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THE ABOLITION of Cal-OSHA dominated the legislative experience of 1987. Governor Deukmejian's stunning action early in the year continued as Labor's major public issue throughout the session.

The fact that a program costing less than \$7 million a year could be eliminated from a budget of \$42 billion in the name of fiscal necessity was immediately opposed by Labor as economically unwise and destructive of the health and safety of California's working people.

While the money was restored by legislative action, the Governor vetoed its inclusion in the multi-billion dollar budget.

Otherwise, the 1987 session was a continuance of the past four years with the Governor signing some AFL-CIO-backed bills and vetoing almost twice as many.

He signed 13 bills supported by the federation in 1987, of which 4 were workers' compensation bills: that require payroll audits to ensure payment of premiums; disseminate information on claims and procedures; repeal the sunset clause on fire fighters' cancer presumption; and add a labor and a management member to the Workers Compensation Insurance Rating Bureau.

Other bills signed make tree spiking a felony; support industrial drug rehabilitation programs; speed IWC wage order procedures; liberalize tax credits for preservation of low-income housing; extend the sunset date on unemployment insurance retraining benefits programs; prohibit discrimination in hospital emergency rooms; and eliminate tax deductions for private clubs which discriminate on the basis of age, sex, race, religion or national origin.

The Governor signed a federation-opposed bill that deprives race-track employees of overtime pay.

In addition to his budget cut that eliminated Cal-OSHA funding for the private sector, the Governor vetoed 23 federation-supported bills, including 7 on worker safety and health.

He also vetoed bills calling for a raise in unemployment insurance benefits from \$166 to \$181 and legislation affecting public works employment, job training eligibility and benefits, voter registration practices, parental leave, wage claims, wage orders for construction industry workers, protection for seniors from abusive insurance agents and class size in the state's schools.

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Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

DISABILITY INSURANCE

1. **AB 1468 (Eaves)** requires the Employment Development Department to develop a program of education concerning state disability insurance rights and benefits, and requires employers to give employees notices of these rights and benefits.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

2. **SB 227 (Bill Greene)** requires payroll audits to ensure the proper amount of workers' compensation insurance premium has been paid when the Department of Industrial Relations, the Employment Development Department or another state agency determines an employer has under-reported its payroll.

3. **SB 656 (Bill Greene)** increases the information provided to injured workers, employers, employees and insurance companies concerning workers' compensation claims and procedures.

4. **SB 1037 (Torres)** repeals sunset clause on fire fighters' cancer presumption for purposes of determining eligibility for workers' compensation benefits.

5. **AB 1704 (Peace)** requires the Insurance Commissioner to appoint a labor and a management member to serve on the governing board of the Workers' Compensation Insurance Rating Bureau which oversees rate setting and other issues affecting workers' compensation.

ENVIRONMENT

6. **AB 2588 (Connelly)** requires industries to provide a full accounting of their toxic emissions and, where warranted, requires them to complete a detailed analysis of the effect of these emissions on people's health.

WORKER SAFETY

7. **SB 1176 (Keene)** makes it a felony to spike trees intended for harvest and requires any person whose act of tree spiking causes bodily injury to be punished by an additional 3 year prison term.

DRUG TREATMENT

8. **AB 397 (O'Connell)** extends the state law requiring employers of 25 or more employees to make reasonable accommodations for employees participating in alcoholic rehabilitation programs to also cover drug rehabilitation programs.

INDUSTRIAL WELFARE COMMISSION

9. **SB 779 (Bill Greene)** requires the Industrial Welfare Commission to set a matter for consideration and issue a written decision within 120 days of the receipt of a petition to change wage order provisions regarding hours or working conditions.

HOUSING

10. **SB 113 (Leroy Greene)** makes preservation of existing subsidized housing a top priority for use of federal low income housing tax credits in California.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

11. **SB 1083 (Bill Greene)** extends for 5 years the sunset date on the unemployment insurance Retraining Benefits Program.

HEALTH

12. **AB 214 (Margolin)** prohibits basing an emergency patient's treatment on the patient's race, ethnicity, origin, religion, national origin, citizenship, age, sex, pre-existing medical condition, physical or mental handicap, insurance status, economic status, or ability to pay for medical services.

CIVIL RIGHTS

13. **AB 239 (Moore)** disallows a tax deduction for expenses in connection with a private club which discriminates on the basis of age, sex, race, religion, or national origin in its membership.

