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XXII. STUDENT BODY CONSTITUTION

CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS  
OF HUNT HIGH SCHOOL

PREAMBLE

We, the Associated Students of the Hunt High School, in order to co-ordinate our efforts toward the betterment of our school, our community, and ourselves; to promote a spirit of unity and loyalty among the students; to instill in all the students the appreciation and the fundamental concepts of democracy; and to foster greater participation in American life; do hereby adopt this Constitution.

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization shall be known as the Associated Students of Hunt High School.

ARTICLE II

Purposes

The principal purposes of this organization shall be:

- Section 1. To provide experience in the privileges and responsibilities of a democracy in this school so that all students may develop a growing understanding of membership in a democracy.
- Section 2. To unify all student organizations under one general administration and to promote the general activities of the school.
- Section 3. To promote the welfare of the school and community by arousing a spirit of loyalty and co-operation among the students and faculty.
- Section 4. To inspire the students to work toward a greater America.

ARTICLE III

Membership

- Section 1. All regularly enrolled students of Hunt High School shall be voting members of this organization.
- Section 2. The Hunt High School faculty shall be eligible for non-voting membership in this organization.



ARTICLE IV  
The Governing and Advisory Board

- Section 1. The governing body shall be the student council composed of:  
The elective officers: president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer, historian, and publicity manager. These officers of the student body shall occupy the same offices in the student council.
- Section 2. One representative elected from each core class.
- Section 3. The principal of Hunt High School.
- Section 4. Faculty representatives who will act in the capacity of advisors.

ARTICLE V  
Qualifications

- Section 1. All officers must have a good scholastic standing and the approval of the faculty of Hunt High School.
- Section 2. Student council representatives must have good scholastic standing and the approval of their respective core teachers.
- Section 3. Faculty representatives shall be two appointed personnel and two colonists.

ARTICLE VI  
Election and Term of Council Members

- Section 1. A primary election shall be held two weeks before the general election to nominate four candidates for each elective office. The primary election shall be open to all candidates with petitions signed by 50 voting members of the student body, and said petitions must be filed with the student body secretary one week before the primary election. The four nominees receiving the highest number of votes cast by the student body in the primary election shall run in the general election. The candidates receiving the highest number of votes cast by the students in the general election shall be declared elected.
- Section 2. The general election shall take place before May 1st of each year. A special election, in case of a vacancy in any elective office, must be held to fill the unexpired term within two weeks after said vacancy occurs.
- Section 3. At the beginning of each school year, each core class shall elect by popular vote, one of its members as a representative to this council.



- Section 4. The council shall have the power to set the place and procedure of all general and special balloting (with exception of voting, which shall be by secret ballot.)
- Section 5. The inauguration of new officers shall take place at the last meeting of the Student Council of the current year.
- Section 6. In the event of a tie in any first election, a re-election shall be held. Should a second tie occur, the council shall determine the method of selecting the officer or officers.

#### ARTICLE VII Powers of the Student Council

- Section 1. To assist in and formulating legislating any rules necessary for the improvement of the school, its life, and interests, such as:
- A. Student Council
  - B. Social Activities
  - C. Assemblies
  - D. The preservation of school and community property.
- Section 2. To grant charters to clubs and organizations.
- Section 3. To investigate and report on matters especially referred to it by the student body or the faculty.
- Section 4. To assist in organizing and supervising all school activities.
- Section 5. The council may demand by a three-fourths vote the resignation of any council member who does not maintain the duties of his office.
- Section 6. The principal and the faculty representatives of Hunt High School have the power to veto. In cases other than W.R.A. and other administration policies, the student council by a quorum vote shall have the power to over-ride the veto.

#### ARTICLE VIII Recall

- Section 1. Any elective member of the council who does not maintain the duties of his office may be removed by a recall initiated by a three-fourths vote of the Student Body.

#### ARTICLE IX Meetings

- Section 1. The Student Body shall meet regularly.
- Section 2. The Student Council shall meet on the first and third Tuesdays of each month of the school year.



ARTICLE X

Quorum

- Section 1. A quorum for conducting a business meeting of the Student Council must consist of two-thirds of the voting members of the council.

