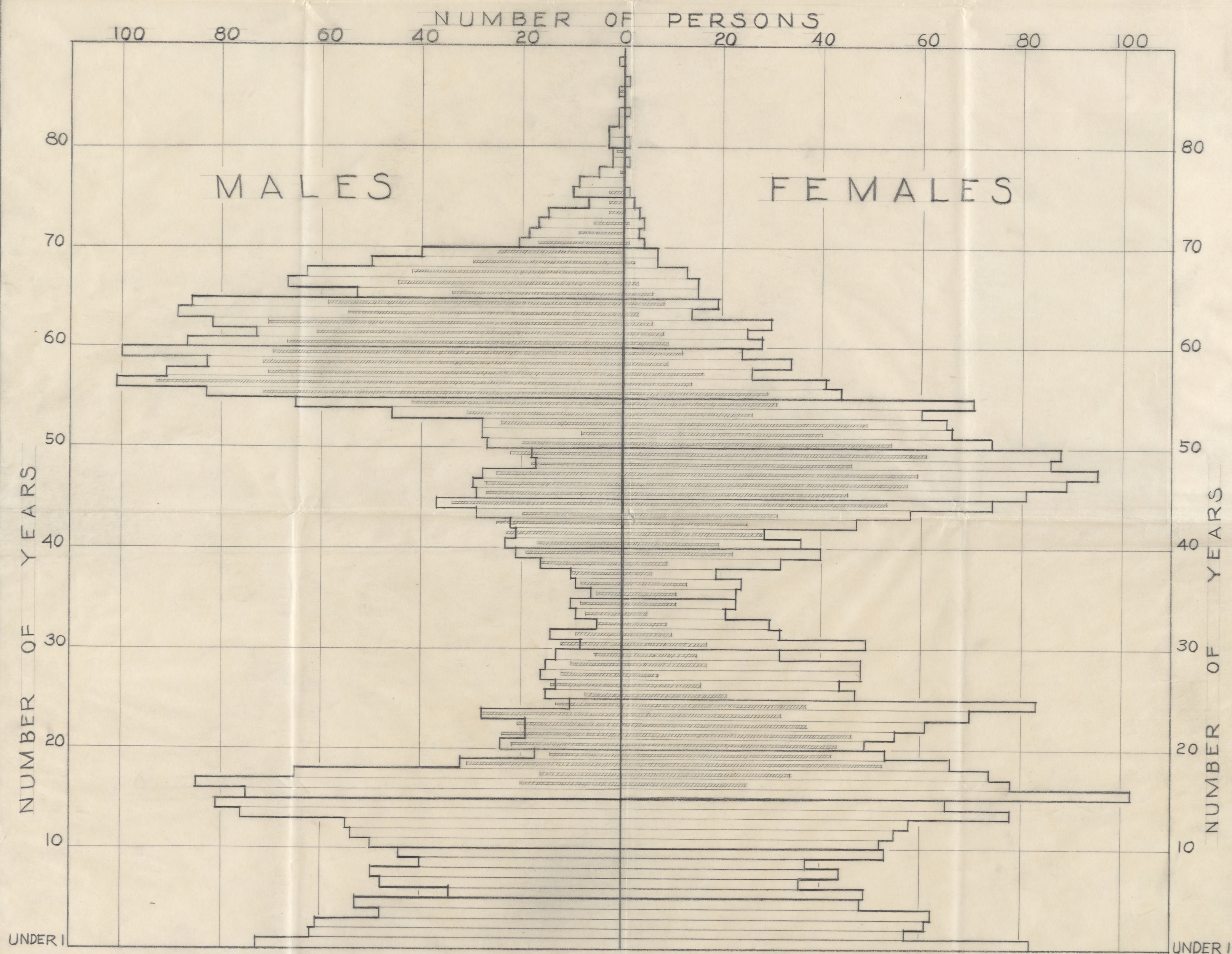


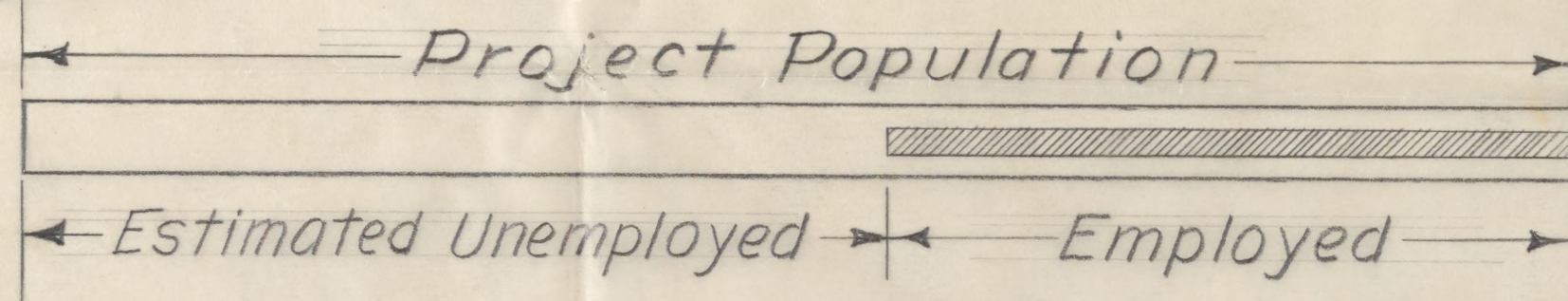

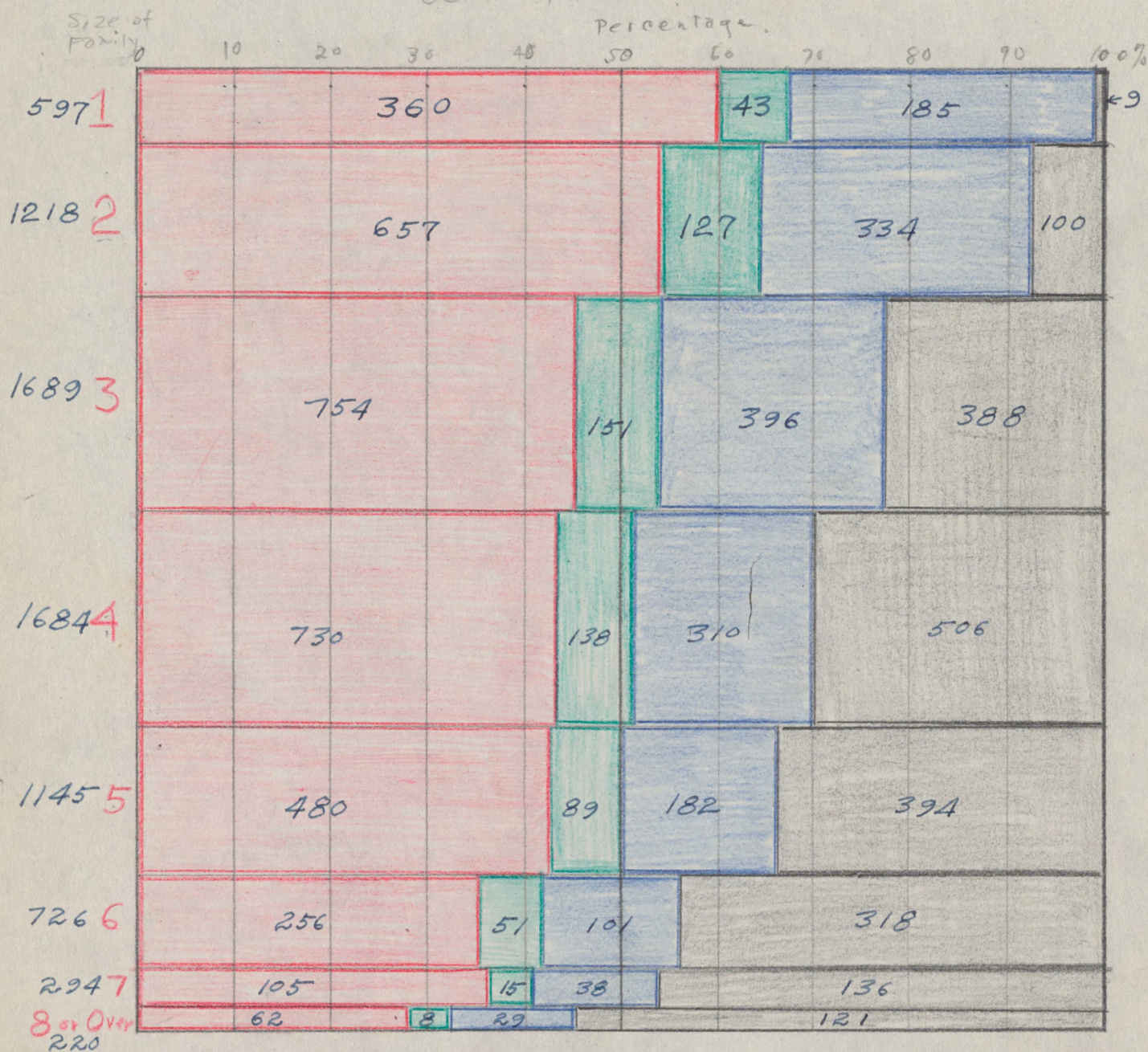

