enacted

LABOR STANDARDS ENFORCEMENT

1. **SB 1726 (Bill Greene)** requires the labor commissioner to make every reasonable effort to ensure that judgments for compensation are satisfied, including taking all appropriate legal action and requires the employer to deposit a specified bond.

2. **AB 2757 (Floyd)** authorizes the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to use information obtained by the Employment Development Department in the administration of the unemployment insurance law for the purpose of enforcing state wage and hour laws.

CIVIL RIGHTS

3. **SB 1895 (Watson)** gives the Department of Fair Employment and Housing authority to bring an action in court to reduce orders to a judgment.

EMPLOYEE RIGHTS

4. **AB 3603 (Agnos)** requires any employer who intends to use a flexible scheduling technique, as permitted by an order of the Industrial Welfare Commission, requiring a vote of the affected employees to make a full disclosure in writing to each such employee.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

5. **SB 1495 (Bill Greene)** permits a person to receive unemployment insurance benefits if he or she works less than the normal workweek when participating in a shared work unemployment compensation benefit program approved by the Director of Employment Development.

6. **SB 1571 (Bill Greene)** renews the program providing extended unemployment benefits to workers who have been laid off due to plant closures and are participating in retraining programs.

7. **AB 1994 (McAlister)** provides that retirement benefits shall not be offset against unemployment benefits if the claimant has made any contribution to the retirement benefits.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

8. **AB 3000 (McAlister)** appropriates \$2,287,000 from the Employment Development Department Contingent Fund to the Uninsured Employers Fund to overcome estimated deficiencies for the payment of workers' compensation benefits to injured workers.

DISABILITY INSURANCE

9. **SB 1633 (Bill Greene)** increases worker contributions to the disability insurance fund to insure the continued solvency of the fund.

10. **SB 1577 (Lockyer)** makes permanent a provision in law, due to

expire on January 1, 1987, that allows a worker to receive a maximum of 52 weeks of unemployment disability benefits.

11. **AB 2728 (Floyd)** provides that an individual is eligible for disability benefits if enrolled in a qualified drug or alcohol rehabilitation program in another state.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

12. **SB 1998 (Bill Greene)** requires Cal/OSHA approval for use of a diesel engine in mines or tunnels.

13. **AB 3052 (Tanner)** identifies and evaluates pollutants associated with indoor air pollution.

14. **AB 3222 (Floyd)** requires that portable or permanent electrical generators connected to commercial, industrial, or residential structures be connected only to that electrical system by means of a double pole, double throw switch.

15. **AB 4233 (Hayden)** obligates the state's institutions of higher learning to consider ergonomic factors in purchasing office furniture and equipment including VDTs.

ENVIRONMENT

16. **SB 2424 (Torres)** revises and recasts the enforcement of hazardous waste laws and regulations by the imposition of civil penalties, the issuance of injunctions, and the issuance of orders by the state Director of Health Services.

17. **SB 2575 (McCorquodale)** prohibits a contractor from engaging in a removal or remedial action concerning a release of specified hazardous substances without having passed an approved hazardous substance removal certification examination.

CONSUMER PROTECTION

18. **AB 3333 (Arelas)** regulates credit card interest rates and fees.

Bills Passed, But Vetoed

LABOR STANDARDS ENFORCEMENT

1. **SB 276 (Roberti)** would have improved laws regarding the payment of prevailing rates on public works construction.

2. **SB 1616 (Bill Greene)** would have strengthened provisions for auditing employers who are suspected of under-reporting their payrolls for the purpose of computing workers' compensation premiums.

3. **AB 3934 (Connelly)** would have required farm labor contractors to deposit a surety bond with the labor commissioner to be an amount equal to the total wage bill for the highest calendar quarter of the most recent year, but not less than \$25,000.

EMPLOYEE RIGHTS

4. **AB 4177 (Margolin)** would have provided that an agreement between an employer and its employees for a regularly scheduled workweek with workdays longer than eight hours per day without payment of premium wages, as permitted by regulations of the Industrial Welfare Commission, shall not become effective until it is ratified in a secret ballot election by at least 2/3 of the affected employees and is filed with the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement and shall not remain effective for a period of more than three years.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

5. **AB 561 (Floyd)** would have made permanent law compensating firefighters for exposure to cancer-causing materials.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

6. **SB 1651 (Petris)** would have provided that two members of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board be from management, rather than from the field of management, and two members be from organized labor, rather than from the field of labor.

7. **SB 1741 (Petris)** would have provided coverage for university and college students using laboratories under the Hazardous Substances Information and Training Act.

8. **SB 1756 (Petris)** would have required growers to post warning signs around fields which have been sprayed with specified pesticides.

9. **SB 1899 (Bill Greene)** would have streamlined the process by which the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board responds to petitions for new safety and health standards.

10. **SB 2000 (Bill Greene)** would have clarified the meaning of a "serious" violation of carcinogenic standards by an employer.

11. **AB 1157 (Connelly)** would have required the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to give first priority in the development of standards for carcinogens as determined by the International Agency for Research on Cancer.

12. **AB 3047 (Floyd)** would have strengthened OSHA's preventive inspection program and targeted high hazard industries for more frequent inspections.

13. **AB 2742 (Floyd)** would have required the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to investigate any possible occupational safety and health hazards associated with the use of VDTs.

14. **AB 4248 (Margolin)** would have required the adoption of generic carcinogen regulations to classify, identify, and regulate cancer-causing chemicals.

