THE 1990 LEGISLATIVE session bore the handprints of Governor Deukmejian down to the closing hours. Foremost in terms of evaluation was the devastating \$12.6 billion deficit that became the ensuing burden of Governor Wilson and the 1991 legislature.

In a manner reminiscent of his destructive abolition of Cal-OSHA in 1987, Deukmejian removed all funding of the California Division of Apprenticeship Standards in his final budget submission.

The 51 year old apprenticeship training system was restored on a temporary basis by legislative borrowing from other funds.

Its future has not yet been resolved.

Nothing so much typifies the regime of Governor Deukmejian as these two thoughtless assaults on worker safety and worker training.

In both actions he declared that inferior federal programs should replace the proven state systems in safety and apprenticeship.

Thus, the 1990 session was a mere extension of what the Deukmejian years had meant for labor. In his eight years of rule, there were two rare moments of liberalism: South African divestment and a long delayed but record increase in workers' compensation benefits.

In a counting sense, the Governor signed into law 35 bills.

He vetoed 40 labor bills in the same session.

There was nothing in the 1990 session to compare in any way with the historic advances realized by workers in the administrations of Edmund G. Brown (1959–1967) and Edmund G. Brown, Jr. (1975–1983).

The following pages detail the 1990 experience by bill and by vote.

There is a certain consolation about 1990: by reason of Democratic majorities in Assembly and Senate, labor survived despite a hostile Governor. Survival, however, is not enough. Not in a society that requires essential economic and social advance for workers.

Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

CHILD CARE

1. **AB 421 (Allen)** makes child care services available during regular work hours as well as weekends and evenings to all legislative employees who perform most of their work in Sacramento.

2. **AB 1169 (Allen)** establishes a 3-year pilot project to develop and evaluate a model program to recruit and train infant home care providers.

3. **AB 1428 (Hannigan)** appropriates \$900,000 to the State Department of Education for child care referral agencies.

4. **ACR 108 (Murray)** creates a legislative task force to evaluate new regulations that set minimum standards for quality in licensed child care programs.

5. **SB 78 (Watson)** authorizes the state to issue \$30,000,000 in general obligation bonds for the purchase of equipment for child care facilities.

CIVIL RIGHTS

6. **ACR 138 (Burton)** reaffirms support of the MacBride Principles of fair employment in investment of state Public Employees Retirement System funds in companies conducting business in Northern Ireland.

7. **SJR 62 (Roberti)** memorializes the President and United States Congress to enact proposed civil rights legislation that would strengthen laws banning discrimination in employment and other types of discrimination.

CONTRACTOR LICENSING LAW

8. **AB 189 (Floyd)** requires any local agency issuing licenses or permits for garment manufacturing businesses to require proof that the applicant is registered with the Labor Commissioner.

EDUCATION

9. **AB 2950 (Farr)** requires that appraisal and examination of public school instruction include research based on classroom experience that is conducted by teachers.

10. **SB 2147 (Petrus)** establishes community service pilot projects in grades 7 to 12.

ENVIRONMENT

11. **SB 2040 (Keene)** establishes an oil spill contingency plan that requires the state to respond to all oil spills in coastal waters and set up rescue and rehabilitation stations for wildlife.

HEALTH CARE

12. **SJR 69 (Mello)** memorializes the President and United States Congress to enact a national health care plan.

HOUSING

13. **SB 1908 (Mello)** provides a first right of refusal to tenants, non-profit organizations and public agencies to purchase housing projects in danger of conversion.

14. **SB 1913 (Petris)** extends the notification period required before conversion from 6 months to one year in regard to rental housing developments receiving governmental assistance, and allows for local public hearings to decide the impact of the loss of the housing on the affected tenants.

15. **SB 2011 (Leroy Greene)** requires local government to encourage affordable housing development for low- and moderate-income housing.

JOB TRAINING

16. **AB 2694 (Johnston)** provides \$2.5 million from the Employment Training Fund for apprenticeship training.

17. **SB 1033 (Bill Greene)** conforms the state Job Training Coordinating Council to changes in the federal Job Training and Partnership Act to provide local employment and training services for economically disadvantaged and displaced workers.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

18. **AB 2981 (Elder)** authorizes contracting agencies to provide increased retirement benefits for local miscellaneous employees who are members of the Public Employees Retirement System.