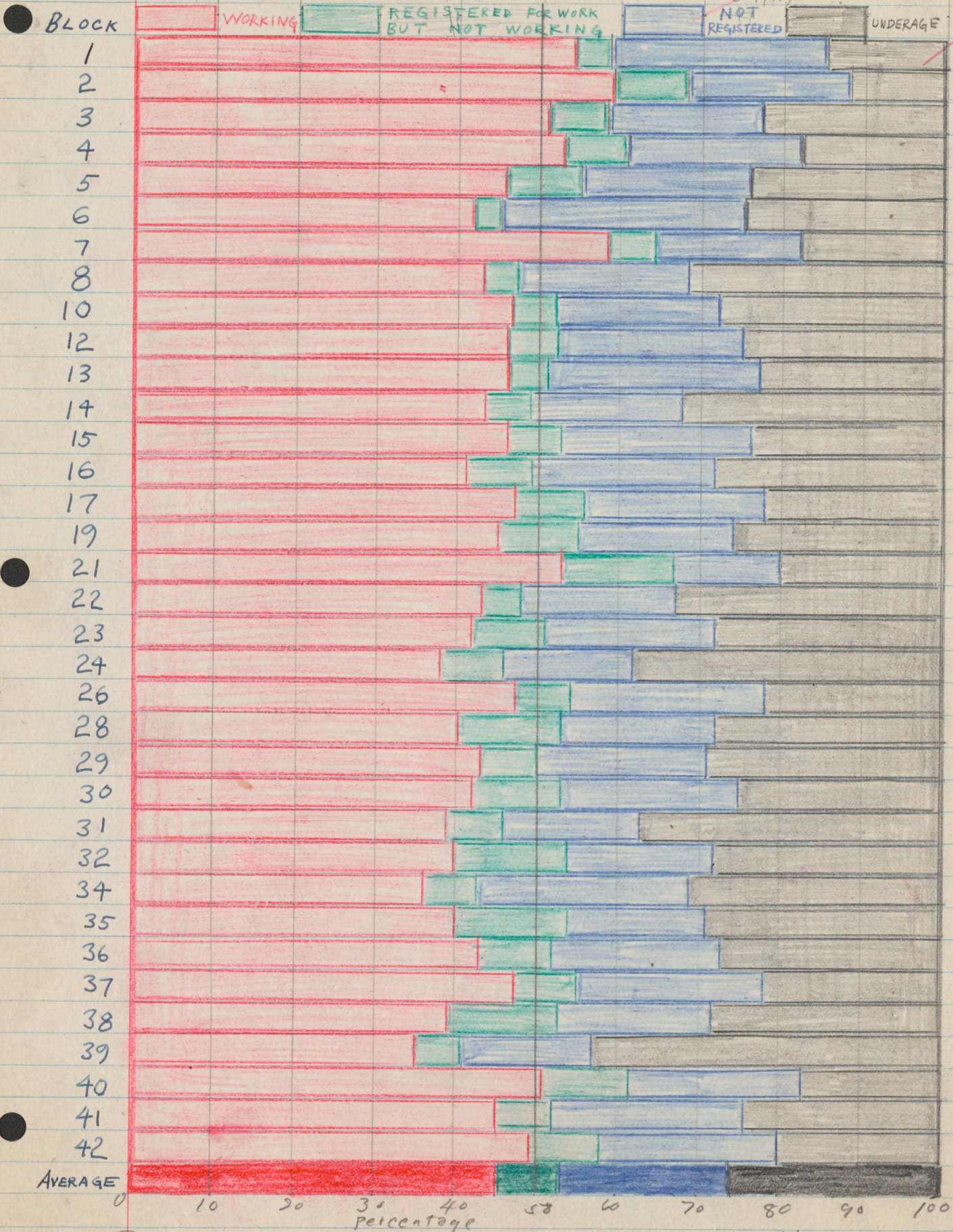

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