POSTER SHOP: The papers and other materials for the Navy Job arrived during the month and a double shift was started in the Foster shop so that the work could be completed at an early date. The Navy posters have been completed and forwarded to the Bureau of Naval Personnel. We hope that these prove satisfactory to the Navy and future orders from this agency will be forthcoming.

SAWMILL: Most of the month, our crew has been short and at one time only four workers were in the forest. In addition to the production which appears on the front page of this report, we also skidded and trucked timber to the mill for cutting. We have almost a full crew at the present time, and I hope to produce 10 to 15,000 lumber per week during the next month, if I don't have labor or equipment troubles.

SEWING: Job order for the production coveralls and overalls are waiting shipment of materials. The employment has been cut in this unit to increase work efficiency and standards.

CABINET SHOP: The hospital submitted job order for 135 bedside tables. Because of lack of materials, we will start only 60 of this items. If materials are available later, the others will be produced. We also plan to start the Home Economics tables next week. This again will depend upon receiving materials from the Engineering Department. Much time is being spent on the completion of shelving and furniture for the H.S. library.

NARRATIVE REPORT:

POSTER SHOP — Plans are being made for the Navy poster job, and with the move of the shop to other quarters, an attempt will be made to set the shop up on a production basis. We are looking forward to the assistance of Miss Maida Campbell from Granada.

All work done during the month was for the center. There is a steady flow of requests which keep the workers busy. With the addition of several workers from Tule Lake it is hoped that we can handle our share of the Navy job. Materials and supplies have been adequate and, in the main, we have anticipated our needs so that slow deliveries have not bothered production schedules.

New housing of the shop will be about the same as our present location. Industries are using both recreation halls in Block 27, thus, the Community Activities requested us to move into another hall to allow them to have one in that block.

SAWMILL — Production schedules have kept well ahead of the demand during the past month. Most of our time, as will be noted, was spent in getting dry logs and poles for the construction of the root cellar and for use as coal bunkers. Several hundred are decked ready to be hauled to the center, but only those actually delivered to the job are included in the report.

Transportation has been scarce because of the need for trucks in the segregation program. We also have had some difficulty with break-downs of transportation equipment because of the steep hills. The Motor Pool, however, have given us 100% cooperation. Necessary equipment, materials, and supplies have been on hand or readily available.

BAKERY AND TOFU — These shops have just been turned over to the Industries Section. At present, the buildings are not quite ready. The inside must be cleaned and painted or white washed before equipment can be installed. This work is too new to say just how many workers will be involved. It looks now like we will have to train most of our bakery help as there are few bread makers on the project. The equipment for the bakery is on hand, I understand. The machinery and other equipment for the tofu is to be made with most of the parts on the project. Materials and supplies should be readily available for both jobs.

CABINET SHOP -- As is indicated by the report, some of our larger job orders were completed during the month. Shortage of help has been prevalent because of the number of men going to seasonal labor. SEWING -- Our crew has been small and work sufficient. Materials are still somewhat of a problem, but all departments involved are cooperating 100%. A broader production program is being studied, but there is little to report at this time.

NARRATIVE REPORT:

Industries in Operation: Discuss any unusual or significant developments this month; current problems; plans for next month; production schedules; orders on hand; policy changes; problems in connection with labor, materials, tools, equipment, housing, etc., etc.

POSTER SHOP -- This shop was closed October 15 and will remain closed until proper heating facilities are available. A system of heating has been worked out, and it is hoped that this system can be installed in the building. This system should eliminate the fire hazards that were present under the old system. All the work to bring this shop to standard will be completed before work is resumed.

We would like to be able to accept work on the Navy job late in November or the first of December. Housing will be a problem as the Community Activities section are anxious to have adequate recreation space for the center during the winter months. We have used a recreation hall up to this time and believe there will be one available to us in some other block in the center.

SAWMILL -- The sawmill continued to function smoothly with a full crew and adequate cooperation from all divisions. Our main effort changed during the month from dry logs to lumber materials with the completion of the Root Cellar. Cutting and decking have been the major part of our work the last half of the month. One quite heavy snow slowed operations somewhat, but we were able to work every day. Ten inches of snow fell in the upper timber where the cutting and decking are being done. This tied up our trucks and little hauling to the mill or the center was done.

If weather holds good, operation will continue, but it is anticipated that the mill will be closed when weather gets too bad.

