Dear Mr. Collins:

First of all, on behalf of the detainees here at Fort Lincoln, I wish to express our sincere thanks to you and Mr. Tamba, for your kind aid and detailed advice which you so kindly rendered to us during your recent visit. We are most grateful to you for your kindness.

Following your departure for the West Coast, we assembled and discussed thoroughly the various problems confronting us, especially the matter of finances. All your clients have earnestly pledged to pay one hundred dollars (\$100.00) sooner or later, but as you are fully aware, the internees here are in a much worse position financially than the people at Tule Lake, so at present it is impossible to raise \$15,000 or more required but we shall send you in the form of a bank ~~money~~ money order, every cent that we can possibly raise. Please understand that all those whose financial circumstances do not warrant full payment at this time shall make payment on the balance as soon as they are financially able upon release from detention, or as soon as they are able to borrow from friends or relatives who are relocated outside. Our finance committee contacted the finance officer here and have made arrangements enabling the internees to make additional withdrawals as attorneys' fees. The following persons were elected to compose the finance committee: Yoshio Shibata, Vice Chmn.; Miki Nishiyama, Treasurer; Tatsumi Matsuura, Asst. Treasurer and myself; and in addition we have selected the following persons to act as auditors; namely, Minoru Ueda, Shigeru Toriumi, and Masaichi Ito. I shall give you further detailed information as soon as it is available.

The officials here have stated that it is still absolutely necessary that they receive your duly signed written consent and acceptance to withdraw the applicants name from the court cases before any application for repatriations can be accepted, as is the case of Goro Amemiya who has undoubtedly wired you asking for your written consent. As far as I know Kiyoshi Yukawa was able to ~~make~~ make application for repatriation to Japan with the aid of your written consent of two weeks ago. Regret to trouble you at this time but to avoid any possible delay or disappointment, Goro Amemiya and Frank Susumu Sakamoto earnestly request me to have you send me your duly signed consent in order that they may repatriate on the next boat which may sail at any moment. Frank Sakamoto's mother has insisted upon his repatriation to Japan, so please give your consent to him, also. Kiyoshi Yukawa, Goro Amemiya and Frank Susumu Sakamoto have earnestly requested that you withdraw their names from the court cases. I am sure that there must be some misinformation or misunderstanding so would appreciate your kind aid and attention on this matter, because the officials here insist that your ~~written~~ written consent is absolutely necessary.

I have discussed with Satoru Shinde, Shigeo Ikejiri, Roy Matsuda, Yasu Shinzaki and Shigeo Nakata but their decisions will be known only after having discussed their ~~family~~ family problems with their respective families through the mail so undoubtedly you shall be hearing from them shortly concerning their problems.

Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is in reference to the matter of financial pledges which is the main problem confronting us at the present time.

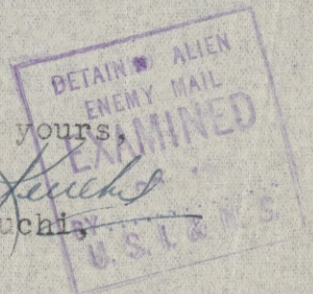
A survey in this detention camp reveals that very few internees here will be able to pay the one hundred dollars in full at the ~~present~~ present moment, but we find that everyone at Fort Lincoln has pledged to pay the one hundred dollars eventually, even if they must borrow from other parties upon their release from detention. Present indications are that on this initial drive we shall be able to forward you a bank money order for the sum of approximately four thousand ~~and~~ six hundred (\$4,600.00). As you are fully aware, some of our families in Tule Lake made full payment for us from there, thereby cutting down the total amount to be pledged at this camp. A few detainees here have written to their respective families requesting funds, so we are unable to make collections in some instances but will forward these to you immediately upon receipt of same. At present the committee members which I mentioned in my previous letter, are giving full cooperation and aid in order that we may be able to forward you the money as soon as possible. Also, Frank Yeshio Tsuchiya came to me yesterday, requesting that he be enrolled on the regular group list and that I did gladly and I'm sure that it was your desire and hope that he would join in with us. The committee members have asked me if ~~it~~ you can kindly send us about 150 so-called promissory notes which the internees here whose pledges have not been paid in full, can fill out and send to you duly signed as an assurance to you that these individual pledges shall be paid eventually. I regret very much in inconveniencing you at this time but I would appreciate your kind aid on this request for promissory notes. Also, upon receipt of the aforementioned bank money order, please send me a signed receipt for same, as we would like to give out individual receipts to these making pledges, as an assurance against any misunderstandings concerning our committee members.

Again, may I state that the officials at Fort Lincoln have clearly stated that no one may repatriate to Japan without a written statement from you stating that the person requesting repatriation has been withdrawn from all court cases, in which he may have been involved, or was to have filed.

Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is regards to the matter of financial pledges collected at this camp recently, and also in response to your two air mail letters dated January 26th.

On behalf of the internees here, I sent you via registered air mail on January 31st, bank money order #A1713 for the sum of \$4399.00, which represents the total pledges given by 142 internees on the initial drive. As you probably know, some of the detainees have written to their respective families outside for additional funds in order that they may make payment on their pledges, so upon receipt of such funds, we shall forward these to you immediately. Also, a few persons have delayed payment pending replies from their respective families in order to ascertain whether or not their families had made full or partial payment at Tule Lake. I am trying to get detailed accounts of such cases thru the aid of Mr. Larry Kataoka. The committee shall forward any additional pledges which may be received from time to time. I am enclosing herewith a list of those who have pledged payments on this initial drive; and also those whose families in Tule Lake have made full payment for their sons or husbands here. I regret inconveniencing you at this time but if at all possible, please issue individual receipts to the listed internees who have made pledges and also please send me enough promissory notes to cover those who still have a balance to be paid.

In response to your letters of the 26th, may I state that with the aid of your written consent sent to Mr. Cook, Officer-in-Charge, Goro Amemiya, 31-G, was able to file application for repatriation to Japan with his family on the next boat. Many thanks to you. Also, in respect to the case of Frank Susumu Sakamoto and family, it seems that his mother in Tule Lake changed her mind suddenly and decided to relocate to Burbank, Calif. according to a wire received by Frank only a few days ago. Frank's brother and sister in Tule Lake applied for a mitigation hearing immediately. Frank being an honorably discharged veteran, feels that since he has put you to much trouble in trying to withdraw from the cases in order to satisfy his mother and go back with her to Japan, now prefers to remain from the court cases due to financial reasons and that he would like to apply for his citizenship rights after he has relocated and is financially able to take court action. His three brothers shall remain in the court cases.