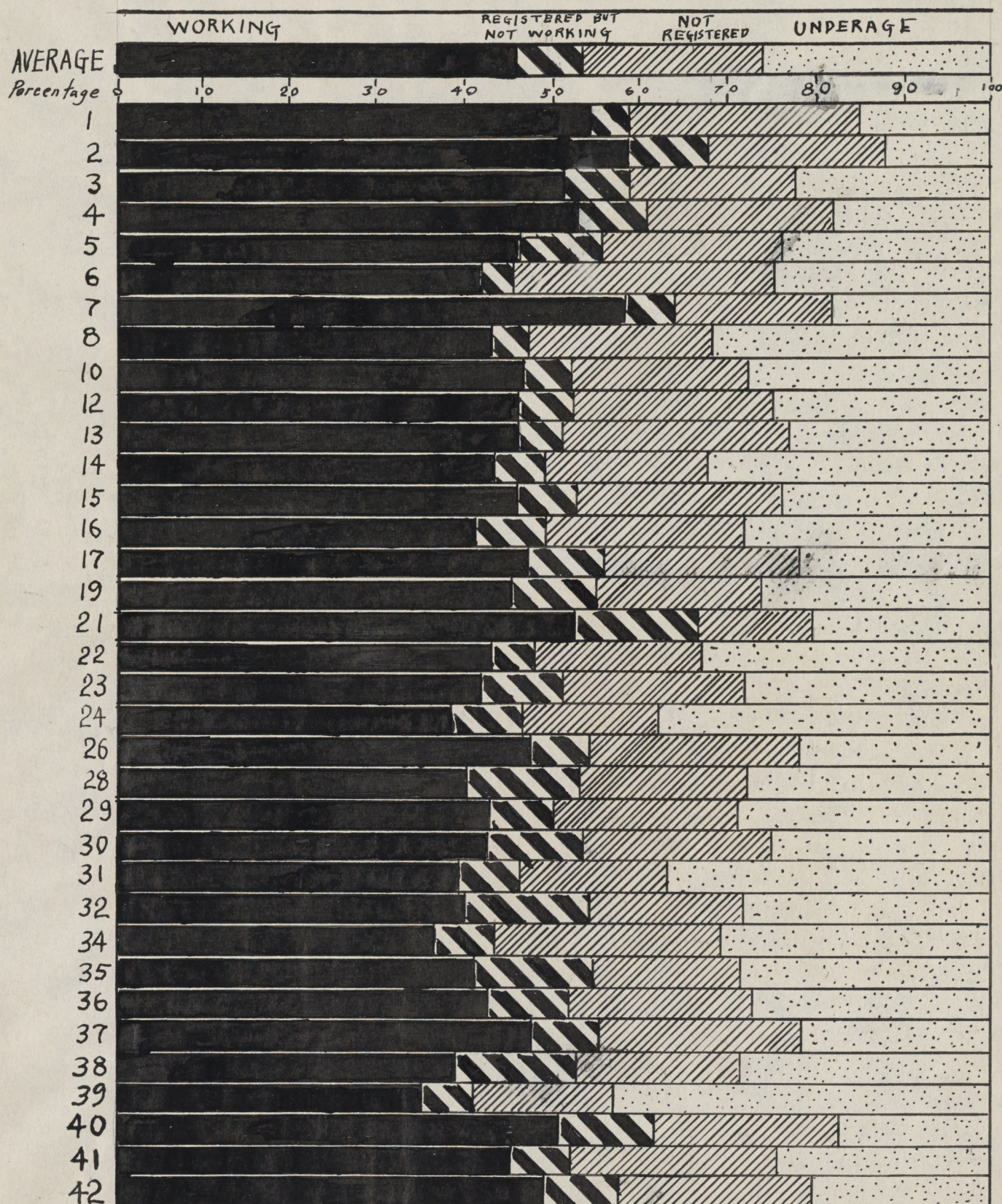
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