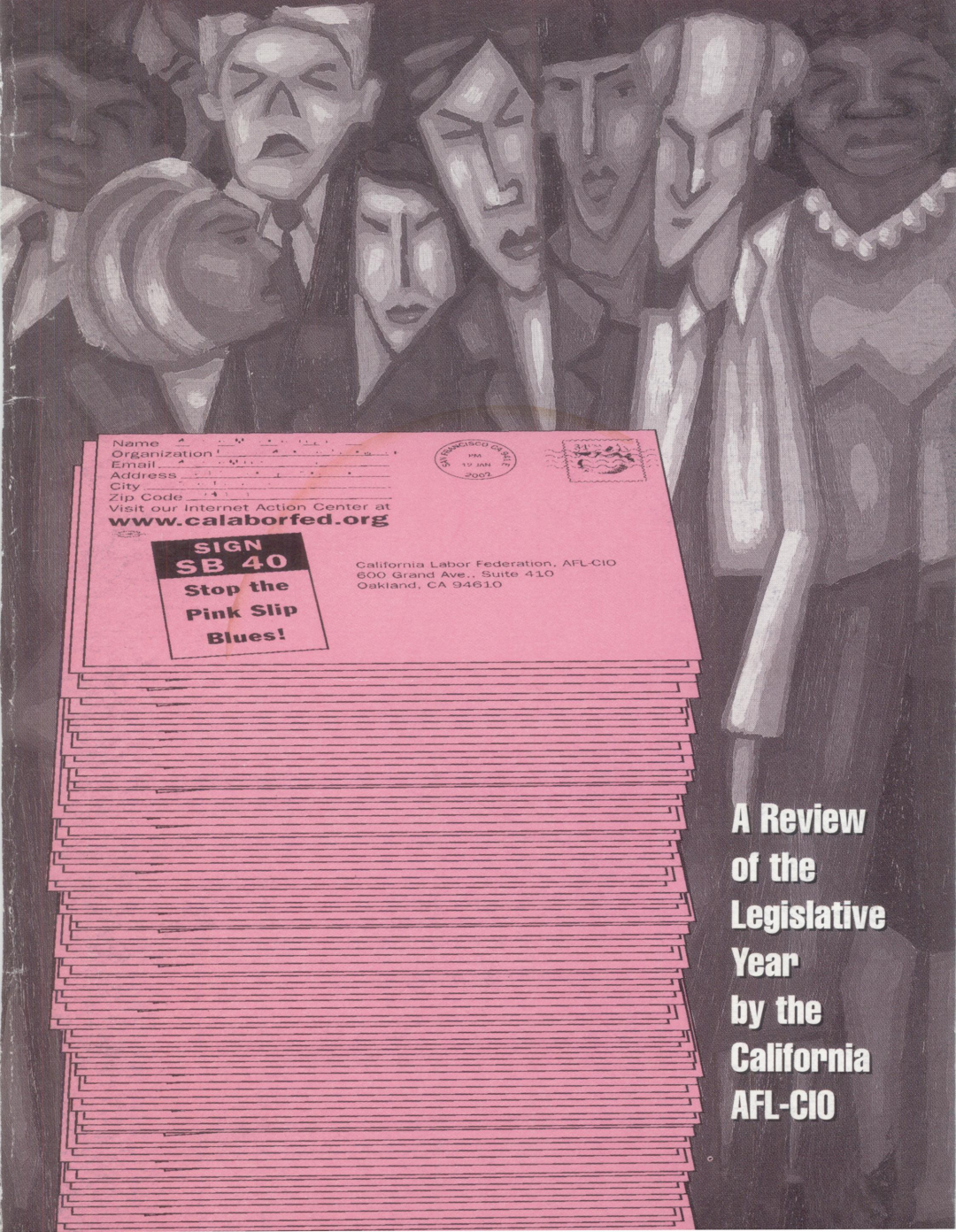

More wins to build our unions

"Stop the Pink Slip Blues" (see cover) was a successful Federation campaign to involve rank and file union members in the effort to win major Unemployment Insurance legislation in 2001 (SB 40-Alarcon).

More than 16,000 signed postcards to stop "the pinkslip blues" promptly landed in Sacramento to make the point.

Retroactive benefits for workers who became unemployed following September 11 will be a Federation priority for the 2002 session.

The Federation supported many bills to expand union membership for affiliates.