ARTICLE XI

Clubs and Organizations

- Section 1. All new clubs and organizations before becoming active must have their constitutions and by-laws approved by the Student Council. All changes made thereafter also must be approved by the council.
- Section 2. At least one month before the end of the school year, all clubs and organizations must present to the council for approval their reasons for existence. In the event that any club or organization is disapproved by the council, it shall be automatically disbanded.
- Section 3. All clubs and organizations are entitled to have one non-voting representative to the student council.

ARTICLE XII

Amendments to the Constitution

- Section 1. Amendments to the constitution may be proposed by one of two methods. First, by a petition signed by 150 students with the approval by a quorum vote of the student council; and second, by a proposal of the council itself, with the approval of a three-fourths vote cast by the student body.
- Section 2. Amendments proposed in either way must be ratified by a three-fourths vote of the student body. The amendment shall become effective one week after ratification.
- Section 3. To amend an amendment, the same procedure must be followed as in introducing a new amendment.

BY-LAW

ARTICLE I

Duties of the President

- Section 1. The president shall preside at all meetings of the student council and the student body; he shall have the power to call special meetings of these two organizations mentioned above; and he shall perform all duties pertaining to student body affairs.
- Section 2. The student body president may not hold the office of president in any other club or organization; neither



may any other student hold the office of president in more than one club or organization. The only exception will be the president of a core class who may hold the office of president in a club.

Section 3. The president shall be an ex-officio member of all student body committees.

#### ARTICLE II

##### Duties of the Vice-President

Section 1. The vice-president shall act as president in the absence or resignation of the president until a successor for that office is elected.

Section 2. The vice-president shall have charge of all clubs and organizations of Hunt High School and will aid them with their activities.

#### ARTICLE III

##### Duties of the Secretary

Section 1. The secretary shall take minutes of student council and student body business meetings; he shall take care of all correspondence; he shall perform all other duties, such as roll call at the student council meetings; he shall record all paid bills of the student body. He shall turn over all minutes, records, and correspondence to his successor.

#### ARTICLE IV

##### Duties of the Treasurer

Section 1. The treasurer shall receive, deposit, and disperse all money of the student body and make a record of the same.

Section 2. The treasurer shall check the treasurers' books of all the other clubs and organizations at the end of every month.

Section 3. The treasurer shall not pay bills of the student body without the approval of the student council, with the exception of routine bills.

Section 4. The treasurer shall perform his duties under the supervision of a commercial teacher.

#### ARTICLE V

##### Duties of the Historian

Section 1. The historian shall save all clippings, pictures, etc. concerning the activities of Hunt High School and properly arrange the same in a book. He shall record the names of those students participating in student activities. He shall also include in the book a copy of the school calendar of activities.



ARTICLE VI  
Duties of the Publicity Manager

- Section 1. The publicity manager shall publicize and advertise all student body affairs by preparing sufficient posters concerning these affairs, by submitting write-ups to the school and community papers, and by making announcements of such affairs.
- Section 2. The publicity manager shall see that the material on the high school bulletin board is arranged neatly and that old articles, posters, etc., are removed.

ARTICLE VII  
Duties of the Core Class Representatives

- Section 1. The representative must be present at all student council meetings except in case of illness or emergency. In the event that he is unable to attend, a standing substitute should take his place.
- Section 2. The representative must at all times represent the interest of the majority of his core class. After each student council meeting the representative must give a complete report of the proceedings to his core class.

ARTICLE VIII  
Duties of the Faculty Representatives

- Section 1. The faculty representatives acting as advisors to the student council shall represent the views of the majority of the faculty.
- Section 2. At the faculty meetings the faculty representatives shall make a report of the proceedings in the student council.
- Section 3. Faculty representatives must be present at all student council meetings except in case of illness or emergency.

ARTICLE IX  
Duties of the Club and Organization Representatives

- Section 1. The representatives of clubs or organizations who are non-voting members shall represent the interests of the clubs or organizations they are representing.
- Section 2. These representatives shall have the floor only in cases where their particular club or organization is concerned.
- Section 3. It is also their duty to present to the student council the reason for the existence of their clubs as mentioned in Article XI, Section 2.