Also, the following persons have filed requests for court action thru me, following the sending of the original group petition of 149 detainees so I would like to list these names with you at this writing, to ascertain whether or not you have received their individual requests for representation. I have given each of them a questionnaire and proper number of letter copies to be sent to the Attorney General and to your office, so I believe that you shall be in receipt of these very shortly, if not already received. They are: Satoshi Mori, Yoshiro Aramaki, Shigeo Aramaki, Alexander R. Iseri, Shinji Dote, Takeshi Dendo, Tsuyoshi Okada, Shigeru Ikejiri, Masaaki Nakagiri, Mitsugu Fukaya, Frank Yoshio Tsuchiya*, Tomozumi Yanai, Leo Masao Nishioka, Kenji Fukuda and Masao Nakao, making a total of 161 internees at Fort Lincoln who have officially filed with you.

Dear Mr. Collins:

I am enclosing herewith Bank Money Order # A1743, in the sum of \$1125.00, which represents the total pledges given by the listed internees on this second drive. Please be advised that we will be unable to make additional payments from Fort Lincoln as of this writing as this internment camp is scheduled to close within three weeks and furthermore I would like to inform you that 193 non-repatriates here at Fort Lincoln will be transferred to the Alien Detention Camp, Santa Fe, New Mexico. Also, in reference to this matter of pledges, may I make the following corrections on the list which I sent previously, as I find that Shuntaro Emoto's parents had not paid in full at Tuks Lake as had been reported by him. In view of this, he has paid the sum of \$30.00 at this time leaving a balance of \$70.00. Also, according to your significant letter of the 6th, it seems that Mrs. Miyoko Nakamura had paid \$50.00 on behalf of her husband (not her brother) Satoshi Nakamura, instead of \$100.00 as had been supposed. Frank Yoshio Tsuchiya pledged \$50.00 thereby leaving a balance of \$25.00, since Lt. William S. Tsuchiya has paid the sum of \$25.00. I understand that you have received a postal money order for the sum of \$25.00 for Hiroshi Morita and in addition he pledged \$15.00 on the initial drive leaving a balance of \$60.00.

In response to your air mail letters of the 6th and 9th, please be advised that Frank Susumu Sakamoto earnestly desires to remain out of the cases, as there is still a possibility of being repatriated if his mother so decides, although she is now in Burbank, Calif. Also, I wish to inform you that for family reasons, Goro Amemiya has again had to change his repatriation request to that of a non-repatriation status, and in view of which he desires to remain in the cases as originally requested, if that is at all possible. He sincerely regrets the numerous inconveniences he has caused you, but he does earnestly desire to remain in the cases, since his family is going to remain in the United States and as he is desirous of regaining his citizenship rights.

At this writing I also wish to inform you that Matsuo Ikejiri, 30-M and Kenji Ikejiri, 30-M have earnestly expressed their individual desires to file with you and to have their citizenship rights restored, so I gave them the necessary letter-forms and questionnaires which shall have been completed and sent to you by this time. This brings the total to 163 clients, excluding the pending status of Goro Amemiya. If it is acceptable to you to have Goro Amemiya re-enlist in the cases, the total will be 164, which is nearly every renunciant here, excepting only about twenty internees and aliens.

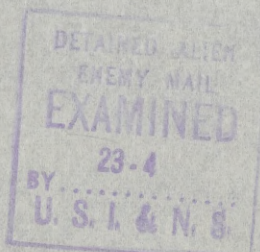

Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is in response to your most significant air mail letters of the 13th and 18th, which I gratefully received.

As suggested in your informative letter of the 13th, our committee typed out sufficient ^{PRECISE} copies of your requests for re-hearings letter-forms in quadruplicate as a safety measure in order to insure against any possible delay in case such forms may be needed. At this time please be informed that the so-called mitigation hearings at Fort Lincoln were commenced on the 13th, but as far as I know, only about three-fifths of the 182 renunciants' hearings have been completed to date, but my guess is that all will have been completed by the first part of next week, as we are slated to be transferred to Santa Fe on the 1st day of March. Please be informed that I was given my hearing on Monday and I was before the hearing officer (Mr. Shevlin) about forty or forty-five minutes which was about the average hearing time for the majority of those here, to date.

As requested in your significant letter of the 18th, I shall forward to you the names of those receiving notifications of release and also those persons names whose recommendations were unfavorable, immediately upon receipt of such information. To date ~~xxx~~ no one here has received such notifications. Present plans are to transfer all of us to Santa Fe on the 1st, but there is still a slim chance of some of us being released from detention prior to our departure for Santa Fe, though it is unlikely. As stated in your letter, it is probable but not definite. I shall inform all those here that our transfer to Santa Fe will not in any way jeopardize our rights as far as the court cases, are concerned.

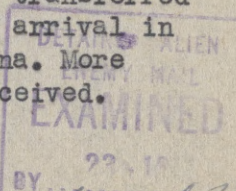

— Leo Masao Nishioka and Kenji Fukuda, who were among the latest to file with you have stated that their individual questionnaires were forwarded to you some ten or twelve days ago, but I am in doubt as to their safe arrival. If so please inform me, as I would like to ascertain just who's questionnaires have reached you. To the best of my knowledge, all the other questionnaires have been definitely filed at your office. Please be informed that I also have received a copy of the letter which you sent to the Hon. Tom Clark, Hon. Ugo Carusi, Hon. W.S. Cook, Hon. Abner Schrieber, Hon. Ivan Williams and other listed persons, in reference to your visit here and at Santa Fe.

Having written to my local draft board requesting re-classification, I was asked to complete the "Statement for American Citizens of Japanese Ancestry" form which I did so immediately and which I returned to my local board shortly thereafter, and to date I have not received my latest classification card, but am looking forward to a 2-A, 3-A, or possibly a 4-A classification if not a 1-A. One of the renunciants here who is one of your clients also, received his induction orders not long ago and he was taken to the draft board in Bismarck for acceptance and it seems that since his necessary papers had not been transferred to Bismarck he was not inducted but he hopes to be inducted upon his arrival in Santa Fe. The aforementioned internee-inductee is Richard Takao Kawana. More detailed information will be forwarded to you, as soon as such is received.

Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is in response to your numerous and detailed letters of the 21st and 23rd.

After checking with our master list, I found that the total number of clients here at Fort Lincoln still stands at 164 including Goro Amemiya, as I had stated in my previous letter, as I found that your latest listing had listed Harry Tokumitsu Oshiro and Minoru Kakutani in two different columns which I am sure, accounts for the total of 166, instead of the correct 164 clients. Please re-check and if there is any error on this please notify me of such and also if any other questionnaires have been received. As far as can be ascertained, every client here has sent in his completed questionnaire to your office at the above address.