Federation-Opposed Bill Enacted

INDUSTRIAL WELFARE COMMISSION

1. **SB 342 (Maddy)** takes away overtime pay from racetrack stable hands after 40 hours work and on the 7th workday.

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

WORKER SAFETY AND HEALTH CAL-OSHA BUDGET

After the Legislature restored funds for Cal/OSHA which the Governor had eliminated in the budget, he used his veto power to eliminate Cal/OSHA funding for the private sector.

1. **AB 889 (Bill Greene)** would have restored Cal/OSHA jurisdiction over mines.
2. **AB 348 (Tanner)** would have required the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to report to the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board recommendations on its study on the need for video display terminal-related standards by July 1, 1988.
3. **AB 435 (Floyd)** would have created a new criminal penalty for an employer to knowingly or negligently maintain a condition, practice or process which would create a substantial probability that death or serious physical harm could result.
4. **AB 474 (Margolin)** would have included as a regulated carcinogen under the Occupational Carcinogen Control Act any carcinogen on the Governor's list published pursuant to the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986.
5. **AB 701 (Floyd)** would have strengthened public sector enforcement of Cal/OSHA.
6. **AB 1279 (Hayden)** would have prohibited employers from sending subliminal messages on video display terminals or by other means to workers without their consent.
7. **AB 1701 (Peace)** would have increased the civil penalty assessed for a serious Cal/OSHA violation when the violation is the cause of, or results in, an employee incurring a serious injury or a serious exposure.

MINIMUM WAGE

8. **SB 1658 (Torres)** would have increased the minimum wage by 90 cents an hour to \$4.25 an hour effective January 1, 1988.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

9. **SB 346 (Rosenthal)** would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$166 to \$181.

PARENTAL LEAVE

10. **AB 368 (Moore)** would have made it an unlawful employment practice for an employer of over 25 employees to refuse to

grant a reasonable request by an employee for a leave of up to four months for child rearing.

PUBLIC WORKS

11. **SB 1643 (Keene)** would have required at least 50 percent of all work performed on public works projects to be done by California residents.

LABOR RELATIONS

12. **AB 452 (Margolin)** would have required employers to pay accrued vacation pay during a strike or lockout of over 90 days.

13. **AB 1470 (Floyd)** would have established the California Labor-Management Relations Council in the Governor's office and required the Council to promote and initiate efforts to improve labor-management relations.

WORKERS' PROTECTIONS

14. **AB 391 (Floyd)** would have established a time limit for the Labor Commissioner to hear wage claims.

15. **AB 809 (Floyd)** would have provided that until the Industrial Welfare Commission adopted orders for the construction industry, the manufacturing industry orders would apply to construction workers.

16. **AB 922 (Floyd)** would have made an employer in violation of payment of wages, liable for the unpaid wages, interest on the wages and reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs.

JOB TRAINING

17. **SB 122 (Bill Greene)** would have improved eligibility requirements to allow unemployed persons who lack skills to be competitive in the labor market, to participate in retraining programs.

18. **AB 2024 (Maxine Waters)** would have extended eligibility for Employment Training Panel funds to persons whose unemployment insurance eligibility had been exhausted for up to two years rather than one year as present law provides.

ELECTIONS

19. **AB 899 (Bates)** would have allowed voter registration cards to be mailed on request by DMV with vehicle registration forms.

HEALTH INSURANCE

20. **AB 1108 (Connelly)** would have protected seniors from abusive practices of unscrupulous Medigap insurance agents.

EDUCATION

21. **SB 436 (Hart)** would have appropriated \$75 million to establish a program to reduce class size.

INSURANCE

22. **SB 911 (Robbins)** would have required, after a minimum of 20 percent of the annual premium was paid, an assigned risk automobile insurance plan to permit the remaining premium to be paid in equal monthly installments over a 9 month period.

THE ARTS

23. **SB 1050 (Mello)** would have made an appropriation of \$110,000 to the California Arts Council and established a partnership program between local arts agencies and the Music Performance Trust.