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# First Council Meeting - Mr. Light Greeting

The first meeting of the Hunt A.S.B. was called to order by our president, Calvin Ninomiya, in room 7-C-D at 3:15 P.M.

Mr. Light opened the meeting, by giving a welcome speech, and introduced our advisors, Mrs. Pollock and Mr. Erhlandson.

The Social Hall has been closed from misuse. Soon, the cold weather will set in, and the students with free periods will have no where to go. The hall will be for use, only if the students conduct themselves in an orderly manner. This won't be such a problem, after the pingpong tables and shuffle boards have been installed.

When questioned how to improve the Social Hall, Johnny Kanno stated, "Well, it's not exactly cozy in there. . . . it's more like a warehouse."

Some suggestions, were to add pictures and large, comfortable chairs.

The holes in the ceiling, mar the appearance of the newly re-walled (plaster-board) Social Hall, and the students were asked to exercise special care in keeping the hall attractive.

The Rest Rooms are also being misused, and the pupils were warned not to mark the walls, or mar them in any way.

In order to make money for the A.S.B. Treasury, it was suggested to sponsor movies. The rent for the camera could be taken from the proceeds.

It was decided to have a "Back to School Dance", on Labor Day, Night, stag affair.

Dutch Watanabe and Catherine Matsuda are to act as co-chairmen. The meeting was adjourned at 4:15 P.M.



September 13, 1943

Second Meeting = Game Drive - Welcoming Comm.

Calvin Ninomiya called the meeting to order in 6 E-F at 11:15 A.M.

The minutes were read and approved.

Dutch gave a report on the dance. We made        on the dance, and we now have        in the treasury.

The Social Hall will be opened as a lunch room soon, but during the periods, other than 4th and 5th, it will be available for the students, if it is not misused again.

In order to keep some of them occupied, ping-pong tables, shuffle boards and games will be supplied. Hitoshi Kanzaki and Haruko Kumasaka are co-chairmen of a drive to collect games which are not needed.

The teachers in the Science Rooms have complained about the students disturbing the classes. These students were asked to go elsewhere during their free periods.

Frank Muramatsu suggested that we organize a Welcoming Committee for the Tuls "ake people, with the Seniors as the nucleus.

It was decided to have it a school affair, rather than a block project. As host and hostess is to be chosen from each core class, to help the Tuleans when they need it. The names of the host and hostesses were to be submitted in the office.

The meeting was adjourned at 12:00 noon.



September 23, 1943

### Third Meeting = Bond Drive

The meeting was called to order at 3:15 P.M. in room 7 C-D. by our president.

The minutes were read and approved.

Haruko Kumasaka gave a report on the Social Hall. She asked the representatives to get their teachers' and classes' opinions on having a drive to collect unused games. If it is approved, the drive will start right after the Harvest Vacation.

"Sugar" (Frank Kuramatsu) gave a report on the Welcoming Committee. The hand books and tags for the hosts and hostesses will be ready by next week. There isn't really very much to do until after Harvest Vacation. There will be a host and hostesses meeting next week.

The Bond Drive will start Monday, Sept. 27, and the representatives were asked to urge their respective core-classes to buy.

There will be different groups coming around to each core-class Monday, to sell the stamps. These groups will make the rounds each day for one week.

Mr. Erthandson will get some stamps for us. \$20.00 worth of \$.25 stamps and \$30.00 worth of 10¢ stamps.

The library is a place for study; therefore, the students cannot enter between periods. After the Social Hall has been opened this problem will be solved.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 P.M.



November , 1943

Fourth Meeting = U.S.O.

Calvin Ninomiya called the meeting to order at 4:15 P.M. in room 6 C-D.

This purpose of this meeting, was to sell U.S.O. tags. The tags may be purchased for any amount. The drive starts on Thursday, and will be carried until Friday afternoon.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:00 P.M.



December 10, 1943

Fifth Meeting = Recognition of club constitutions.

The president called the meeting to order at 3:10 P.M. in room 6 A-B on Dec. 10, 1943.

The representatives of each club were represented; they read the preamble of each constitution, and gave the purpose of their respective clubs.

They were represented as follows.