Also, may I state at this time that the hearings being conducted at Fort Lincoln will probably have been concluded by the end of the week if not sooner. As far as I know, about forty renunciants remain to be heard. All the other internee's hearings have been completed. Yesterday, all Japanese internees here were requested to fill out forms indicating to which vicinity each of us would like to relocate in the event he is recommended for release and such recommendation is approved. It is likely that those requesting resettlement in the Middle West and also to the Eastern parts of the United States, will be asked to remain here at Fort Lincoln pending favorable recommendations from Washington or until their hearing decisions are known- favorable or otherwise- in order to do away with unnecessary expense ~~etc. etc.~~. In this way, all those receiving favorable recommendations will most likely be allowed to relocate directly from here, while those of us requesting permission to resettle in the West will be transferred to Santa Fe to await our decisions there. It is not definite as yet, but we are unofficially scheduled to entrain for Santa Fe on or about the 5th of March, subject to changes of course. As far as I know, no one here has received any notices-releases or otherwise- to date, but it is probable that a few persons may be released before we depart for Santa Fe, but this is only my opinion and guess.

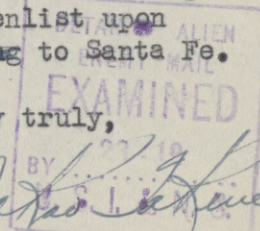
In case a few persons are asked to remain here at Fort Lincoln pending word from Washington, I plan to record their new addresses and telephone numbers if any, just in case you may desire to contact them in the future and we have packed all the records preparatory to going to Santa Fe, as it is certain that the greater majority of us will be sent to Santa Fe on this movement. I have no word concerning the detention of fathers and husbands at Crystal City, Texas, as yet.

I understand that Richard Takao Kawana is desirous of volunteering for service in the Army, so I presume that he shall try to enlist upon his arrival at Santa Fe, if he is among those slated to going to Santa Fe.

This letter is in response to your most encouraging air mail letter of the 27th and also to your telegram of the 1st, both of which I received yesterday. Thanks.

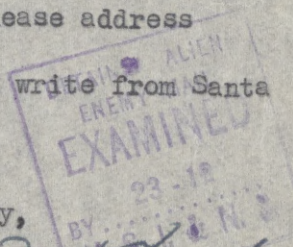
It was my pleasure to inform the committee members of your proposal to the Department of Justice, to give immediate consideration to a release of all persons detained at Tule Lake, Bismarck, Santa Fe and Crystal City, whether or not they have received unfavorable recommendations following their so-called mitigation hearings. I wish to inform you at this time, that every renunciant here at Fort Lincoln has been given his hearing and that the last of the hearings were completed yesterday afternoon, following which four Issei will be given hearings today, so I understand. In reference to your telegram, I would like to state that I have been assured that Tamio Thomas Okano, now hospitalized at the St. Alexis Hospital in Bismarck, will be given a hearing there, very shortly. He is slated to be released from the hospital in about two weeks, so I presume he will be transferred to Santa Fe shortly thereafter. I am going to visit him tomorrow afternoon.

No internee or renunciant at Fort Lincoln has received any notice of release or detainment as yet, except for one Kimio Kato, who's official release orders have been received, because of his mental disability resulting from his long detainment here. I was asked to accompany him to his hearing recently, but we were unable to complete his hearing, as it seemed that his mental condition and sense of memory was beyond control and so his hearing was discontinued after a few simple questions and his case was disposed of accordingly. He is scheduled to be released to his brother in Chicago on Tue., March 5, as he has consented to take full responsibility and to look after him.

As stated previously, about one hundred and eighty-five internees here will entrain for Santa Fe, New Mexico on or about the 5th of March, so hereafter, please address my letters in care of my brother Kenneth, if you may so desire. Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is in response to your air mail letter of the 7th which I received upon my arrival here yesterday. We arrived here safely yesterday afternoon.

Prior to our departure from Fort Lincoln, North Dakota on the 5th, we completed a survey of all the Bisma~~ck~~ renunciants-by obtaining their new relocation addresses and telephone numbers. Nearly everyone knew his future address, except for a few who were still undecided as to just where they would relocate~~d~~. I shall endeavor to make up the list of names and addresses in alphabetical order and forward the list to you in the very near future.

Since everyone has been scattered thru-out the camp, it will be very difficult for me or the committee members to keep in contact with everyone, so I advised everyone to write to you individually on matters pertaining to individual pledges or other personal affairs. All payments hereafter shall be forwarded to you individually in postal money order form. Also, it is my desire to contact your seven clients here, through the aid of Ben Adachi and add there names on the list too. I understand that some several hundred internees are scheduled to be detained here from Tule Lake, within a few weeks, if the Department decides upon this transfer as being necessary, I suppose. All group communications hereafter may be addressed to me if you so desire, as I will try to inform everyone of the latest developments thru the aid of other members.

In reference to those injurious articles in the Pacific Citizen, I would like to state that everyone here from Bismarck has deepest faith in you and your staff, so no one even pays attention to such articles and may I also state that no one is alarmed about articles published in the Pacific Citizen.

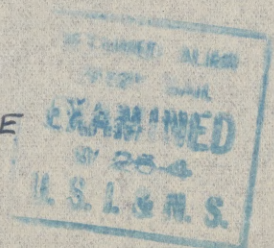

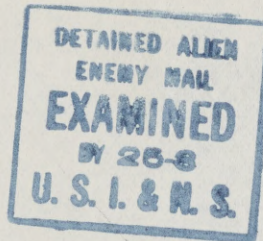

Mr. Ben Adachi desires to have me add the names of the seven Santa Fe clients on the list, so I shall endeavor to get their names and new relocation addresses, and add these to the regular Bismarck list of 164.

Also, as mentioned in my previous letter, the following persons asked me for permission to file with you in the pending court cases, so I forwarded the correct letter-forms and questionnaires to these persons, namely: Masao Akiyoshi, Toshio Akiyoshi, Tsugio Imoto, Yutaka Tsurutome and Kazuyoshi Okamoto; all of whom reside in Barrack #8. If these requests are not acceptable to you or are filed too late, please notify me. Individual postal money orders payable to you will follow.

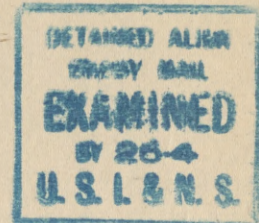

I am enclosing herewith, a list of individual relocation and Santa Fe addresses of your clients formerly detained in Bismarck and Santa Fe, all of whom are now detained here, except for two still remaining at Fort Lincoln and one in the St. Alexis Hospital in Bismarck.