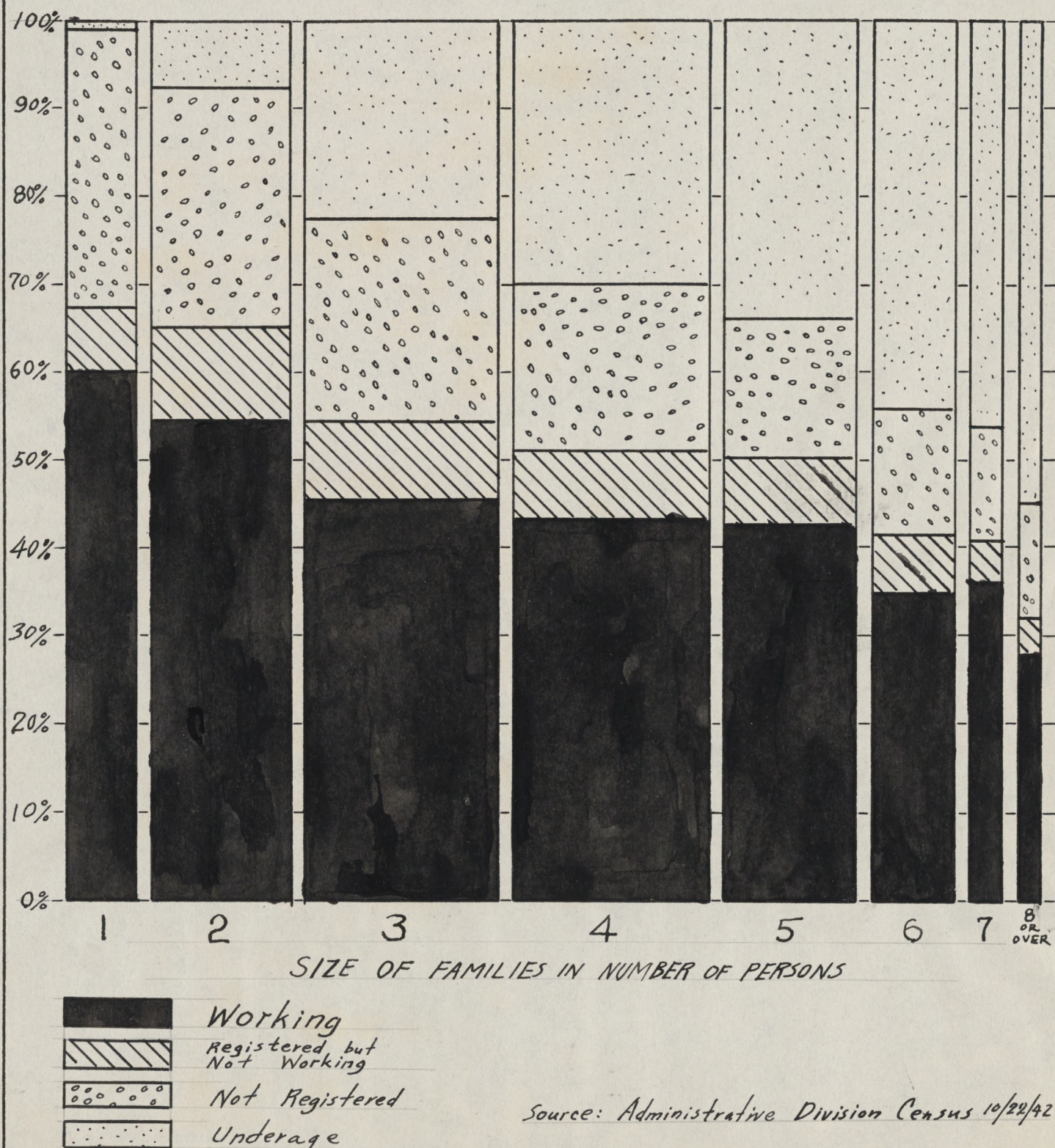
DISTRIBUTION OF LABOR FORCE BY BLOCKS AS OF OCTOBER 22, 1942