1. Shuzo Kato-Senior Class.
2. Kiyo Ueda - Senior Girls' Activity Club.
3. Romanzo (Jim Morita) Wolverines.

The boys and Girls' Club Constitutions are to be reconized at a later date.

Unclaimed annuals may be claimed at the Journalism office in 6 E.

Bunzo Nakagawa was chosen as the general chairman of the all-school carnival. It is to be held about the 3rd week in January.

Mr. Barber suggested that we outline a set of rules about the students' conduct on the school grounds. Also, posters to carry out the campaign.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:10 P.M.



December 29, 1943

#### Sixth Meeting - Social Hall Problem

The president called the meeting to order, at 2:10 P.M. in room 7 E-F.

The minutes were read and approved.

The Boys' and Girls' Club constitutions were accepted.

Kenny Numba - Boys' Club.

Eunice Torii - Girls Club.

Petitions for extra - curricular activities were handed out to the representatives.

Social Hall conditions should be improved or else it will be closed. Mr. Barber suggested that a representative of a Boys' or Girls' Club, keep watch, and maybe take shifts doing so.

The representatives were asked to ask their respective core-classes for games to be used in the social hall.

The matter of school spirit and cooperation was brought up. There was quite a discussion about the part of sports and the work program in our school activities.

There was an argument of the importance of inter-scholastic sports in Hunt High.

Our school carnival is to be held sometime during the third week in January.

Mr. Barber brought up the matter of smoking, but this problem is unsolved, as yet.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:15 P.M.



January 31, 1944

Seventh Meeting - Movies, Carnival report, Hon. Soc.

Our president, Calvin Ninomiya, called the meeting to order at 2:25 P.M. in room 7 C-D.

The minutes were read and approved. Calvin gave a report on the Carnival. Approximately \$1,400.00

A vote was taken to see if the A.S.B. should sponsor movies. The members voted unanimously that we should sponsor them. The projector may be borrowed only on Sundays. "China", "Birth of the Blues", "Ghost Breakers" and "Hold Back the Dawn" are some of the movies obtainable.

Toshie Heyamoto, Hohn Matsushima and Eileen Nakamura were asked to bring up this subject to their classes and give a report on their reactions.

Snig Sakamoto gave a report on all extra-curricular clubs. All clubs are to be divided into two groups. These two groups will be 44 meet on different weeks during different periods.

It has been decided that Hunt High School will have an Honor Society. Those chosen to be on the committee are:

Richard Cutowsky, Eugene Uyeki, Peggy Miyake, Amy Mitamura, Tetsuo Arase, Renso Enkoji and Kiyo Ueda.

Meeting was adjourned at 3:15 P.M.



Feb. , 1944

Eighth Meeting =

Our president called the meeting to order, at 3:15 P.M. in room 4 E-F on Feb. , 1944.

The minutes were corrected and approved.

Peggy Miyake gave a report on the Honor Society. To be a member of the Honor Society, you must have an average of 3.6 or above. A vote was taken, to see if we should accept the standard. It was unanimously accepted.

John Matsushima gave a report on the movies. It was decided that it would do more harm than good, because, 1) it might compete with Blocks 8 and 34, which will not be so favorable. However, the Coop has O.K'd the plan, and the committee, on movies, was requested to look further into the matter.

The gymnasium construction problem has been explained - the workers have objected to continue on the construction, since the weather is too cold.

Smoking on the school grounds have been opposed, 100 percent. Some of the reports are as follows.

Ikuko: 75 percent opposed

? : 100 percent opposed

? : 100 percent opposed

Aiko suggested a demerit system, but it was opposed, since it needed a complete new merit system, and Hunt does not have a merit system to start with.

John Matsushima gave a report on a special organization. "The Angels", in his former school. Only smokers were allowed to become members, and their duty was to stop others,



that they saw, smoking on the school grounds.

It is very doubtful if an organization of this sort will work in Hunt.

Mr. Barber wants definite action to be taken on this subject.

The library is not being used as it should be. The representatives were asked to bring back the opinions of their classes.

There have been too many absences, and the students were warned upon this matter, since it will count greatly on their report cards.

So far, 578 annuals have been sold. They will continue to be on sale, until the 1,000 quota has been reached.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:15 P.M.