Bills aimed at developing our unions' growth and supporting organizing also topped Labor's list of accomplishments, including: SB 20 (Alarcon), AB 1015 (Wright), SB 871 (Burton), SB 1212 (Romero), AB 1281 (Cedillo), AB 1262 (Migden), AB 1069 (Koretz), SB 588 (Burton), and AB 856 (Wesson).

Additional victories brought improvements for public employees, janitors, university employees, immigrant workers, domestic partners and consumers. Prevailing wage laws were strengthened and lactating mothers were given accommodation at the workplace.

The nation's first horse racing collective bargaining law, AB 856 (Wesson), will present an opportunity to organize 3,500 backstretch workers on the state's race tracks.

Governor Davis signed 29 bills sponsored or supported by the Federation.

Early in the 2002 session, the Governor signed AB 749 (Calderon), the Federation's historic workers' compensation legislation which for the first time includes permanent cost-of-living increases for injured workers.

We will continue to mobilize our members where they live and work, then transfer their power through political action in their home districts and finally to the state capitol. This is how we keep elected officials responsive to workers' voice. Local legislative action committees are working overtime. Success for workers begins at home. This is the process, and it is working better every year.

Federation-Supported Bills Enacted

BACKSTRETCH WORKERS

1. **AB 856 (Wesson)** Creates opportunity to organize up to 3,500 backstretch workers by enacting the first horse racing collective bargaining law in the nation; monitors racetrack housing standards, and requires Labor Commissioner audits of non-union employers of backstretch workers.

CIVIL RIGHTS

2. **AB 1015 (Wright)** Extends employee anti-discrimination laws to applicants for employment and prohibits discrimination regarding lawful conduct outside of employment.

CONSUMERS

3. **AB 313 (Goldberg)** Permits redemption of coupons for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Nutrition Program at any authorized vendor and provides for information to be printed in a form readable to new scanning technology.

CSU GRIEVANCES

4. **SB 1212 (Romero)** Strengthens bargaining at California State University by ensuring employees' statutory employment rights, such as grievance procedures, cannot be superceded by a collective bargaining agreement.

DOMESTIC PARTNERS

5. **SB 1049 (Speier)** Provides that, in San Mateo County, death benefits and survivor's allowances, which are currently payable to the surviving spouse or children of a deceased member, may also be payable to a member's surviving domestic partner.

6. **AB 25 (Migden)** Extends numerous legal rights currently afforded spouses to domestic partners.

EDUCATION

7. **AB 540 (Firebaugh)** Exempts undocumented immigrants from

nonresident tuition at the California Community Colleges and the California State University.

FACULTY PART-TIMERS

8. **AB 1245 (Alquist)** Requires that reappointment rights for specified community college part-time faculty be a mandatory subject of bargaining.

FARM LABOR CONTRACTORS

9. **AB 423 (Hertzberg)** Tightens restrictions on growers' use of farm labor contractors, and includes placing the burden on growers to verify the identity of the contractors prior to entering into an agreement with them.

HEALTH CARE

10. **AB 1075 (Shelley)** Requires regulations to be set for safe staff-to-patient ratios for direct caregivers working in skilled nursing facilities.

HIGHWAY SAFETY

11. **AB 1262 (Migden)** Requires a motor carrier to report to the California Highway Patrol whenever it replaces more than half its drivers in a 30-day period, and subjects its vehicles to safety inspection, thereby making it more difficult to replace striking workers.

JANITOR JOB STABILITY

12. **SB 20 (Alarcon)** Permits janitors to keep their jobs with a successor maintenance contractor up to 60 days when their employer has lost a janitorial contract.

LABOR COMMISSIONER

13. **AB 1069 (Koretz)** Permits the Labor Commissioner to reconsider a dismissed discrimination complaint arising from a worksite-related health and safety issue, when the U.S. Department of Labor finds the complaint had merit.

PREDATORY LENDERS

14. **AB 489 (Migden)** Prevents the practice of 'predatory lending'

by imposing requirements on consumer loans, secured by real property, often defined as 'covered loans.'

PREVAILING WAGE

15. **SB 588 (Burton)** Authorizes a joint labor-management committee to bring an action against any employer who fails to pay prevailing wages as required by state law.

