Public relations with surrounding communities has been more or less suspended during the last month due to the Cody-Powell resolution asking that no evacuees be allowed to visit the towns. The feeling in the two towns at this time is not aggressive. Visitors have been allowed in both towns on necessary business trips and no untoward incidents have resulted. The Powell Tribune and Lovell Chronical have continued to maintain a favorable interest. The Cody Enterprise has kept in the background, due to the fact that the paper's attorney is one of those who at times has been active against the center. There has been a general decline in agitation in the center since the close of the Denver Post's series of articles. Evacuee morale is generally good and probably will improve with leadership and direction of the Relocation committee. Some feeling may be anticipated from reduction of working staffs and tightening up of regulations.

Relations with Cody and Powell have improved recently with the adoption of a supplemental resolution by the joint-councils of the two towns requesting that the "stop" order on evacuee labor be rescinded. Although the first resolution was not revoked the acceptance of "visitors" is more lenient. Heart Mountain was visited by approximately 20 editors and radio commentators as guest of relocation officers. Favorable results are expected. Project personnel has been closely confined to the center during the month and lack of transportation has prevented making outside contacts. No releases are issued to the press generally except for an evacuee correspondent for the Billings Gazette and the Powell Tribune. Bob White, feature writer for the Gazette visited the project and wrote a Sunday feature, a copy of which was forwarded to the Washington office.

Two untoward incidents occurred this month, however, neither is significant in public relations. The first took place near Garland, about 18 miles from the center where a crew of evacuee youths were working on a farm. An oilfield worker on a Saturday afternoon spree attempted to run down with his car the group of five as they were walking along the highway. They jumped into the harrow pit. The driver returned and said he would kill them. He did return but the farmer employing the boys knocked him unconscious. The oilworker was fined \$125 for drunken driving and disorderly conduct. Felony charges also have been filed against him and his case is bound over to the district court.

Details of the second incident have not been completely recorded by our internal security officers but an evacuee, who according to hospital records, is an epileptic and subnormal but absolutely docile, was struck by an MP in Cody. The evacuee had been working under the close supervision of his father and was in town with a labor crew. The MP, with his company, was transferred to another post the following day and the military had little information at the time on the incident.

The Powell town council wrote to the project director during the month requesting that evacuees living in Powell (they had been taken there at the request of the American Legion to aid in the harvest), should be returned to the center because of rising war feelings, etc. The project director replied, quoting from the attorney general, that evacuees have the legal right to go anywhere, except defense zones. Nothing more has been heard of the matter, although authorizations are being held to a minimum in both Cody and Powell.

The high school basketball team played the towns of Shoshone, Cowley, Cody, Lovell and Thermopolis during the month, winning only one game.

The Women's International Council for Peace and Freedom is distributing in pamphlet form thousands of copies of The Sentinel editorials, "Looking Toward The Future."

The Church Publishing company asked for permission to reprint the Dec. 24 editorial, "And a Merry Christmas to All."

Plans were also developed for the remodeling of the Administration Building to the extent of housing the new division.

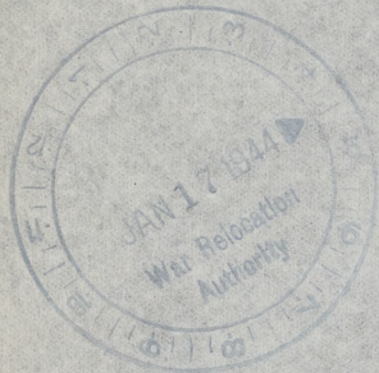

Public relations were held to a minimum during the month to avoid possible unfavorable reaction to the atrocity stories. An exhibit of arts and crafts scheduled to be shown at Lovell was cancelled, but arrangements can and will be made for the event at a later date. Basketball games were played with visiting teams from Cowley, Byron, Worland, Cody, all in Wyoming, and Rapelje, Montana. Members of the Chi Lambda group of the Community Christian Church, about 40 of them, were guests of the Methodist church in Cody.