PUBLIC WORKS

19. **SB 197 (Bill Greene)** requires the awarding body of a public works contract to transfer all wages and penalties which have been forfeited to the Labor Commissioner for disbursement if the contractor fails to bring suit for recovery within 90 days after completion of the contract.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

20. **AB 1675 (Friedman)** allows prosecution for manslaughter after conviction of willful violation of an occupational safety or health order which results in the death or permanent impairment of an employee.

21. **AB 2249 (Friedman)** provides that a corporation is guilty of a crime if it has actual knowledge of a serious, concealed danger and fails to warn its affected employees as well as Cal-OSHA or discriminates against an employee who has exposed a worksite hazard.

22. **AB 3018 (Tanner)** provides that before hazardous substance removal work is started, a safety and health conference shall be held and that in the absence of state occupational safety and health standards concerning removal, federal standards will prevail.

23. **AB 3672 (Elder)** requires the Cal-OSHA Standards Board to set safety standards for certain oil refinery and chemical plant facilities no later than July 1, 1992.

24. **AB 3826 (Hayden)** requires the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to establish a safety inspection program for all tower cranes and employ safety engineers to inspect cranes, derricks and hoisting equipment.

25. **SB 1341 (Hart)** requires the Cal-OSHA Standards Board to adopt field sanitation standards by Dec. 1, 1991 and sets minimum penalties for violations.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

26. **AB 2695 (Johnston)** prohibits a provider of medical services from billing an employee who has filed a workers' compensation claim unless the employer has rejected liability and the employee has been notified of the rejection.

27. **AB 3977 (Johnston)** allows the Governor to suspend the one week waiting period for applicants for unemployment insurance in the event of a state of emergency.

28. **SB 241 (Bill Greene)** requires timely payment by insurers to medical care providers in workers' compensation cases.

29. **SB 1941 (Lockyer)** provides for a waiver of the one week waiting period for disability benefits if the claimant is unemployed and disabled for more than 14 days instead of 21 days as the law previously provided.

30. **SJR 58 (Bill Greene)** memorializes the United States Congress to grant a supplemental appropriation to compensate for the 1990 federal unemployment insurance shortfall in funding for the state administration of unemployment insurance programs.

TRANSPORTATION

31. **AB 2550 (Clute)** requires the Public Utilities Commission to hold public hearings in the locale in which a railroad plans to abandon or discontinue its service.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

32. **AB 2693 (Eastin)** increases penalties from \$100 to \$250 for the first violation and \$1,000 for subsequent violations when a private employer fails to provide an employee with an itemized wage statement.

33. **AB 3782 (Tucker)** prohibits an employer of 25 or more employees from discharging or discriminating against an employee who leaves work, having given advance notice, in order to visit the school of the employee's child for a parent-teacher conference.

34. **AJR 69 (Moore)** memorializes the United States Congress to amend the National Labor Relations Act in regard to reinstatement of wrongfully discharged employees with triple damages for lost pay and benefits, recognition of collective bargaining representatives and protection of employees' rights.

35. **SB 1027 (Petriss)** makes it an unlawful employment practice for any employer to discriminate against a female employee because of pregnancy, childbirth or a related medical condition under the California Fair Employment and Housing Act.

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

CHILD CARE

1. **AB 1853 (Speier)** would have replaced the existing Child Development Program Advisory Committee with a new California Child Care Advisory Committee.

2. **AB 3545 (Norman Waters)** would have required child day care employees to receive additional training in preventive health practices, first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation.

3. **AB 4155 (Norman Waters)** would have funded demonstration projects to design a system to provide information and support to parents seeking child care services for children with exceptional needs.

4. **SB 259 (Torres)** would have required the State Department of Education to coordinate public and private child care programs and services.

CHILDREN

5. **SB 2379 (Presley)** would have authorized the Governor to appoint a director of children and youth services to develop a comprehensive delivery system at the state, local and public school district levels.

CORPORATIONS

6. **SB 2500 (Hart)** would have allowed judges to sentence corporations to probation for crimes that threaten the public health or the environment.

