- 1a The original grass shack which was the first Volcano House Hotel, rim of Kiluea volcano, island of Hawaii, n.d., n. photog., oval photo 5" x 7".
- 1b A volcano painting, probably Kiluea by Jules Tavernier. n.d., n. photog., 8 1/8" x 5 1/2".
- 2a Lava flow heading towards Hilo, Hawaii, perhaps 1884 or 1887. n. photog., 9 1/8" x 6 3/4".
- 2b Rainbow Falls to the rear of the city of Hilo, Hawaii, n.d., n. photog., 9 1/8" x 6 5/8".
- 3 Model of a double outrigger canoe and in front a single outrigger canoe. Canoes are called WAA. n.d., n. photog., 9 1/4" x 6 3/8".
- 4a A woman in riding habit called a PA'U--a drawing either by Burgess or Enoch Wood Perry. n.d., n. photog., 8" x 4 7/8".
- 4b Native type wearing a head lei of white ginger blossoms and a neck lei of the same. The leaves are fragrant and much prized even today called "MAILE". n.d., n. photog., 6 1/2" x 8 3/4".
- 5a Posed studio portrait of native types as they would be sitting at a native feast called a "luau". The wooden bowls are of Koi wood. n.d., n. photog., oval photo 5" x 7".
- 5b Woman native type perhaps part Chinese Hawaiian in a riding habit called a "PAU"--the first floral patterned piece I have seen. Whip in hand of whalebone--ivory lei is of fragrant MAILE, lei in hair is yellow ILIMA. n.d., n. photog., 6 3/8" x 8 3/4".
- 6a Posed studio portrait of a female and male hula dancer--woman is same as in above(?) photo. Holding gourd-feather and coconut shell rattles called LILI-ULI. Wearing yellow ILIMA leis. n.d., n. photog., Oval photo 5" x 7 1/4".
- 6b Emperor Norton of San Francisco is known to have come to Hawaii--if this is he it is a great find! Note dogs, he always had two or three, Bummer and Lazarus. (I do not think this is Norton,) RAW. n.d., n. photog., 6 1/2" x 8 3/4".



- 8a Five Hawaiian men, perhaps members of the legislature or a government office. n.d., n. photog.,
- 7b Posed studio photo of hula dancer. The famed grass skirt did not appear for several years. n.d., n. photog.,
- 7a Posed studio photo of PAHU drum dancers (gourds).

- 8b Two native types--a woman and her daughter. n.d., n. photog., 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 9a The Reef or Oahu Prison built in Ieweli district of Honolulu in 1857. Site later of Love's Bakery-- Salvation Army Thrift Shop site 1977. n.d., n. photog., 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 6 $\frac{5}{8}$ ".
- 9b Honolulu from the harbour. Right center roof and tower of Royal Hawaiian Hotel, Tower to left extreme tallest--Engine Co. No 4 Fire Dept at junction of Union and Hotel Street. Beyond (2 blocks away) the tower of Fort Street Church at Fort and Britannia Streets. Much of the foreground was filled in through the years, the new (1977) Federal Building would be at the bottom of the photo., n. d., n. photog., 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 10a The city of Kailua-Kona, Hawaii. Two story building with a balcony was built as the residence of Governor Kuakini in the 1830's. Later the residence of Princess Ruth--now a museum called HULHEE Palace.
- 10b A view from the "Reef" or Prison looking up Nuuanu Valley--towards the Pali. The low hill on the right is Pacific Heights -full of homes in 1977.
- 11a Honolulu Harbour from the "Reef" looking towards Waikiki -in the great distance is Diamond Head. This area at bottom was filled-in in the 1880s and became the main terminus of the Oahu Railway and Land Co. At the left Nuuanu Stream enters the picture, n.d., n. photog., 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 11b This is the immediate left portion of photo n. 124, (10b) in the front of the prison known as the "Reef". This area in ancient time was called LELEO. Where the two-story house is in the right portion this is the intersection of King and Beʻetania Streets. Of modern times. The two-story residence was built by and lived in by W.T. Rawlins who had a tallow and soap works factory to the right. n.d., n. photog., 8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 12a To the left the Rawlins home again. Homes mostly of native Hawaiians. Taken as part of the panorama from the Prison known as the "Reef".
- 12b Building in centre of photo is the old Customs House building occupied in the upper story by J. Mort & Co. Oat, Sailmaker. He was later Postmaster General of Hawaii. Tower to the left centre is from Honolulu Iron Works. Land filled in to most of ocean area in later years. Stone building to right is C. Brewer and Company lumber and storage shed.n.d., (ca.1870)? n. photog., 8 $\frac{7}{8}$ " x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 13a Bleak uncultivated Punchbowl. To left edge the Parliament or Legislative Building built in 1872 by