Please note that on the last page (12) of this list, an additional six names have been added to the original Santa Fe group of seven, as these aforementioned persons earnestly desire to enlist your kind aid at this time, if acceptable with you. You shall undoubtedly be hearing from these six internees very shortly. If these requests are not acceptable with you at this time, please notify me.

Also, I wish to inform you that an official announcement was made public here yesterday, indicating that this camp would officially close within four weeks and all those remaining at that time would probably be transferred to Crystal City, Texas. It was also stated that approximately two hundred persons would probably be released from detention within the next ~~two~~ two weeks; and I sincerely hope that the Attorney General will decide to release everyone, regardless of recommendations, by that time.

According to your latest letter all the questionnaires, excepting George Y. Fujii's have been received.

It would be an honor and a pleasure to meet and discuss with you once again, and we shall be looking forward to such an opportunity.

According to Mr. Tamio Okano's latest letter from Bismarck, it seems that he was released from the St. Alexis Hospital on the 10th and is now staying at Fort Lincoln with five other internees who are cooks at the Officers' Mess, and who are detained there, pending word from Wash. as to their disposal, release or otherwise.

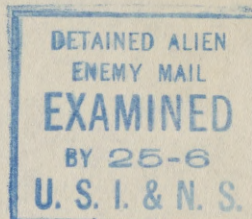

They are namely; Minoru Adachi, Nobuo Ebisuda, Takeo Fred Hamamoto, Harry Fumio Hiraki, Harry Tatsuo Iida, Mitsuji Inouye, Keiichi Kei Ishigami, Tatsuma Itani, Yukio Paul Kajikawa, Minoru Matsumoto and Sueo Matsumoto. The other two persons from Bismarck are not in the cases while the third party is from Santa Fe, originally. More releases are expected ~~to~~ here very shortly. Each releasee has been requested to inform you of their new address, upon relocation.

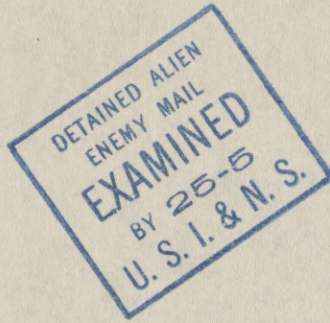

I shall list herewith, the nine (9) persons who have received their notices of release, since the last writing. They are namely; Katsuo Kiyama, Toshio Kiyama, Masaaki Nakagiri, Gengo Sakamoto, Jingo Sakamoto, Kageto Sakamoto, Yukio Soga, Toshio Soga and Shuji Uyemaruko. More releases are expected this week.

Also, I wish to inform you that Noboru Morita received a so-called "Crystal City Transfer Notice", today. It has not been determined as to just why he is to be transferred to Crystal City, but I believe it is because his wife was transferred there from Tule Lake. I gave him the necessary re-hearing request forms, in case of unfavorable recommendations. His date of departure is not known.

I wish to thank you for your significant air mail letter of the 26th, which I received yesterday. Also, my sincere thanks to you for your timely, encouraging telephone call.

I regret to hear of the interference in the release program by some well-known persons, but I sincerely hope that ~~this~~ interference has now ceased and that the release program will be speeded up, enabling more internees to be released from detention. As Mr. Williams has stated a few releases are being received here ~~time~~ to time and there is every indication that the release program will be speeded up shortly, as this camp is slated to officially close sometime in April. As far as I can determine, about seventy-five release orders have been received here to date, with the receipt of some twenty-five release orders today. Kazuo Tanigawa, whose permanent address is P.O. Box 747, Pleasanton, Calif., received his notice of release, today, as did; Kazuyoshi Okamoto, whose permanent and relocation address is: P.O. Box 291, Walnut Grove, Calif. making a total of 22 clients released, rather received release notices, as of today.

Also, I wish to inform you that Yoshio Kubota, residing in Brk.7, whose permanent address is P.O. Box 366, Orosi, California, has expressed his earnest desire to file with you in the pending equity suits, so I gave him the necessary letter forms and questionnaire, which were completed and mailed to you and other proper parties this morning. Also, Noboru Morita, who is slated to be transferred to Crystal City, earnestly desires to have his wife, Mrs. Miyeko Morita, 847 A-3, P.O. Box 788, Crystal City, Texas, sandwiched in the pending court cases, pending your acceptance of course, but I gave him the necessary forms and questionnaire, which is being sent to his wife tomorrow, to be completed by her and mailed to the proper parties, soon thereafter.

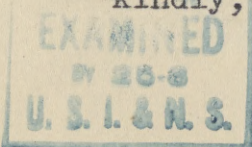

Unit, Washington, for an early release.

Tomorrow, I shall have the honor of meeting and discussing with Mr. Williams and probably Mr. Schrieber, at which time I shall extend your best regards to them. I shall also speak to Mr. Williams about Miss Teshiba's recommendation. I have been assured that arrangements can be made, permitting me to stay a while longer, in order that I may keep you informed of the latest etc. I am more than glad to make this small sacrifice, if it will help in any small way. 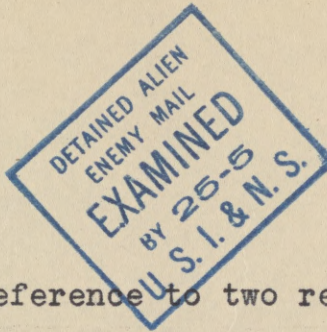

Mr. Hayao Nakagawa, Brk.#7, a renunciant; whose permanent address will be P.O. Box 521, Parlier, California, earnestly requests and desires to file with you in the pending equity suits, so I gave him the necessary forms and questionnaire, which he shall complete and mail out on Monday. I would be very grateful to you, if you could kindly accept the above renunciant, in the pending suits. The total number of clients to date is 179.

Mr. Tomohiko Higa, an alien residing in Brk.#11, sincerely requests your kind aid and advice on the matter of his early release. He was born on December 7, 1887 at Saikawa-mura, Miyako-gun, Fukuoka-ken, Japan. He resided at 7712-I while at Tule Lake. His wife, Mrs. Jisa Higa and only son Yoshihiko Higa, 17, have relocated to 2310 Catner Avenue, West Los Angeles, Calif. Circumstances delayed his cancellation for repatriation to Japan until the end of January, which accounts for his not having been given his hearing, and to date he has not received his deportation notice, though he is fearful of such action. His family is suffering untold hardships and they are greatly in need of their husband-father, so I would be very grateful to you if you could kindly aid this aged person to receive an early release or special consideration. I am enclosing herewith, a copy of the letter which he had drawn up and sent to Mr. Cooley in February, a copy of which he desires to have sent to you. I would appreciate any information or advice which you may have concerning this hardship case.