March 1, 1944

Ninth Meeting = Library, Social Hall

Calvin Ninomiya called the meeting to order at 10:20 A.M., in room 6 C-D on March 1, 1944.

The minutes were read and approved.

The Social Hall will soon be opened for the students' use, with Jimmy Ikutsu as its recreational director.

Some suggestions were taken as how to improve the Social Hall.

Lane: Nicholodian, keeping the fire going at all times, and having a Wolverine in there, to keep watch.

Romanzo objects: Wolverines are only a small percentage of Hunt High; therefore it is everyone's duty to keep the Social Hall in order.

Mr. Light stated that the Social Hall wasn't being used, and everyone was jamming the library. The library is being made unusable for those who really need the library books. Also, it should not be used as a Study Hall . . . the empty rooms are supposed to be used for that. Also, many students cross each other's names off, just to get in the library. The continuous coming in and going out will be prohibited.

We're lucky to have librarians such as Ruble and Hyerdahl, and we should do our utmost to make it easier for them.

Quiet games, ping-pong, and checker-boards were some of the suggestions of games for our Social Hall.



Mr. Light announced that we will have three new teachers on the Hunt High faculty. They are: Mrs. Frost, Miss Mullins and Miss Gilmore.

Hunt High was supposed to have been run on a 6 hour schedule but it was impossible, especially with so many students working part time.

Mr. Light stated that 200 chairs have been ordered for the Social Hall.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:10 A.M.



March 8. 1944

Tenth Meeting =

Our president called the meeting to order in room 6 C-D at 10:20 A.M., March 8.

The minutes were read and approved.

"No Smoking" on the school grounds, is to be enforced.

There has been too much skipping lately.

A vote was taken, to see if we should enforce this problem.

Since the vote was unanimous, the members were asked for suggestions as to the method of enforcement. There were two suggestions, that raised some comments.

1). Lowering of grades and 2). manual work.

Romanzo: Doesn't approve of lowering of grades.

If a person keeps up with his work, he deserves a high grade.

Light: Even though a student that's poor scholastically, he may get a high grade if he tries his hardest and gets the most out of his subject.

Pollock: Nine times out of ten, the student that skips a lot finds his grades have dropped.

Some suggested that if a person skips too much, he should be expelled. This was voted down, however.

The meeting was adjourned at 11:10 A.M.



March 9, 1944

Eleventh Meeting =

Meeting was called to order by Vice-president Shig Sakamoto at 8:40 A.M.

The main purpose of this meeting was to draw up resolutions for smoking, library use and rest-room use. Shig appointed a committee to draw up resolutions. Jimmy Tazuma, Kats Okamoto and Lucy were appointed.

Jim Morita made a motion that the student body drop this plan of holding a dance at the school shop building, as the Boys' Club are planning this dance.

The plan to have school movies was dropped as the C.A. may take away our tickets.

The Seniors requested that the activity period schedule to be changed.

The question of changing the vocational program to an athletic program was stressed. Mr. Light said the students may try to push this program on.

The question of tardiness and absences was brought up. The complaint was the bell rang off schedule. Ikuko suggested a convoy to bring students from the far ends.

The Social Hall will be opened as soon as the Boys' and Girls' Club are ready.

The 3 resolutions were given by Jim Tazuma and was passed unanimously by the council.

The meeting was adjourned at 9: 35 A.M.

Lucy: Said people who are tardy must have admit slips to enter class tardy. Seeing friends off, is unexcused unless you have an excuse explaining, before hand.

Jimmy T: Recommendation by teachers. A teacher may give a student a chance to make up their grades if they deserve it.

Martha: May have excused absenses.

Roland: Teacher starts class before the last bell.

- 1 - Jimmy's proposal
- 2 - Compromise demerits and cutting grades.
- 3 - Demerits
- 4 - Grades clashed

A motion was made and seconded that we adopt Jimmy's proposal as a resolution. Calvin appointed Jimmy, Toshie, Shig and



Calvin Machida to be on a committee and make it into the form of a resolution.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:00 P.M.

March 15, 1944

Thirteenth Meeting -

Our vice-president, Shig Sakamoto called the meeting to order at 9:20 A.M.