- 13a cont'd. King Kamehameha V. Now (1977) State Court House. Kawaiahao Church with the tower which was not on the church long. That is the white wooden area above the clock. Land fill in bottom area in later time. At the present (1977) this ocean area was filled in and the new Federal Building would appear at the bottom of the page in the same view today. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4".
- 13b Corner of Fort and Hotel Street in Honolulu. Hale Pai Kii(The House of Pictures or Photos) was run by Chase, Montano and then Burgess. Most of these photos were taken by Chase. Moving up the street towards the steeple the large clump of trees was the residence of Reverend Samuel Mills Damon, publisher of the "seamens newspaper," "The Friend". The steeple is on Fort Street Church. The long roof to the right center is on the Roman Catholic Church. The white gable just to the front of it with the windows is the residence of Alfred de Forrest Cartwright, his brother Alexander Jay Cartwright lived a block away—he it will be remembered is the man ~~now~~ acknowledged and credited with founding the game of BASEBALL. Trees in lower right are Papaia. Those at the bottom center are—Pride of India. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4".
- 14a By placing 132-133 (13b-14a) together you continue a panorama. The house with the many gables is the Dowsett-Monsarrat residence. Light roof at the head of the street to the left, a pharmacy and dispensary built about 1842 for Dr. Thomas Charles Byde Rooke, father of Queen Emma, consort of Kamehameha IV. The tower is on Engine Company No. 4 of the Fire Department. This is Union Street. The horizontal street is Hotel Street. The mountain to the rear is Punchbowl. In 1950 the interior became the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. A magnificent example of a tuff-cone volcano. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4".
- 14b Iolani Palace built in the late 1830s as the residence of King Kamehameha III by Kamehameha IV, V, Lunalilo, and Kalakaua who in 1879-80 began construction of the Italianate building now being restored as a museum in 1977. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4".
- 15a The corner of King Street and horizontal is Punchbowl Street. Kawaiahao Church with wooden steeple, later removed small fence just inside the gate is the fence surrounding the tomb of King Lunalilo which is just out of the picture to the right. To the left at great distance are the fences surrounding the "mission homes". These are the oldest frame buildings west of the Rocky Mountains and the oldest printing building also west of the Rockies—(1822). The church and walls are of hand and coral blocks.