RATIO OF EMPLOYMENT BY SIZE OF FAMILY

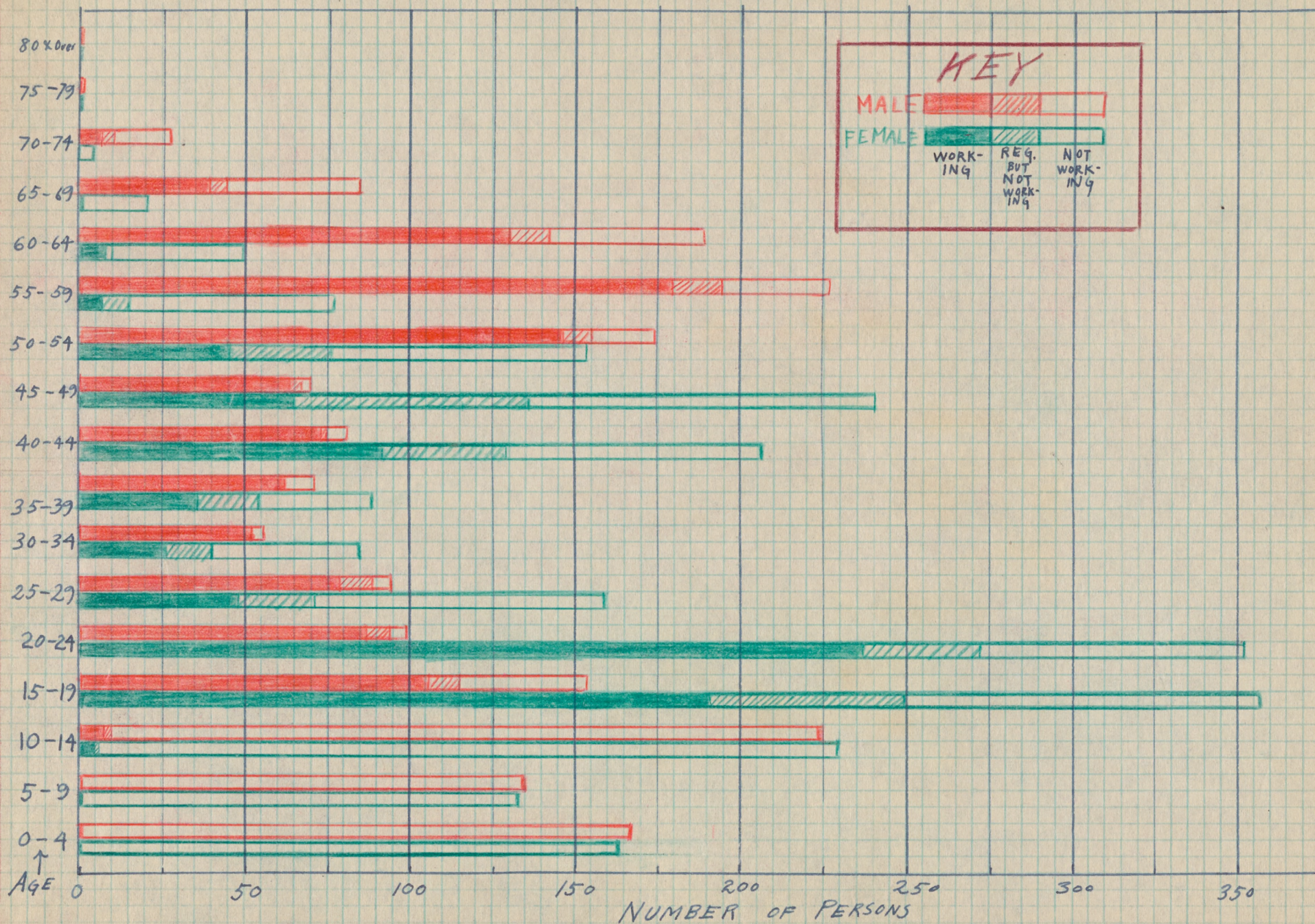

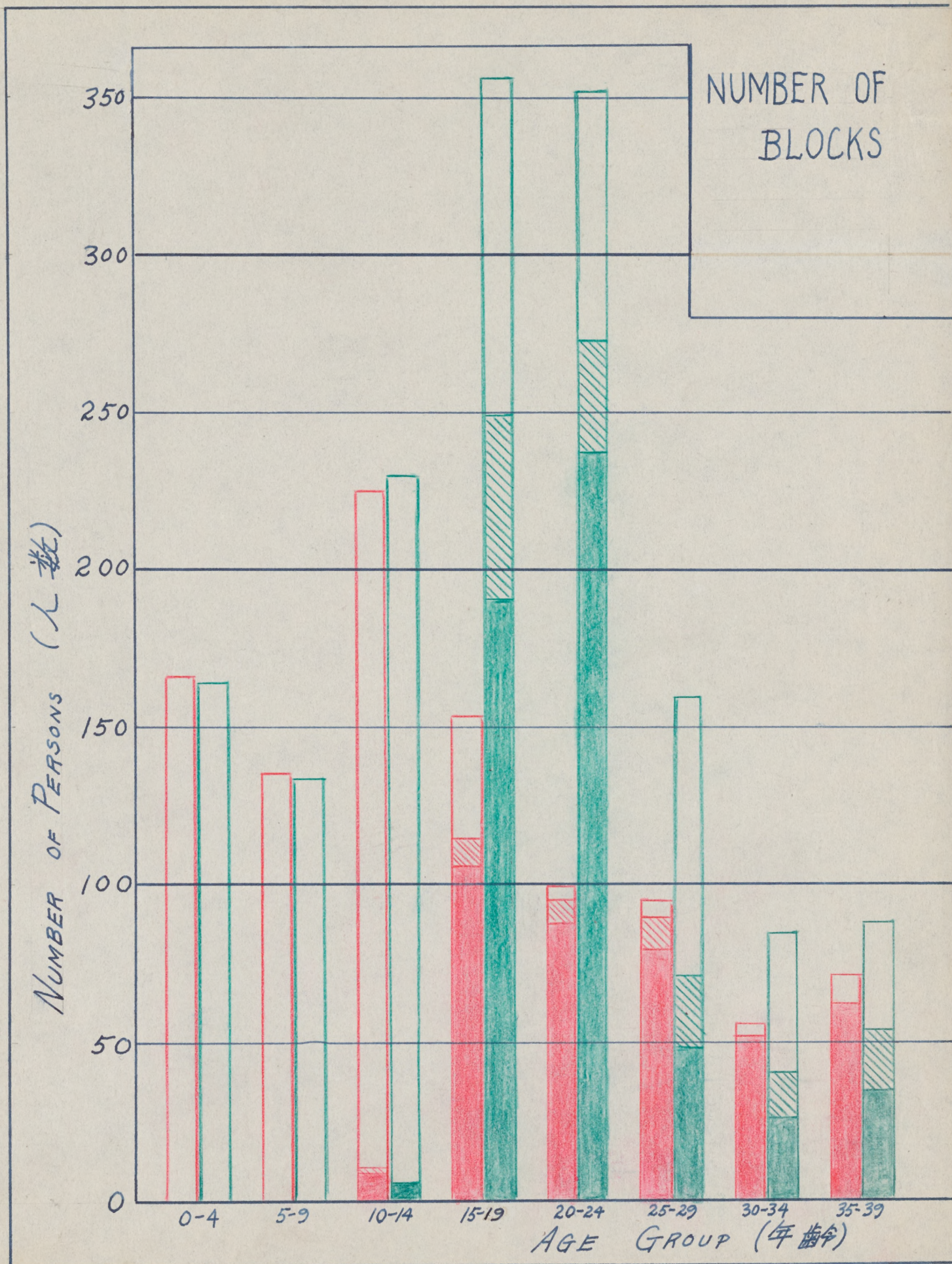