Jimmy Tazuma read the resolution, concerning skipping.

It stated that each you may be excused only if: 1). You have been unavoidably detained, and have a written excuse. Otherwise, there will be a 1/3 cut of the semester grade.

It was suggested that each core class O.K. the resolution.

Mr. Barber suggested that we put the resolution into immediate effect, but it was unanimously passed that it shall go into effect next semester. Since there was a misunderstanding about the vote, a vote was taken for reconsideration of the previous vote. Resolution was passed as going into effect next quarter.

Dutch stated that the Senior Class wants the permission to sponsor May Day. The Council passed Dutch's request.

It was brought up that the students cannot over rule the faculty.

Barber: Doesn't think inter-scholastic sports important.

A motion was made to appoint a committee to see more about interscholastic sports and to form a resolution concerning it.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 A.M.



March 24, 1944

Fourteenth Meeting =

Calvin called the meeting to order at 2:30 P.M. in room 7 E-F on March 24.

The minutes were read and approved.

We discussed the resolution on skipping again.

A motion was moved and seconded that the resolution be sent back to the committee to form a compromise, after which, it will again be submitted to the faculty for their approval.

Since there was nothing more to be discussed the meeting was adjourned at 3:25 P.M.



March 29, 1944

Fifteenth Meeting -

Calvin called the meeting to order at 2:30 P.M. in room 7 E-F. on March 29.

The minutes were read and approved.

Jimmy Tazuma read the compromise on the resolution concerning unexcused absences. The suggested change was:

One unexcused absence does not affect the grade any, but the second unexcused absence will result in a 1/6 cut in the semester grade.

The differences concerning unexcused absences and cuts were clarified.

1). The unexcused absence isn't acceptable according to the standards.

2). The Cuts constitute the cutting of one class and attending the rest of the classes, or attending morning classes and cutting afternoon classes.

Mr. Barber recommended us to adopt the faculty's suggestion, of deducting 1 point per cut. Ex. (A+ = A = A- etc.)

Also, the clause of making up work on an excused absence be stricken from the resolution.

It was moved and seconded to send the resolution back to the faculty for their approval.

Pertaining to the extra-curricular clubs, It was moved and seconded to revert back to the old schedule, of two club-groups meeting alternately.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:25 P.M.



April 5, 1944

Sixteenth Meeting =

Meeting was called to order by our president at 9:20 in 6 C-D.

Minutes were read and approved.

Mr. Barber gave a report on the faculty meeting, concerning the resolution on absenteeism and tardiness.

There was a discussion on the varsity sports program. Romanzo, Mr. Barber, Mrs. Polleck, and Mats expressed their opinions, pro and con.

It was moved and seconded that we have a committee form a resolution concerning intra-mural sports.

The King and Queen contest is to be held on "May Day", April 28. It is to be an all day affair. The purpose of this combined carnival is to raise more funds for our annual. The Chairman are Peggy Miyaki and Eugene Uyeki.

Shig read the constitution of the Soph. Class. The Soph. Class was accepted as an active organization of the A.S.H.

Bunzo read the constitution of the Science Club and it was accepted.

Eugene Uyeki read the constitution of the Debate Club and it also was accepted.

Mrs. Pollock brought to our attention that only 70 members showed up at the Club meetings last week.

It was moved and seconded that the Science Club be moved to group one. The Spanish Club was moved into group two.



It was suggested that an Engineers Club be organized.

Lucy read the constitution on extra-mural sports. Then it was to be sent back to the faculty for their approval.

Calvin asked the opinion of some students concerning forming Junior Club. The majority agreed that it would be wise.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:15 A.M.



April 6, 1944

Seventeenth Meeting =

Our president, Calvin Ninomiya, called the meeting to order in room 7 E-F, 6th period, April 6.

The minutes were read and approved.

Romanzo read the resolution concerning intra-mural sports.

The Executive Committee submits the following, By Laws and Constitution for the Hunt High School Agriculture Club:

## Article I

Name and purpose of the organization.

### Section A

The Name of this organization shall be the Agriculture Club of the Hunt High School Hunt, Idaho.

