CONVERSATION WITH YASUO ABIKO

Story of Tanaka, Tsurukichi interesting.

sneaked out of Japan

8

He came to US about 1867 at age 14. Father was friend of Townsend Harris. Got on British boat and came as cabin boy. Officers were very rough on the men. Jumped ship in Honolulu and came to US. Capt. was kind and introduced him to an Am. friend here. (owner of shoe factory?), He went to school here.

He was already here when the first mission under the Meiji Govt. arrived in 1872. (Other missions had come before that.)

He was told to learn a trade and go back to Japan. Tried to go to Virginia City to learn about mining, but there was persecution from the Chinese (?).

He went to Alaska to learn fishin, and salt making. Went back to Japan and given land near Tokyo. Took Mr. Tsukamoto (?) father of Kay Tsukamoto
(*remained debts*)

Came back to US. (when?) Worked for the Orpheum Circuit when he was close to 80. Was in chge of the janitors, but kicked out when everything unionized. He was made Ass't Treasurer (as such, he counted thousands of tickets that came in to theatres each day.)

Married one of daughters of interpreter on First mission to US (1886)

~~children~~: George Tanaka (Belmont, Mary Nagata (Belmont - seems to be the historian of the family). one other married to hakujin in Richmond (close to 80).

- Mother: Shizue Namura
- Father: Tsurukichi Tanaka - was called Thomas
- Grandmother - Kame. Her father was in first mission to U.S.

- Father came to US as a young boy; stow away. Mother said he was a shogunai boy.

- She doesn't seem to know too much about her father's life.

- Grew up South of Market St. 1905 moved up to Twin Peaks. Grandmother was here, because she came with her mother. She said she never would have come if she knew life was going to be so hard. In Japan she had servants and a good life. Grandmother was afraid of fire, so moved. Susie found ads and they went around looking at homes. ... She remembers horse and carriages. They lived above a stable, used to watch horse and buggies going out.

- M. spoke Japanese, but Father spoke English to them. He was the head of the janitors at the Orpheum. Many J. worked for him. When union stepped in, couldn't hire Japanese. Trouble started.... He wanted to learn how to make salt and take the skills back to Japan, but was unsuccessful because of the climate. He took the first cattle to Japan. He was one of the first J. to get citizenship. (how?)

- 1906 Earthquake:

5:30 a.m. beds began to shake. Mother told them to lie quiet. First shock was very severe. They looked downtown and could see fires every where. Susie went to Mitsui where she was working and put valubes into S. Dep. box. Fire came up to Van Ness. They had a well for water, so F. opened it up. Refugees came and camped on the hill. Grandmother made hibachi with bricks and they cooked outside with wood. They used to use kerosene lamps, then gas came. They had a gas stove, but couldn't use it after earthquake. They had to stand in bread lines for food. One would get bread, one potatoes, another corned beef. They had to get rations for each day. The Army took over. Father brot back sacks of rice. Lots of the Orpheum theatrical people came. People slept on the floors. After the quake, the Orpheum moved to the Cliff House. Mary remembers walking thru Golden Gate park to get there. Later moved to OFarrell. They were the only J. on twin peaks.

1908-09: All J. were to go to some Chinese school. Discrimination ag J. Mother made her stay home, saying she wouldn't send her to those schools. Few ~~ish~~ Irish children called her names. They used to fight.

- she married Mr. Iwata. The Iwata Bros had art shops in the Stockton area. He didn't get along with the bro., so he went to work as a laborer. In those days, Isleton, Walnut Grove, Delta area were full of Japanese people. Geo Shima, potato king. ~~Ex~~ Used Colberg(?) motor boats to get to Isleton .

They went from camp to camp to work in the fields. Had small daughter. Had to sleep on wooden beds with a blanket thrown over hay for a mattress. Sometimes, they put a blanket on top of a table to sleep.

They had their own place as they were a family. Washed in a tub; Had to pump water for cooking; there was a nihonburo.

- She became the cook for the camp. Cooked for about 20-30 people. She didn't know anything. She was young and had led a sheltered life. The men made vegetable patches and helped her cook and clean.

