We know you will pardon us for using a mimeographed form letter in writing you this time, but the rush of applications and the necessity for speed seems to make it better for all of us.

On your questionnaire you indicated that you have already been accepted at . While there can be no assurance of your getting a travel permit at present, our Council will be glad to make further efforts in that direction. In order to secure your permit we shall have to have some further evidences of your eligibility.

Will you please send or have sent to us as quickly as possible the items checked below:

1. A letter or telegram from the college which has accepted you, proving that you have been officially accepted. (Absolutely essential)
2. A letter or telegram from your bank or some other financially responsible source proving that you have enough money available to keep you for a year. (Absolutely essential).
3. A statement from you about what living arrangements you have been able to make. (Important whenever possible).
4. The name of a friend or sponsor at the college or in the community. (Important whenever possible).
5. The means of travel you intend to use, (bus or train). (Essential).
6. So many spaces on your questionnaire were left blank that we were unable to render a very accurate decision. Please complete every one as fully as you know how. (Absolutely essential).

It is imperative that this information reach us at the earliest possible date.

We are very pleased that you have been able to make some progress toward transfer and hope that your plans can be completed speedily.

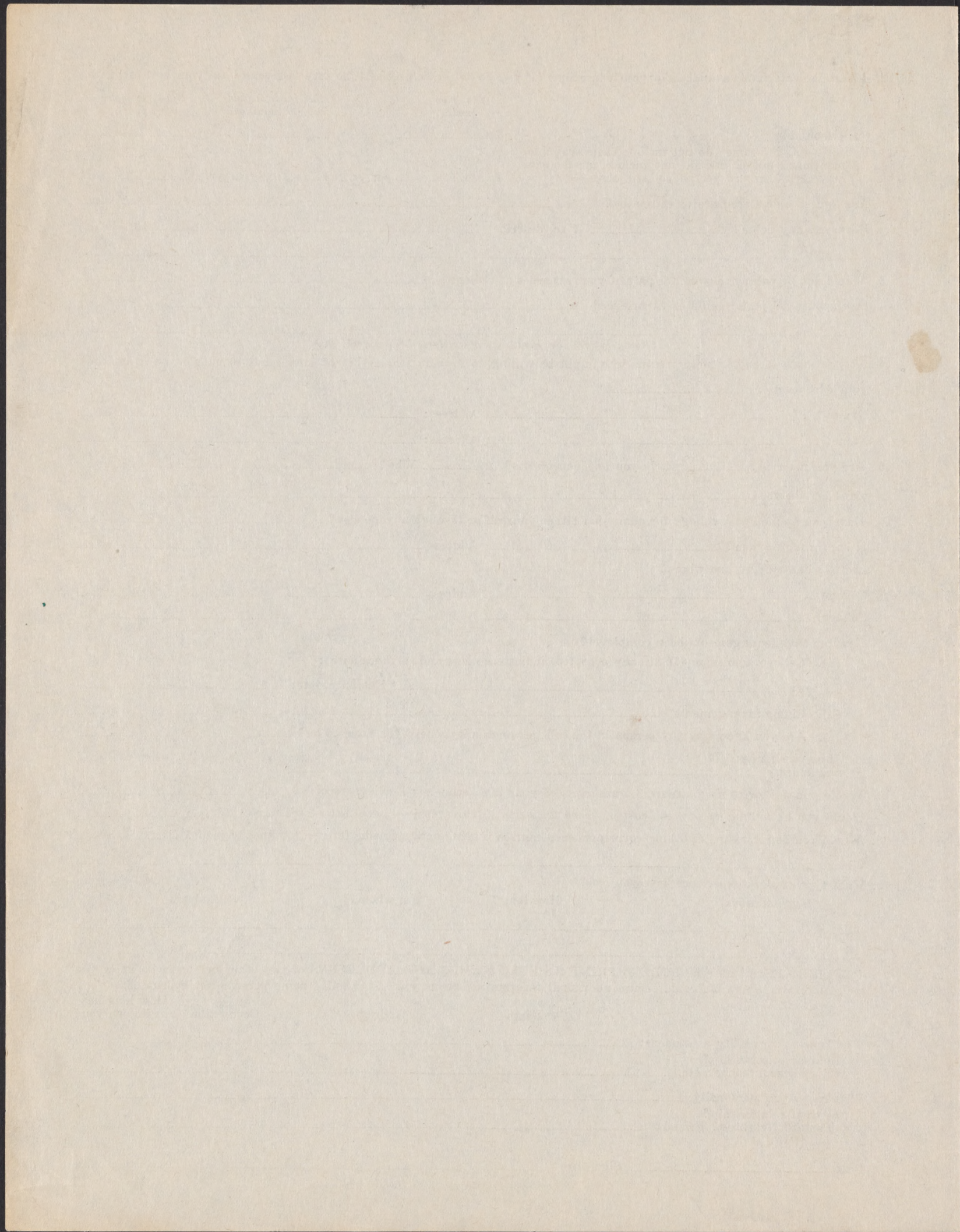

Unfortunately, figures for previous months in comparable form are unavailable. The average number of acceptances per month since June 15, 1942, roughly the beginning of the Council's work, is 150 students per month.

III. Contingencies Affecting Future Placement:

The General Draft Law is probably the only event which will materially affect the volume of future placements. Out of 14,000 Japanese American Civilians now within the age limit, it is estimated that approximately 4,000 will be taken into the Army. Thus, more than 29% of the male student applications will become inactive in our files.

A new procedure involving individual clearance through the office of the Provost Marshal General will permit certain students to enter the major universities which are now uncleared. Students in advanced and specialized fields will thus have an opportunity they may not have had previously.

\* This figure should not be confused with the number of students relocated to colleges which now totals 2309.

Of the 2861 students accepted, approximately 700 have not filed Questionnaire Forms and are not included in Section I; these 700 were accepted partly or entirely on their own initiative.



SURVEY OF ANSWERS TO QUESTION #18 OF STUDENT QUESTIONNAIRE

The question: Would you be interested in taking correspondence courses if other arrangements for study cannot be made?  
Which courses?

From a grand total of 1884 questionnaires tabulated:

- 1121 Students answered "Yes". A small number stated that they were already engaged in study by correspondence. A very few answered "Preferred".
- 557 Answered "No". Most of these students offered no explanation of their answers. Some, however, gave as reason for their answers the laboratory requirements of their particular courses which precluded any study by correspondence. Others explained that conditions within the Centers were prohibitive to concerted study. Still others indicated their intentions to perform work within the Centers while interned.
- 148 Gave no answer, or, in a few instances, wrote "Undecided" or "Doubtful".
- 58 Affirmed with qualifications. The largest group said, in effect, "Yes, if the expense is within my means". Some said, essentially, "As a last resort". Others stated different conditions.

Points to be considered in evaluating the survey:

(a) A number of those who answered "Yes" to the general question pertaining to interest in correspondence courses gave no answer to the question, "Which courses?"

(b) Some answers listed specific subjects such as "spherical trigonometry", while others gave general courses such as "engineering" or "pre-medical" which implied many of the subjects specifically cited by other students.

(c) Many students apparently are not familiar with the limitations of study by correspondence, for many highly technical subjects or subjects requiring laboratory experiments and demonstrations were cited such as "embryology, mycology, and obstetrics, etc."
