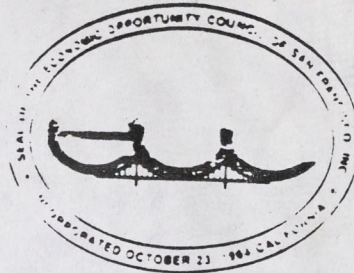



OLD BUSINESS:

N. MASON GAVE A REPORT ON THE ENERGY CONFERENCE TO BE HELD JANUARY 17-19, 1996, AT THE HOLIDAY INN ON VAN NESS & PINE STREETS. ALL COUNCIL MEMBERS INTERESTED IN VOLUNTEERING OR BEING A SPECIAL GUEST SHOULD CALL YOLANDA BIRDSONG, EXECUTIVE SECRETARY FOR THE EOC PROGRAM.

B. JACKSON REPORTED THAT MR. RICHARDSON WAS TO FOLLOW-UP ON SENDING A LETTER TO SOWAC (AFRICAN AMERICAN CULTURAL CENTER) ON FULTON STREET TO INVITE THEM TO THE NEXT WESTERN ADDITION EOC COUNCIL MEETING TO DISCUSS THE 1996 JUNETEENTH CELEBRATION. MR. RICHARDSON WASN'T PRESENT TO COMMENT ON FOLLOW-UP.

B. JACKSON ASKED B. HOLMES TO REPORT ON THE NEED TO INCREASE THE COUNCIL. BENNIE HOLMES GAVE A BREAKDOWN OF THE COUNCIL MAKE-UP 1/3 FROM THE POOR POPULATION EQUALS 14 PERSONS, 4 FROM THE PUBLIC SECTOR, ORGANIZATIONS AND PROFESSIONALS, WE HAVE TWO. 9 FROM PRIVATE SECTORS, SUCH AS THE FIRE DEPARTMENT, POLICE DEPARTMENT, LIBRARY, MERCHANTS, HOSPITALS, HOUSING DEVELOPMENTS, ETC. C. JOHNSON RECOMMENDED AN AD-HOC COMMITTEE BE DEVELOPED TO FOCUS ON RECRUITING COUNCIL MEMBERS, AND REPORT BACK TO THE COUNCIL OF EACH MEETING. SHE STRESSED IT IS TIME TO RECLAIM OUR COMMUNITY BACK THROUGH THE EOC COUNCIL, WHICH IS ONE OF THE OLDEST COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS LEFT SERVING THE POOR AND COMMUNITY LARGE.

B. HOLMES ANNOUNCED THE EOC ANNUAL CHRISTMAS PARTY WOULD BE HELD ON FRIDAY, DECEMBER 15, 1995, STARTING AT 12:00 (NOON) WITH THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS COUNCIL MEETING. HE INFORMED ALL COUNCIL MEMBERS THAT THEY WERE INVITED TO PARTICIPATE.



NEW BUSINESS:

C. JOHNSON SUGGESTED THE WESTERN ADDITION EOC COUNCIL, INCLUDING OTHER ORGANIZATION SHOULD SPONSOR AN AWARD DINNER NEXT YEAR, TO SHOULD OUR APPRECIATE FOR COMMUNITY PERSON WHO WORK HARD AND DEDICATED THEIR LIVES FOR YEARS SERVING THE COMMUNITY.

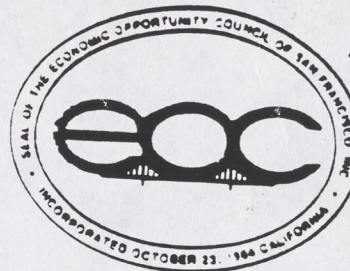

**DISTRICT COUNCIL BYLAWS  
OF THE  
ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY COUNCIL OF SAN FRANCISCO, INC.**

**ARTICLE I  
Purpose**

**Section 1.01. Bylaws.**

The general purpose of these bylaws is to make uniform the procedures governing district councils throughout the City and County of San Francisco.

**Section 1.02. District Councils.**

The general purpose of the district councils is to give the low-income residents of neighborhoods a greater role in addressing the issues and programs which affect them, and to provide a vehicle for mobilizing resources towards meeting the needs of their communities. The specific functions of district councils are representation, planning, coordination, and mobilization of resources. The district councils also serve as a direct link to low-income residents by their representation on the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council.