- The work was seasonal, so they moved with the crops. During asparagus season she had to get up at 3:30 a.m., make bkfst at 4:00; then men were out in the fields until 12 or 1:00. Had dinner about 2 or 3:00; Took a nihon buro - big wooden metal lined tub. 4 x 8 frame, then metal; burned wood underneath. The first thing they did was go out to the levees and cut wood and saw it, let it dry before it could be burned.

- She ~~sometimes~~ often had to boil water in a tub and wash the men's clothes. Her mother told her "gaman while young, and toshi tottara raku wo suru". The men felt sorry for her, and so usually washed their own clothes. "Obasan," they called her, "bokura ga suru." She was only about 21 - 23.

- Since she was young and everything was new, she rather enjoyed this life. It was the first time in her life she had to do so much. They got board and room, and were paid at the end of the season.

- Between seasons, they would stay at the hotels, and then hotel people would notify them if so many workers were wanted here or there; Tracy, Walnut Grove, etc... Men who could, took wives.

- Toilets were outside; just holed in the ground. J. carpenters made the oillets.

- They were migrant laborers for about 3 years off and on. Brother felt sorry for them. They opened an art shop in Palo Alto, then went to Stockton and opened a gift shop. Her husband died of the flu (1918?) She also was ill and was in the hospital. When her husband died, the relatives took over his gift shop, so she had to come home to her mother.

- Later she got a job at Peter Dunn(?) - Later married Mr. Nagata, a newspaper man. She lost her citizenship when she married him, a J. national, but later had it restored. Cable Act 1923 (?)

Amount of arable land in Japan - amounts to only about $\frac{1}{2}$ of Tennessee

No. of people per cultivated area - highest in the world.

"Even when cultivated inch by inch. Japan's own soil can feed only 70,000,000 of her 87,000,000 people." Must sell to be able to buy to feed this excess.

2. Japan's 2nd Class Citizens; M. Times Aug. 8/22/54.

Wm. Jordan -

In rural areas - wife up before sunrise makes breakfast, lunch, dinner, laundry, then helps husband in rice fields - has time off break, she nurses baby - now makes lunch, after more farm work, serving after dinner, every few days can bathe.

Sleeps only 6 hrs or so, does farm work + 4½ hrs at household.

Some doubt about the new system of doing things -

In ex. co-ed: - why should women yield, boys get same education when boys will need more training, girls will eventually marry, more divorces among love-match marriages.

3. Low Mark Student a Problem in Japan - from J. Student News Service.

About 500,000 student - not of school preparing for exams because they failed ~~too~~ entrance exams. (called Ronin). They try to get into a "Continuation School" to prepare for next year's entrance exams. - Even to get in here - long line of applicants stand in front of continuation school.

→ This year 500,000 student graduated high school.

But only 120,000 freshman can be accommodated yearly - 130,000 can enter universities

Some will give up because of family and so on... but about 50,000 - 80,000 "Kosen" will be produced. Many in universities want to go on to better & higher universities.

72 gov't universities

34 Public "

131 Private "

Tokyo U, Keio U, & Tohoku U. - all former "Imperial U's" consid. best. All concentrate on big U's - so even bright ones have trouble getting in - because they feel that's the only way to get a good job.

Those in continuation school do nothing but prepare for cultural exams -

"Is Japanese Youth Going Communist?" by Ezra Weln - S.E. Post - Aug 6, 1949

Free Electron January '48 (?) - Communists increased seats  in Diet from 4 to 35.

H.S. & college age student are most unsure of U.S. & democracy.

Soviets drawing large sps from here -

- Student were given "A Primer for Democracy" - That year? -

New textbooks - many give idealistic versions of democracy.

(many boys & girls nurse own ~~for~~ bros & sister on backs - while they play)

Ex: of one boy - Bombings, raids never - mother & sister died in icy river -

boy lived with people who took him in - visited his father 80 back from being prisoners of war in Russia - captured in Manchuria by The Soviets.