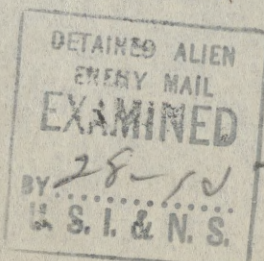

I wish to inform you that 41 additional release orders have been received here to date, making a total of more than 135 releases as of today, noon. *JK*

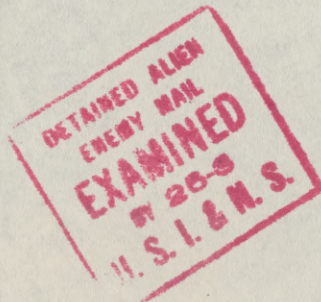

I shall keep you informed, as the releases are received. Thanking you very kindly, I remain,

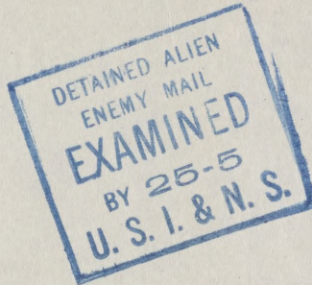

This is to inform you, that tonite our committee is busy at work, typing out the necessary number of questionnaire forms to be filled out early in the mprning and to be sent out via air mail to Mr. Besig, tomorrow. Just how many aliens will come in to file their requests for immediate stay of deportations remains to be seen, but my guess is that a goodly number will file with you and Mr. Besig. The Peruvian questionnaires will most likely be filled out and sent out over the week-end or probably on Monday. I shall do my utmost to get these out as soon as possible.

I wish to inform you that the following persons have expressed their earnest desires to file with you in the pending equity suits, so their completed questionnaires were forwarded to you during your visit here. They are namely: Masatsuji Harry Ide, Takeharu Amemiya, Ichiro Kosha, Hideo Hero Yonenaka and Yoshito Roy Matsuda. I shall forward to you their individual relocation addresses, along with a number of changes of addresses of releasees at a later writing. Would greatly appreciate your kind aid in sandwiching the above mentioned five persons in the pending cases. No additional release orders have been received in the past few days, but I presume that a few more releases should be here very shortly.

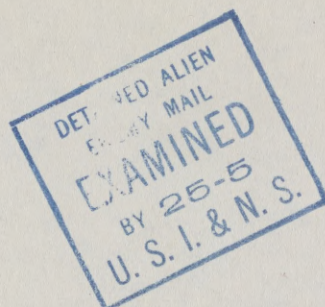

Dear Mr. Collins:

This letter is pursuant to my wire of the 13th, in reference to the 49 removal orders received by renunciants on the 12th, soon after you and your party left for San Francisco.

First of all, may I state that all the renunciants were very much alarmed over receiving removal orders from the Attorney General, especially those with families. I am enclosing herewith a list of those receiving removal orders plus, Noboru Morita, who received a notice to be transferred to Crystal City, previously. Also, it may interest you to know that my brother Kenneth, received a removal order on Friday and then received his release orders on Saturday. It seems that the release order out-weighed the (still pending) removal, so he is slated to leave for Reedley, sometime this week. According to information received here, some 82 Peruvians and 7 voluntary and deportables (Illegal Entries) will be sent to the Immigration Detention Station in San Pedro, to be detained there pending the outcome of negotiations with the Peruvian Government. May I sincerely request your kind aid, in these very tragic cases. I sincerely hope that some solution may be found, enabling the Peruvians to return to their country. The Peruvians are quite worried for the fact that none of your 62 clients are unable to speak or translate English, so there only solution is to have Mr. Nakamura interpret to them in Japanese. The Peruvian questionnaires were filled out during the week-end so I expect them to be in the mail, this morning. Also, Henry Ohara who was among those who stayed behind at Fort Lincoln to cook at the Officers' Mess, was returned to this camp, yesterday. All the renunciants at Ft. Lincoln were released recently. Mr. Ohara has stated that in view of the fact that he is a recipient of a removal order, that he wrote you during your absence, so Mr. Besig was kind enough to write him explaining the proper procedure and possibilities for a stay. Would be grateful to you for any information or aid on his case.

I wish to inform you that the following persons have received releases; namely; George M. Nishi, Shoji Jack Nosaka, Tsuyoshi Okada, Kiyoshi Suzuki, Masaru Teshiba, Yoshito Ueda, Kenneth Kazuto Takeuchi, Yoshio Yanagi; that is as of this day. I understand that Kenneth's release is still pending official confirmation of release due to the removal order received on Friday.

Rumors are that more removal orders will be here shortly for renunciants, but what one cannot understand is the fact that, only the Bismarck boys are taking all the beating, when it is known that there must be a certain set reason for determining removals and releases. Would greatly appreciate your kind aid in finding out just why, we were picked for removals. Everyone is quite worried, but I shall do everything to keep them pacified and in good spirits. Will be leaving for Crystal City on Thursday. I was just notified that Mr. Henry Ohara is among those going to Terminal Island Detention Station. Please endeavor to effect a stay for all the Peruvians and deportables. Again, thanking you very kindly, I remain,

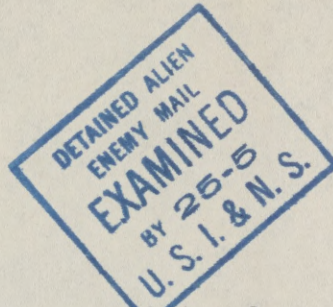

This letter is to inform you that a few more releases were received here early this morning. This will probably be my last letter from Santa Fe; unless something arises during the day.

The following renunciants received release orders this morning: Satoshi Nakamura, Hideo Fukagawa, Tsugio Dohara, Shuntaro Emoto, Roy Toju Uyeda, Masato Uyeda, and Ben Tsutomu Adachi. Their permanent relocation addresses are listed on the relocation listing which I sent you previously.

Also, the latest renunciants to file with you are listed as follows with their permanent relocation addresses: Yoshito Roy Matsuda, 12641 Filmore Street, San Fernando, Calif.; Yasuo Shinzaki, 2251 Irving Street, San Diego, California; and Masami Yoneta, PO Box 366, Orosi, Calif. Of this group of three, Yoshito Roy Matsuda was released only recently.