**ARTICLE II  
Members**

**Section 2.01. Membership and Membership Rights.**

Each District Council shall consist of twenty-seven (27) members. There shall be three categories of membership, as follows: elected representatives of low-income persons, consisting of fourteen (14) persons; public officials, consisting of nine (9) persons; and representatives of private groups and interests, consisting of four (4) persons.

Only elected representatives of low-income persons who have been members of the district council for at least one (1) year shall have the right to be elected by the district council to the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council. In all other respects, the rights of all members, regardless of category, shall be equal.

**Section 2.02. Elected Representatives of Low-Income Persons.**

Each elected representative of low-income persons shall reside within the boundaries of the district established by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council. Each elected representative of low-income persons shall have resided at least three (3) months in the district from which elected by election day. To be eligible to vote, a voter must be low-income, must be at least eighteen (18) years old by election day, and must have resided at least three (3) months in the district in which the election is taking place by



election day. Elections shall be conducted according to procedures established by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, and shall be held at least once every four years.

Any vacancy in a seat of an elected representative of low-income persons shall be filled by way of appointment by the District Council Chairman and approved by the district council; appointments shall be for the full unexpired term. Such appointments shall become effective upon their ratification by the Executive Committee of the Economic Opportunity Council. A seat of an elected representative of low-income persons shall be deemed vacant if the representative moves his/her residence outside of the boundaries of the district council.

Any elected representative of low-income persons who fails to attend three consecutive regular meetings of his district council, without being excused, shall forfeit his seat on the council. The Chairman of a district council shall have the power to excuse members from attendance.

**Section 2.03. Public Officials.**

The public officials shall be officials of the City and County of San Francisco or of independent public agencies. The agencies to be represented on the district council shall be designated by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, by and with the advice of the elected representatives of low-income persons on the district council. The public officials to be members of the district council shall be appointed by the Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, by and with the advice of the agency, unless the public official is to represent an independent public agency, in which event the independent public agency shall appoint its official representative.

Each public official shall continue to be a member until his successor is appointed. Any vacancy in a seat of a public official shall be filled in the manner prescribed for filling the seat which has become vacant.

**Section 2.04. Representatives of Private Groups and Interests.** The private groups and interests which will be allowed membership shall be those which shall be able to demonstrate a prior concern with low-income persons and shall be able to bring to the district council pertinent financial or human resources. The private groups and interests with membership on the district council shall be designated by the district council, by and with the advice and consent of the elected representatives of low-income persons and public officials on the district council. Thereafter, every other year at the January meeting of the district council, or at the first regular meeting in January, if the district council has more than one regular January meeting, the elected representative of low-income persons and public officials shall review the



private groups and interests which have been allowed membership, for the purpose of possibly recommending changes to take effect March 1st. Any private group or interest allowed membership shall also be allowed to select its representative itself.

The term of membership of each representative of a private group or interest shall be two (2) years, commencing January 1st. Each representative of a private group or interest may succeed himself without limit, so long as the private group or interest which selected him has membership on the district council. Any vacancy in a seat of a representative of a private group or interest shall be filled in the manner prescribed for filling the seat which has become vacant.

**Section 2.05. Duties.**

It shall be the duty of the members of the district council to: (1) To perform all duties prescribed for them collectively or individually by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council or by these bylaws; (2) To supervise all committees and officers of the district council to assure that their duties are properly performed; and (3) to adopt such operating procedures for the district council as may be found desirable, so long as those procedures do not conflict with these bylaws or with the policies of the Economic Opportunity Council.

**Section 2.06. Compensation.**

Members of the district council shall serve without compensation, except that reimbursement for expenses and allowances shall be provided to members who qualify under guidelines as low-income individuals.

**Section 2.07. Membership Book.**

The district council shall have a membership book containing the name and address of each member. Termination of the membership of any member shall be recorded in the membership book, describing the manner of termination and the date on which such membership ceased. Such book shall be open to inspection by the public at any reasonable time.

The members of the District Council shall register their addresses with the secretary of the district council, and notices of meetings mailed to them at such addresses shall be valid notices thereof.

**Section 2.08. Transferability of Membership.**

Membership in the district council is not transferable and is not assignable, except as prescribed by these bylaws.