- 15b The original courthouse and Parlaiment building of the monarchy erected in 1850's, torn down in 1968! The site in front and the later site of the building in 1977. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 1/4".
- 16a The lawn in front of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel built in 1872 and razed in 1926. n.d., n. phtogg., 8" x 5 3/4".
- 16b View of Waikiki Beach from the Harbor showing Diamond Head in the background, n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 17a The view of Honolulu near Smith's Bridge or on Nuuanu and Bates Streets. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4".
- 17b Residence to left of C.C. Harris below Smith's Bridge on Nuuanu Street, n.d., n. photog., 8 3/4" x 6 1/4".
- 18a Looking down Nuuanu Street. H.L. Chase's photographic wagon left. Junction near Kuakini Street and Nuuanu Street, n.d., n. photog., (Studio 64-66 Fort St.)
- 18b Looking up Nuuanu Street at a point near photo No. 139 (17a) . See Truck of Nuuanu Dairy., n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 19a A Nuuanu Street Home, n.d., n. photog., 8 5/8" x 6 7/8".
- 19b Residence of millionaire Chinese business man Chun Cefong and his Hawaiian American-English wife, Julia Fayerweather. Cefong seated on left. A magnificent home with gracious old Hawaiian hospitality., n.d., n. photog., 8 3/4" x 6 3/8".
- 20a Dr. John S. McGrew called by many the "father of annexation". This was the old residence of Dr. Wood being called the American Hospital--site at corner of Hotel and Bishop Street now occupied since 1900 when this building came down--as the Alexander Young Hotel. 1968 they went out of the hotel business and the building is all offices. Robert E. Van Dyke was a leading tenant in this building for many years. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 1/4". (occupying the jewelry firm of Dawkins Bercovy (?) Co.
- 20b Unidentified Honolulu cottage, n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8". Another view of the C.C. Harris home on Nuuanu Street (See photo 17b)
- 21a Undifentied residence on Honolulu Street (Nuuanu)? n.d., n. photog., 9 1/8" x 6 3/8".
- 21b St. Albans or Iolani College School, Honolulu, n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".

- 22 Another view of the C.C. Harris home on Nuuanu Street, See photo 17b) n.d., n. photog., 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".
- 23 Kapaonia Falls . Today, 1977, a freeway runs along the right. To the left in fenced area in 1866 was built the mausoleum of the Hawaiian Royal Family. A most sacred area in the old days known as KAWANANAKOA. n.d., n. photog., 6 $\frac{1}{4}$ " x 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".
- 24a Hawaiian School near Punchbowl area., Honolulu, n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 24b Old Mission School still standing in 1977 to the rear of Kawaiahao Church, n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 25a The Priory School run by the English Sisters of St. Andrews Church. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 25b This is the Royal School built as the Chiefs Childrens School in 1839-1852 for the education of the children of the high chiefs and those ~~of~~ that became the later monarchs of Hawaii. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 26a The Kawaiahao Seminary and Boarding School on King Street across from Kawaiahao Church. Site in 1977 was occupied by the City Hall of Honolulu. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 26b The children's Indian tent and play area at the magnificent ranch of John A. Cummins at Waimanalo. Site of the finest parties given for the Hawaiian Royal Family. Lord and Lady Brassey in their yacht the Sunbeam were given a lavish party here in the time these pictures were taken. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 27a Waikiki Beach before everyone and everything! The sand is covered with a purple morning glory vine. This area at the bottom of the picture would be near the present Royal Hawaiian Hotel looking towards Diamond Head. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 27b Nuuanu Stream near present 1977 Foster Garden-at dip in mountain  note the Royal Mauseleum noted in photo no. 23. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".
- 28a Kameameha V's beach house at Waikiki, site of the Royal Hawaiian Hotel., n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".
- 28b Parliament Building-Honolulu. Obviously under construction. Note window upper right (no glass) construction shack to rear. In 1977 building houses state courts, probate, etc. this picture is either 1872-73. In 1977 Hawaiian State and old Territories Tax Office is on the site where the wooden sheds are. Fence was replaced with an iron one--removed very early. n. photog., 9" x 6 $\frac{3}{8}$ ".