Also, in reference to the Peruvian group, I wish to inform you that Mr. Ricardo T. Nakagawa, is the Spokesman for the Peruvian group, which you are presently representing. Please refer to him, whenever making contacts with the group after their arrival in San Pedro. The alien group here is not quite organized as yet, so I presume that they will get together with the 24 in Crystal City, at which time, they will undoubtedly inform you of their committee members.

George Yasushi Yamashita is going to relocate to Route 1, Box 321, Clarksburg, California. Kenneth K. Takeuchi and Tsuyoshi Okada left this morning. Mr. Okada is going to relocate to PO Box 895, Parlier, California; while Kenneth is going to Rte. 2, Box 672, Reedley, California. 144 minus the seven renunciants and two aliens released, leaves 135 going to Crystal City early tomorrow morning.

Dear Mr. Collins:

I wish to inform you that we 135 internees arrived here safely this evening at sun-down. It was my pleasure to meet Mr. Minowa Matsumoto and Mr. Iwao Shimizu. I am looking forward to meeting and discussing with the committee members here, within a very few days. We plan to unite and form one solid group, thereby enabling us to keep everyone well informed of latest developments.

Also, I wish to inform you that two aliens filed with you in the stay of deportation cases, namely: Hiroshi Raymond Hirai and Shinzo Ogata were released from detention the day before our departure from Santa Fe, so please cancel their requests for a stay of deportation. The above-mentioned persons are not from Peru, but from the mainland that is, they were former residents of the United States. Please inform Mr. Besig relative to the above matter.

I am enclosing herewith my copy of the letter to the Attorney General, requesting re-consideration or a re-hearing. I shall see to it that all those receiving removal orders, that is, all those persons from Santa Fe, shall have sent in their form letters to the Attorney General, to the Officer-in-Charge and also a copy to you, very shortly. Also, I shall make a complete listing of new camp addresses and forward same to you as soon as possible.

Also, the three ministers from the Fresno Temple, namely; Revs. Enryo Shigefuji, Seimoku Kosaka and Gijo Maeda, have stated that they will try to cancel their requests for repatriation and file for non-repatriation as soon as they are able to upon arrival at San Pedro. As I stated previously, they volunteered for repatriation to Japan after receiving their removal orders in hopes that they may be allowed to return to the United States again as ministers, only with the knowledge that by volunteering they may be allowed some concessions, such as re-entry privileges, etc. I would be grateful to you, if you could contact them via telephone or correspondence, for more detailed information.

I understand that some 300 renunciants here, received their removal orders only a few days ago. This number together with the 49 at Santa Fe, makes a total of nearly 350 renunciants holding removal orders. I also heard that one or two renunciants holding removal orders were ordered released from detention, so I guess that none of us should do too much worrying over the fact that we are recipients of removal orders.

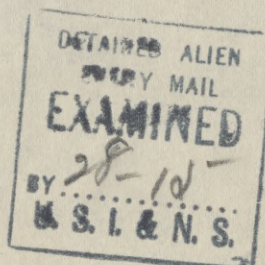
We have decided to meet with the Crystal City committee on Monday evening, so I believe that we can get together and become better organized after informal discussions, etc. No other changes, so for now this is all.

Also, I am enclosing herewith a letter addressed to you from Mr. Sadamu Nakamura, an alien formerly residing in Seattle, and who is a recipient of a final removal order but not a final deportation order. He has sent an appeal for reconsideration to the Attorney General.

Also, the following renunciants have expressed their earnest desires to file with you in the pending suits. They are, namely; Matao Uwate, Hayao Chuman, Hideo Taira, Yoneo Shigemura and Noboru Taguma, making a total of 193 Bismarck and Santa Fe renunciants filed with you. I believe more requests will be received from time to time. Their completed questionnaires and copies of ~~1~~ letters should be in your hands very shortly. We mimeographed several hundred copies of rehearing requests today, so we shall send them on to the Attorney General immediately. You shall be receiving your copies soon, too.

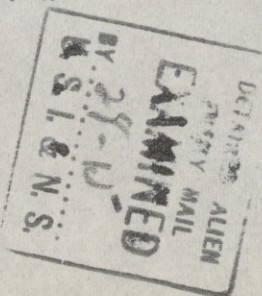

This letter is relative to several persons here, who have expressed their desires to file with you in the pending suits and who have already sent out there letters of revocation to the Attorney General, the Officer in Charge and to you.

Their names and camp addresses are as follows: Zenkichi Yokomizo, Tamie Yokomizo, both of D 40 B; Toshio Eddie Miyamoto, Masaye Mary Miyamoto, both of D 23 A; Mrs. Tsuyuko Tsurutome of Q 66 B 1; and Haruo Johnny Awamoto of Q 47 A 1. These six added on to the latest total of 193 clients of Santa Fe and Bismarck makes a grand total of 199, exclusive of the three hundred or more from Tule Lake, who are here. All the above persons are recipients of removal orders, so I shall see to it that their rehearing requests are sent in to the proper persons within a few days. All of us from Santa Fe, who received removal orders, have sent in reconsideration appeals or rehearing requests to the Attorney General, etc. I have also sent these letter forms to the five removal order holder-clients who remained at Santa Fe, to help close the camp there.

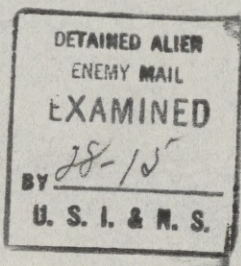
Since our arrival here, I have not seen any releasees as far as we remunciants from Bismarck, Tule Lake or Santa Fe, are concerned. Two Bismarck boys namely; Shigeru Ikejiri and Minoru Ueda received their oral removal orders soon after our arrival here at Crystal City, so I had them send in their rehearing requests. Also, Mrs. Helen Ikejiri received her removal order at the same time. as did her husband, Shigeru. She had sent in her letter, upon receipt of her unfavorable recommendation while at Tule Lake. No other remunciants have received their verbal removal orders as far as I can determine.

We are anxiously waiting for the favorable decision of the pending court case, which was scheduled to have opened today in San Francisco. Everyone here has taken much more interest in the outcome of the case, since posting the excerpts from your most significant telephone conversation of last week.

I am enclosing herewith a list of all those renunciants and your clients, who received their verbal removal orders today, as ordered by the Attorney General of the United States.