- The B-29s had dropped leaflet warning civilians to evacuate

- He says brother - friend, who is at College of Commerce in Tokyo -

said Am. troops would pull out - . He says Soviets giving J. students a chance to join the party now; assuring them of jobs in China & Japan.

Many student joining - student think it foolish for J. to be made a Pacific nation when ~~for~~ it is ⁱⁿ orbit of Soviet expansion plans. - He wants to know about democracy -

Censure of J. Ed & Septem: - one by one laws passed by Diet -

① Superior education for superiors (outlawed, superior inferior)

② Co-ed educ'n. - bring women up to equal status -

③ Children of fishermen, farmers, laborers etc. have same legal right to higher education today as former Peer's son. Entrance dependent on mental ability.

Civil Info & Education Section - under SCAP. - Ed. experts sent over to help ~~new~~ new educational set up.

Before War: - 6 yrs compulsory ed.; adults 95% literate

- Nora Walsh - (cont'd) - Pre-war texts, songs, etc.. all martial, ultra-nationalistic. These marked out of text books. Teachers given new idea to teach orally. Temporary texts. - People asked to submit new texts - Many good ones - folk songs; New History of Japan, etc...
— Soviets also are printing much stuff - often material redone under J. authorship.
Adults too - read Am. Sponsored textbooks in Soviet mat'l with equal interest.
Soviets clever at fiction - Even use paper shows.

- Anti-Am. began to grow as China went Communist. Korean war + indecisive U.S. victory - 1950 Communism gained much momentum in J. May 30, 1950 - students participated in Comm.-sponsored demonstration in front o Dip'l Palace in Tokyo, assaulted some Am. soldiers. - Again violent anti-Am. violence May Day 1952.
— a sort of "Peace" movement began to gain headway in J. before end o occ'n - grew into anti-Am. com. After much suffering during war, J. were inclined toward pacifism. Intellectual began advocating permanent peace.
+ "Peace Problem Discussion Society" created by people such as Pres. of Peers School, Pres. Tokyo U. etc... became more & more anti-Am - as Am began to urge rearmament - wanted neutrality - no military commitment.
— Sekai magazine published its ideas. - Article, books, by members about Hiroshima, about effect o military bases on small towns, etc... Anti-rearmament. Communists are 100% behind peace movement!
— J. Teachers + School Workers Union - under Commie leadership.
— They put out broadsheet - denounce USA as aggressive - discuss Korean war, rearmament etc... + China + Russia - peaceful. - Sponsored film "Hiroshima".

one morning in 1946 - K. went to talk to Emperor - stated for ½ hr waited 3 hrs or less - read from Bible - "Whosoever will be great among you ... shall be servant of all." ... only by service to others can a man, or a nation be godlike.

History: Son of business man + prostitute - Kayawa sent to bitter mother - beaten by her + her mother.

Sent to school - met 2 Am. missionary teachers - Dr. Harry W. Myers + Charles A. Logan - who inspired in K. a passion to left the down trodden + love the voiceless. Went to Tokyo Preech College to prepare for ministry - + in 2nd year, got T.B. Friends sent him to seashore for 1 yr, where he began to write. - later returned to Tokyo + then to Kobe Theol. Seminary. - Disgusted there with doctrine + theories. Went so ~~ff~~ to Shinkawa slums.

Times Eve - 1909 K. carted possessions to 6x6' Shinkawa hut where he would work + live for 15 yrs. - Here, he dev'd ideas + writing which made him famous. Helped feed neighbors - called his parish "my little kingdom of the slaves." People took advantage of him - but he never struck back - One day publisher found scraps of his novel in his hut - ~~- with money~~ "Across + Death Line" - with royalties - added hosp'l + dispensary to his hut. Wrote book after work -

(In 1924 - gov't hoped to wipe out slums in J's 6 biggest cities - (K. credited with this.)

In 1914 - friends stated him to 2 yrs study at Princeton - he turned from simple servant to social reformer. There convinced that poverty made slums, exploitation + labor made poverty. entered labo movement.

J. then switching to machine age - unions then illegal, sweatshop cond's. - K wrote that laborers were human + should have the right to organize. dockyard workers went on strike for this right in 1921 - they asked K to lead them; organized J's 1st full-fledged labor union. Police seized him, beat him, + dragged him to jail.