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS

7. **AB 2851 (Farr)** would have created the Council on Economic Transition for the purpose of reporting to the Legislature and the Governor on issues relating to conversion from a defense-oriented economy to a civilian economy.

8. **AB 3591 (Farr)** would have created a working group to assist with environmental, health and economic conversion issues arising from military base closures.

HEALTH CARE

9. **AB 2569 (Epple)** would have provided that health insurance premiums be exempt as well as current income in determining the income of a recipient of in-home supportive services.

10. **SB 1791 (Rosenthal)** would have required the State Department of Health Services to waive the means test for determining eligibility of pregnant women and infants for Medi-Cal benefits.

JOB CREATION & PRESERVATION

11. **SB 1946 (Bill Greene)** would have required the Employment Development Department to establish community job centers for employable applicants who need the services of professional case workers.

LABOR RELATIONS

12. **AB 1135 (Tucker)** would have created a Labor-Management Relations Council to promote mutual cooperation in the public and private sectors.

13. **SB 1812 (Craven)** would have prohibited police officers from working as private security guards for an employer whose workplace is the site of a strike, lockout or picketing and within the jurisdiction of the police officers' regular employment.

LABOR UNIONS

14. **SB 2217 (Petrís)** would have protected unions from being bankrupted by lawsuits alleging responsibility for acts committed by individuals during a labor dispute.

PAY EQUITY

15. **SB 2078 (Roberti)** would have created an 11-member Commission on Pay Equity for state employees.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

16. **AB 510 (Roos)** would have extended agency shop status to all state university workers represented by unions within the California State University system.

17. **AB 3273 (Epple)** would have prohibited the California State University from contracting for personal services resulting in the displacement of California State University employees.

18. **SB 2850 (Bill Greene)** would have required the Public Employment Relations Board to use the services of the State Mediation and Conciliation Service in public employment labor disputes to prevent PERB from assuming the roles of both judge and prosecutor.

PUBLIC WORKS

19. **AB 2599 (Tanner)** would have extended the time allowed the Division of Labor Standards and Enforcement to commence an action against a contractor to 6 months after completion of a public works project in order to recover wages and penalties incurred for failing to pay the correct rate of prevailing wages.

20. **SB 422 (Bill Greene)** would have required public agencies calling for bids on public works projects to consider contractors' safety records along with quality of work and bid price.

21. **SB 2056 (Cecil Green)** would have required the installation of pre-fabricated office systems to be paid from public funds, when a public works contract exceeds \$10,000.

SAFETY AND HEALTH

22. **AB 161 (Floyd)** would have allowed monetary penalties on state and local governmental employers for violations of occupational safety and health regulations.

23. **AB 955 (Hayden)** would have required employers to set up workplace safety standards for video display terminals and related furniture.

24. **AB 1469 (Margolin)** would have required Cal-OSHA to comply with workplace safety standards for chemicals determined to be carcinogens by the International Agency for Research on Cancer.

25. **AB 1728 (Katz)** would have authorized establishment of a toxic materials data base in the Environmental Affairs Agency to help public agencies set up protective regulations.

26. **AB 2537 (Burton)** would have created the Crane Operators Licensing Board and made it a misdemeanor for any employer to require an employee to operate a crane without a license.

27. **AB 2825 (Floyd)** would have provided that the members of the Occupational Safety and Health Standards Board be appointed by the Governor subject to the approval of the Senate.

28. **AB 3462 (Friedman)** would have extended the deadline from 30 to 60 days for filing a complaint against an employer who retaliates against an employee for revealing a workplace safety and health violation.

29. **AB 3633 (Margolin)** would have required any owner of a building occupied by a state agency to inspect the building for the presence of asbestos and to establish a maintenance program to protect occupants and maintenance workers if asbestos material was found.

30. **AB 4006 (Cannella)** would have increased all OSHA penalties by 50 percent.

31. **AB 4259 (Epple)** would have brought county agricultural commissioners and their staffs under the protections of the Hazardous Substances Information and Training Act.

32. **SB 1834 (Rosenthal)** would have established April 28 as Workers' Memorial Day in observance of those who have suffered work-related injuries or deaths.