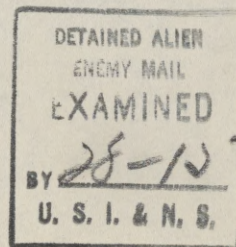
Also, at this writing I wish to inform you that Yoshinori Umeda, Q 44 C 3, who is going to relocate to Route 2, Brighton, Colorado upon receipt of release orders; and Toru Nishimura, Q 45 C 1, who is going to relocate to PO Box 54, Ivanhoe, Calif., upon release, have both expressed their desires to file with you in the pending suits, so I gave them the necessary forms and letters to be completed and mailed immediately. You shall be acknowledging receipt of their questionnaires and letter copies very shortly. The total number of clients from Bismarck and Santa Fe is now 201, with more coming from time to time. The committee is in hopes of compiling a complete list of all your clients here, that is a complete master list of all those clients from Tule Lake, Bismarck and Santa Fe. We shall forward you a copy, upon completion.

Many of the aliens here are quite concerned over the fact that they may be deported on or about May 13th, but I have tried my best to explain to them that they needn't become alarmed as long as they have complied with the request to send in all the completed questionnaires to Mr. Besig, Director, A.C.L.U. of N.C. as he is to take necessary steps in appealing for a stay of deportation for all those requesting such. It seems that the Peruvian group received a wire from Mr. Gongoro Nakamura this afternoon to the effect that the United States has decided to postpone the deportation of the Peruvians for at least ninety days, so I overheard. I sincerely hope that each and every member of your family has been enjoying the best of health.

Thanks to your untiring efforts, I was able to meet my cousin Sumner Shimizu who was released only a very few days after Henry Shimizu of Petaluma consulted you. My deepest appreciation to you for all that you are doing for those still detained. It is gratifying to note the great number of Peruvians who were paroled to Seabrook Farms in line with your kind suggestions and negotiation. I too am hoping that everything will turn out O.K.

As for the case, I have learned that the arguments ~~will~~^{are to} be heard on September 26th on the following Monday. If my work would permit, I would certainly enjoy a drive to Fresno to listen in on the hearings, as I am still a part of the "Boys" in Crystal and I think of them and their present status always. I am concerned over the outcome of these hearings. I do hope that the decision will be in our favor - at least on the detention issue. I have not had any word from Crystal during the past ten days, but I am sure that everyone

is living each day as best he can and in good spirits. Undoubtedly, everyone is looking forward to an early declaration of Peace and return to normal living.

Relative to the induction of renunciants - I have a letter here from the Koga brothers of Santa Maria, who state that they were scheduled to have been inducted yesterday, following the passing of there pre-induction physical examinations in Los Angeles, earlier this month. I wish to thank you for the informative copies of recent letters sent to the committee members at Crystal City and above all for your significant letter of October 3rd, which I read with great interest.

It must have been a joyous occasion for the many renunciants and aliens who were fortunate enough to have been paroled to Seaboard Farms, N.J. pending court decisions on the various issues and cases. I am happy for them - as undoubtedly many of the internees were beginning to show signs of restlessness and dependency. Thanks to your efforts another large group has been taken out of detention leaving only a handful of families and those who are unable to work, still detainees at Crystal.

I am looking forward to an early decision, in our favor, on the detention issue at least, if not on the citizenship issue at this time.

I have written to Crystal City several times in recent weeks, but for some reason or another, I have not had any replies. I hope that most, if not all, of the renunciants have taken this opportunity to breathe some "free air" or "Atlantic air" ^{I should say} ~~at least~~ - as a breathing spell in their long camp life.

I hope it is groundless, but I heard that Roy Shiraishi and Larry Kataoka are asking your special favore of you

Since they claim that they have done a great deal & more than what the defense committee has accomplished altogether. All I can say is that they did their own share, but at time Roy himself was considered to be a strong antagonistic element in our machinery. I remember one time he called on me and told me that "Unless Tex and Sasaki listen to me I am ~~not~~^{going} to crack their faces with this." Then he showed me a handy metal tube. It was just before the committee to have an important meeting. So, I had warn Tex and Mr. Sasaki to keep away from Roy. I wasn't afraid of him, but I didn't want take chance to let anything like that to happen at critical moment like that. I don't believe Roy and Larry ever worked on the committee without being on W. R. F. payroll. I did stay on the committee (advisory) and worked in office for nearly two

months without ^{even} a penny of compensation. I don't want to brag about myself, but I want to show you that everybody was equal and same, and Mr. Roy and Larry Katakoka are no exception in this case.

I have recieved many letters from Japan stating those renunciants there regretting repatriation to Japan. We could have been on the same boat if you didn't decide to extend your warm hands to save us from the dreadful deportations. So, at this first Christmas since evacuation I pause and meditating timely that you, Mr. Collins, are a true saviour of our lives. We were born unfortunate to face ^{that} humiliating evacuation, but are fortunate enough to have met a great American, Mr. W. M. Collins, who has shown us the meaning of the American democracy.

With your effort we are to have a very peaceful Christmas and Happy New Year. Thank you very much.

As soon as I made enough money I had my wife consulted with a specialist and she was completely recovered from her illness in less than two months. I haven't saved hardly any money this year, but one thing I am proud is that nobody in my family is suffering physically as well as mentally at this Christmas. And, for change I have great hope in 1947 and many more years to come.

Without your effort we had all go to Japan. At ^{the} time I wish you a very best of health, Merry Christmas, and Happy New Year.

Dear Mr. Collins:

Please excuse my long silence. I sincerely hope that this note finds you and your family enjoying the very best of health.

First of all, congratulations upon the winning of the first ~~of the~~ ²⁰⁰⁰ all-important cases relative to the ^{and those} ~~remnants~~ presently detained at Crystal City and Leabrook, New Jersey. Having existed a few weeks ago, I did not have ~~any~~ access to newspapers everyday. I knew nothing about Judge Goodman's decision on the detention issue until my family sent me the enclosed news clipping from the Nishi Bei Times ^{yesterday}. I am most grateful to you for all that you have done on our behalf and I humbly request ~~for~~ your continued aid and service in the remaining issues and barriers. I trust that the pending citizenship decision will be in our favor, ~~but~~ ^{though} I will admit that we Nisei were at fault too - but am keeping my fingers crossed.

During the process of my enlistment I explained that even though I was born in the U.S. that my citizenship status was not clear, etc. but the officer said that all the Army wants to know is whether I was born in this country or in Japan. A native-born American is considered to be a citizen - regardless - so I was told.

