The lower classmen were handed a 20-0 defeat from the Senior gridsters yesterday afternoon on Rudolph Field.

After plowing down their way down to the visitors fifteen, halfback Yashiro plowed his way over from the three yard line.

The Mustangs scored once again on a punt return with Afferbach on the receiving end, he raced up to the Eagles forty-yard line then he lateraled to Hill who streaked down the side lines scoring. The extra point was made on a quarterback sneak.

With only thirty seconds left for the half, Rabbit Shiraki guard intercepted a Mustang pass on his own fifteen and outdistanced the entire Mustang backfield.

The half time ended with the Mustangs enjoying a 19-13 lead.

Wednesday night in a practice tilt in the local gym, the Eagles walked over the Zebra Jay Vees, 27-19.

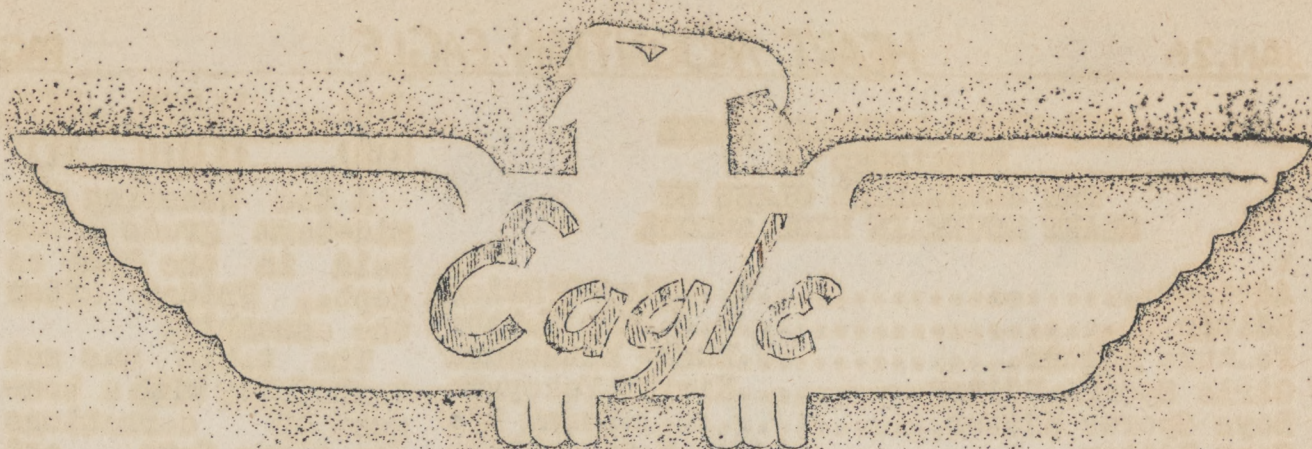
The Zebras started fast in the game taking the lead at the end of the first quarter by the score of 9-7 with George Yamamoto leading the attack, scoring eight points.

DUKES DEFEAT AJAX, BRUINS

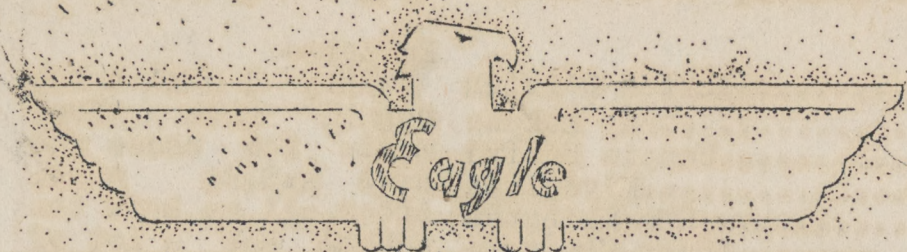

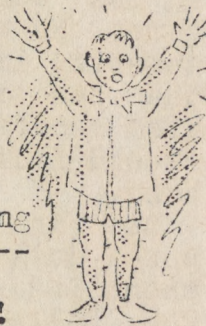
