HISTORICAL INFORMATION Alexander J. Barclay was born on March 13, 1871 in Rome, New York. He was first employed by SP in May 1891 as a chainman and camp boss. After a series of other jobs with Southern Pacific, including inspector, draftsman, instrument man, and leveler, Barclay became an assistant engineer in 1897. He served under Chief Engineer William Hood in January 1905 during the construction of Fallon Railway and from 1909 to 1917 worked as the Assistant Engineer in charge of construction on the Central Pacific 2nd mainline track project. Between 1918 and 1923, when he was laid off by the SP railroad due to lack of construction projects, Mr. Barclay worked on various public and private projects such as building a pier at Manhattan Beach and a filtration tank for the City of Sacramento water system. In 1923, he was recalled to work for SP as a construction engineer. His last SP project was building the Los Angeles Union Passenger Terminal between 1933 and 1940.

In addition to his career with Southern Pacific, Mr. Barclay was the Mayor of Auburn between 1913-1917, a member of several masonic bodies, and a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

Mr. Barclay died on May 25, 1950 in Alameda, California.

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Series 1. Photographs

The majority of over 1,500 black-and-white photographs arranged into six albums, plus a few loose ones depict construction work on several projects for which Mr. Barclay was Southern Pacific's supervising field engineer. Many photos were taken and printed by professional photographers, either in private business local to the project or employed by Southern Pacific. Some apparently were taken by Mr. Barclay himself. Many of the latter are general scenic views not showing railroad activity.

The major construction projects included in the Barclay photographs are the second main track from Rocklin to Colfax, Colfax to Blue Canon, and Winsted to Lawton (1909-1916); Susanville-Lassen Branch (1916-1918); and the new Phoenix main line between Welton and Picacho, Arizona (1924-1926). Many secondary projects are also included.

These photographs are arranged in six photo albums made of coarse black sheets bound in board covers. Many photos were tightly glued to the black sheets and could not be removed. These photos remain attached to the sheets (with any excess sheet material trimmed and discarded). Photos attached by corner ears were removed and the sheets discarded.

All photos have been segregated in accordance with the album in which they were attached. There were six albums plus about 25 loose photos not attached in a specific album. The albums were generally arranged by subject matter with some overlap. All identifying writing on album sheets has been retained. Some photos do not have descriptive data.

A photcopy of each photo has been made to facilitate patron searches and browsing. Binders containing these photocopies are available in the Reference Room.

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Series 2. Personal papers

This series includes a variety of documents from Mr. Barclay's life and career. Includes correspondence, a poem wrote by Barclay's SP gang, a patent claim, a payment record, his school record, and an article about the impact of the construction of the Los Angeles Union Depot on Chinatown. Of particular interest is a letter he received from the Los Angeles Chinatown in Chinese, together with an English translation thanking Mr. Barclay for successfully helping them receive payment Southern Pacific for payment to the Chinese residents for its destruction of Chinatown while constructing the L.A. Union Depot.