I realize that my voluntary enlistment may have been entirely unnecessary - but I

joined because having been born, raised and educated in Fresno and having so many friends who are returned veterans, etc. I felt as did my family that I should at least go out and serve my country - even though hostilities may have ceased and even though my term of enlistment be only 18 months. Since my return from Crystal City I had taken active part in church and young people's activities and at times I have felt ~~that~~ guilty in not having served in the Armed Forces. Also, some of my old-time friends have said that I went to Dulake to evade the draft and to assure my well being during the period of hostilities, etc., ~~and~~ since all the boys ~~my~~ my age have served and nearly all have returned, I felt that I too should, as late as it may be, to sacrifice a little, not considering the evacuation damages etc. - before actually settling down. I realize that the family needs me at home and I should be shouldering a greater portion of the responsibilities but since ~~my~~ ^{my parents} have decided to "try again" and to make this our "home" - we felt that it would be for everyone's good to have served in this emergency - for Uncle Sam.

I am looking forward to visiting you - on some weekend in the near future - since H. and I are only 115 miles from S. K.

Court Frees Renunciants from Custody

The immediate release of all American-born Japanese still being held under government custody today was ordered Monday by Judge Louis E. Goodman of the U.S. district court here.

According to Wayne M. Collins, attorney for the renunciants, the decision affects about 300 nisei being held by federal authorities, some under relaxed internment at Seabrook Farms in New Jersey and others at Crystal City internment camp in Texas.

The federal court ruling was only on the habeas corpus petition for the release of interned renunciants and a decision by Judge Goodman is still pending on a petition of nearly 2000 renunciants who are seeking to regain their U.S. citizenship.

Not 'Alien Enemies'

The decision was announced Monday in a brief memorandum and Judge Goodman indicated that the reasons for the ruling would be amplified when he announces his decision on the citizenship matter.

The ruling Monday did say that the renunciants could not be considered "alien enemies" and consequently could not be held or removed under the alien enemy act.

I wish to apologize for my unreasonably long silence. I sincerely hope that this note finds everyone enjoying the very best of health, despite the great weather we are having in "sunny California".

Being a helper on the Defense Committee, I have occasion to write to Tex quite often regarding the collection of funds, but I've been very sick and procrastinate in not keeping in touch with you Mr. Collins - please forgive me. I've really not been able to do all that I'd like to do as far as committee work went - because the family was forced to move twice in two months. We moved from Rte 2 Box 59 to Rte 2 Box 49 and on Dec 30th, we moved to our present location which is Rte 13, Box 399. I've had to

concentrate my efforts to evenings and Sundays - but am glad to report that we've had fairly good responses in my area - Merced to Bakersfield.

Everyone on the list (about 140) has paid in something and nearly 60% are fully paid up and I hope to have my district paid up 100% shortly, I hope. Tomorrow, being Sunday, I hope to make my rounds in order to have my district come

out on top - as far as contributions + pledges go.

I can hardly wait for the 29th to roll around and am keeping my fingers crossed in hopes that the government will not designate anyone nor appeal the case. I also hope that there will be no more extensions. So many people in the valley have come to me, written to me and asked me - about this and that regarding the suite and I just answer them the best I know how. All's well so far - ~~and~~ keep hoping that all will be well - come the 29th of January and I trust that it will - so I tell 'em. I do hope that no one will be designated - but if so - then we must back this case with renewed efforts and hopes - till we do succeed. I'll stick it out to the end!

Am happy to report that in this valley, I have not come across any "wire-guys" who want their citizenship gratis - that is - they're all willing to pay - but in some cases not quite able immediately. I trust that everyone will have been paid up in a month or so.

Well, that is all I have to write for now. I've got my fingers crossed for a 100% victory on the 29th. Please take very good care and please extend my best regards to all. Goodbye!

Dear Mr. Collins:

Please excuse my long silence. I sincerely hope that this letter finds you and your family members enjoying the very best of health. Fortunately, we have all been well thru the long hot summer and grape harvest.

Having nearly completed my grape and raisin harvest I am making preparations to continue the collection drive which I left undone the latter part of July, due to the harvest. I wrote and sent to Tex a list of all parties in the suits in my district who owe you a balance, in order to get an up-to-date balance list prior to starting my collection rounds, as some may have remitted during the past ten weeks. I expect to receive the corrected list shortly and hope to start immediately thereafter.

I am writing you in regards to Shigemi Horibe and Tsurugi Godwin Horibe, brothers, now residing in Aomori Ken, Japan and who were among those on the judgment list. I collected \$150.00 each from their father, Mr. G. Horibe, 520 A St. Fresno, on Aug. 25, 1952. Mr. Horibe has promised to pay the remaining \$300.00 on his two sons, by the end of the year, so I forwarded the two blue judgment papers to him. He in turn sent the certificates to the above sons in Japan, hoping that they could return to the U.S. shortly thereafter. It seems that the boys went to the American Consulate in Tokyo, but were refused a passport even though they had proof of citizenship, etc. I told Mr. Horibe that maybe they may have voted in a Japanese election, participated in activities at Tulake keeping them on the blacklist, if there is such a thing, or it could be one of many factors, of which I know nothing. Anyway, Mr. Horibe has come to me requesting for your kind assistance in the matter Mr. Collins; as they are stumped as to just what to do. I would be very grateful to you Mr. Collins, if you could kindly check into the matter and give me any information you may find in regards to the above case. I am enclosing herewith the letter which Shigemi Horibe sent to the Defense Comm. Office which was forwarded to me by Tex. The boys' address is in the letter. I would appreciate any information or aid which you may be able to extend.

Also, one person in Japan has written to me asking if it is possible to pay in \$200.00 and the remaining \$100.00 after she gets here, but I've heard too many stories of guys skipping country and not notifying of there whereabouts, after reaching the US, so I have not sent any kind of reply as yet. Will you please give me a reply to the above request or should I write back and state that only those who make full payment shall be allowed to come for individual hearings. Is that your ruling, Mr. Collins. Hoping to hear from you on this too.

As I recall he was a very quiet, kind to understand sort of person, so it was quite possible that he met with presume of coercion. I asked my sister Amy Mikuni for some names as it might be more accurate than with just my recollection.

I do not ~~not~~ remember a Harada from 32. I remember a Kimura a big Judo expert but I do not know ~~from~~ ⁱⁿ what block he stayed.

yesterday. I understood that he wanted to take a good civil service job over there - but decided to come back because he couldn't wait out the 2 or 3 months period for those positions. His wife & family is to come over by ship later. He is going to stay in L.A. temporarily but may settle down in Fresno eventually. He will probably start paying up in monthly installments as soon as he lands a job.

Please excuse me for the long delay in sending a reply. I know I can't be of much help. But if there is anything that you may need to help out the father's movements, please do not hesitate to ask me. I will gladly get the information. I owe you everything in the world - as my wife and I voted in the primary election for the first time in our lives, and I can say it was a great feeling and privilege to be able to vote. I want to thank you once again for all you've done for all of us.