16. **SB 975 (Alarcon)** Expands the meaning of public works projects and broadens the coverage of prevailing wage laws to projects funded through the California Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank, which funds redevelopment and housing projects.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

17. **SB 795 (Torlakson)** Allows the Contra Costa County Supervisors to provide an additional monthly benefit to retired county employees and their survivors.

18. **AB 43 (Wesson)** Directs the Commission on the Status of Women to study gender-based compensation and classification inequities in the state civil service and higher education institutions.

19. **AB 128 (Goldberg)** Permits non-merit local school districts that have not adopted a merit system for its employees, to opt for third party binding arbitration in handling employee disciplinary cases, except for peace officers.

20. **AB 365 (Nation)** Requires that a permanent classified school district employee who accepts a promotion and fails to complete the probationary period for that position, be employed in their previous classification.

21. **AB 616 (Calderon)** Authorizes counties, cities, or contracting agencies of the Public Employees' Retirement System to elect to provide service retirement benefits for members on terms which are more advantageous for the employees.

22. **AB 1281 (Cedillo)** Authorizes card check recognition for local agency public employees.

SHEEPHERDERS' RIGHTS

23. **AB 1675 (Koretz)** Provides labor standards for sheepherders in regard to wages, hours, breaks, housing, tools and working conditions.

TAXATION

24. **AB 136 (Corbett)** Increases the exemption from ad valorem taxation on hand tools that are owned and supplied by an employee as a condition of employment to \$50,000 from \$20,000.

UNDERGROUND ECONOMY

25. **AB 202 (Corbett)** Includes representatives of the Department of Insurance on the Joint Enforcement Strike Force on the Underground Economy, thereby enhancing enforcement against employers who do not carry or who cheat on Workers' Compensation insurance.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

26. **SB 40 (Alarcon)** Significantly increases maximum Unemployment Insurance benefits from \$230 to \$450 over four years; increases wage replacement rate from 39 to 50 percent over two years, and qualifies more part-time workers for benefits.

WORKERS' RIGHTS

27. **SB 871 (Burton)** Ensures drug and alcohol screening laws relating to commercial carriers are adhered to and makes carriers responsible when laws are not followed.

28. **AB 1025 (Frommer)** Provides reasonable unpaid break time and accommodations for an employee to express breast milk for the employee's infant child.

WORKPLACE LANGUAGE

29. **AB 800 (Wesson)** Makes it an unlawful employment practice for an employer to adopt a policy that prohibits the use of any language in the workplace unless justified by a business necessity.

Federation-Supported Bills Vetoed

CAL-OSHA

1. **SB 123 (Escutia)** Would have required that members of the Cal-OSHA Standards Board be confirmed by the Senate, and

immediately leave their posts at the end of their term.

2. **SB 1215 (Escutia)** Would have required the Governor's Cal-OSHA Board appointments to be confirmed by the Senate and to leave their post within 60 days of the end of their term.

EMPLOYEE SURVEILLANCE

3. **SB 147 (Bowen)** Would have prohibited an employer from secretly monitoring an employee's electronic mail or other computer records.

FARM LABOR

4. **AB 1680 (Labor & Employment Committee)** Would have required that state-mandated farm labor contractor license classes be conducted by the Labor Commissioner rather than by private parties, such as the Farm Bureau.

HEALTH AND SAFETY

5. **AB 960 (Keeley)** Would have transferred \$300,000 from the General Fund to the Office of Criminal Justice Planning for prosecuting health and safety violators.

INTERNATIONAL TRADE

6. **SB 1111 (Kuehl)** Would have required the Environmental Protection Agency to review and assess the potential impacts of international trade agreements on state environmental laws and regulations.

LABOR AGENCY

7. **SB 25 (Alarcon)** Would have created a state Labor and Civil Rights Agency consisting of labor-related agencies (DIR, EDD, DFEH, FEHC, PERB, and ALRB).

PERSONNEL RECORDS

8. **AB 1635 (Vargas)** Would have provided employees who currently have the right to hand-copy his or her personnel records, to photocopy these same records.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

9. **SB 1061 (Alarcon)** Would have required the Bureau of State Audits to report annually on the status of labor relations at the University of California.

SICK LEAVE

10. **SB 1197 (Romero)** Would have provided that employers may not establish policies that monitor workers' absences in order to discipline them for exercising their right to family sick leave.

TEMPORARY LABOR FORCE

11. **AB 1679 (Shelley)** Would have created an employer of record who utilizes a contractors' license, and made the employer jointly liable with a temporary agency for providing wages, hours, working conditions, workers' compensation and occupational safety and health.

