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
ILWU VETERAN LEE BROWN AT MARCUS BOOKS, FEB. 28th

On Wednesday, February 28th at 6:30 pm, Marcus Bookstore, 1712 Fillmore Street in San Francisco, will host a book signing for ILWU veteran Lee Brown. Brown will be discussing his newly published autobiography, "Strong in the Struggle: My Life as a Black Labor Activist." In the 1940s and 1950s Brown was an organizer and vice president of a militant ILWU local on the waterfront in New Orleans, Local 207, Warehouse and Distribution Workers. Brown fought for black and white unity among the workers in his local and in other industries. He was hauled before the House Un-American Activities Committee in 1957, and he steadfastly refused to cooperate with the witch-hunters. A year later he was unjustly tried and convicted under the anti-Communist provisions of the Taft-Hartley Act. In 1960 his conviction was overturned by an appeals court, and Brown made his way to San Francisco where he became a shop steward at the Fairmont Hotel and active in Local 110 and later Local 2 of the Hotel and Restaurant workers union. He also worked with other organizations, including the NAACP, Black Panthers and Nation of Islam. Now retired Brown has also been active in the struggle for senior citizens' rights. Brown will be speaking with his co-author, Robert L. Allen, author of "The Port Chicago Mutiny" and senior editor of The Black Scholar journal.