SOCIAL INSURANCE

33. **AB 950 (Peace)** would have required the Employment Development Department to conduct a survey of employers regarding workers' compensation and health insurance coverage.

34. **SB 2509 (Lockyer)** would have provided the presumption of eligibility for workers' compensation benefits for health care workers who contract AIDS or other illnesses caused by blood-borne pathogens after exposure on the job.

WORKER PROTECTIONS

35. **AB 77 (Moore)** would have made it an unlawful employment practice for an employer with 25 or more employees to refuse an employee's request to take up to four months of unpaid leave in a two-year period to care for children, parents, grandparents or spouses.

36. **AB 386 (Murray)** would have required the Industrial Welfare Commission to conduct a full review of the adequacy of the minimum wage beginning in the month of January of each even-numbered year.

37. **AB 3236 (Tucker)** would have created the Employee Assistance Council to promote the development of employee assistance programs to return workers to effective job performance by helping them resolve personal problems.

38. **AB 3930 (Hayden)** would have provided that any person who contracts with an independent contractor to manufacture garments, be liable for law violations committed by the contractor in regard to wages, industrial homework, minors and health and safety regulations.

39. **SB 1752 (Robbins)** would have prohibited an employer from refusing to hire, discharge or discriminate against an employee in terms of compensation or working conditions because the employee chooses a particular means of transportation for traveling to and from the job, providing it is sufficient to get the employee to work on time.

40. **SB 2844 (Torres)** would have required the state's institutions of higher education to provide personnel, academic and tenure records to the Fair Employment and Housing Commission upon request in the same manner as any other employer in an unlawful employment practice or discrimination case.

- 1. Child Care** (AB 3545-Norman Waters) would have required child day care employees to receive additional training in preventive health practices, first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Passed 44-26, June 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 2. Child Care** (SB 78-Watson) authorizes the state to issue \$30,000,000 in general obligation bonds for the purchase of equipment for child care facilities. Urgency clause refused adoption 47-21, August 28, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 3. Child Care** (SB 78-Watson) authorizes the state to issue \$30,000,000 in general obligation bonds for the purchase of equipment for child care facilities. Passed 54-20, August 31, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 4. Child Care** (SB 259-Torres) would have required the State Department of Education to coordinate public and private child care programs and services. Passed 48-27, August 28, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 5. Civil Rights** (AB 3090-Moore) would have required the Franchise Tax Board to compile an annual list of the names of any clubs holding an alcoholic beverage license that restricts membership on the basis of age, sex, race, religion, color, ancestry or national origin. Passed 47-24, May 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 6. Civil Rights** (ACR 138-Burton) reaffirms support of the MacBride Principles of fair employment in investment of state Public Employees Retirement System funds in companies conducting business in Northern Ireland. Passed 49-27, April 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 7. Corporations** (SB 2500-Hart) would have allowed judges to sentence corporations to probation for crimes that threaten public health or the environment. Passed 44-28, August 28, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 8. Economic Conditions** (AB 2851-Farr) would have created the Council on Economic Transition for the purpose of reporting to the Legislature and the Governor on issues relating to conversion from a defense-oriented economy to a civilian economy. Passed 46-24, June 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 9. Education** (SB 2147-Petris) establishes community service pilot projects in grades 7 to 12. Passed 54-21, August 22, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 10. Health** (AB 2744-Margolin) would have required the state Department of Health Services to establish an occupational ergonomics program and to declare its findings relative to occupational musculoskeletal disorders. Passed 44-25, June 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

