The Institute of Industrial Relations has been serving management and labor groups through institutes, conferences, short courses, and other community programs. We have also given library services to some of you but we would like to have more of you visit us.



about our collection . . .

The Institute Library specializes in books, periodicals, and pamphlets in the field of industrial relations, including material on such topics as: personnel management; collective bargaining; mediation and arbitration; labor legislation; labor-management relations. For example, the Library subscribes to several commercial reference services, such as the *Daily Labor Report* of the Bureau of National Affairs. In addition, the Library has basic reference tools, such as encyclopedias, handbooks, and guides to books and articles in the field of labor, industry, and public affairs.

The Library has about 4000 bound volumes and 40 file drawers of unbound pamphlet material. It also receives a total of 668 journals, newspapers, and other periodicals. In addition to local labor union newspapers and national journals of importance to the field of industrial relations, the Library receives a number of foreign labor newspapers and journals.

Many of these books and periodicals have been presented to the Library as gifts, helping to expand the collection. For example, of the 668 newspapers and other periodicals received, 532 are gift subscriptions.

The Institute of Industrial Relations was established on the Berkeley and Los Angeles campuses of the University of California by the State Legislature in 1945. The general objective of the Institute is to facilitate a better understanding between labor and management throughout the State, and to equip persons desiring to enter the administrative field of industrial relations with the highest possible standard of qualifications.

The program of the Institute is not directed toward the special interests of either labor or management, but rather toward the public interest. It is divided into two main activities: general education on industrial relations, which includes regular University courses for students and Extension courses and conferences for the community; and investigation of the facts and problems in the field of industrial relations, which includes an active research program and the collection of materials for a research and reference library.