13 days - released - when arrested by Commiss to search equipment at factories - but K. intervened - paraded at bridge - + stopped them. 1925 - largely with his influence - laws forbidding unions were repealed.

- Also introduced coop'ive movement to farmers - give their lives more dignity -

1928 - founded Nat'l Anti-war League + J.
ag. J. militarists - China Incident - 1931 - K. flew to Shanghai +
apologized - on his return jailed by militarists. Tried to step up peace efforts.
1941-45 - his network + corps nationalized + regimented, menus abolished,
rural rehabilitation projects jettisoned. - many institutions he
founded (settlements, orphanages, Ym service centers, chapels etc...)
destroyed in bombing raids. Militarists persuaded him to
broadcast to US. To protest bombings - Militarists altered them with
propaganda - names to US. Stars + stripes criticized him saying
leader in guile he fostered war - short Americans - said to have
been fanned by Communists -

End + war - stunned + exhausted. Tried to rally J. Ku. Communists
together.. try to write chauvinism out + school texts. Went on evangelizing
others.. trying to Christianize J. -

Today almost blind from trachoma (contracted during steam work)
books ag. best sellers, corps stronger - He directs 3 factories turning out
products for corps - + has established dozens + schools for workers,
promoting small-scale mfg. as winter industry for rural people.

His prime rule - "Give yourself freely + without reserve, to the

Gov. of 2 provinces - Had 2 wives - real mother (concubine) died when K. was 4. - father few months later - so K sent to 1st wife's home - no love - big house, wealthy family - when 11, sent away from home to a govt high school. - Mrs. lived in tent across the road - day heard hymn-singing in a tent - It was a vacation Bible School - Am. missionary preaching. (Logan) he introduced K. to Dr. Myers, who taught him English - he suggested he study "Sermon on the Mount" - - "Consider the lilies of the field... But seek ye first the Kingdom of God, & His righteousness, & all these things shall be added unto you." - Life took on new meaning for K & he began to pray. - used to say "O God, make me a good boy! Amen!" Lived then with an Uncle who didn't believe in Christ.

p. 81 Missionary said to him ... "Do you pray & fast?" Yes sir
"How do you?" "Under bed covers, Sir!"

He urged him to come to church - by calling him a coward not to.

By 15, 3rd Sun. he was baptized - (15 yrs)

Finished h.s. determined to be a minister - Disinherited by Uncle, but got Dr. Myers put him into Tokyo Presb'r College.

In dorm - at time of Russo-J. war - he refused to march or train for war - beaten up.

at 19 (after 2 yrs of College) - summer - preached in streets, daily for 40 days, then collapsed with tubercular pneumonia. recovered - went to Kobe Theol. Seminary. - preached - collapsed ag. - sent to hosp'l - but to save Dr. M's money went to a fisherman's cottage - preached ag - There wrote 1st novel on covers of old magazines - Dr. Myers con-

solely, only animals - no E - They feared his disease -

Dr. Myers came to stay with him during vacation - slept with K.

p. 84 He asked, "Aren't you afraid?" - He ans. "Your disease is contagious but love is more contagious." - K. realized then true meaning of love - ~~absolute~~ That it had no limits - encompasses all. He decided he would love & serve slum dwellers.

He went to live in the slums of Shinkawa - there, took in thieves, mentally ill, etc. fed 4, worked as chimney sweep - took care of ill - smallpox, typhoid, etc. - Published see my boys book -

"Aren't Death kind?" - & he wrote more - next.

After translation realized ~~as was~~ putting up pieces after they fell - he must keep them from falling over.

In May 1913 - K. married - Hare. good family, but lost money - she worked in book-binding concern, 9 yrs. There K. preached conducted services in morning - In summer K. took his place. She began coming to his church in the evenings, & helped at street mtgs. When she told him a proposal offer - he said, marry me instead! Shocked at this face to face offer. - but very many - she stayed. Lefted - while he gone to U.S.