1. Safety and Health¹ (SB 152-Alquist) Twenty-seven

Yes votes were required to override Governor Deukmejian's budget cut and restore the \$7 million needed to fund the state's workplace safety and health program. Failed 25-9, July 16, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

2. Workers' Compensation¹ (SB 323-Lockyer)

would increase temporary disability and death benefits and make various procedural reforms. Passed 22-14, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

- 3. Industrial Welfare Commission** (SB 342-Maddy) takes away overtime pay from racetrack stable hands after 40 hours work and on the 7th workday. Passed 27-8, May 28, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

1. Consumer Protection (AB 2-Areias) would have made restrictions on annual percentage rate charges on bank credit cards. Passage refused 28-40, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

2. Health (AB 214-Margolin) prohibits basing an emergency patient's treatment on the patient's race, ethnicity, origin, religion, national origin, citizenship, age, sex, pre-existing medical condition, physical or mental handicap, insurance status, economic status, or ability to pay for medical services. Passed 48-29, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

3. Civil Rights (AB 239-Moore) disallows a tax deduction for expenses in connection with a private club which discriminates on the basis of age, sex, race, religion, or national origin in its membership. Passed 56-16, July 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

4. Public Transportation (AB 267-Floyd) would have prohibited an operator of public transportation from using public funds for operating costs during a strike or lockout directly involving the operator. Passage refused 38-34, April 20, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

5. Labor Commissioner (AB 307-Margolin) would have corrected an adverse court decision regarding subpoena power of the state labor commissioner. Passage refused 36-39, June 15, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

6. Safety and Health¹ (AB 348-Tanner) would have required the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to report to the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board recommendations on its study on the need for video display terminal-related standards by July 1, 1988. Passed 67-6, April 20, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

7. Parental Leave (AB 368-Moore) would have made it an unlawful employment practice for an employer of over 25 employees to refuse to grant a reasonable request by an employee for a leave of up to four months for child rearing. Passed 43-35, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

8. Workers' Protections¹ (AB 391-Floyd) would have established a time limit for the Labor Commissioner to hear wage claims. Passed 45-27, April 20, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

9. Safety and Health² (AB 435-Floyd) would have created a new criminal penalty for an employer who knowingly or negligently maintains a work environment which creates a substantial probability that death or serious physical harm could result. Passed 46-32, June 4, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

10. Labor Relations (AB 452-Margolin) would have required employers to pay accrued vacation pay during a strike or lockout of over 90 days. Passed 43-33, June 15, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

11. Safety and Health³ (AB 474-Margolin) would have included as a regulated carcinogen under the Occupational Carcinogen Control Act any carcinogen on the Governor's list published pursuant to the Safe Drinking Water and Toxic Enforcement Act of 1986. Passed 43-33, June 22, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

12. Unemployment Insurance¹ (AB 602-Klehs) would protect individuals who refuse substance abuse tests from being denied eligibility for unemployment insurance benefits. Passed 41-36, June 22, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

13. Disability Leave (AB 605-Maxine Waters) would have required employers with 50 or more employees to provide up to four months unpaid disability leave. Passage refused 35-37, May 4, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

14. Plant Closures¹ (AB 607-Maxine Waters) would require the Employment Development Department to prepare and submit an annual report to the legislature containing data as to plant closures or reductions in operations. Passed 41-36, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

15. Public Works¹ (AB 619-Floyd) would provide that any contractor found to be in willful violation of public works laws shall be ineligible to bid on public works contracts for a period of one year for the first violation and for up to three years for subsequent violations. Passed 42-34, June 1, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

16. Workers' Protections² (AB 809-Floyd) would have provided that until the IWC adopted orders for the construction industry, the manufacturing industry orders would apply to construction workers. Passed 42-36, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

17. Elections¹ (AB 899-Bates) would have allowed voter registration cards to be mailed on request by DMV with vehicle registration forms. Passed 43-35, June 23, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

18. Workers' Protections³ (AB 922-Floyd) would have made an employer in violation of wage payment statutes liable for reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs as well as the unpaid wages including interest. Passed 42-35, June 1, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

19. Public Employees (AB 1099-Elder) provides that when representatives of a public agency and employee organization representing peace officers or fire fighters fail to reach an agreement, an impasse may be declared by either and a mediator requested from the state Mediation and Conciliation Service at no cost to the parties. Passed 44-34, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

