Re: Memo II We are glad that you obtained this information from the Eastern office for it would have been difficult to obtain it from our end. Now as to the discrepancies:

A. Minnesota This university states that it has not accepted any students and our list indicates four.

1. Katsuo Kato, 11-3-D We do not have her official letter of acceptance yet, but she wrote to us on July 17 indicating that she had made the arrangements with the University of Minnesota.

2. Minoru Paul Nakada, 333 26th Street, said he had been accepted at the University of Minnesota. Since then he has also been accepted at the University of Wisconsin and he prefers the latter.

3. Richard Muno of M-21-4 Tulare Assembly Center indicates that he has been accepted at the University of Minnesota. However when we wrote him we found that he had only applied and did not have the official letter of acceptance.

4. Kenji Sameshima, M-20-5 Tulare Assembly Center, has not as yet sent us his official letter of acceptance from the University of Minnesota, but we have written to ~~report~~ *him*.

B. Wisconsin "Only two tentatives--your list says eleven." Thursday night we sent you copies of the material we are sending to Marks so that we can make the University of Wisconsin a test case as far as the approval of the Navy goes. Included in this material was a page for each of the eleven students who have been accepted at the University of Wisconsin tentatively.

1. Mary Ishimoto, District 7 Street 7 Barrack 21 Unit 2 Santa Anita Assembly Center--We have already written you in detail about her.

2. Inez Nagai, Fresno Assembly Center C 5-5--I have also written in detail about Inez.

3. Soichi Fukui, District 7 10th Street Barrack 18 Unit 1 Santa Anita Assembly Center

4. Kiyoshi Higuchi, District 5 Avenue K Barrack 29 Unit 5 Santa Anita Assembly Center

5. Yoshimaro Shibuya, Avenue 3 Barrack 23 Unit 19 Santa Anita Assembly Center

6. Henry Watanabe, B-2-98 Puyallup Assembly Center

7. George Suzuki, 3415-B Tulalake Relocation Center

8. Setsuo Ken Iwata, Ward C Street 1 Unit 2 Merced Assembly Center

9. Alice Ota, 144-2 Tanforan Assembly Center

10. *George Takahashi Fuku Kawa, 4817 - D, Tulalake*

11. *Minoru Paul Nakada*

The two that Wisconsin probably mentions are those for Mary Ishimoto and Inez Nagai. The rest are all like this: "My dear Mr. Fukui: Your records are here and if the federal government will give us a recommendation with regard to your transfer here, your scholastic record will warrant our receiving you as a student at the University of Wisconsin." So as soon as we can get this federal approval, this is a complete letter of acceptance. Wisconsin feels that it cannot issue a complete letter of acceptance if it is not going to be approved. - *Sima dictated 2 more students accepted.*

C. Nebraska "Approved applications of approximately fifty voluntary evacuees for admission--your list gives twenty-one." Today I know of twenty-five students who have been accepted at the University of Nebraska, and each day

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more material comes in on students. Some may still be trying to obtain the necessary documents and travel permits on their own, and the balance of some twenty-nine will probably be taken up when we start the matching process and when we assign the students to Nebraska. As to the designation of voluntary evacuees, theoretically all of them are leaving the assembly and relocation centers voluntarily. This is just a phrase that has been bandied about by governors, WCCA, and others.

D. Colorado We know of almost all of thirty-three of those Colorado mentions who will be coming from the assembly and relocation centers. I am completely surprised that they quote only forty-one for next fall for in their communications to us they have indicated that they would be willing to accept sixty and probably even more. They have been generously cooperative.---William Dyck going down to the city council himself and discussing at length with the members the government requirement of community acceptance and at last obtaining a blanket community acceptance for all students who are going to the University. He was so successful in this that we have also obtained a similar blanket community acceptance for all ^{new} students who want to be relocated in Boulder--up to seventy persons or twenty-five families. The requirements for them are a little stricter than those for the students, but this is the first community which has so whole-heartedly cooperated.

E. Ohio State University Sho Sato of Tulalake applied there, but she has been accepted at another university, has obtained her official letter of acceptance, and has decided that she would rather go there than to Ohio State. Edward John Fugiwara, now at Minidoka Relocation Center but until Thursday at D-1-139 Puyallup Assembly Center, was also accepted at Ohio State University. They wrote him and told him that they had to wait until they heard from the federal government, but we believe that they will be favorable as Wisconsin will be as soon as we hear that it has been approved by all the necessary agencies.

We have heard directly from you and indirectly that a list of colleges has been approved, that you submitted sixty-four, and that many of these were approved by both the Army and the Navy; however we have received no indication as to what colleges, aside from the twenty-five we already know of, have been approved, and we are getting as restless as the students in the centers are to know which colleges have been fortunate enough. Personally I hope and pray that the University of Colorado, the University of Nebraska, Washington University at St. Louis, and the University of Wisconsin are on this list. But I have been hoping that since May.

I am sorry if this letter sounds discouraging, but things are happening fast out here on the West Coast. O'Brien of Seattle, Odgers, of Portland, Harris of Los Angeles are all here conferring with us and getting this matching process under way and working strenuously. Robert Kelly has arrived to supervise the matching. Margaret Cosgrave, registrar of Fresno State College, has also arrived. We are just pulling in to our most strenuous period. Over 250 students have been accepted at 109 different colleges,

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and soon the matching process will begin in earnest, and perhaps many more hundred students will be accepted at colleges and we shall have to get all their documents together, get the college approved through Washington, D.C., get community acceptance, get the statement of their finances, and take their documents over to the WCCA in San Francisco and ask for travel permits for them. We now can say that five students have reached their destination. Three just arrived at Park College in Parkville, and probably were so excited that they did not have time to write us the news. We know that two more have obtained their travel permits--one for Texas and one for Denver. We have heard that five travel permits have been sent out to five others, and we hope that seven students whose documents we submitted a few days ago have by now received their permits, although this will be too much to hope for. One of these seven is Lillian Ota, who is going to Wellesley. Perhaps she will be able to get to Wellesley in time for the opening date, August 27. Today we are submitting the material on eight more students, who are going to such widely divergent places as Wyoming, Colorado, and big Texas. As soon as more colleges are approved we will start swamping the government offices with student records for we are already to go on some forty to sixty students as soon as this final OK comes through.

I hope this fully answers your two memos.
