POLICE DEPARTMENT TO ENFORCE TRAFFIC RULES;

"Poston 2 policemen will hereafter have authority to make arrests," stated Project Director W. Wade Head at the weekly meeting of the Unit 2 community council held yesterday morning. The statement was made by the Director during the course of his lengthy explanation on the law and order procedures for the community.

Another significant note of the meeting was the appropriation by the council of \$150 cash advance allotment to the Recreation Department. Jimmy Hirokawa, head of the Community Activities council for Unit 2, reported that the Rec. department actually required at least \$480 at the present time to get their program underway. However, in view of the fact that the Community was allotted only \$400 as cash advance by the Community Enterprise and as there were other departments, such as the social welfare, which also were in need of financial assistance, the council voted to allot \$150 to Hirokawa's department until further funds were available.

### TRAFFIC VIOLATORS

## WRA HEAD MEETS WITH UNIT 2 BLOCK MANAGERS

The block managers meeting of Poston 2 yesterday was highlighted by the appearance of Project Director W. Wade Head, who clarified many perplexing questions in the minds of the local residents.

Director Head stated that he favored an independent co-op movement in each unit to take over the Community Enterprises with the provision that the purchasing of all goods of the 3 units be centralized. The Project Director commended the fellows who have been managing the Com. Enterprise project, stating that the stores had given good service to the residents at reasonable prices and had established an enviable record for prompt payment of all accounts.

Mr. Head revealed that as a result of a WRA administrative order received recently that plans are now being executed as quickly as possible to issue scripts for clothing. It was stated that these coupons will be in addition to the regular wage scales. People unable to work will be provided with a direct allowance through the Community Services (Social Welfare) dept.

### Re-location Policy

Keeping in line with a basic WRA policy, Director Head stated that the Administration would assist Poston residents to relocate themselves as much as possible in States outside of the Western Defense Command.

Stressing the fact that absolute freedom of religion is being observed in Poston, Wade Head announced

that Caucasian ministers from the outside will be allowed to come here if the following compliances are met: 1. That such requests come directly from the minister's congregation; 2. the community council approves such requests; and 3, that the request meet with the approval of the Project Director.

### Educational Center

Director Head visualized Poston as being a great educational center for persons with initiative. As examples, he mentioned the opportunities awaiting those who may qualify

as warehousemen, cost accountants, property clerks and numerous other clerical jobs.

Other matters taken up by the managers included: announcements that T. Miura, 222, had been appointed as Blk. garden supervisor; the immediate need for 4 tractor drivers to assist in finishing the levelling of the blocks; that an official Poston 2 weather bureau will be established to record the maximum and minimum temperatures daily.

## NEW RECREATION SETUP SOUGHT AS THIRTY FIVE DEPARTMENT LEADERS REJECTS POWELL'S PROPOSALS

A new formula for Poston's recreation program is being sought following outright rejection of the proposal set forth by Dr. John Powell, Director of Poston Recreation and Adult Education, in regards to the re-organization of the recreation program on a Community Activities and Welfare basis was the result of the meeting of 35 acting recreation leaders of Units 1, 2, and 3 Thursday in the Blk. 45 Mess Hall of Poston 1.

Among the principal points of the new plan offered by Dr. Powell and which were rejected in its entirety were: (1) to reorganize the recreation dept. along a community-wide activities and welfare line with an over-all council as the authoritative body; (2) to eliminate competitive sports activities entirely or as much as is consistent with the fact that at present there are no available funds from the government; (3) to participate in activities whereby the expenditures will not be too great (such as folk dancing); and (4) that certain broad fields of activities, such as sports, drama, music, etc., consider a membership basis by which the respective units may support and finance itself.

The impracticability of these suggestions was reported to be the determining factor for the rejection.

## CONSTITUTION PLANNED FOR POSTON GOV'T.

### RESIDENTS TO RATIFY OR REJECT PROPOSAL

Postonians will either ratify or reject the form of permanent government for Poston in the next few months, disclosed Ted Haas, project attorney, in an address to the prospective teachers of Poston at a meeting held last Mon. night at Mess 14. This meeting was one of the series to be held each day, when some member of the project will address the teachers.

"In my opinion," stated Mr. Haas, "the next month and a half will be one of the most important periods in Poston's history. And Organization Committee will soon be appointed by the Project Director to draft a constitution for a permanent local government. This proposal will be presented to the residents of Poston for ratification or rejection. If it is approved, a permanent council will be elected for Poston with greater powers than the present council has."

He also stated that the relations of Poston 1, 2 and 3 councils will be greatly strengthened by "setting up" of the permanent government.

SCHOOL PROGRAM  
REVEALED BY  
ED. DIRECTOR

Dr. Miles Cary, Director of Education for Poston, told the staff members of the Agr. Dept., in a meeting held last Mon. at Mess 32, that the course in Agriculture at Poston will "not be forced or requested" upon the students, but the decision would rather be left up entirely to the pupils themselves.

"The probable system to be used, which is yet to be formulated in details, is the part time labor on the voluntary basis, while those interested in a thorough knowledge of farming basic training will be given along with the actual agriculture work, Dr. Cary asserted.

As to the high school program itself, Dr. Cary commented, "We are willing to accept criticisms in regards to educational project, but we must assure the residents that actual results of the system cannot be achieved after until some eight months. About three weeks after the students enroll we are going to give them standardized tests. Within a year another examination of the same nature will be held for the pupils. By this method we would be able to determine how successful our educational program has been conducted.

The secondary students are now prepared to attend the Poston High Schools, come Oct. 5.

Information regarding School and the Education Plans for Poston was given out by Dr. Miles E. Cary, Dir. of Ed., to parents and community leaders at the Ed. meeting held Wednesday, Sept. 30, in Mess 21.

Dr. Cary assured the people that the situation regards to teachers is hopeful, the teachers being well-qualified. He mentioned that from 30--40% of the teachers in Hawaii are of Japanese ancestry. He, himself, Dr. Cary said, was 21 years in Hawaii, being 17 years at McKinley High. One half of the local teachers-to-be are College grads; others are Jr Col. grads or above; and all have had a 8-weeks' intensive teachers training.

Rec Halls are to be used instead of the school buildings, as planned before. All Poston is to be the school campus. Classes are to be scattered all over, the whole school to utilize 30 buildings. Most of the classrooms are to have tables of graduated heights, and partitioned. "Outlook," Dr. Cary said, "is not too dark in regard to equipment, Poston's present equipment being about average of the U.S. There will be school supplies; all new books, blackboards; 7000 chairs have been ordered; 1400 are expected by Oct. 9."