- 20. Health Insurance** (AB 1108-Connelly) would have protected seniors from abusive practices of unscrupulous Medigap insurance agents. Passed 55-21, June 23, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 21. Minimum Wage**¹ (AB 1187-Floyd) would fix a new minimum wage at \$4.25 an hour unless the federal minimum wage exceeded that figure, then the federal minimum wage would prevail through adoption of an IWC order. Passed 44-35, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 22. Elections**² (AB 1204-Chacon) would provide that in any statewide general election a voter may register to vote at the polling place of his own precinct. Passage refused 38-37, June 1, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 23. Safety and Health**⁴ (AB 1279-Hayden) would have prohibited employers from sending subliminal messages on video display terminals or by other means to workers without their consent. Passed 49-22, June 23, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 24. Disability Insurance** (AB 1468-Eaves) requires the Employment Development Department to develop a program of education concerning state disability insurance rights and benefits, and requires employers to give employees notice of these rights and benefits. Passed 45-32, June 22, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

- 25. Plant Closures**² (AB 1490-Maxine Waters) would have required an employer with an average of 50 employees who plans to relocate a business outside of the United States to give public notice and to make a good faith offer of sale of the business to an organization of the employees or to the community in which the business is located. Passage refused 33-39, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 26. Surety Bonds** (AB 1677-Johnston) would severely limit bad faith suits against surety companies by beneficiaries of surety bonds. Passed 59-13, June 23, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)
- 27. Job Training** (AB 2024-Maxine Waters) would have extended eligibility for Employment Training Panel funds to persons whose unemployment insurance eligibility has been exhausted for up to two years rather than one year as present law provides. Passed 42-33, July 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
- 28. Drug Testing** (AB 2113-Eaves) would require drivers of trucks and buses pass a controlled substance test and the results be reported to the Department of Motor Vehicles. Passed 55-16, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)
- 29. Farm Labor Contractors** (AB 2306-Connally) would increase the bonding requirements for farm labor contractors. Passed 42-32, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

30. Environment (AB 2588-Connally) requires industries to provide a full accounting of their toxic emissions, and where warranted, requires them to complete a detailed analysis of the effect of these emissions on people's health. Passed 42-34, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

31. Privatization (AB 2626-Duplisseau) would have required public transit operators who receive public funds to annually bid out at least 3 percent of its bus service if operating more than 125 buses in the 1988 and 1989 calendar years. Passage refused 36-34, June 25, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

32. Industrial Welfare Commission (SB 342-Maddy) takes away overtime pay from race-track stable hands after 40 hours work and on the 7th workday. Passed 41-33, September 9, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

33. Unemployment Insurance² (SB 346-Rosenthal) would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$166 to \$181. Passed 45-34, September 10, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

34. Education (SB 436-Hart) would have appropriated \$75 million to establish a program to reduce class size. Passed 51-27, September 10, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

35. Safety and Health³ (SB 889-Bill Greene) would have restored Cal/OSHA jurisdiction over mines. Passed 45-28, September 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

36. Insurance (SB 911-Robbins) would have required, after a minimum of 20 percent of the annual premium was paid, an assigned risk automobile insurance plan to permit the remaining premium to be paid in equal monthly installments over a 9 month period. Passed 43-33, September 8, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

37. Workers' Compensation (SB 1037-Torres) repeals sunset clause on fire fighters' cancer presumption for purposes of determining eligibility for workers' compensation benefits. Passed 67-9, September 11, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

38. Public Works² (SB 1643-Keene) would have required at least 50 percent of all work performed on public works projects to be done by California residents. Passed 43-32, September 8, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

39. Minimum Wage² (SB 1658-Torres) would have increased the minimum wage by 90 cents an hour to \$4.25 an hour effective January 1, 1988. Passed 44-35, September 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

61. Elections⁴ (AB 899-Bates) would have allowed voter registration cards to be mailed on request by DMV with vehicle registration forms. Passed 13-10, June 17, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

62. Workers' Protections⁷ (AB 922-Floyd) would have made an employer in violation of wage payment statutes liable for reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs as well as the unpaid wages including interest. Passed 12-9, May 13, 1987. (YES = **Right†**)

63. Public Employees³ (AB 923-Floyd) would require a local public agency or the state to permit a public or state employee to donate vacation time, overtime or sick leave to a time bank maintained by the employer for the benefit of any employee organization. Passed 13-10, June 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

64. Public Employees⁴ (AB 1099-Elder) provides that when representatives of a public agency and employee organization representing peace officers or fire fighters fail to reach an agreement, an impasse may be declared by either and a mediator requested from the state Mediation and Conciliation Service at no cost to the parties. Passed 13-10, June 24, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