TRADE IMPACT ON WORKERS

12. **SB 1044 (Kuehl)** Would have provided for the Department of Industrial Relations to assess the impact of international trade agreements on California labor law.

TRANSIT SAFETY

13. **AB 1079 (Oropeza)** Would have required every public transit bus to be equipped with a two-way radio for communicating with the dispatcher in an emergency.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

14. **SB 71 (Burton)** and **AB 1176 (Calderon)** Would have increased and indexed Workers' Compensation benefits and reformed the administration of the Workers' Compensation system.

Federation-Supported Resolution Adopted

SOCIAL SECURITY

1. **SJR 8 (Speier)** Expresses the opposition of the Legislature to privatization of the Social Security system.

Federation-Supported Two-Year Bills

IMMIGRANTS' RIGHTS

1. **AB 60 (Cedillo)** Would allow for a taxpayer identification number to be used in lieu of a Social Security number for purposes of applying for a driver's license.

PUBLIC EMPLOYEES

2. **SB 1175 (Soto)** Would authorize PERB to penalize an employer or an employee organization for repeated unfair practices at institutions of higher education.

SECRET SETTLEMENTS

3. **SB 11 (Escutia)** Would prohibit information from being classified confidential in civil actions concerning bodily injury or wrongful death caused by a defective product or environmental hazard.

UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

4. **SB 1128 (Kuehl)** Would clarify who is considered to be an employee and is entitled to Unemployment Compensation benefits upon losing their job, making it more difficult for employers to misclassify employees as independent contractors.

WAGE AND HOUR PROTECTIONS

5. **SB 278 (Alarcon)** Would establish a cause of action for a commercial driver against a motor carrier who requires the driver to operate a vehicle in excess of the maximum number of hours permitted under law.

WORKERS' RIGHTS

6. **SB 1027 (Romero)** Would provide that a registered nurse or health care worker may not be compelled to work more than 40 hours in a workweek.

Federation-Supported Bills Defeated

CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS

1. **AB 1353 (Wiggins)** Would have allowed a refundable credit equal to 100% of the amount of a political contribution made by an individual, to specified types of political committees.

ENERGY WINDFALL PROFITS

2. **SB 1X (Soto)** Would have imposed the Electric Windfall Profits Tax on sellers of electricity in an amount equal to the portion of the sales price of electricity that exceeds a base price.

Federation-Opposed Bills Defeated

MINIMUM WAGE

1. **AB 1456 (Briggs)** Would have required the Industrial Welfare Commission to adjust the minimum wage for each county according to how much the county unemployment rate exceeds the statewide rate.

TAXATION

2. **SB 704 (Knight)** Would have required workers to make quarterly estimated tax payments on their wages, including State Disability Insurance contributions, thereby jeopardizing the stability of the Disability Insurance Fund.

3. **AB 475 (Cogdill)** Would have authorized an employer tax break on that part of an employee's wage attributable to a newly increased minimum wage.

32. Campaign Contributions AB 1353 (Wiggins) Would have allowed a refundable credit equal to 100% of the amount of a political contribution made by an individual, to specified types of political committees. Passed 6-2, May 14, 2001.

33. Taxation AB 136 (Corbett) Increases the exemption from ad valorem taxation on hand tools that are owned and supplied by an employee as a condition of employment to \$50,000 from \$20,000. Passed 8-0, March 12, 2001.

TRANSPORTATION

34. Highway Safety AB 1262 (Migden) Requires a motor carrier to report to the California Highway Patrol whenever it replaces more than half its drivers in a 30-day period, and subjects its vehicles to safety inspection, thereby making it more difficult to replace striking workers. Passed 11-4, April 23, 2001.

35. Immigrants' Rights AB 60 (Cedillo) Would allow for a taxpayer identification number to be used in lieu of a Social Security number for purposes of applying for a driver's license. Passed 11-7, April 2, 2001.

36. Transit Safety AB 1079 (Oropeza) Would have required every public transit bus to be equipped with a

two-way radio for communicating with the dispatcher in an emergency. Passed 11-4, April 23, 2001.

37. Workers' Rights SB 871 (Burton) Ensures drug and alcohol screening laws relating to commercial carriers are adhered to and makes carriers responsible when laws are not followed. Passed 13-2, July 9, 2001.
