

We see Tsutomu Ota on the loose again, so girls here's your opportunity now.



"We are not going to push any one out of this camp". With this statement Mr. W. K. Holland of the relocation program office made clear to the students of the combined sociology classes of Mr. Parker and Mr. Krueger this policy of the W.R.A. during the seventh period last Thursday.

He also pointed out that as far as he was concerned Japanese Americans will not be deprived of their jobs when the soldiers return from overseas.

An interesting fact which should be considered by many graduating seniors who are concerned about their future is that many colleges are favoring the entrance of the Nisei students. These and many other helpful answers were given by Mr. Holland.

Some of the more pertinent questions by the students and the answers by Mr. Holland are listed.

Question: "Will loyal Nisei be drafted earlier than the other citizens?"

Answer: "No. to my knowledge Niseis will be drafted neither earlier nor later than any other citizens."

Question: "Will short term leaves be available?"

Answer: "Short term leaves are available. Short term leaves up to thirty days are given and another thirty days leave may be given if it is necessary. A group of families may select a representative to investigate the conditions outside by these short term leaves."

Prior to coming to Tule Lake, Mr. Holland had been carrying on the relocation program in Nebraska. Born in South Dakota he has taken a great fancy to Nebraska.