**Section 2.09. Right to Inspect Records.**

All records of the district council shall be open to inspection by the public at any reasonable time.

**Section 2.10. Nondiscrimination.**



No person shall be excluded from membership on the district council or participation in the activities of the district council on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. Provided, however, that the minimum age for voting to elect representatives of low-income persons shall be eighteen (18) years.

### ARTICLE III Meetings

#### Section 3.01. Place for Regular Meetings.

The district council shall provide, by resolution, the place for holding regular meetings. At least 72 hours before a regular meeting, the district council shall post or make public an agenda for the meeting with a brief description of each item of business to be discussed at the meeting. The agenda shall specify the time and location of the regular meeting. No other business shall be considered at such meetings by the district council.

Regular meetings of the district council shall be held within the district. If, by reason of fire, flood, earthquake, or other emergency, it shall be unsafe to meet in the place designated for regular meetings, the regular meetings may be held for the duration of the emergency at such other place in the district as is designated by the chairman of the district council.

#### Section 3.02. Time for Regular Meetings.

The district council shall provide, by resolution, the time for holding regular meetings. Regular meetings of the district council shall be held at least monthly. If at any time any regular meeting falls on a holiday, such regular meeting shall be held on the next business day.

#### Section 3.03. Special Meetings.

A special meeting may be called at any time by the chairman of the district council, or by at least fourteen (14) of the members of the district council, by delivering personally or by mail written notice to each member of the district council and to each local newspaper of general circulation, radio or television station requesting notice in writing. Such notice must be delivered personally or by mail at least 72 hours before the time of such meetings as specified in the notice. Such notice must be actually delivered at least 72 hours before the time of such meeting; mere deposit of such notice in the mail is insufficient.

The call and notice shall specify the time and place within the district of the special meeting and the business to be transacted. No other business shall be considered at such meetings by the district council, except by approval of a two-thirds (2/3) vote. Such written notice may be dispensed with as to any member who, at or prior to the time the meeting



convenes, files with the secretary of the district council a written waiver of notice. Such waiver may be given by telegram. Such written notice may also be dispensed with as to any member who is actually present at the meeting at the time it convenes.

**Section 3.04. Quorum.**

A quorum shall consist of a majority of the duly seated members.

**Section 3.05. Loss of Quorum.**

The members present at a duly called or held meeting at which a quorum is present may continue to do business until adjournment notwithstanding the withdrawal of enough members to leave less than a quorum.

**Section 3.06. Adjournment of Meetings.**

The district council may adjourn any regular, adjourned regular, special, or adjourned special meeting to a time and place within the district specified in the order of adjournment. Less than a quorum may so adjourn from time to time. A copy of the order of adjournment shall be conspicuously posted on or near the door of the place where the regular, adjourned regular, special or adjourned special meeting was held within twenty-four (24) hours after the time of the adjournment.

When a regular or adjourned regular meeting is adjourned as provided in this section, the resulting adjourned regular meeting is a regular meeting for all purposes. When an order of adjournment of any meeting fails to state the hour at which the adjourned meeting is to be held, it shall be held at the hour specified for regular meetings by resolution.

**Section 3.07. Voting.**

Members shall not be permitted to vote or act by proxy, and cumulative voting shall not be authorized.

**Section 3.08. Conduct of Meetings.**

Meetings of the district council shall be presided over by the chairman of the district council or, in his/her absence, by the first vice chairman, or, in the absence of both, by the second vice chairman, or, in the absence of all three, by a chairman of the meeting chosen by a majority of the members present.

Meetings shall be governed by Robert's Rules of order, as such rules may be revised from time to time, insofar as such rules are not inconsistent with or in conflict with these bylaws or with law.

All meetings of the district council shall be open and public, and all persons shall be permitted to attend any meeting of the district council, except as otherwise provided in this section. A member of the general public shall not be



required, as a condition to attendance at a meeting of the district council, to register his/her name or other information, to complete a questionnaire, or otherwise to fulfill any condition precedent to attendance.

In the event that any meeting is willfully interrupted by a group or groups of persons so as to render the orderly conduct of such meeting unfeasible and order cannot be restored by the removal of individuals who are willfully interrupting the meeting, the members of the district council conducting the meeting may order the meeting room cleared and continue in session. Only matters appearing on the agenda may be considered in such a session, except by approval of a two-thirds (2/3) vote. Duly accredited representatives of the press, of other news media, except those participating in the disturbance, shall be allowed to attend any such session. Nothing in this section shall prohibit the district council from establishing a procedure for readmitting an individual or individuals not responsible for willfully disturbing the orderly conduct of the meeting.