### Section B

The Purpose for which this organization is formed are as follows:

1. To develop competent, aggressive, rural and Agriculture leadership.
2. To strengthen the confidence of the member in themselves and their work.
3. To create more interest in the intelligent choice of vocations.
4. To create and nurture a love for country life.
5. To improve the rural home and its surroundings.
6. To encourage co-operative effort among students of Vocational education.
7. To promote thrift among students.
8. To promote and improve scholarship
9. To encourage organized recreational activities among students of Vocational Agriculture.



10. To advance the cause of vocational education in the public schools in the United States and its possessions.

#### Section C

The members of the local club shall meet organize and adopt a constitution that will not conflict in any way with the constitution of the High School, and W.R.A. policies.

#### Article

#### Article II

##### Membership

#### Section A

The membership in this organization shall be composed of student who are properly enrolled in Vocational Agriculture Class in the Hunt High School.

#### Section B

New membership into the organization shall require 2/3 majority vote of members of any regular meeting of the club.

#### Article III

##### Officers

#### Section A

The officers of the club shall consist of a President, Vice-President, Secretary-Treasure, Corresponding Secretary, Reporter, Custodian and Advisors. The officers shall perform the usual duties of their respective offices.



## Article IV

### Duties of officers

#### Section A

The duties of the president shall be:

1. Preside over all the regular meetings.
2. Call all meetings of the club.
3. Call all officers, and
4. Appoint, and be an ex-official member of all special committees.
5. Organize the club's affairs so that every officer and member will have something to do.
6. Get acquainted with and be familiar with the constitution and by laws.
7. Be familiar with Roberts Rule of Order and parliamentary procedure.
8. See that the annual program of work is functioning.
9. Plan far enough ahead so that no one will be embarrassed by an eleventh hour request.
10. Check other officers to see that they are doing their job.
11. Divide the responsibility of your position with the vice-president. Be sure he has definite responsibilities.
12. Make a check on each committee chairman and make sure that the committee is doing its share of the work.
13. Make sure that the annual program is built to fit local conditions.



14. Be familiar with rules and regulations governing the school, clubs and other similar organizations.

#### Section B

The duties of Vice President shall be as follows:

1. Discharge any duties delegated to you by the president.
2. Supervise the organization and functions of at least two of the major committees.
3. Plan and take charge of initiations of new members.
4. Take charge of some of the meetings even though the president is present.
5. Help the other officers perform their duties.

#### Section C

The duties of the Secretary-Treasure shall be as follows:

1. Keep an accurate, neat set of minutes of each meeting.
2. Read such minutes and receive approval from members at regular meetings.
3. Keep a record of moneys and receipt of all reimbursements concerning members and club.
4. Read the financial status of the club at regular meetings.
5. Help all other officers perform their duties.



#### Section D

The duties of corresponding secretary shall be as follows:

1. Correspond and keep a record of the local club.
2. Be present at all meetings.
3. Aid the Secretary and other officers of the club.

#### Section E

The duties of Custodian shall be as follows:

#### Section G

The duties of Reporter shall be as follows:

2. Make new report of happenings of meeting of interest.
3. See that Articles are placed in "Irrigator" & "Hi-lite".

#### Article V

#### Executive Committee



### Section A

The executive committee shall consist of the officers of the club. This committee shall perform the usual duties of an executive committee, review and approve receipts and disbursements, act as a nominating committee and be responsible for the welfare of the organization.

### Section B

The executive committee shall nominate two (2) candidates for the various offices. Other nominations shall be made, if desired, from the floor at a regular meeting of the club.

### Section C

Candidates not elected to the President's position shall automatically be candidates for the office of Vice-president, Secretary-Treasure, Corresponding-secretary, Reporter and Custodian.

## Article VI

### Meetings

#### Section A

The local club shall hold their meetings monthly or more often and at such time and place as may be decided upon by mutual consent of the Executive Committee of the local club.

## Article VII

### Dues

#### Section A.

The dues of the club shall be fixed by a majority vote of the membership of the club.



Article VIII

Regulations and Rules

Section A

The meetings of the organization shall be conducted by Roberts Rules of Order.

Article IX

Club Representatives

Section A

The club members shall elect one representative which shall be non-voting member in Student Council and shall have the floor only in case where the club is concerned.