- 29a The rear entrance to the Parliament Building. Courts to the Left--Board of Health and other Government Offices to the right. Board of Health later (1883) had its own building to the right. This is Queen Street. The location is called MILILANI--it was the Honolulu home of Judge John di. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 29b The old Nuuanu Pali Road. At the end is the spectacular view called the "Pali". n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 30a Native Hawaiians on the Pali Road, n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 30b Looking back on to the Pali view from the bottom. This spot where the photo was taken, in 1977, is called "Castle Junction" where four roads intersect. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 31a View from the Nuuanu Pali looking towards Makapu area. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 31b View from the Nuuanu Pali looking towards Koolau mountains and Kanohe. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 32a Nuuanu Pali itself. Note the lack of vegetation which today makes this one of the most beautiful spots in the world. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 32b Tomb of King William Charles Lunalilo before the iron fence was added. This must have been taken at least in 1874-1875. It is located just to the right of the entrance to Kawaiahao Church. n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 33a Newly planted date palm drive at the Queen's Hospital, n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 33b The Queen's Hospital on Punchbowl Street, n.d., n. photog., 8 7/8" x 6 3/8".
- 34a Kawalo Basin area looking towards Parliament Building under construction in the early 1870's. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".
- 34b Fabulous view of Punchbowl occupied by thousands of homes (today) and Ala Moana shopping center in 1977. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".
- 35a The famous Waimanola Ranch of John Adams Cummins. Workers houses, Mt. Alomana in the background. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".
- 35b Looking up Nuuanu Street from Kuakini street corner. n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".

36. The Royal Mausoleum built in 1865 to house the bodies of the Kamehameha dynasty and associated friends and relations. Later removed from niches in this chapel and an underground vault was placed here to house all members---sealed in 1903, n.d., n. photog., 9" x 6 3/8".
- 37 Queen Emma, consort of King Kameha meha. n.d., n. photog., 6 5/8" x 9 1/4".
- 38 King David Kalakau (1874-n.d., n. photog., 10" x 8 1/8".
- 39 Queen Kapiolani (1874-1891) consort of Kalakaua died in 1899. Granddaughter of King Kaumualu n.d., n. photog., 8 1/8" x 10".
- 40 Governor John Owen Dominis of Oahu. Husband of Lydia Paki who became Queen Lili uokalani. n.d., n. photog., 8 1/8" x 10".
- 41 Lydia Kamakaiha who married John Owen Dominis-- upon the death of her brother King David Kalakaua at the Palace Hotel in San Francisco in January 1891 she became the last Queen of Hawaii who was overthrown in 1893. She died in November 1917. n.d., n. photog., 8 1/4" x 10".
- 42 Archibald Scott Cleghorn who was married to Princess Likelike. She was the sister to Kalakaua and Lilioukalani. His daughter was the greatly beloved Princess Victoria Kaiulani--heir to the throne of her aunt Queen Liliuokalani.
- 43 Princess Likelike ,mother of Princess Kaiulani and wife of Governor Archibald Cleghorn. n. d., n. photog., 8 1/8" x 10". (Same for photo no. 42)
- 44 Prince Liliohoku (William Pitt) heir to the throne of Kalakaua. His untimely death made his sister, Mrs. Dominis, become designated as the heir apparent, n.d., n. photog., 8 1/8" x 10 1/8".
- From here on the photographs are believed to be of Fiji or the Gilbert Islands. Mr. Van Dyke believes they are not of the Hawaiian Islands.
- 45a Veranded structure overlooking the sea, n.d., n, photog., 6" x 8".
- 45b Group of natives standing on the beach by an outrigger canoe., n.d., n. photog., 6" x 8".
- 46a Group portrait of same natives as in 45b, at the same location, n.d., n. photog., 6" x 8 1/8".
- 46b Unidentified bay with two Europeans, n.d., n. photog., 6" x 8 1/8"

- 47a Looking across an unidentified bay.n.d.,
n. photog.,6" x 8 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".
- 47b Small shore settlement from the sea looking into
the beach, unid. location, n.d., n. photog.,

- 48a Village by the sea,looking from a nearby height,

- 50 a Small beach village with beach, unid. location.,
n.d., n. photog.,6" x 8".
- 50b Bay from a nearby hill, unid. location,n.d.,
n.photog.,6" x 8".