#### **ARTICLE IV Officers**

##### **Section 4.01. Officers and Qualifications.**

The officers of the district council shall be a chairman, a first vice chairman, a second vice chairman, and a secretary. Any member of the district council is qualified to be an officer thereof, provided, however, that the chairman shall be an elected representative of low-income persons.

##### **Section 4.02. Election of Officers.**

The chairman, first vice chairman, second vice chairman, and secretary shall be elected annually by the members from among their number at their first meeting at which a quorum is present following January 1st. Officers shall be eligible for re-election so long as they are members of the district council.

##### **Section 4.03. Terms of Office.**

Officers of the district council shall serve from the time they are elected until the next annual election of officers and until their successors are elected.

##### **Section 4.04. Removal of Officers.**

Any or all officers may be removed from office at any time by the vote of two-thirds of the members of the district council. In the case of the removal of any officer, a new officer shall be elected to serve the unexpired portion of the term of his predecessor at the meeting at which the officer is removed.

##### **Section 4.05. Vacancies in Offices.**

Vacancies for any other reason shall be filled by the members at the next regular or special meeting at which a quorum is



present following the vacancy. Officers elected to fill vacancies as in this section provided shall hold office for the unexpired terms of their predecessors, or until their removal, or until the office is vacated for any other reason.

**Section 4.06. Duties of Chairman.**

The chairman shall perform all duties as may be required of the chairman by these bylaws, or as assigned by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, or as assigned, from time to time, by the district council.

**Section 4.07. Duties of First Vice Chairman.**

In the absence of the chairman, or in the event of his inability or refusal to act, the first vice chairman shall perform the duties of chairman, and when so acting shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the restrictions on, the chairman. The first vice chairman shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the district council.

**Section 4.08. Duties of Second Vice Chairman.**

In the absence of the chairman and the first vice chairman, or in the event of the inability or refusal of both to act, the second vice chairman shall perform the duties of chairman, and when so acting shall have all the powers of, and be subject to all the restrictions on, the chairman. The second vice chairman shall perform such other duties as may be assigned from time to time by the district council.

**Section 4.09. Duties of Secretary.**

The secretary shall perform such duties as may be required by these bylaws, or as assigned by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, or as assigned, from time to time, by the district council.

**ARTICLE V  
Committees**

**Section 5.01. Standing Committees.**

The chairman shall, immediately after his/her election each year, appoint, subject to confirmation by the district council, a program committee and such other standing committees as may have been created by the district council. A majority of the members of the program committee and of any other standing committee shall be members of the district council. The members of each such committee shall serve until their resignation, their removal by the district council, or until the next annual election of officers, whichever occurs first.

**Section 5.02. Ad Hoc Committees.**

Ad Hoc Committees for specific purposes or activities may be designated from time to time by resolution of the district council. The chairman shall appoint, subject to confirmation



by the district council, any ad hoc committee. A majority of the members of any ad hoc committee shall be members of the district council. The members of each such committee shall serve as such for the life of the committee unless they sooner resign or are removed, whichever occurs first.

#### **ARTICLE VI Hearings**

##### **Section 6.01. Continuance.**

Any hearing being held, or noticed or ordered to be held, by the district council at any meeting may by order or notice of continuance be continued or recontinued to any subsequent meeting of the district council in the same manner and to the same extent set forth for the adjournment of meetings; provided, that if the hearing is continued to a time less than twenty-four (24) hours after the time specified in the notice of hearing, a copy of the notice of continuance of hearing shall be posted immediately following the meeting at which the order or declaration of continuance was adopted or made.

#### **ARTICLE VII Bylaws**

##### **Section 7.01. Adoption, Amendment, and Repeal.**

These bylaws shall become effective on their adoption by the vote of the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, and they may be amended or repealed, in whole or in part, and new bylaws adopted by the vote of the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council.

##### **Section 7.02. Translations.**

The text of any translation of these bylaws into another language shall, upon approval by the board of directors of the Economic Opportunity Council, be equally authentic with the English text and any other approved text.