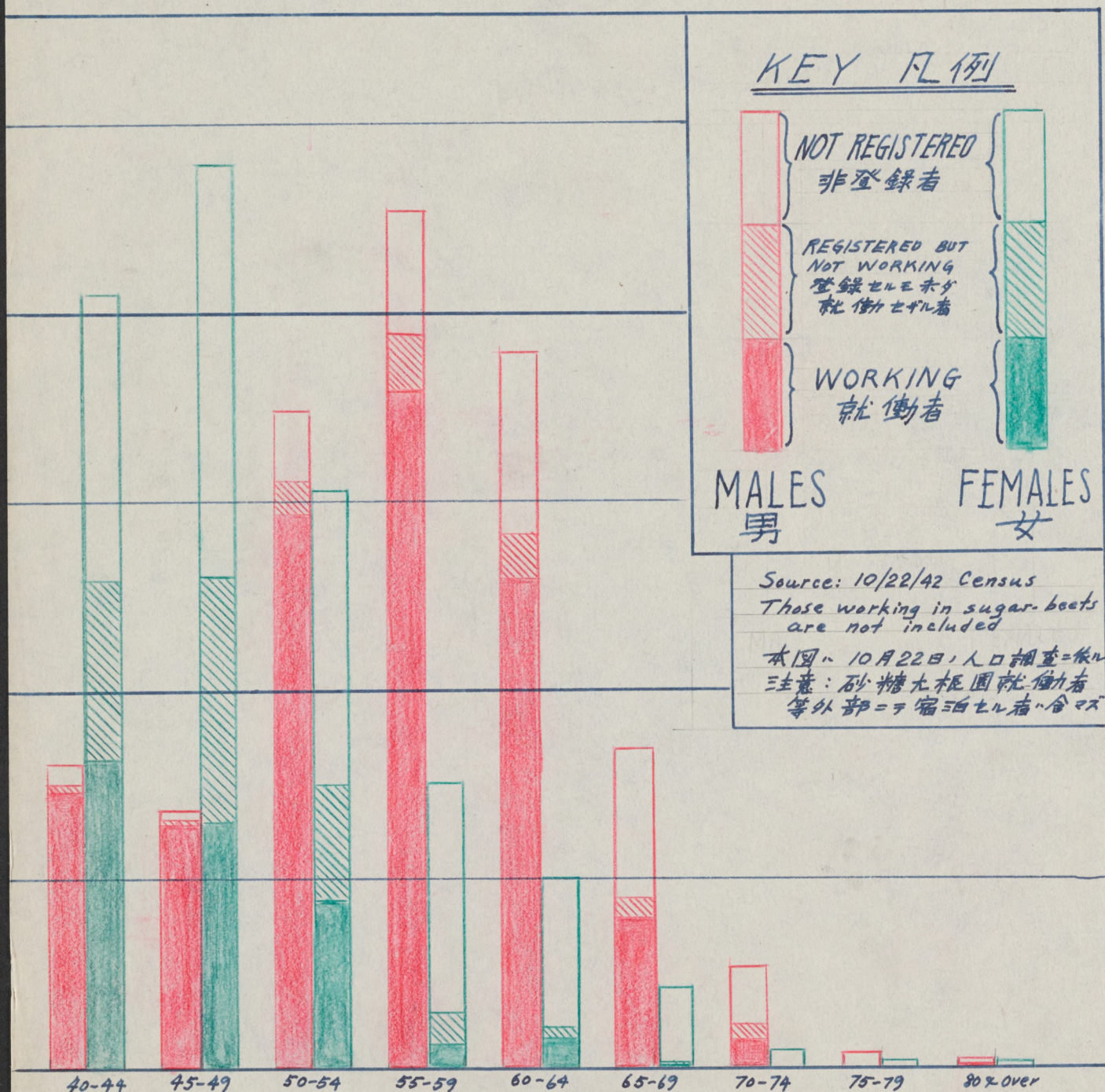

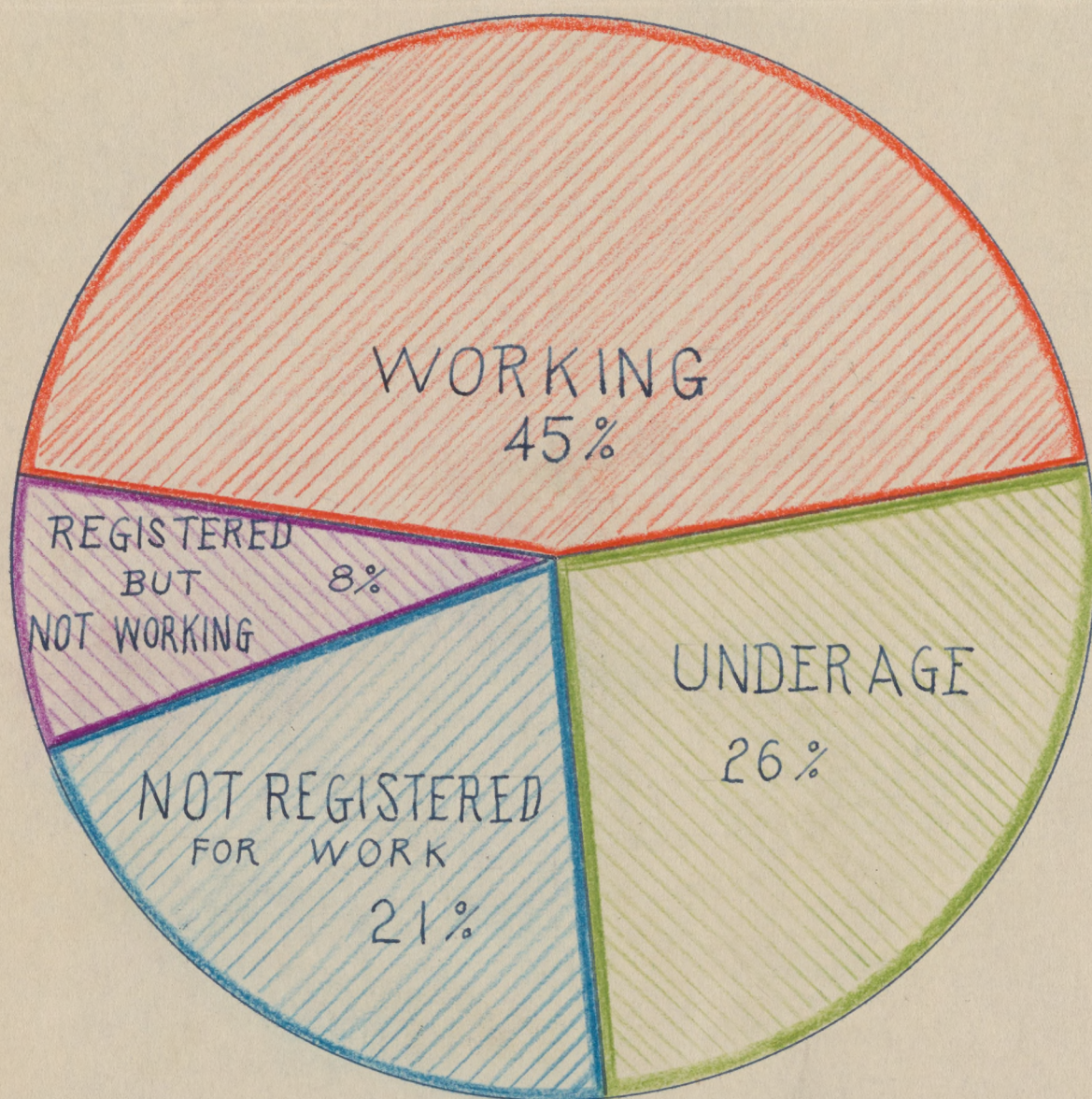