SEWING -- Sewing is taking on a little different attitude since getting lined up to produce for Business Enterprises. Two new workers were added to strengthen our staff for this production. A little reorganization of the shop planned soon will aid in the line-production idea, and we hope to cut down on labor costs. A clock is needed in the shop

BAKERY SHOP -- A bakery superintendent position was requested of Washington and it is hoped this will be cleared soon so that the training program can get under way. Only a part of the bread requirements will be produced at first. As soon as trained workers are available, shifts will be started to furnish full projects needs. Most machinery is now ready, but is not being placed until the superintendent is here to organize his work his own way.

TOFU FACTORY -- The tofu is progressing slowly with most equipment ready except the grinder which is being held up until bearing arrive. We should be in production within two weeks.

to accurately get a picture of labor costs. Inauguration of a daily work-job sheet will also assist us in getting a true cost figure. Equipment for faster cutting should be made available as all cutting is done by hand. Even tailor shears are impossible to purchase. An effort is now being made to secure electric cutters which might be available through the WPA-Treasury Procurement surpluses somewhere over this country. Some of the WPA surplus equipment we received is still not in working order, but parts have been ordered and we hope will soon be here to put some of the heavy duty equipment in operation.

CABINET SHOP.--The cabinet shop is to be turned to the Engineering Section at an early date, and therefore, this will be deleted from future reports. Most production orders for the center have been completed and little but maintenance will be done in the future.

NARRATIVE REPORT:

Industries in Operation: Discuss any unusual or significant developments this month; current problems; plans for next month; production schedules; orders on hand; policy changes; problems in connection with labor, materials, tools, equipment, housing, etc., etc.

Sawmill -- A small amount of lumber, both rough and finished, was produced during the month. Because of the lack of trucks for hauling logs to the mill, practically all of our work was in cutting and decking. With enough snow on the ground now to haul logs with a car and sled the major activity during December will be to get these logs to the mill and saw into lumber. No particular problems have arisen other than transportation which was unavoidable. Housing and feeding were adequate and workers continued to report to work regardless of some cold and snow. Adequate work clothing has been furnished the men.

Sewing -- Several hundred suits of coveralls were completed and distributed. These being the first on the project since last spring, they were in great demand. More materials were ordered and we hope delivery is not delayed as long as the last order. We also have produced 15 dozen dresses for the Community Enterprises and hope that we can do more of this work for them. Cost of production on the first 15 dozen was rather high because of our first experience and because of the need for spending much of the time on design and pattern making. Future work should reflect this planning.

Poster -- We operated only a small portion of the shop for necessary items needed for the Center. The Project Director has approved use of one of the C.C.C. buildings for our new shop and Engineering is taking the necessary steps to start this work soon.

Bakery -- All equipment and men are awaiting the approval of the Bakery Supervisor by Washington. Until this is received and he is on the job, no effort is being made to go ahead.

Tofu -- This production will be carried on in one end of the bakery building and is now being equipped for production. Some difficulty in setting and making the equipment because the evacuee person knew tofu production but lacked the engineering skill to set it up and make part of the equipment which was necessary. Most of these items have been ironed out and we believe production can start in about ten days.

Shoyu sauce and bean sprouts have been mentioned and recommendations for building have been made for this year's budget. The equipment needed for this production is not great and the building facilities are the most important. If these are made available for this year, production can be started.

NARRATIVE REPORT:

Industries in Operation: Discuss any unusual or significant developments this month; current problems; plans for next month; production schedules; orders on hand; policy changes; problems in connection with labor, materials, tools, equipment, housing, etc., etc.

Sawmill: About 1200 logs were hauled to the mill during the month of December. Most of these were handled with tractor and sleigh because of the snow conditions. This job is now completed, having hauled all logs that were cut and decked. No more cutting is being done because of the deep snow. There is about three weeks work yet to be done, sawing and cleanup around the mill. When this has been completed, operation will be discontinued for the winter.

POSTAGE: This shop has operated on a very limited basis. Some of the workers assigned have been trying to fix the shop and get it in order for the Navy job we hope to get. We have not heard any more about this work but are planning so that we can start as soon as it is received.


SHIRTS: We have tried to bring production costs in line but have not gotten them down to where they should be. We find in most instances that costs are about 1 1/2 to 2 times greater than ordinary quotations to the government and at times exceed retail values. There are several things that enter into this situation. 1-The shop itself is not a production shop as the cutting, pressing and button hole work is all done by hand. This naturally cuts down on efficiency of operation. 2-Common to all other work within the center the labor is not cheap even at the small hourly wage. 3-General labor conditions are not toward efficiency and enter into the picture of production. We have raised our output to a somewhat higher level during December than our average and hope that by our continued efforts, we will bring production costs down to market costs.