- 11. Health Care** (AB 3923-Willie Brown) would have required the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development to collect data on major health services including financial data on health care providers. Passed 43-31, June 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 12. Health Care** (SB 1791-Rosenthal) would have required the State Department of Health Services to waive the means test for determining the eligibility of pregnant women and infants for Medi-Cal benefits. Passed 47-26, August 27, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 13. Housing** (AB 1560-Areias) would have required landlords of residential property to pay 5 percent interest a year on any security deposit of more than \$50 held for more than one year. Passed 43-26, January 24, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 14. Housing** (SB 2011-Leroy Greene) would have required local government to encourage affordable housing development for low- and moderate-income households. Passed 48-23, August 29, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 15. Labor Relations** (SB 1812-Craven) would have prohibited police officers from working as private security guards for an employer whose workplace is the site of a strike, lockout or picketing and within the jurisdiction of the police officers' regular employment. Passed 48-25, August 16, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 16. Labor Unions** (SB 2217-Petris) would have protected unions from being bankrupted by lawsuits alleging responsibility for acts committed by individuals during a labor dispute. Passed 43-31, August 22, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 17. Pay Equity** (SB 2078-Roberti) would have created an 11-member Commission on Pay Equity for state employees. Passed 46-29, August 22, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 18. Public Employees** (AB 510-Roos) would have extended agency shop status to all state university workers represented by unions within the California State University system. Conference reported adopted 42-29, August 27, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 19. Public Employees** (AB 3273-Epple) would have prohibited the California State University from contracting for personal services resulting in the displacement of California State University employees. Passed 42-28, May 31, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 20. Public Works** (AB 2599-Tanner) would have extended the time allowed the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to commence an action against a contractor to 6 months after completion of a public works project in order to recover wages and penalties incurred for failing to pay the correct rate of prevailing wages. Passed 45-29, June 11, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

- 21. Public Works** (AB 3021-Floyd) would have extended the period of time for the Labor Commissioner or the governmental awarding body to take action against contractors for fraudulent or willful violations. Passed 42-32, May 31, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 22. Public Works** (SB 197-Bill Greene) requires the awarding body of a public works contract to transfer all wages and penalties which have been forfeited to the Labor Commissioner for disbursement if the contractor fails to bring suit for recovery within 90 days after completion of the contract. Passed 46-25, August 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 23. Public Works** (SB 422-Bill Greene) would have required public agencies calling for bids on public works projects to consider contractors' safety records along with quality of work and bid price. Passed 47-28, August 28, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 24. Public Works** (SB 2056-Cecil Green) would have required the installation of pre-fabricated office systems to be paid from public funds, when a public works contract exceeds \$10,000. Passed 44-29, August 27, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 25. Safety and Health** (AB 1675-Friedman) allows prosecution for manslaughter after conviction of willful violation of an occupational safety or health order which results in the death or permanent impairment of an employee. Passed 41-33, August 28, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

55. Child Care (AB 4280-Speier) would have provided income tax credits against start-up expenses for employers who establish or construct a child care facility. Passed 7-0, April 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

56. Civil Rights (AB 3090-Moore) would have required the Franchise Tax Board to compile an annual list of the names of any clubs holding an alcoholic beverage

license that restricts membership on the basis of age, sex, race, religion, color, ancestry or national origin. Passed 7-2, April 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

60. Child Care (SB 259-Torres) would have required the State Department of Education to coordinate public and private child care programs and services. Passed 14-1, August 22, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

- 61. Civil Rights** (ACR 138-Burton) reaffirms support of the MacBride Principles of fair employment in investment of state Public Employees Retirement System funds in companies conducting business in Northern Ireland. Passed 20-1, April 18, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 62. Corporations** (SB 2500-Hart) would have allowed judges to sentence corporations to probation for crimes that threaten the public health or the environment. Passed 12-8, August 20, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 63. Health** (AB 2744-Margolin) would have required the State Department of Health Services to establish an occupational ergonomics program and to declare its findings relative to occupational musculoskeletal disorders. Passed 14-8, June 13, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 64. Health Care** (AB 3923-Willie Brown) would have required the Office of Statewide Health Planning and Development to collect data on major health services including financial data on health care providers. Passed 12-8, June 6, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 65. Housing** (SB 1913-Petris) extends the notification period required before conversion from 6 months to one year in regard to rental housing developments receiving government assistance, and allows for local public hearings to decide the impact of the loss of the housing on the affected tenants. Passed 14-8, August 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

