Arroyo Grande, California was Miss Dohi's home town before evacuation. She spent three months in Boston II until her departure in the middle of October 1942 for Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania. In describing the school, she said that in a student body of 800 there were ten Nisei attending. She graduated there this spring with three other Nisei who are successfully employed in engineering, telegraph office work, and government service. She was employed at the Swarthmore College office prior to her assignment with the Council.

Before her arrival here, she gave talks to enthusiastic youth groups of each quad in Rhower Relocation Center during the three weeks spent there.

Asked whether she encountered any prejudice,

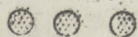
She came here because her friend who is teaching in Amache, Colorado, said that she enjoys the relocation center. Since she wanted to come to the southwest, Poston was her choice.

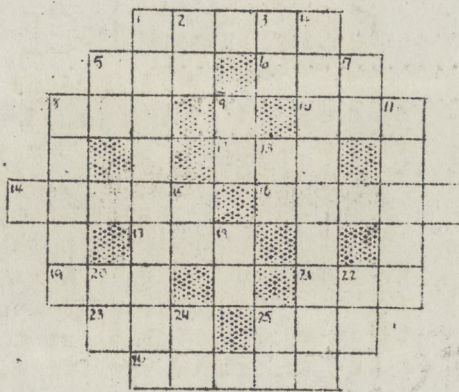

NAVY MEDIC VISITS SCHOOL

Dr. Alexander, a commissioned officer in the navy, spoke to the senior core classes on October 21, 1944.

His main topic was on the problem of Japanese Americans and their return to the Western Defense areas and relocation. He said that most of the people are not opinionated and don't care whether the Japanese Americans come back or not. In his speech Dr. Alexander said that some of the people even offered to take some Japanese students into their homes while they continue their education; others wished to let the Iséis come back and others offered the Japanese Americans a job.

Dr. Alexander stressed the point of higher education. He stated that the Japanese Americans will have plenty of competition in every field after the war. He believes that if the people relocate now, they will have a better opportunity in holding their jobs after the war.

Later in the evening these same boys were seen walking down the street. Sure they looked innocent, but wait....

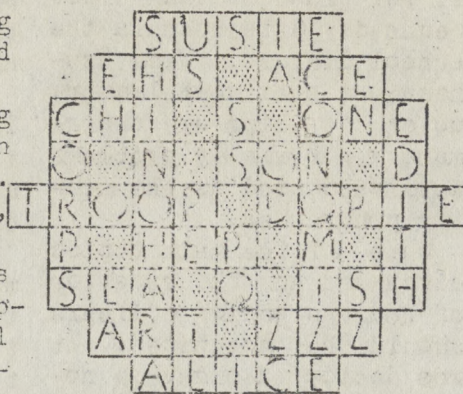
Next day our butcher was heard in a rage, "Who soaped my windows?!" Wait 'til I get my hands on the rascal that did it. I pity him".

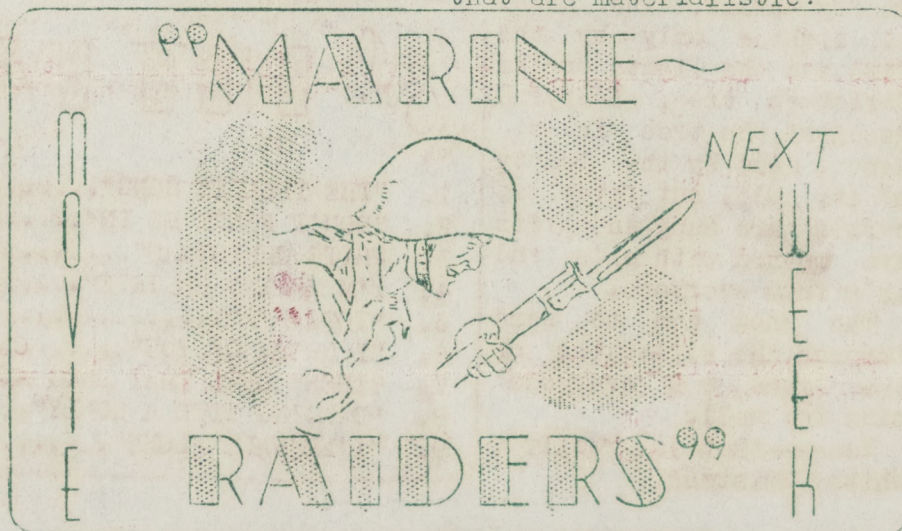

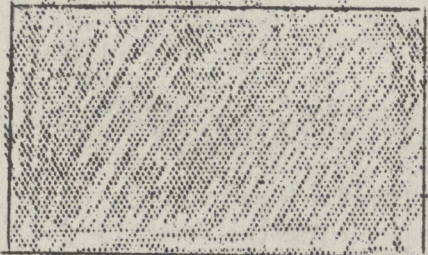
Parker Valley High School finished six rayon wall hangings. These had scenes of Poston painted with fabric paint.

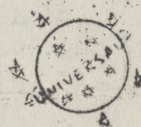

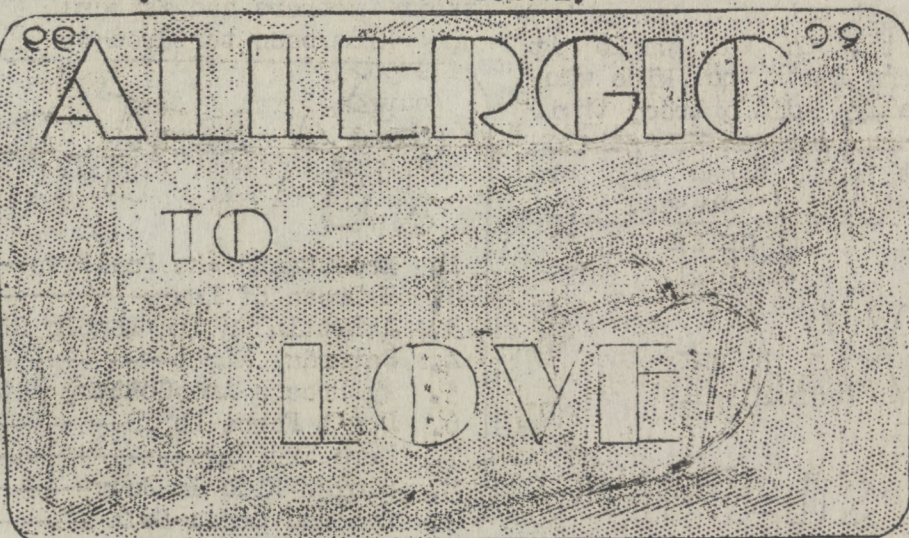