On the basis that relations in Cody couldn't be much worse, the Sentinel attacked foreign-born U.S. Senator E.V. Robertson in a page one editorial hoping that it might be helpful in slowing down his sniping at evacuees. Not a single complaint was registered while many local people congratulated us on our stand, asking for extra copies of the paper to mail to friends. The editorial was picked up by AP, UP, and INS.

An exhibit of the local Fire Department and report on clean-up week was submitted to the International Fire Prevention Council. Our one opportunity to conduct an outside contact campaign when Sgt. Ben Kuroki was here was made impossible by the War Department's ruling that there could be no outside appearances. Jack Corbett, high school principal, outlined educational facilities and progress before the Powell, Wyo., P.T.A. A "bright" spot in center activities has been the brief patriotic ceremony conducted before the administration flagpole for each group of inductees leaving the center for service. Actually, a minimum of outside criticism has marked the failure of the large number of draft-age men to answer their pre-induction calls. Newspapers and press associations have followed the battle between the Sentinel and the Fair Play Committee and have supported our campaign. Many encouraging letters have been received from outside complimenting The Sentinel on its stand. In preparedness we are watching carefully any developments that might result from the approaching trial.

Suggest more frequent and complete reports from the Washington office to the project. For instance: We received a telephonic report on the recent shooting at Tule Lake on Thursday, May 25. The brief and meager report was carried in the bulletin that day with a statement that more information would be released as received. On Saturday we received a routine teletype carrying practically the same information we had received by telephone two days before. That was the last information received concerning the incident. In the June 3 issue of The Sentinel we carried a report of the coroner's inquest from a California newspaper which didn't carry out earlier WRA statements indicating that the M.P. guard probably suffered from "itchy finger." The shooting happened May 24, the victim died the 25th, the inquest was held and the verdict rendered the 26th. Since the victim was a former Heart Mountain resident there was considerable interest here.

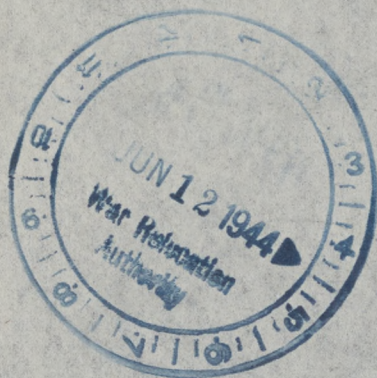

In the June 3 issue of The Sentinel we carried a report of the coroner's inquest from a California newspaper which didn't carry out earlier WRA statements indicating that the M.F. guard probably suffered from "itchy finger." The shooting happened May 24, the victim died the 25th, the inquest was held and the verdict rendered the 26th. Since the victim was a former Heart Mountain resident there was considerable interest here.

Public relations with adjoining towns at the present time are at as low a level as they have ever been. As has been previously pointed out the town of Cody, (pop. 2,500) lost approximately 40 men at Midway immediately after Pearl Harbor and a certain element has always been antagonistic. During the last year oil field workers have flocked to both Cody and Powell and since most of them are "roughneck" workers the feeling against the center has been increased. This antagonism has not thoroughly penetrated either town since businessmen are almost 100% in favor of evacuees shopping at their places of business. For the third time the Powell city council recommended to the project director that no more evacuees be allowed to visit the town--businessmen, however, opposed the action. The project director and relocation officer, (who lives in Powell) both talked to the Powell club, (similar to the G of C). Behind the general movement against evacuees is the fact that "vested interests" at Powell are anxious to get the first opportunity at the project land, which has been developed by WRA, after the war is over, consequently, they have asked for a statement from Washington to the effect that all evacuees will be forced to leave when the military necessity no longer exists.

A 700 word story and pictures were sent to the Cheyenne Tribune for its "Frontier Days" edition.

Heart Mountain's superior high school team defeated Duron 31-0; Red Lodge, 60-0; Lovell, 32-0 and Burlington, 44-0. (to be subsequently defeated 19-13 by Casper for our first defeat in two years.) The Happy Time club sent three boxes of clothing from the Community Christian church congregation to destitute French children. Two delegates attended the Hi-Y conference at Pueblo, Colo., Oct. 7, 8. A delegate attended the Student Christian movement meeting at Topoka, Kans. Miss Ethlyn Christensen, industrial secretary, Buffalo, N. Y., assisted with Halloween parties for all center children on Oct. 30. Center-wide participation has been taken in the Red-Cross and National War Fund drives. The conspiracy trial in Cheyenne, Oct. 23-30 at which the majority of project officials were called as witnesses offered an opportunity to maintain continued relations with newspapers and officials. The governor and various state officials were called upon by the project director while other important persons were contacted by others of the director's staff.