- 66. Labor Relations** (SB 1812-Craven) would have prohibited police officers from working as private security guards for an employer whose workplace is the site of a strike, lockout or picketing and within the jurisdiction of the police officers' regular employment. Passed 15-8, August 8, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 67. Pay Equity** (SB 2078-Roberti) would have created an 11-member Commission on Pay Equity for state employees. Passed 14-8, August 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 68. Public Works** (AB 2599-Tanner) would have extended the time allowed the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to commence an action against a contractor to 6 months after completion of a public works project in order to recover wages and penalties incurred for failing to pay the correct rate of prevailing wages. Passed 14-8, May 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 69. Public Works** (SB 2056-Cecil Green) would have required the installation of pre-fabricated office systems to be paid from public funds, when a public works contract exceeds \$10,000. Passed 14-9, August 22, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
- 70. Safety and Health** (AB 2249-Friedman) provides that a corporation is guilty of a crime if it has actual knowledge of a serious, concealed danger and fails to warn its affected employees as well as Cal-OSHA or

discriminates against an employee who has exposed a worksite hazard. Passed 12-5, January 17, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

71. Safety and Health (AB 2537-Burton) would have created the Crane Operators Licensing Board and made it a misdemeanor for any employer to require an employee to operate a crane without a license. Passed 13-8, May 15, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

72. Safety and Health (AB 3462-Friedman) would have extended the deadline from 30 to 60 days for filing a complaint against an employer who retaliates against an employee for revealing a workplace safety and health violation. Passed 14-8, June 13, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

73. Safety and Health (AB 3633-Margolin) would have required any owner of a building occupied by a state agency to inspect the building for the presence of asbestos and to establish a maintenance program to protect the occupants and maintenance workers if asbestos material was found. Passed 14-8, June 13, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

74. Safety and Health (AB 3826-Hayden) requires the Division of Occupational Safety and Health to establish a safety inspection program for all tower cranes and employ safety engineers to inspect cranes, derricks and hoisting equipment. Passed 17-5, May 30, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

75. Safety and Health (AB 4006-Cannella) would have increased all OSHA penalties by 50 percent. Passed 13-5, April 25, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

76. Safety and Health (SB 1834-Rosenthal) would have established April 28 as Workers' Memorial Day in observance of those who have suffered work-related injuries or deaths. Passed 14-2, April 25, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

77. Social Insurance (AB 2695-Johnston) prohibits a provider of medical services from billing an employee who has filed a worker's compensation claim unless the employer has rejected liability and the employee has been notified of the rejection. Passed 20-1, June 6, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

78. Social Insurance (AB 3680-Farr) would have allowed non-profit employers who owe unemployment insurance taxes to choose retroactively to pay either the back taxes owed or the benefits collected under their account. Passed 22-0, June 13, 1990. (YES = **Wrong**)

79. Social Insurance (AB 3977-Johnston) allows the Governor to suspend the one week waiting period for applicants for unemployment insurance in the event of a state of emergency. Passed 21-0, May 8, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

80. Social Insurance (SB 241-Bill Greene) requires timely payment by insurers to medical care providers in workers' compensation cases. Passed 22-0, August 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

81. Social Insurance (SB 1941-Lockyer) provides for a waiver of the one week waiting period for disability benefits if the claimant is unemployed and disabled for more than 14 days instead of 21 days as the law previously provided. Passed 22-0, August 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

82. Social Insurance (SB 2509-Lockyer) would have provided the presumption of eligibility for workers who contract AIDS or other illnesses caused by blood-borne pathogens after exposure on the job. Passed 13-8, August 1, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

83. Worker Protections (AB 386-Murray) would have required the Industrial Welfare Commission to conduct a full review of the adequacy of the minimum wage

beginning in the month of January of each even-numbered year. Passed 12-8, January 23, 1990. (YES = **Right**)



84. Worker Protections (AB 3203-Speier) would have limited the number of hours of work for a resident physician in training both inside and outside the hospital. Passed 14-8, June 13, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

85. Worker Protections (AB 3930-Hayden) would have provided that any person who contracts with an independent contractor to manufacture garments, be liable for law violations committed by the contractor in regard to wages, industrial homework, minors and health and safety regulations. Passed 13-8, May 8, 1990. (YES = **Right**)

86. Worker Protections (SB 2083-Torres) would have permitted an employee, the Department of Industrial Relations or the Division of Labor Standards Enforcement to recover interest on unpaid minimum wages or overtime as part of a civil action. Passage refused 8-10, August 14, 1990. (YES = **Right**)