65. Health Insurance (AB 1108-Connelly) would have protected seniors from abusive practices of unscrupulous Medigap insurance agents. Passed 21-2, June 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

66. Workers' Protections⁸ (AB 1181-Floyd) would have provided that no employer in the restaurant industry may charge or deduct the costs for meals or beverages from wages. Passage refused 7-10, May 13, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

67. Minimum Wage³ (AB 1187-Floyd) would fix a new minimum wage of \$4.25 an hour unless the federal minimum wage exceeded that figure, then the federal minimum would prevail through adoption of an IWC order. Passed 13-10, June 24, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

68. Safety and Health⁹ (AB 1279-Hayden) would have prohibited employers from sending subliminal messages on video display terminals or by other means to workers without their consent. Passed 23-0, June 17, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

69. Disability Insurance³ (AB 1468-Eaves) requires the Employment Development Department to develop a program of education concerning state disability insurance rights and benefits, and requires employers to give employees notices of these rights and benefits. Passed 13-10, June 3, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

73. Drug Testing³ (AB 2113-Eaves) would require drivers of trucks and buses pass a controlled substance test and the results be reported to the Department of Motor Vehicles. Passed 13-7, June 24, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

70. Plant Closures⁶ (AB 1490-Maxine Waters) would have required an employer with an average of 50 employees who plans to relocate a business outside of the United States to give public notice and to make a good faith offer of sale of the business to an organization of the employees or to the community in which the business is located. Passed 12-10, June 17, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

74. Farm Labor Contractors² (AB 2306-Connally) would increase the bonding requirements for farm labor contractors. Passed 20-3, June 9, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

75. Environment² (AB 2588-Connally) requires industries to provide a full accounting of their toxic emissions and, where warranted, requires them to complete a detailed analysis of the effects of these emissions on people's health. Passed 13-8, June 17, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

71. Job Training² (AB 2024-Maxine Waters) would have extended eligibility for Employment Training Panel funds to persons whose unemployment insurance eligibility had been exhausted for up to two years rather than one year as present law provides. Passed 13-7, July 1, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

76. Privatization² (AB 2626-Duplisseas) would have required public transit operators who received public funds to annually bid out at least 3 percent of its bus service if operating more than 125 buses in the 1988 and 1989 calendar years. Passed 14-7, June 24, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

72. Insurance³ (AB 2067-Connally) would have established a new system of regulating insurance rates for all classes of insurance other than workers' compensation, life insurance, and reinsurance. Passage refuted 9-8, August 26, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

77. Industrial Welfare Commission² (SB 342-Maddy) takes away overtime pay from race-track stable hands after 40 hours work and on the 7th workday. Passed 12-6, August 31, 1987. (YES = **Wrong**)

78. Unemployment Insurance² (SB 346-Rosenthal) would have increased the maximum weekly unemployment insurance benefit from \$166 to \$181. Passed 13-9, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

79. Education² (SB 436-Hart) would have appropriated \$75 million to establish a program to reduce class size. Passed 12-10, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

80. Safety and Health¹⁰ (SB 889-Bill Greene) would have restored Cal/OSHA jurisdiction over mines. Passed 13-9, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

81. Insurance⁴ (SB 911-Robbins) would have required, after a minimum of 20 percent of the annual premium was paid, an assigned risk automobile insurance plan to permit the remaining premium to be paid in equal monthly installments over a 9 month period. Passed 13-9, August 31, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

82. Workers' Compensation² (SB 1037-Torres) repeals sunset clause on fire fighters' cancer presumption for purposes of determining eligibility for workers' compensation benefits. Passed 19-3, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

83. Housing² (SB 1268-Petris) would establish a Housing and Economic Development Subvention Program and require moneys in the program to be used for housing for low-income households. Passed 13-9, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

84. Public Works⁴ (SB 1643-Keene) would have required at least 50 percent of all work performed on public works projects to be done by California residents. Passed 13-4, August 25, 1987. (YES = **Right**)

85. Minimum Wage⁴ (SB 1658-Torres) would have increased the minimum wage by 90 cents an hour to \$4.25 an hour effective January 1, 1988. Passed 13-9, September 2, 1987. (YES = **Right**)