15. **AB 4296 (Margolin)** would have established stronger penalties for violation of a Cal/OSHA prohibition of use order.

16. **AB 4307 (Margolin)** would have provided that any authorized representative of the Division of Occupational Safety and Health may prohibit the use of a piece of unsafe equipment at a place of employment

for 24 hours on his or her finding that its continued use is likely to cause death or serious injury or illness.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

17. **SB 2100 (Rosenthal)** would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment benefit from \$166 to \$186 a week.

COMPARABLE WORTH

18. **SB 1957 (Roberti)** would have established the state Commission on Pay Equity recommended by the California Comparable Worth Task Force to determine what sex-based inequities exist in state employment.

19. **SB 2347 (Lockyer)** would have required the Department of Fair Employment and Housing and the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to work together on pay equity issues.

20. **AB 2864 (Klehs)** would have required the Department of Fair Employment and Housing to receive and tabulate for statistical purposes complaints and inquiries on the subject of comparable worth.

EDUCATION

21. **SB 1604 (Hart)** would have improved the quality of public education by initiating and funding a program to reduce class size.

22. **SB 1622 (Leroy Greene)** would have protected seniority rights of classified school employees, if, as a result of reorganization of special education programs, the employees were employed, terminated, reassigned or transferred.

JOB PRESERVATION

23. **AB 3715 (Statham)** would have prohibited the California Film Office from charging fees for the use of state park property or for the charging for compensation of employees of the Dept. of Parks and Recreation for services provided.

24. **SB 2532 (Roberti)** would have required that 50% of the total worker hours on all public works projects in the state be performed by bona fide California residents.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

25. **SB 2533 (Lockyer)** would have provided members of the University of California Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory Protective Force with peace officer status.

26. **AB 3789 (Robinson)** would have provided that if a mediator is unable to effect settlement of dispute between the state and civil service employees and declares that factfinding is appropriate to the resolution of the impasse, either party may request that their differences be submitted to a factfinding panel.

HOUSING

27. **SB 942 (Leroy Greene)** would have provided funds for housing

assistance to the homeless.

28. **AB 4005 (Roos)** would have prevented landlords from claiming tax deductions on monies gained from the rental of substandard housing.

HEALTH CARE

29. **AB 4172 (Agos)** would have required long-term health care facilities to pass through to nonadministrative employees 75 percent of the Medi-Cal payment rate increase attributable to labor costs for nonadministrative employees in relation to the dollar amount attributed to the wages and benefits component of the Medi-Cal cost-of-living adjustment and provided sanctions for non-compliance.

CHILD CARE

30. **SB 2197 (Watson)** would have mandated a study of the need for child care among the employees of the state university system.

Note: In addition to the 30 favorable bills listed above, SB 469, a bad bill, was vetoed by Governor Deukmejian.

SB 469 (Dills) would have extended the seven-year limit on contracts that recording companies currently can require performing artists to sign.

- 2. Safety and Health¹** (AB 3047-Floyd) would have strengthened OSHA's preventive inspection program and targeted high hazard industries for more frequent inspections. Passed 47-29, June 16, 1986. (YES = **Right**)
- 3. Safety and Health²** (AB 3222-Floyd) requires that portable or permanent electrical generators connected to commercial, industrial, or residential structures be connected only to that electrical system by means of a double pole, double throw switch. Passed 47-23, May 19, 1986. (YES = **Right**)
- 4. Safety and Health³** (AB 3238-Tanner) would have required the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board to adopt an indoor air pollution standard. Passed 42-28, May 19, 1986. (YES = **Right**)
- 5. Pregnancy Leave** (AB 3340-Maxine Waters) would have provided that it is an unlawful employment practice under the Fair Employment and Housing Act for any employer to refuse to allow an employee, rather than a female employee, who is disabled, rather than affected, by pregnancy, childbirth, or related medical conditions to take leave on account of pregnancy, not to exceed four months. Passed 47-28, June 9, 1986. (YES = **Right**)

Safety and Health⁴** (AB 3512-Connelly) would have enacted the Workplace Hazards Prevention and Education Act to provide grants to public and private employer associations, unions, educational institutions, and nonprofit organizations for the purpose of educating workers on the use of hazardous substances. 10. Public Employees¹ (AB 3789-Robinson) would have provided that if a mediator is unable to effect settlement of dispute between the state and civil service employees and declares that factfinding is appropriate to the resolution of the impasse, either party may request that their differences be submitted to a factfinding panel. Passed 43-29, May 19, 1986. (YES = **Right**)

15. Employee Rights (AB 4177-Margolin) would have provided that an agreement between an employer and its employees for a regularly scheduled workweek with workdays longer than eight hours per day without payment or premium wages, as permitted by regulations of the Industrial Welfare Commission, shall not become effective until it is ratified in a secret ballot election by at least 2/3 of the affected employees and is filed with the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement and shall not remain effective for a period of more than three years. Passed 43-33, May 22, 1986. (YES = **Right**)

11. Environment (AB 3891-Hannigan) would have required the installation of watersaving toilets in new construction. Passed 49-27, June 10, 1986. (YES = **Right**)

74. Job Preservation² (SB 2532-Roberti) would have required that 50% of the total worker hours on all public works projects in the state be performed by bona fide California residents. Passed 13-9, August 12, 1986. (YES = **Right**)