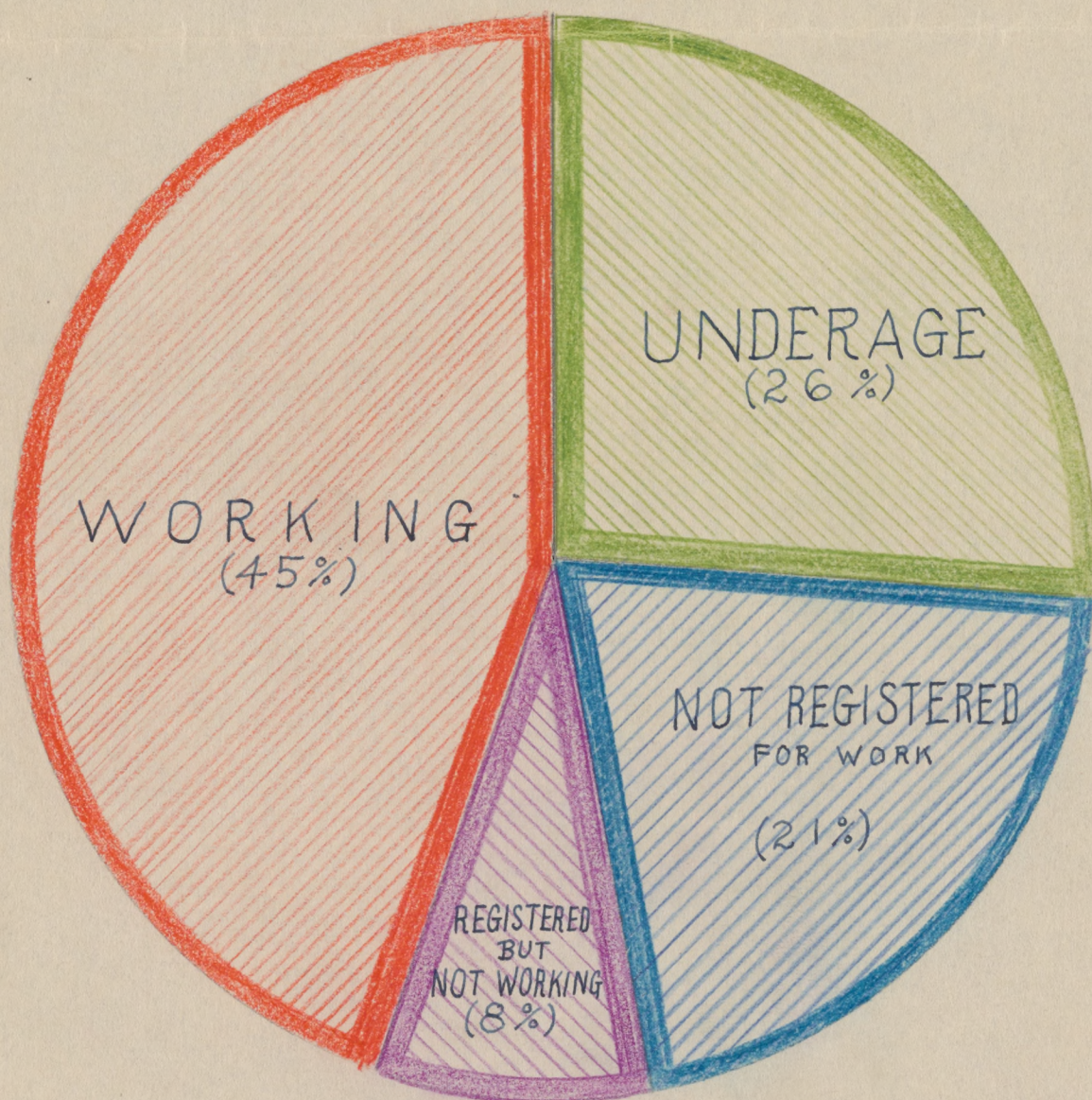

AS OF OCTOBER 22, 1942



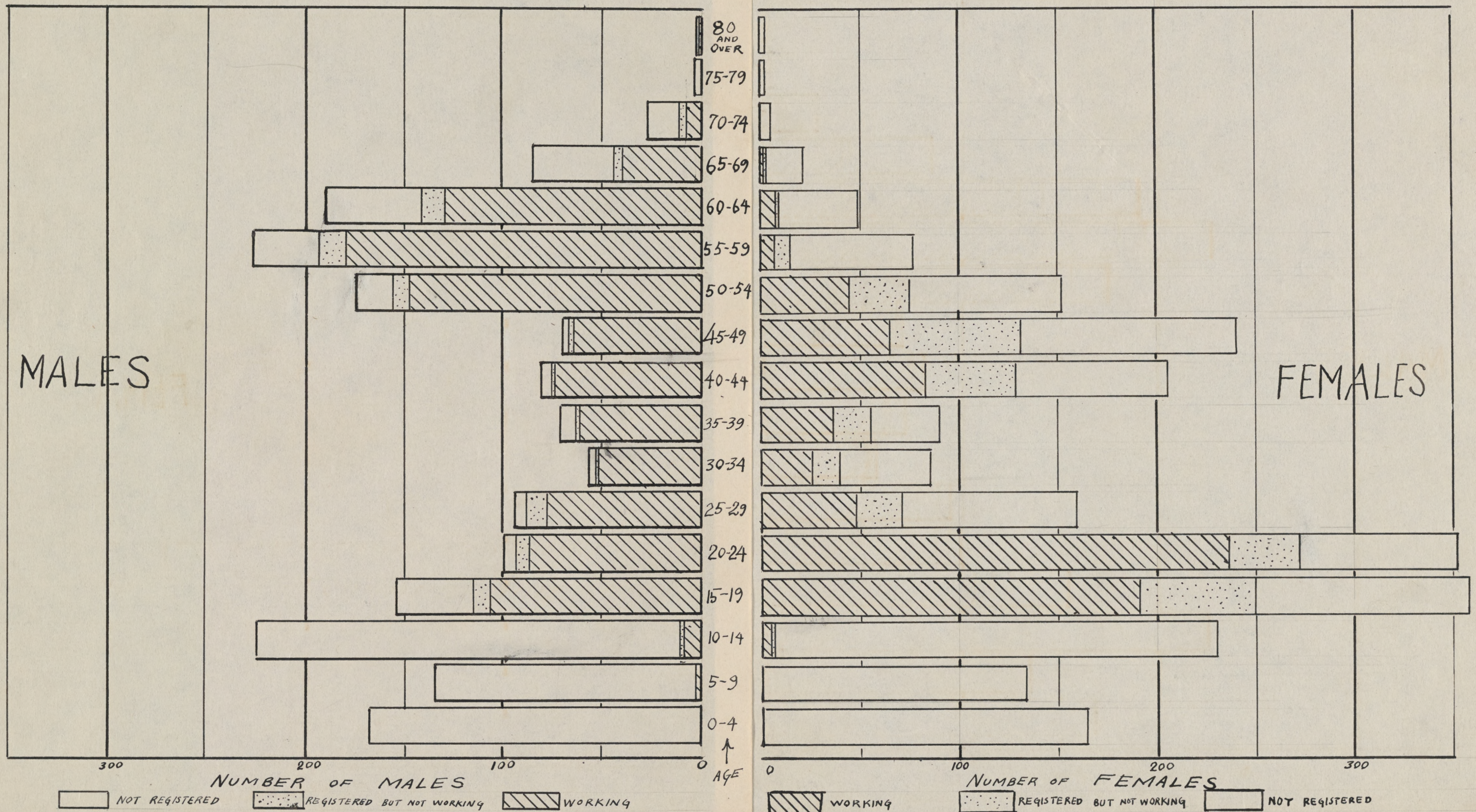