K. realized - people can't be true. His church society is a true Ken society.

K. - The Peasant Problem - Only about 18% land can be cultivated Only about 45% for rice fields. - Peasants poverty stricken - 1921 - started Kobe YMCA - 1st peasant union in Japan - started magazine, K. toured J. organizing farmers - helped them form cooperatives etc... improve methods taught about Christ - urged them to plant trees. - ~~use~~ milk goats rather than cows & they eat more weeds. - He was considered a radical agitator - followed by detectives - & thrown into jail.

P107 - Believe we must remake our society to conform to the principles of Jesus. We must have an econ. system based on the true value of individual, designed to offer individual a chance to live, work & share marks & a man. So K. started cooperatives, make econ. democracy & With labor & peasants - if instead of competing w/ each other, they could cooperate - things would be so much easier. Wanted to establish corps. based on Ken principles.

- 1923 earthquake - preached everywhere - helped set up relief - In accident in motorcycle side car - got back injury

Rev'd Honjo Settlement church to keep relief work going - Matsuzawa "

Worked with Gov't - on many commissions - unemployment etc..

1923 - 1st child born - so moved from slums after 14 yrs. Built a small home himself from packing crates - made tables & chairs of boxes etc.. Wanted to be near Kobe & slums, Osaka - skilled labor, Tokyo & nat'l leaders.

1925 - gov't adopted K's estimates - wiped out slums in Tokyo, Osaka, Yokohama, Kyoto & Nagoya - modern apt. houses erected, streets paved - had to fight infiltration - Communists everywhere - Organized non-denomil Union church in Tokyo - Corps. etc - Goal: to win a million souls for Christ -

In 1921 - founded "Society of The Friends of Jesus" - a French-Church-Presbyterian Order - (Purity, Work, Purity, Peace, Service) by 1926 1300 members They supported his plan to win a million souls for Christ - Kingdom of God Movement!



1929 - enlisted 2000 churches in J to win a million souls - Had no devote more time, but also wrote among K. (6)
- Working Habits: 4-5 prayers + meditation
 breakfast - noon - write
 aft - org. coop.,
 evening - preach.

1930 - 39 - Did much travelling around the world - in effort to retain peace. 1940 - arrested again - charged w/ engaging in pacific propaganda subversive to interests + state. 1941 - in U.S. meeting leaders - trying to work for peace - Dr. J. appeared before House + Reps. + House + Peers, pleading for peace - War - Heart broken.

During war - asked to keep silent & asked to resign from all activities. Could only hold small service in own Chapel. All 113 of his books except poems were banned. Income stopped. Had to sell ~~over~~ hundred volumes from own library to raise funds to keep little meat houses going in protest ag. war - retired to Colony for Tubercular Patient on an island in the Inland Sea. Worked with people + wrote. 2½ yrs. until hairy ordered evacuation. Then went to small village of Minamata, estab. rural Gospel school. freq'y called to city for questionings.

May 1944 - (1 yr 3 mos f war's end) - again arrested - released - jailed for inspiring Pacificism.

Wartime broadcast spiritual messages to troops - + others in response to reports that Am's were committing terrible atrocities. As J. neared defeat - ~~Aug 16~~ + Nagasaki atom bombed - K. warned that Army would assassinate him - He hid in forests north of Tokyo 4-5 mos. living on mulberry leaves.

1945 War over - Prince Higashikuni became Prime Minister - he sent for K. - said (about to present Eng.)

P-139 K. was only reason which will help J. to leave her enemies. K. asked him to free K. in prison - which he did - K. served as special advisor to Dept. of Public Welfare - He went personally to MacArthur to beg for food for refugees - + helped to help rebuild -

Post War - ¹⁴ new Constitution Empress issued receipt which said in effect, he was no longer a demi-god. Eng. app'd K. to House + Peers + then asked him to come lecture to him - H. + Peers dissolved 2 yrs later + replaced by Hse. of Councillors.

Feb. 7, 1946 - went to Imp. Palace; Eng., Empress; + courtiers talked for 1½ hrs - The Empress need for character bldg - + not fair that Eng. must sit close to E. + inspire them + desire for democracy + justice.