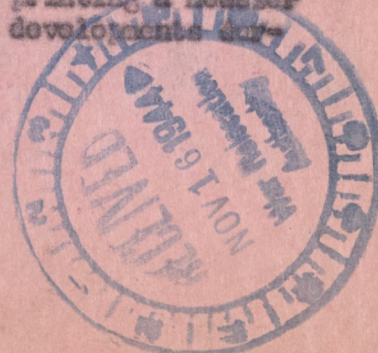

Four delegates attended the conference of the Central Wyoming Council of Boy Scouts at Casper and Dick Fujioka, Coordinator of Y activities attended the West Central Region Conference on Boys' Work Secretaries at Kansas City. Airmail, special delivery copies of the Sentinel were sent to West Coast papers on each casualty report.

With the change of management at the Cody Enterprise (which publishes the Sentinel), our relations have shown a decided improvement. For the last two weeks The Enterprise has picked up Sentinel stories, carrying them on page one. We feel certain that The Enterprise will be more amenable to suggestions and recommendations than ever before. We were unable to carry out the presentation of the Silver Star to Mrs. Aoyama as we originally planned. The program was to have been held on Easter Sunday, at which time members of the Powell and Cody American Legions were to have been invited. With the change in Army personnel requested by Washington, the ceremony was pushed up to Thursday. Miss Lisette Anderson, State Field Director, Red Cross, spent a few days here on a routine check-up; Rev. and Mrs. Donald Torihai returned to the Center after several months on a survey tour of eastern cities studying relocation possibilities and ~~problems~~ **COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS** problems; Rev. Daisuke Kitagawa, visited United Christian Ministry to Japanese-Americans in the Twin Cities, visited the Center and met with several families concerning relocation.

The Chi Sigma Lambda (High School age boys of the Community Christian Church) played basketball with a team from the Cody Presbyterian Church and defeated them 30 - 27. With the Center population reaching its lowest point each week, the general feeling toward the Center by local residents is improving slightly.

### COMMENTS AND SUGGESTIONS

With the relocation of the associate editor of The Sentinel and the imminent relocation of Haruo Iwano, the editor, we have hit a not low. It is doubtful if The Sentinel can continue more than two more months at the most. Besides the two editors, several others are planning to leave in the next week or so. When The Sentinel does fold up, information, naturally, will be distributed to center residents in bulletin form. As per our recent letter, we emphasize our wish for "personalized paragraphs" of relocated persons. Heart Mountain residents, formerly from Los Angeles, will be glad to read about a former friend or neighbor from the same city regardless of whether the evacuee is from Heart Mountain or any of the other centers. We feel, as we reported before, that a string of "names" will be of more interest than "success" stories. This applies to all parts of the country -- not California alone. We would suggest that the name of the family, their present address, their business, their pre-evacuation address, and their relocation center be included. (A)

Indications point to the suspension of the printed Sentinel on July 28. The immediate reasons for suspending The Sentinel are: lack of a competent staff and because the trust is rapidly losing money due to the fact that we have not accepted subscriptions for six months. The Japanese section of The Sentinel may be discontinued in its present format two weeks earlier. A skeleton staff will remain on the Japanese section, sufficient to translate necessary information, for what period we do not know. With the suspension of The Sentinel we plan to continue our Tuesday and Thursday bulletins of essential information as it is now being published. In addition, we publish a bulletin devoted to current news, policy announcements and relocation stories. We will not attempt to stimulate a newspaper format because of the additional effort necessary in cutting stencils. Documentary reports from all divisions and sections, bringing them to a current basis are due in the Reports Division July 15. There undoubtedly are many problems facing this division in the coming months. We are attempting to anticipate them; however, no definite plans can be made since the situations are unpredictable and our facilities for meeting them are equally unknown.