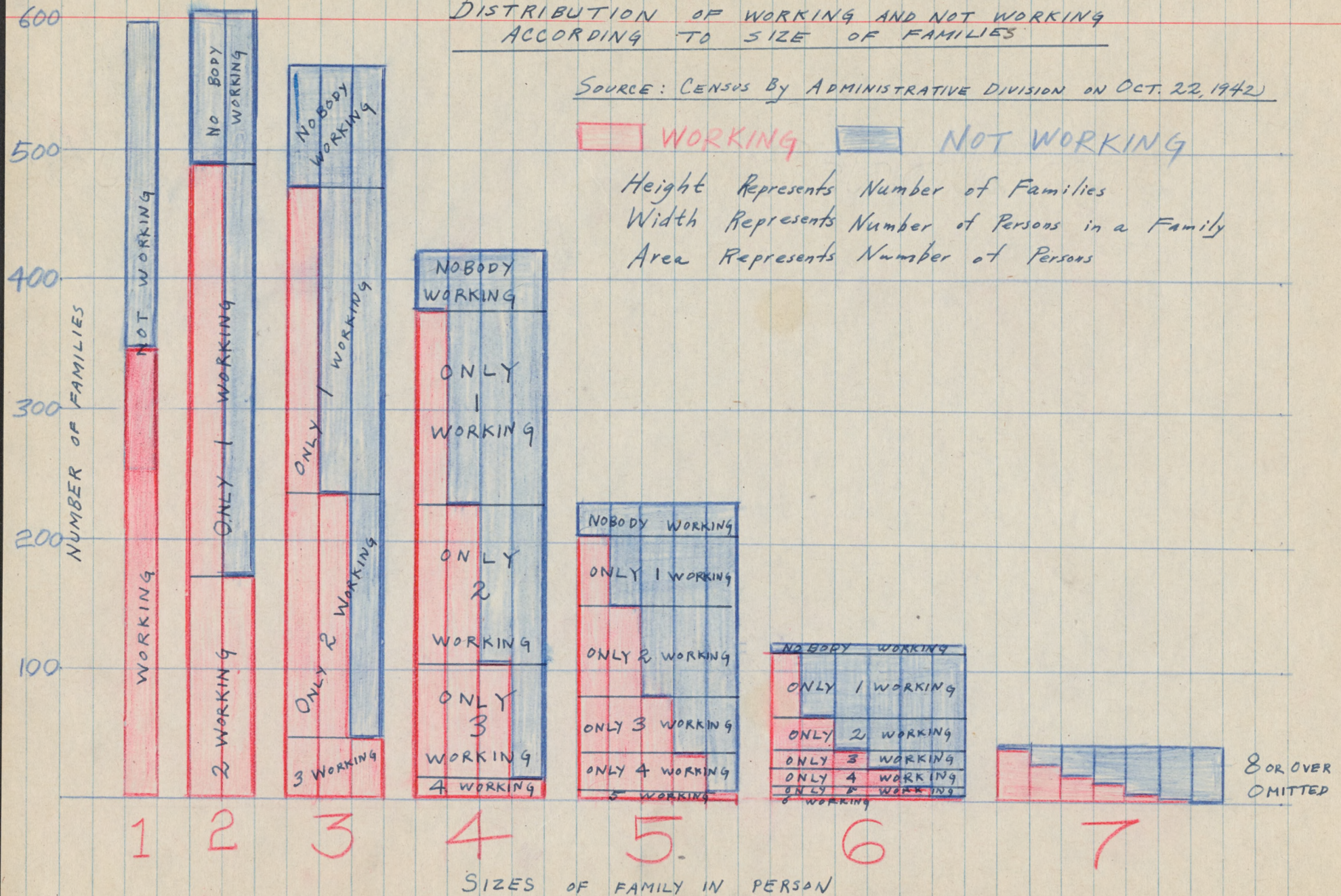


DISTRIBUTION OF WORKING AND NOT WORKING ACCORDING TO SIZE OF FAMILIES
